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QUASTION.-Do yon know what the sparata Sohgol Act ia?
ANswnd-Yes. It in an Aot that was passed in the year 1855, during the laat Parliamentary eeesion held at Queheo, the ohief provicion of which 1 l , that the head of five families, "heing Roman Catholios," have the privilege of eatahlishing a Separate Sohool in any Sohool Section or Ward, for the excluaive education of their own ehil dren.
Q.-Are thene Separate Subsole entitled Qovernment firante ?
A.-Yes. Every Separate Sohool eatahished under the Aet is entitled to a alare of the fund annually granted by the Ligisa lature for the support of Commen Schools.
$Q$.-LIave any other religious denouinations the privilege of erecting a Seperate Sobool ?
A.-No. Those profossing the Roman Catholio religion are the only ones impow. ered hy law to ereot Separate Schools, and bare thue a preferential olsim in the eye of cho la $w$ over and above all others.
Q.-But have not Preahyterians, Epiecopalian and Wesleyana an equal right in the eye of the law with Roman Cathollcs ?
A.-Not in Canada. Ifere the aoruples of the Roman Cathollce are protected by legal onatment, but those of the other reilgious denominatione are not known to the lew.
Q.-Dien not that atriks gou to be very unfeir?
A.- - ertainly it does. For ${ }^{-t}$ is ohvioue that if any particular seet is parmitted to brenk awey from the Nationnl Synten of Education, all others should he entitled to the same privilege
Q. - What would be the effect if the provisions of the Separate School Act were extonded to other religious denominations :
A.-Its offset would be that each sect would bave ite own school, in which the dogmas of a particuler creed would be taught. Ths oountry would then be studded with smell nod inefficient schoole, and the Nitional System of Education would be utterly dem stroyed.
Q. - But hare not the Roruan Cntiolice a right to teach their children after their own partucular creed
A.一Most assure lly they have. But then tho public moneys should not he devoted for that purpose. If such a system is to he euouraged, the S:ate will soon loo found onduwing the schools of every sect, and the wirnt features of the connexion between Caurch and State inevitahly introducel. Q.-But d)ell children in the cown and cition gat to the Nati mal Schools?
A.-No. There aro many private sehools at which children aro tanght ing accomplished individuals, but with these the govornment hos mothing to do, nur do they receivoang money from the state whatever. Perons senling their childeen to such whilu's are tot csompt from the Common Shom tux, whish they pay in addition to the charges unde at theee private sulhools.

Q.-Under what olrcnmstancen was the

## Aot pareed:

A.-The Bill was seoretly concooted under the auspioes of Blishop Charbonnel, and introduoed Into the Leglalative Counell towards the end of the Session of 1885 whioh was held at Quehec. It was eent down to the Lower Luuse on the 2lat of May, and finally passed eight daye afterwarda.
Q.-But the Upper Canadians to whom the act applies could not have been aware of its provisinns hefore it was finally passed A.-Thoy were not. It was brought down within eight days of the prorogation of Parliarliament, and urged on with tho utmost onosd, notathatanding thar the government had lad the Upper Canadian memhers $t$ believe that no important measure would ho introduced, and many had left Quebeo for the Upper Provinoe.
Q.-But was not the usual time allowed for deliheration on suoh an important measure:
A.-No. Atry-Gan. Macnonalid moved the "first roading" on Monday, the 2let of May, and carried ite second reeding "far tho following day." The Reform party asked the Atty-Gen. to give a little time, hus he, urged on hy Biehop Caarnonnza., and haoked up hy a uuited majority of the Roman Catholie members of the Ifouse, would listen to no dalny, and Mr. Brown'e motion was lost, by e mnjority of 67 to 17 . The Oppo. aition prayed for one week's respite, in nrder that "a call of the House" might be mede, and the moniberd who had left for Upper Ceneda recalled. But this did not suit the Priest party; they know that it would bo impossible to carry the measure if that oourse was adnpted, and the govern. ment oontinued to pross it on the Iouse. Mr. Ravkiv then eoliultel that three daya should be ellowed to elapse, hut that too was deniod; and tho socond reading of a bill relating entirely to Upper Canada wae foreed through hy the Priest party of Lower Canada, before a copy of the Bill bad found its way into the Upper Province!
Q.-Dida.jy of the Upper Canadian mem bers rote for such an injurious measure under such unheard of oiroumstances :

Q.- But lo a Natlonal 8yatem of Kdueation of ae math lmpertanee at you seom to attrlhute?
A.- Moat oortalnly. A National Syatom Eduoation in the mont efficient ayatom of "Pollice," and the Sohool Temoher is the beit "Policeman." Wherever a Nailonal System of Fiuoation exists there are the people the moat bighly educated, and the grosser orlmes the least frequent. To break up auoh a aystem may be the ohject of thone whose power is chlefly drawn from the Ignorance of the maseses ; but in a conntry like Canada-where thought as well as person is free-no other than a Natlonal Syatem of Education ost. prorail.
Q. - llas any oplnion been expressed on this suljeet by ocrleniastion of the Moman Cathollo Cburoh?
A.-Yes. The Koman Catholio Biahop at Toronte has doue no, and hat given direoe tions, in a pastoral letter, ns to the oourso to be pursued respeating oandidates to Par. liament?
Q.-What is that oourse ?
A.-To require from every now oandidate for a seat in Parliament a pledge to aupport Separate Suhoola.
Q.-Anything else?
A. - Yee. The Bishop connsela bia floek - to oppose, hy all oonatitutional means, the re-olection of any memher who has roted or aoted against that support ; and If onr active 00-operation might be of any service in any oonstltuenoy of our Diocese, for either the aid pledge or opposition, we would give it moot willingly within the measure of our ebility, and without any buman consideration.
Q. - Is that the Biehop's langnage ?
A.-It is, as contained in a Patoral written on St. Nicolas' Day.
Q.- Do the Roman Catholion Insist that the support acoorded by them to any oan didate should he on oondition of his onpporting Esparate Schools?
A.-Most oertainly. That in the etipn lated condition, as sot.forth in the Bishop's pantoral lotter
Q.-Do yeu gather from tho language of the Bishop that ho will interfere in politioal contents:
A. - No otber meaning can be attaohod to his words, and alrealy secret negooiationa with candidates lave been concluded in this matter.
Q.-lt would secui thon to le the duty of Protestnnts th oppose this deep-laid schome to destroy tho National Systom of Eluca tion by overy meuns in their power-by miting is the support of thmac onndidatos hame whe will plodge thomselves to nholish
 uppret a Nuibnal Systoun of Eliseation 1.-That is undoubtedly the enso.
