It was thru show-ing the economic value of a man, which was \$10,000, that wakened the men of the United States to a realiza-tion of the situation. The outstanding point driven home by the speaker was that no woman ever chooses the lower strata of life from choice. It is a gradual step which may be retrieved in its early stages, but not even the patriotic appeal to go into munitions with but \$16 a week to back it up was sufficient to turn back the women who were enured to a life of vice, with from \$50 to \$100 a week as the wage. For such there is no reform except religion at the psychological moment, said the speaker

solution of the social problem offered was to save the children thru organization, which must be largely voluntary. Thousands of volunteer women are wanted. Probation officers cannot begin to cover the situation. In the United States there are 400,800 women who are kept at a cost to the state of anything from \$2 or more a week paid by the citizens.
