## BYRON LOTT IN BELLEVILLE JAIL REILLY CONFESSES AND RINS AWAY SHIBBLEY WAITED BUT CAN'T BE FOUND

### Late Liberal Candidate in West Hastings Arrested as He Returns From a Hunting Trip.

### Reilly Makes Confession Denies Many Statements Took Trip to Watertown

Montreal, Q., Nov. 21.—(Special)—F. J. Reilly, the man whose name was brought into the West Hastings bogus ballot box case by Phil Lott, brother of the Liberal candidate, returned from Ottawa yesterday, and in an interview with a correspondent of The Star stated that he was being made THE SCAPEGOAT OF CERTAIN LIBERAL ORGANIZERS.

Phil Lott, it will be recalled, told the court of his visit to Reilly at Kingston in connection with the procuring of the ballot boxes. Reilly declares that he has not been concerned in the inventing, manufacture or forwarding of bogus ballot boxes, but had on a visit to Watertown, N. Y., ascertained the price to be paid for them from the tinsmith who had manufactured them. He had also met Phil Lott in Kingston and written the letter which was produced by Mr. Corby in court.

He had never made the statements attributed to him by Lott that Ross was bound to win it. He had never paid a visit to Toronto nor had he ever met Cap Sullivan or Vance. He had not even received the expenses for his trip to Watertown. He had not been correctly subpoenaed to go to Belleville, but was prepared to do so as soon as required. He was confident that he could clear himself, BUT HIS EVIDENCE WOULD IMPLICATE CERTAIN OTHER PARTIES.

He had never seen the ballot boxes until a week before the elections. He then recognized the enormity of the offence and regretted his part in it. Reilly said that J. Shibley, the Liberal candidate in Frontenac, had given Phil Lott a letter of introduction to him. A warrant for the arrest of Reilly for contempt of court was lodged with the Chief of Police here on Saturday evening last. Reilly has not as yet been arrested, and considerable indignation is expressed on this account.

### SHIBBLEY LEAVES HIS HOME BUT WARRANT SWORN OUT

Has Been Sitting Tight, But Drove Away From Harrowsmith on Monday Morning.

Harrowsmith, Nov. 21.—(Special)—This is the home of W. J. Shibley, Liberal candidate for the commons at the last federal elections. It was said in The Globe that he was in Belleville on Saturday, but it is not true. He was here all day Saturday. He heard that a warrant was out for his arrest to-day and left for parts unknown this morning. He drove away. He had not yet returned at 11 o'clock, and it is believed by many persons in the village that he will not return till he cares to. Knowledge that Byron O. Lott had been arrested in Belleville caused great excitement. It is known that a warrant is out also for Shibley, and it is believed he is absent to escape service till he has had a chance to consult with his lawyers in Kingston.

### REILLY LEAVES KINGSTON CHIEF OF POLICE BLAMED

Teaches at Regiopolis College, But Did Not Put in an Appearance All Day Yesterday.

Kingston, Nov. 21.—(Special)—This is getting hot in the bogus ballot box case in this city. The man who had the boxes sent to him here has left the city. T. J. Reilly made an admission of guilt on Sunday last, but on consulting with his lawyer, J. McDonald Mowat, asked him to withdraw it, but the message had been forwarded. He returned from Ottawa on Sunday and was in the city until this afternoon, but then he was seen, and is said to have gone to Watertown, N. Y. He did not teach at Regiopolis College to-day and sent word he was sick.

Considerable adverse comment is made over the fact that the chief of police held since Sunday night a summons for Reilly as a witness, and also a warrant for his arrest, but neither was returning Reilly at Fermoy in Frontenac, and the returns there are suspected.

## JAPS EXPLODE PORT ARTHUR MAGAZINE KILLING RUSS SOLDIERS NEAR ARSENAL

Mine Sungshoo Hill and Train Big Naval Guns on Warships in Harbor, Making Breaches in the Walls.

Tokyo, Nov. 21.—During the bombardment of Port Arthur on Saturday night from the fort captured on Sung Shoo Mountain, shells from the Japanese naval guns exploded a Russian magazine near the central arsenal, setting fire to the adjoining buildings and undoubtedly causing great loss of life to the Russian soldiers in the camp between Quail Hill and Orling fort. The imperial headquarters to-day, in the light of the destruction of the magazine, publishes a despatch from General Nogai's headquarters, dated Sunday morning, in which he says:

"Our operations against all the forts not already captured are proceeding as planned from the East Hill and the Russian magazine. We have shelled the Russian magazine, which was engaged in introducing coal, between Quail Hill and Orling fort, causing them to flee in confusion. The breaches made on the western side of Port Arthur have been widened, and our gunfire has put the Russian warships out of action. Several of them are badly damaged. In other directions there is no news yet."

