

PASTORAL LETTER.

My Dear Friends:

You will find in the following Reports much interesting information in regard to the work of the Church during the past year. It is not possible, of course, by any mere statements or statistics, to indicate the full results of Christian activity; but sufficient evidence is afforded by them for abundant gratitude to God, and for quickened zeal in His service that we come behind in no gift, waiting for the revelation of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Your attendance at public worship has been most encouraging, and while we have not been visited with any unusual evidences of the Divine blessing, it cheers me to know that my ministry among you is not without it quiet helpfulness. To God be all the praise!

During the year no less than eleven of our members have been removed, some of them suddenly, by the hand of death. My earnest sympathy goes out towards the bereaved families, and I pray that the Father of Jesus Christ may abundantly sustain and comfort them.

Since our last Report, I have succeeded, by persevering industry, in completing pastoral visits throughout the whole congregation. These visits have been most enjoyable to me, and, I hope, of some benefit to you. My only regret is that under ordinary circumstances they cannot be more frequent. The care of the sick and troubled always demands the first consideration. And beyond this, in view of my growing belief that the strength of the Christian minister should be concentrated upon the work of preaching, little opportunity remains for general intercourse with you in your homes. Be assured that no one feels this deprivation more than I do myself.

Our mid-week services, on the whole, have been better attended than usual, and my hearty thanks are given to the orchestra of young people for the faithful and efficient way in which they have led the musical part of these services.

I gratefully acknowledge the ready assistance of many in different departments of Church work. I confess my need of such stimulus in order to the most effective and hopeful discharge of the duties of my ministry. And my prayer is that the Spirit of God may fill us all with fresh power and earnestness to go forth as true labourers in the vineyard of our common Lord.

KIRK SESSION REPORT,

The Kirk Session desire to present the following statement in regard to the work of the Congregation during the past year.

There has not been much change in the condition of the Congregation since last Report. The work carried on by its various organizations has been attended with more or less encouraging success; the results in so far as these can be tabulated will appear in the separate reports of the several departments of Christian activity. The Session gladly recognize the value of these auxiliaries—some, in promoting the missionary and benevolent work of the Church, others, in imparting religious instruction and otherwise exerting a salutary influence in moulding the lives of the young people of the congregation and stimulating them to develop their gifts by exercise in Christian service.

The mid-week services were held in eight months of the past year, and, on the whole, they have been more largely attended than usual; thus indicating that they are appreciated by a portion of our members and esteemed as a helpful means of grace.

The public services on the Lord's Day have been held regularly throughout the year; and the attendance at both the morning and evening diets of worship has been uniformly good; the ordinary seating capacity of the church having been generally fully occupied. The presence of so many worshippers every Sunday has been stimulating and very encouraging. During the Pastor's vacation in July and August his pulpit was efficiently supplied by Rev. Mr. Winfield, Rev. Prof. Ross of the Presbyterian College Montreal, Rev. Dr. Macrae of Morrin College, Quebec, and Rev. John McLean.

It has been a cause of thankfulness that the Great Head of the Church has enabled Mr. Herridge to continue his pulpit ministrations and pastoral work with so much zeal and fidelity, and in view of his ministry, and the earnest efforts that have been put forth by his co-workers in every branch of congregational activity, the desire of your office-bearers finds appropriate expression in the words of the Psalmist: "Let thy work (Oh Lord) appear unto thy servants, and thy glory unto their children, and let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us, and establish thou the work of our hands upon us, yea, the work of our hands establish thou it."

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered to the Congregation four times during the year. The average attendance of our own members at these quarterly communions has been, (260) two hundred and sixty; being an increase of (17) seventeen over the reported average of the previous year. The average attendance of visitors at these Communions has been (30) thirty.

The Treasurers' statements, which are part of this report, show that the plate collections at the Sunday services of the past year are slightly in excess of the previous year, the ordinary collections having been \$2,204.00, and the special \$763.39, and that the contributions to the Schemes of the Church and interest on Church loan, through the medium of the schedules amount to the sum of \$3,530, out of which the following allocations have been made to the several objects named in the schedule, viz.:—

The Session record with pleasure the fact of an increase both in the amount of the contributions to the various church enterprises and in the number of those who contribute. At the same time they hope to see a more general response to these appeals on the part of the members of the congregation, each giving according to his, or her, several ability.

The Session record with deep regret the departure to Montreal of Mr. Matthew Paterson, who for so many years has been a most useful and valued member of the Kirk Session.

