



RECIPES FOR SUMMER DRINKS

Ginger Punch—Take one quart of water, one cupful of sugar and five lemons and make a strong lemonade; slice the lemons after rolling and mix with the sugar, and allow them to stand before squeezing and mixing them together. Bruise slightly a dozen eticks of mint, put them into a bowl with the lemonade and add a quart of ginger ale. When ready to serve put a large piece of ice in the bottom of a tall glass pitcher, strain in the lemonade and ale, and in the mouth of the pitcher put a fresh bunch of mint, which has been dipped first in lightly beaten white of egg and then powdered sugar.

Canton Punch—Boil four cupfuls of water one cupful of sugar and half a cupful of Canton ginger, cut fine, for 20 minutes. Strain and add half a cupful of orange juice. Chill, and when ready to serve pour over a block of ice in a punch bowl and add a quart of charged water, with bits of lemon, orange and pineapple.

USEFUL HOUSEHOLD NOTES

when cleaning pantry shelves fold together at least three sheets of newspaper the longest way of the full sheet. In this way your shelves may be cleaned often and with little labor.



The wheat is headed out. It has been The wheat is headed out. It has been nourished by a bounteous season. Rains fell providently. North, south, east and west favorable conditions were known. The sunshine was abundant. Frost was unfelt. The soil could not have failed.

The Northwest farmer was not discouraged by last season's shortage. He had witnessed worse. He had faith in the future. He broke more ground to make good his disappointment. He has realized his expectations. He put his money once more into wheat and it has come back to him in a measure to over-flowing.

money once more into wheat and it has come back to him in a measure to overflowing.

In two weeks the harvest will be general throughout the three great provinces of the Dominion that stretch from the lakes to the mountains. Wheat, oats, barley are all abreast of the season. In some exceptional districts they are slightly affected by hot winds. But that is the most that can be said.

The problem that remains is the saving of the bumper crop. A careful look all along the line would satisfy the ordinary observer that the railroads have not been asleep. Long strings of empties are stalled at every shipping point. The labor market is in a favorable condition. The harvest hands will pour in this season.

There are many reports spread that suggest obstacles to the farmer. There is the old-time story about a slip between the cup and the lip. The northwest farmer is quite ready to drink the cup of prosperity. And he is troubled with prophesy of a blockade, with assurances of falling prices, with the continuance of the money stringency.

There is little of genuine substance in any of these warnings, though the present crop is the largest that has been, the railway facailities are better than ever before, and the recent business depression has enabled the roads to supply more cars for the crops. As for the size of the crop being a factor in making for lower prices, there are records also of the smallest presently available world's supply for many a year. The crop about to be harvested may bring up the supply to what it should be. But if prices come down now, it will be because they can be knocked down temporarily. The bankers in the east, too, have been shortening credits all along since the financial depression in order that they should have money to move the crop. They have the money accordingly and the crop will soon be in the moving. The farmer is entitled to a full return.