It is unofficially reported here that the Japanese successfully mined the most important point of the East Hill on Friday, which will permit their naval guns to have free play on the Tiger Peninsula, and make it impossible for the Russian warships to remain in Port Arthur harbor. This is not confirmed by the best authority was due to the fact that the signal gain by General Nogai's army.

### WILL SEE THE PREMIER THRU HON. J. M. GIBSON'S INTENTIONS

Decides to Remain in the Ross Government, But Without Portfolio, Tho' Weary of Politics.

Hamilton, Nov. 21.—(Special)—At the annual meeting of the Liberal Association this evening Hon. J. M. Gibson made the interesting announcement that he had decided to give up the attorney generalship. He admitted that he was somewhat weary of politics, but would stick to the premier, who he would not take such an active part as in the past. He had been in the government for 15 years, and had asked to be relieved of his portfolio. The premier asked him to remain without a portfolio and he had decided to do so.

### ON RHILING COUNTERSCARP

Tokyo, Nov. 21.—Reliable sources report that the Japanese mined and occupied a counterscarp on Rhiling Mountain Nov. 19. A despatch from Tokyo early to-day announced that the Japanese effected a successful mining had occupied a counterscarp on Rhiling Mountain on Friday, Nov. 18. Rhiling (or Erling) Mountain is east of Saughe Mountain. The latter is due north of Port Arthur. Rhiling Mountain forms part of the northeastern fortifications.

### DOMINION PARLIAMENT JAN. 11

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—(Special)—Parliament has been announced to meet on Wednesday, Jan. 11. The order was passed at to-day's cabinet meeting, and an extra of The Canada Gazette will be issued at once with the usual proclamation.

### A GOOD BEGINNING

Without division, the city council, at a special meeting last night, authorized the mayor, the vice-chairman of the board of control (Controller Hubbard) and City Treasurer Cuddy to purchase a million dollars' worth of gas stock. The sale took place at Townsend's, the auctioneers on Tuesday. The council, it is said, only \$100,000 of the stock is sufficient to secure civic representation on the board of directors, but secured, but got no support.

The city council, in special session last night, authorized the mayor, the vice-chairman of the board of control and the city treasurer to buy a million dollars' worth of gas stock. The matter was discussed at length and, while many were of opinion that the city should not go beyond the purchase of sufficient stock to give the mayor a seat on the directors, Ald. Crane was the only member of council to vote against the bylaw and the proposal to retire this year. The other speakers were very careful to lay stress on the fact that they favored the principle of municipal ownership. The order for the expropriation of the new Union Station property was apparently satisfactorily amended by the board of control, as it passed the council without word of comment. The petition to the Dominion government, asking for legislation amending the charter of telephone companies in order to protect the rights of municipalities and providing for the purchase of the lines and operation of the long distance lines were endorsed without discussion, as was also the request to the provincial government to erect a sanitarium for consumptive in Ontario.

### FAREWELL TO EARL GREY MANY PROPHECIES MADE

(Canadian Associated Press Cable)—London, Nov. 21.—Some 300 assembled in the Princess Restaurant, London, at a farewell dinner to Earl Grey, Governor-General-elect of Canada. Amongst others present were the Archbishop of Canterbury, the agent-general of British Columbia and Nova Scotia, the Earl of Aberdeen, the Earl of Litchfield, General Lord William Seymour, Lord Vaux of Harrowood, Viscount Bury, Baron Sulzky of the Japanese embassy, Mr. Hon. Sir John Brodribb, M.P., Sir Percy Girouard, Sir Neville Lytton, Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, Major-General Baden Powell and J. G. Colmer, secretary to Canadian high commissioner.

Lord Aberdeen, in proposing the imperial forces, drew attention to the splendid work done by the Canadians in South Africa. CIVIC OWNERSHIP PAYS PEOPLE OF BROCKVILLE

Gas, Electric Light and Water Services Much Cheaper and Revenue on Upward Move.

Brockville Nov. 21.—(Special).—The announcement recently made by the board of light commissioners of Brockville, that a reduction of 25 per cent. will be made in the cost of illuminating gas will draw attention to the fact that the town of Brockville has made a conspicuous success in its municipal ownership of light and water plants, both of which it bought and took over from the corporations which formerly owned them. Today Brockville gets a better and cheaper water and light service than any other town in Ontario, and has also extended its service of water, light and fuel gas among the people of Brockville to the advantage of citizens individually and collectively. Their health, comfort and purse have been benefited by the municipal ownership of these two public utilities. A short history of municipal ownership in Brockville will doubtless be of interest to readers of The World at this juncture, when the problem looms up prominently before Canadians. In 1834 the waterworks system was established and operated by the town for about ten years, but the service was so poor and the price so exorbitant that the town finally determined to buy it, and accordingly in November, 1852, after an expensive legal arbitration, the town bought the waterworks plant and system. This amount was raised by debentures which were being paid off annually out of the revenue without increasing general taxation. Ever since the last twelve years the waterworks have more than doubled in size, and the price of water has been reduced by a succession of discounts until today the town consumers get far better service than under the old private control and at nearly 50 per cent. less cost.

