Royal Commission on Trade Relations Urges West Indies to Make Arrangement With Canada.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)
LONDON, Sept. 26.—(Special.)—The report of the royal commission on taade relations of Canada and the West Indies, issued to-day, signed by Lord Balfour of Burleigh, Hen. Wm. Fielding, Hon. Wm. Paterson, Lord Islington and Sir Daniel Morris, comprises sixty pages, besides voluminous appendices. The commissioners strongly represent that the preference granted the West Indies by Canada for some years, has been of great value in furnishing a favorable market for West Indies sugar, just as the United States, thru the development of their own colonial policy have ceased to require West Indies sugar as largely as formerly.

rely.

The West Indies are strongly urged to make reciprocal concessions to Canada, so that the advantages already obtained may be continued. Considerable attention is paid to the controversy between West India shippers and Canadian refiners, as to the existence of a West Indian combination to obtain excessive prices and the special concessions made to refiners a year ago, respecting the importation of a limited quantity of foreign raw sugar at preferential rates.

Withdrew Special Concessions.

It is recommended in any scheme for the betterment of trade relations that may be proposed, the special concessions to refiners be withdrawn, in asmuch as the West Indies would regard that step as essential, but that the percentage of the preference allowed by Canada be reduced and made definite and unqualified.

# **WATERLOO**, 1915

History to Repeat Itself? Millions of Trained Men for Defence Are Needed.

LONDON. Sept. 26.-Considerable markable letter written by the secretary of the Devon branch of the National Service League, published in The Naval and Military Record. Under the caption of "Waterloo, 1915," the writer says:

'History repeats itself and the 'balance of European power' that centu-ries has been the bedrock of our foreign policy must once again decide our fate. The two power standard is hardly enough to give us reasonable safety. It is the least our naval needs demand. The care of three hundred million natives seething with unrest in India may soon require the whole of our regular forces to stem the tide of mutiny. What about Gibraltar, Malta, Egypt and South Africa and our interests in Europe? The least that can provide the means to face our trouble is a nation trained for war.

"We only fool about and trust our destiny to the efforts of a few thousand gallant patriots who chance to

volunteer. Untrained, unready, quite incapable to take the field with less than six months' training after war breaks out, stinted and starved, they are completely isolated from our public life, that prefers its ignorance and mbecility to any strenuous preparation to defend its homes.
"We want a million men with six

months' training now, and after that months' training now, and after that another million in reserve, and these must be intact when all our regulars have left our shores. Without them we can neither fight by land nor sea. It is evident to all but to our ill-informed and apathetic people that our supremacy at sea is slipping from our grasp, and our rivals feverishly prepare to dictate terms when we are least expecting war.





It will be unfortunate if the present opportunity is not taken advantage ment of Toronto. Toronto has an unfortunate way of missing good opportunities and the outlook does not conduce to sanguine views. We might have had a splendid little square in front of the city hall if the advice or prominent citizens had been taken a dozen years ago, and the cost would have been a comparative trifle. We might have had Yonge-street widened from King to Carlton if common sense had been allowed to rule fifteen years ago before the Confederation Life Building was crected, and the cost would have been quite intangible, for great as the advance on Yonge-street property has been in that time, with a street 15 or 20 feet that time, with a street 15 or 20 feet cases, wider the values would have been greatly enhanced.

Now there comes a providential opportunity for a thoro remodeling of the city government. Will the mayor and council pass it by as their predecessors passed other good opportunities in former days, or will they consider the best interests of the city; will they regard the future of the whole municipality as of greater importance than any mere temporary personal advantage they might gain; and will they take steps to put Toronto under such a form of government, by charter or otherwise, as will ensure for all time the highest efficiency, the greatest economy and the most enlightened progress for its population?

Is none of the members of the council willing to take up this question? The mayor might make his name historic if he tackled the subject in a progressive spirit. Is the opportunity to be passed over as others have been, or can the council be persuaded to act?

SECRET OF SOIL FERTILITY. What is described as an "epoch making discovery" in connection with soil fertifity was discussed at the Sheffield meeting of the British Association in a paper read by Dr. E. J. Russell, soil chemist of the Goldsmiths' Company's Rothamsted Experiment Station, Harpenden, Hertfordshire. It was prepared in conjunction with .Dr. H. B. Hutchinson, the bacteriologist at Rothamsted. and described the result of an investigation prompted by the practice of French vine growers, who had noticed many years ago that the phylloxera or vine pest could be checked by treating the soil with carbon disulphide, and that in consequence the crops increased. For a long time no reason for this could be found, but about five years ago, while observing at Wye Agricultural College, the rate at which bacteria were working in the soil, it was found that antiseptics like chloroform or toluene increased the amount of bacterial activity and consequently the rate at which plant food was made.

This result was unexpected, since it was supposed that antiseptics would kill the beneficent bacteria, but fuller investigation showed that there was something in the soil that kept these bacteria in check and prevented them from making as much plant food as they ought to have done. This was ultimately ascertained to be due to the presence of certain organisms, larger than bacteria, and either living on the bacteria or keeping them off their food and so starving them. It was then found that the results obtained by the French vine growers were due to the fact that the antiseptics which killed the injurious organisms did not affect the bacterial spores, which were very resistent to the poison. Removal of the enemies of the bacteria enabled the latter to multiply rapidly, work at their proper efficiency and so produce a larger amount of plant food. Further experiments are now in progress with the view of discovering the most economical method of treating ordinary soils. The paper read by Dr. Russell has attracted considerable attention among British agriculturists.


