## GERMANS PRESSED BY BRITISH ON WESTERN FRONT AND DISMAYED BY STRIKE SITUATION AT HOME Separate Peace Idea Died With

Tens of Thousands of Reserves Being Hurled Against British Battlefront in Effort to Check Advance, so Far Without Avail -Hungary, Frightened, Promises Internal Reforms

The battle of Arras still rages with the issue remaining in doubt. For six days the armies of Great Britain and Germany have struggled for the mastery in a conflict which baffles superlatives. Tens of thousands of reservists have been hurled against the British battlefront by Field-Marshal Von Hindenburg in a supreme effort to check the British advance, but so far without avail. Almost literally, foot by foot, General Haig is forcing his stubborn foe back. Both sides are fighting with a resolution as grim and savage as any the war has shown, and it sems to be a question as to which can sustain its ghastly sacrifices the long-

On the eve of the great general strike planned for May Day, the German press and leaders are displaying a feverish apprehension as to what the morrow will bring.





## WANT BORDER WATCHED MILITARY DESERTERS

So many desertions have been reported from the overseas forces of late that the military authorities are sugesting that it might be of advantage if the opportunities of crossing the border were made a little more difficult, the further suggestion being that every man of military age crossing to the United States should be required to produce a letter or should be required to produce a letter of customs officials. So far as can be learned, the United States appears to be the refuge of the great bulk of deserters, so the military officials feel that this field could be cut off if more stringent regulations were enforced at the inter-national line. While it is possible to deport Canadian deserters from the states, the great difficulty seems to be to locate the men.
