TORONTO MOUNTED RIFLES

Recruiting for the New Corps Will Be Commenced Monday at the Armouries.

CAPT. G. A. PETERS WILL COMMAND.

An Attractive and Distinctive Uniform Will Be Devised by the Authorities.

Capt. George A. Peters, late of the Governor-General's Body Guard, has been recommended by the D.O.C. of the district to command the Toronto Mounted Rifles.

The establishment of the squadron is 204 of all ranks. The strength is distributed as follows: One major, 1 captain, 4 subalterns, 1 veterinary officer, 1 squadron sergeant-major, 1 quartermaster, 1 sergeant, 1 farrier sergeant, 5 sergeants, 1 hospital corporal, 6 corporals, 2 buglers, 74 privates mounted and 6 not mounted.

Military authorities expect great things to result from the establishment and equipment of this arm of the service in Canada, and it will no doubt soon become a popular and efficient force as it has proved to be in Australia, New Zealand and South Africa.