Service Grows. In 1892 there were eleven miles of waterworks, now there are eighteen miles, with 181 consumers against 72 when the works were taken over. There has been a substantial increase in revenue from \$18,312.13 in 1883 to \$25,000 in 1904. The increase is more than appears on the face, because the revenue of the past year was made up at very much less than those of the previous eleven years ago. The average annual rate for each domestic consumer is \$2.25. The town has increased its waterworks, increased fire protection, besides making an annual donation of \$100 to the town library to assist in the purchase of books. Recently the commissioners completed the erection of one of the finest pump houses in the province. It is equipped with all modern improvements, and contains two high-pressure and two low-pressure boilers, also one pump of 4,000 capacity and two of 2,000 capacity. Improvements are being made annually and the system is being extended to other parts of the town, to the benefit of the people and to the improvement of the general health. The low death rate in Brockville is attributable in a great measure to the general use of water and the excellent sanitary state of affairs. This sanitary state of affairs has been accomplished by municipal ownership of the waterworks. Brockville would advocate the return to private ownership of the waterworks system which looked upon the town as a benefit of reason.

Gas Works Taken Over. Municipal ownership of the waterworks proved such a great success that the ratepayers decided upon the purchase of the gas and electric light plant from a private corporation, and on Oct. 17, 1904, the works were taken over at a cost of \$100,000. A being issued for that amount extending over a period of ten years, and the ratepayers are now in a very dispirited condition after being in use for four months. It was accordingly lowered from \$1.25 to \$1 per 1000 cubic feet. On Jan. 1, 1905, the price of electricity was reduced from 20c per 1000 watts to 18c. On the same date meter rates for which was charged 50c per quarter, was abolished. Consumers of illuminating gas now get their lighting by the amount of a reduction of 25 per cent. or \$1.50 net, per 1000 cubic feet, instead of \$2 as heretofore.

Gasworks Increase. Under municipal ownership there has been an enormous increase in business. On Sept. 30, 1904, the revenue from gas was \$14,688.06, against \$25,480.40 on Sept. 30, 1903. The same creditable record is shown in the case of electric light. On Sept. 30, 1904, the revenue was \$8,883.25, and on the corresponding date three years later, it should be borne in mind that the letter figure is not the revenue, but the amount of rates much lower than the schedule charged by the private company. In four years the number of consumers has increased about 85 per cent. On Oct. 1, 1904, there were installed 126 meters, on Sept. 30, 1904, there were 112, the largest increase taking place in the number of meters in a year. A corresponding increase in the record of electric light consumers. The ratepayers are well satisfied with the investment. They are getting a much better service at reduced prices, and twenty years will own a plant out and out with a commercial value of not less than \$100,000. It should also be noted that municipal ownership of the gas and electric light plant has resulted in increased lighting facilities of the public areas. The reconstruction of the Victoria Hall by a debenture debt is now nearing completion, and in a short time the public offices, police station and headquarters will be under a new roof. Brockville has set the pace for municipalities of larger and more pretentious nature.

STILL DISPUTES HIS LIABILITY. Sheriff Dana Again Asking Courts to Reconsider Judgment.

Chicago's Big Subway Project. Will Deliver Railroad Freight Into Basement of Business Houses.

Trenton, N.J., Nov. 21.—The Chicago Subway Company, with an authorized capital of \$50,000,000, all common stock was incorporated here today. It is understood that the purpose of the company is to build a subway in Chicago.

Getting Seared. Troy (N.Y.) Budget. The result of Canada's recent election ensures the construction of another transcontinental railroad. Its eastern terminal will be at Portland, Maine, which is a necessary because available Canadian ports are either about to be closed for several months in the year, as a result of the rise and fall of the tides are so great that much expense, danger and inconvenience would be caused. Portland will be helped by this new line, because it is 300 miles nearer Liverpool than New York. Still the Canadian line should not be permitted to have its line on our coast, except under terms which will prevent any part of the line being put to military uses during a war.

Canadian Fruit. London, Nov. 21.—The Nova Scotia government has again arranged through the agent-general for the province in London, for a fine display of apples and other fruit at the Canadian court in the Empire Exhibition. The British Columbia fruit exhibit which obtained the Royal Horticultural Society gold medal at the recent show at Vincent Square, London, is also being sent to the exhibition. The Canadian government is doing a useful work in this regard, and it is to be hoped that the many-sided resources and capacities of our greatest colony.

The Promised Land. Governmental reports from the Nova Scotia district show that in McCant Township the eastern portion is not a desirable one. The population in the district is 1100. Little Township, shows about 60 per cent. of the area a rich soil, and the other 40 per cent. of the area is a poor soil. The Mann Township should eventually be suitable for cultivation.