The members of this Church having taken a prominent part in the inception and organization of the Glebe Mission, and being, to a certain extent, pledged to assist in its maintenance, they will be pleased to learn that under the pastoral care of the Rev. Mr. Winfield the Mission is meeting with encouraging success. From the perusal of its First Annual Report it appears that its members are carrying on the work of the Mission with commendable enthusiasm. It now reports a membership of fifty, being an increase of eighteen members since its commencement one year ago. And their contributions toward the support of the Mission exceeds the amount of their guarantee. They have, however, required the promised assistance of this Church in making up their minister's stipend, the amount of aid thus given will appear in the Financial Statement of the Temporal Committee of this Church.

The Session having been entrusted with the oversight of the Mission, they dispensed the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper to its membership four times during the past year, at which the Rev. Mr. Winfield officiated as Moderator, pro-tem.

In conclusion the Session gratefully recognize the zeal and constancy which so many members have shown in the varied work of the congregation, and they cherish the hope that in the coming year a still greater number will fulfil their share of duty and responsibility as members of the Church, by engaging in such active service as they are qualified to undertake, either on Sundays or Week-days. The Church organizations may thus be more efficiently equipped for their work, and through the blessing of the Divine Master and the co-operation of his Spirit encouraging results may be expected to follow.

A By-law of the Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church in the City of Ottawa in connection with the Church of Scotland:

Whereas the Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church in the City of Ottawa, in connection with the Church of Scotland, require for the purposes of the congregation of the said Church, including the keeping and maintaining the said Church and other property belonging to the said Corporation, and in liquidating the general indebtedness of the said congregation, the sum of \$2,000—to be paid to them from the principal moneys received from the sales of land by the Glebe Trustees of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, and have determined to request the payment by the said Glebe Trustees of the said sum for the purposes aforesaid.

Now Therefore the said Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church in the City of Ottawa, in connection with the Church of Scotland, doth hereby enact and ordain as follows:

I. That the Glebe Trustees of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, be required and they are hereby required and directed to pay to the said the Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church in the City of Ottawa, in connection with the Church of Scotland, the sum of \$2,000—to be applied by the said Temporal Committee to the uses and purposes aforesaid; and this By-law shall be sufficient authority to the said Glebe Trustees for the payment of the said sum of money as aforesaid.

Orchestra, gave a very enjoyable recital and concert on the evening of the 18th January—realizing the sum of \$69.15.

NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The meetings have been held regularly on the first Friday of every month and have been exceptionally well attended. The monthly letters from the missionary at Lake Dauphin, with full details of his work, have been heard with much interest and have given us an insight to the arduous duties he overtakes in that large area over which his work extends. Mr. Gourley, the present missionary, was appointed in May 95, and seems to be the right man in the right place, young, full of zeal and not afraid of work. He has opened three new Sunday Schools, this year, one at Cumberland, 11 miles from Lake Dauphin, with an average attendance of 40, one at Ochre, and one at Turtle River.

The recent completion of the long promised Lake Dauphin rail—way has been an immense boom to the people in that district, providing as it has an outlet for their farm products, and bringing civilization nearer, and it has also brought in a large number of new settlers.

The two Congregations of Dauphin and Gartendre are being united in one, as the railway station is located between these two places where there is a beautiful site for a village on the south side of the Vermillion River, and within 10 miles of the Riding Mountain. A new manse is also nearing completion. Mr. Gourley writes that were it not for the efforts of this Society they would be quite unable to sustain their mission.

In February the sum of \$80.00 was sent out, and in October a further sum of \$180.00 was sent, and most gratefully acknowledged by Dr. Robertson. In answer to an appeal from Mr. Gourley for money to help to build five small churches, the sum of \$82.00 was raised as a special fund and will shortly be applied to this purpose.

The usual Thank Offering meeting of the Society was held in April, and was honored by the presence of the Honorary President, the Countess of Aberdeen, who kindly addressed the ladies. Her Excellency dwelt on her experience of life in the far West, where, during her prolonged residence, she had had opportunities of becoming acquainted with the life and difficulties of the missionary, and said how important it was that these pioneer missionaries should be chosen from amongst the best people, and possessed of high character and endow-

Many adventurous young men went out to this new country thinking they could throw off the conventionalities of the old world, and are therefore open to whatever influence surrounds them. At this meeting the sum of \$154.80 was contributed.

The October meeting was addressed by the Rev. Dr. Smith of Kingston, who had travelled considerably through the North-West, and gave many interesting anecdotes of the self denying missionaries who leave everything in order to carry the Gospel to these lonely settlements and endure much hardship.

