The Question of Federation

Discussed by a Jamaican.

The recent meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade at Yarmouth, N. S., started two ideas of confederation that at present may seem distant, if not chimerical, but may eventually work out into a great a success as the federation of the Dominion nearly forty years ago. It is with the second and more remote that this present article deals, viz.: the Union of Canada with the West Indies. The absence of details in the report of the proceedings make a full discussion impossible, as it is not clear what kind of union the board desired, or whether it included in the West Indies the Bermudas, the Bahamas, British Honduras and Demerara, or British Guiana, which, though neither an island nor in North America, presents all the features of West Indian life. Probably it is quite as well, for principles may be better grasped without a multitude of details, and until the idea has caught on there can be no question of practice.

What are the circumstances that suggest union?

It is urged in the first place that this region is a part, and an old part, of the British Empire, dotting the south part of North America, and the mere fact of that suggests the idea of union, if not unity.

Again, in the great expansion of empire in the last century it is increasingly difficult in the mother country to give adequate abtention to this small and distanterritory.
