## PARLIAMENT MEETS UNDER COALITION

London, June 3—Both houses of parliament met today for the first time since the organization of the coalition government. There was little criticism except from the Radicals and Nationalists, and this was not very strong. The suspensory bill, allowing the members to sit without re-election was passed, as was the bill establishing the portfolio of minister of munitions. Premier Asquith was absent, but the house was led by Sir J. M. Simon, and the secretary of state for home affairs.

ITALIANS HAVE ARMY OF OVER MILLION MEN

Strength of the First Line is About 700,000 — Men Are Liable at 20—Half Reservists Mobilized Had No Connection With Their Regiments

The London Times' military correspondent points out that Italy's army is general and personal in Italy. This liability lasts for 18 years, and begins at the age of 20.

Service in the standing army is the same but with unlimited leave, the third is enrolled in the territorial militia.

The first of these regiments happen to be quartered. About one-half of the reservists embodied on mobilization will usually have had no previous connection with the regiments in which they serve in war.

Peace and War Strength. The peace strength last year before the war was 141,211 officers, 330,000 other ranks and 55,727 horses.

The approximate strength in something over a million—standing 218,000 for the standing army, 345,000 for the mobile militia and 540,000 for the territorial militia.

Equipment in Arms. The Italian infantry are armed with 6.5 mm. Mannlicher-Carcano magazine rifle, pattern 91. A part of the territorial militia still have the Vetterli-Vitali, model 70-87. Officers have the sword and automatic pistol.

The war found the Italian artillery in process of re-arming. It possessed about 100 field batteries, armed with the 75mm. Krupp Q. F. field gun, and others with an older weapon. Meanwhile the depot gun, 150mm. pattern 1914, had been adopted and 100 batteries of these guns should have been delivered by the end of last year.

There are some useful 60 batteries of Krupp howitzers and a large assortment of siege and fortress guns running up to large calibres. The normal siege trains include 9, 12, and 15cm. guns and 15 and 21 cm. howitzers. These are stored in the northern fortresses, but heavier weapons would doubtless figure in the field.

**WALL STREET AND THE WAR**

Not in eight years has Wall street witnessed the activity that developed toward the end of March and continued in million-share days for nearly six weeks. During that time the stocks of manufacturing companies identified with foreign contracts appreciated in value more rapidly than had any other group in the history of the New York Stock Exchange. Bethlehem Steel was the first to rise, from \$80 a share to approximately \$100 a share. The public was fascinated by this performance and on the slightest excuse or on the first exaggerated rumor of new orders rushed in and paid the asking price for stocks that had gone begging a few weeks before because they had not been able to earn dividends.

Instances were multiplied of the tripling and quadrupling of prices within a few weeks. It became a regular thing for quotations of the stocks of ordnance to appear in the newspapers. Some of these advanced from \$300 to \$800 a share. One of them sold as high as \$1,400 a share. The craze reminded one of the tulip speculation in Holland some decade ago. Stirring Appeal For More War Munitions

Manchester, Eng., June 3.—A stirring appeal for co-operation in the matter of supplies for the Allied arms, particularly munitions of war, was made to-night in this city by David Lloyd George, minister of munitions.

"I come here to tell you the truth. Unless you know it, you cannot be expected to make sacrifices. Our Russian allies have suffered a severe setback. The Germans have achieved a great success, not because of superior valor of their soldiers or strategy of their generals. The German triumph is due entirely to superior equipment, an overwhelming superiority of shot and shell and munitions and equipment. It was a battle won by the use they made of their skilled industries, and especially by the superior organization of German workshops."

"Two hundred thousand shells were concentrated in a single hour on the heads of the gallant Russians. Had we been in a position to apply the same process to the Germans on our front the Germans would have been turned out of France and driven half way across the devastated plain of Flanders. They would have been well out of the country they had tortured and tormented with diabolical cruelty. More than that, we should have actually penetrated Germany."

"I say to those who wish to dismiss the conception, for the time being, as a means of levying armies for fighting abroad, that they ought not thereby to assume that compulsion is unnecessary in enabling us to mobilize the industrial strength of the country," he continued.

"We were the worst organized nation in the world for this war, which showed that we had nothing to do with precipitating it. It is a war of munitions, and the government has decided that compulsory powers are essential to utilize the resources of the country to the best advantage. The work of the country must come first, because, unless it does, viewed in all parts of the country through which he traversed were of the very best. Edmonton, June 4.—Hon. Frank Oliver has returned from a political tour of the Peace River country, visiting the Peace River Crossing, the Grand Prairie and Smoky River Valley and a number of settlements. There is now direct rail connection between Edmonton, at McLennan, a distance of about 800 miles, and in addition the ex-minister followed the trail for about four hundred miles. He found vegetation and crops just as advanced in the Peace River country as at Edmonton. Railway construction is going on rapidly, and a number of small craft are busily engaged on the Peace River. Settlements are pouring in and the anticipation of railway construction, the wheat acreage has been greatly increased. He states that the crop conditions are

750,000 ITALIANS TO AID HOMELAND

Canada, States and Argentine Can Supply That Many

MOBILIZE IN MONTREAL

All Reservists Anxious to Fight Traditional Enemy and Recover Long Lost Provinces

(Montreal Gazette.)