In December the ladies sent out two large trunks full of useful and fancy articles, including toys, books, games, warm clothing, magazines and other reading matter, to be distributed among the church people, and judging from the experience of former years, they will be very acceptable and help to cheer many lonely hearts.

We close by thanking all who have aided in this good work, and trust that this new year will be one of increased activity and usefulness.

The "St. Andrew's Church Auxiliary of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada" (western section) continues doing a good work, with about the same membership as last year. The monthly meetings have been regularly held, and the "Letter Leaflet," the Society's organ, has been read, giving latest news from the workers in the several missionary stations: In the North West Territory, in Trinidad, in Central India, in Formosa Island and Honan, China, and in the New Hebrides Islands.

The "Thank offering gifts" in October amounted to \$123.35. With the ordinary fees and subscriptions added to this, the sum of \$193.16 has been contributed this year to the funds of the general Society. The value of the clothing sent in September by our Auxiliary to the Industrial School for Indian children, at Crowstand, was estimated at \$89.25.

The members of our Auxiliary are deeply interested in the work of our great Society, which last year reported a total membership of 22,802, and the generous sum of \$42,876.33, which was contributed to advance its interests.

The Young People's Society held its Third Annual Meeting in November.

The receipts for the year amounted to \$78.66, expenditure \$33.11, leaving a blance on hand of \$45.55.

A glance at the work of the following committees will show what has been done during the year.

Prayer Meeting.—During the first half of the year the attendance was small, but since then it has been slowly and steadily increasing. The interest taken in the meetings has been more marked than ever before. As the studies in the Life of Our Lord were found both interesting and profitable last year, they were continued, and with them the lives of Wyclif, Luther, Calvin and Knox. It has always been difficult to secure leaders for the meetings, but this year quite a few who had never done so before, helped in this way. The seed has been faithfully sown, and we may safely leave the rest with Him who has promised to give the increase.

Social.—Retreshments have been provided for four socials. This means a great deal of hard work for the members of the committee, and they are to be congratulated for the way in which they have done it.

Sunday School.—The Orchestra has become an important feature

in the work of the Church. Many of the services of the Church, Sunday School and Society have been improved greatly by its help; and not only our own Church but others also have been benefitted by it.

Missionary.—This committee have held six sewing meetings, the last of which took the form of a Missionary Tea held at the residence of Mrs. Bryson. A very enjoyable time was spent, and considerable work done. Mr. Bryson kindly donated some flannel, which is being made into garments. About twenty dresses are ready or almost ready to send away. "I was naked and ye clothed me," will be the Master's word of thanks to these workers.

Music and Literary.—Excellant programmes have been provided by these committees for three very successful "At Homes" to the young people of the Church. These were well attended and very much enjoyed.

Flower.—The members of the Flower Committee have during the year visited a large number of houses where illness has kept some one prisoner, and the quiet cheerful talk and beautiful boquet of flowers have helped to make the life of the patient brighter and happier. This is one of the branches of our work which is very near to the Master's heart and His own words, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethern ye have done it unto me" is the best reward to those who are carrying it on.

We lay the work of the year at our Master's feet asking Him to put away all that has been contrary to His will, and to bless exceeding abundantly all that has been done to His glory.

There are at present on the roll 277 scholars and 31 teachers and officers, with an average attendance for the ten months during which the school was open of 171 scholars and 26 teachers and officers. The maximum attendance during the year was 261, on the Sunday before Christmas.

Several changes in the teaching staff have taken place during the year. Mr. J. R. Reid, who had charge of the senior boys' class, left in June to assume the superintendence of the Glebe Sunday School, and his class has been taken by Mr. Alexander.

The annual picnic was held at Chelsea on 27th June, and although the weather and arrangements were all that could be desired, there was a very small attendance and a loss sustained of upwards of \$40. Under these circumstances we think it will be well to omit the picnic next year.

The festival on the other hand was most successful, there being a large attendance not only of scholars, but also of their parents and friends. Lime light views, illustrating the missionary labors of Rev. Dr. Paton in the New Hebrides, were an interesting feature on the programme.

The teachers meet weekly for study of the lessons in association with other schools connected with the local Sunday School Union.

The scholars are provided with the Home Study Series of Lesson Helps, published by the General Assembly's Committee. These are admirably adapted to the needs of our Sunday Schools, and, as the name indicates, are intended for use in the home and not in the class; and we respectfully urge parents to see to the home preparation of lessons, without which comparatively little good can by accomplished by the teacher.

The collections in the School are devoted wholly to Missions. The amount contributed this year is \$200, the largest sum yet reached, and the allocations are as follows:
