Canada Is Making 30,000 Shells a Day For Allies' Armies

Before Long The Output Will be 50,-000—Some 60,000 Men Engaged and **More Wanted**

Ottawa, Ont., June 4—The appeal by Right Hon. Lloyd George for greatmunitions of war, directs attention anew to the activities in that line in Canada. Some months ago, a vigorous campaign in shell production was started and it has not only stimulated the industry but it is aiding the allies in a way that

From every factory or shop that has the equipment, from the steel plants in Nova Scotia right through to Vancouver, shells are being turned out. Many smaller concerns have adopted their equipment to shell making, while others

The total production at present is 30,000 shells a day. Before long it is planned to make the daily output 50,600. Two kinds are being made, shrapnel and high explosive, and at several points explosives of the most destructive kinds are being made.

Shell orders so far placed in Canadda by the allies are close on \$200,000,000,

The number of men engaged is around 60,000 and more are wanted. Upwards of 600,000 shells sent to the front from Canada, are giving the greatest satisfaction. Several industries are also working at high pressure in the manufacture of machine guns, rifles and similar equipment.







Paris, May 15 (by Mail to New York) -You can't exactly say that the Allies aren't sticking together, but you do come across lots of quarrelling between them. That is, not between the soldiers, but

across lots of quarrelling between them. That is, not between the soldiers, but between the civilians; the folks who haven't gone off to fight, but who take their duty out in talking.

There are plenty of fine strong men of every nationality here in Paris; of every nationality except French. If the history books which are studied a quarter of a century from now are as muddled in their stories of the Great War as these men of different nationalities here in Paris, life is going to be a burden for the school kid of 1940.

"They say that Gen. French was outnumbered three to one at the battle of Ypres," said a Russian to me. "It's not true. Why, seven-eights of the German army was over on the eastern front fighting the Russians at that time. It was the Russians that saved the little English army, because we took so many German soldiers away from France."

If you're a Frenchman or an Englishman you can take up the issue with this Russian artist in Paris, any time you please, and get as pretty a little interally-scrap as you want. However, if you're an Englishman, you won't quarrel with the Russian, because you'll have your hands filled with your elderly French friends who couldn't get into the army because of their age. "What! General French saved Paris!" one of them exclaimed. "Absurd. Why, he and his little English army was so far down south after the retreat from Mons that it took them two days to get back to the French lines to support them

"Rot!" I've heard an Englishman answer. "We Allies must stick together, and so I won't quarrel with you."

And, just about this time, another Frenchman will chime in:

It was Gallieni who did i."