The armies of Victor Emmanuel can be strengthened from the United States, Canada and the Argentine Republic to the extent of 750,000 men, or enough to drive the Austrians out of Trieste and Trentino without the aid of home troops, who are being mobilized to the extent of two million men. It is estimated that whenever they are wanted, from ten to fifteen thousand of all classes will be called from Canada, some five thousand of these being in Montreal. There are almost half a million of these reservists in the United States and the remainder of the three-quarters of a million which will go across to fight against the traditional enemy of their country are in the Argentine."

No specific information has yet reached the consulate in this city as to when the first drafts will be sent home, but news may be at hand at almost any time. The consul-general says that the Italian government is responsible for the transportation of these reservists to their own country and all the Canadian reservists are to be finally mobilized in this city. The thousands of men who are liable for service in the home army are being notified from day to day either by the Italian consular machinery in this city or by the different consular officials throughout the Dominion. There are few sons of sunny Italy in America today who ignore the fact that the fatherland is at war with Austria and that the moment for avenging the wrongs of the past hundred years has arrived. As was stated yesterday at headquarters, every group of Italians both in town and country and around every camp fire is already discussing the outcome of the

struggle and are talking about their respective military districts to which every man repairs once he lands on Italian soil.

A number of men from southern Italy who were grouped around the consulate yesterday said there was no difference in this sentiment for the south and the north are as one in their desire to get back the two lost provinces which have been in Austrian hands far too long. Having called all the classes it is evident that Italy is preparing for the worst, for although they expect an easy victory over the Austrian army when the first serious clash takes place, they have no doubt but that the old enemy will die hard and that every effort at the disposition of the nation will be required.

One thing is certain, the Italians expect to get back Trieste and Trentino and the chief place of the first named province being the important seaport on the Adriatic will not doubt be an important place for Canadian imports and exports after the conclusion of the war and after the national ambitions are satisfied and the national frontiers modified to the satisfaction of Italy.

It is stated that the men now preparing to fight for the Italian cause will not proceed at once to the front as soon as they reach home, but will be kept in the different districts until they are absolutely fit to meet the enemy in open field. All have, of course, had their accustomed military training, and will soon get into shape. Arrangements are also being made, so it was said yesterday, for looking after the families of the married men who are to be recalled home, but as this will constitute a considerable burden the understanding is that the single men will go first. At the end, however, when the families are left behind, it is understood that they will be under the protection of the various consular agents of the country. One of the features discussed yesterday was the absence of any danger in transporting troops across from this continent to Italy and here he served the thinking Italians are posting the feats of the British fleet in so handsome a manner, clearing the ocean of the German submarines. They say that thousands of Italian soldiers can be taken home to the Mediterranean without even the assistance of convoys until they get into home waters. One of the first Italians to leave was Baron D'Annunzio, who left last evening for home via New York.

The Italian Red Cross committee has already received contributions totalling \$774, and all contributions received will be acknowledged by Cher. G. Ghilotti, the Italian consul for Canada.

**SOME DO THEIR DUTY BY TALKING**

All Have Different Versions Of Who Saved Paris

SAD OUTLOOK FOR 1940 BOY

But in the Meantime the Fighting Men on All Sides Stick Together — Gossip From Paris Cafes

Paris, May 13 (by Mail to New York) — You can't exactly say that the Allies aren't sticking together, but you do come across lots of quarrelling between them. That is, not between the soldiers, but between the civilians; the folks who haven't gone off to fight, but who take their duty out in talking.

There are plenty of fine strong men of every nationality here in Paris; of every nationality except French. If the history books which are studied a quarter of a century from now are as muddled in their stories of the Great War as these men of different nationalities here in Paris, life is going to be a burden for the school kid of 1940.

"They say that Gen. French was outnumbered three to one at the battle of Ypres," said a Russian to me. "It's not true. Why, seven-eighths of the German army was over on the eastern front fighting the Russians at that time. It was the Russians that saved the little English army, because we took so many German soldiers away from France."

"If you're a Frenchman or an Englishman you can take up the issue with this Russian artist in Paris, any time you please, and get as pretty a little interally-scrap as you want. However, if you're an Englishman, you won't quarrel with the Russian, because you'll have your hands filled with your elderly French friends who couldn't get into the army because of their age. 'What! General French saved Paris!' one of them exclaimed. 'Absurd. Why, he and his little English army was so far down south after the retreat from Mons that it took them two days to get back to the French lines to support them.'

"Rot!" I've heard an Englishman answer. "We Allies must stick together, and so I won't quarrel with you."

And, just about this time, another Frenchman will chime in: "It wasn't Foch, who saved Paris. It was Gen. Manoury."

Now this starts a quarrel between the two Frenchmen.

"But Foch got orders to hold his line when the Germans were advancing," says the first Frenchman, "and he sent back word, 'I can hold no longer. I must attack!'"

"Ah! That's all very fine and true, but Manoury, with his little army, came up against the German flank, from Amiens, when the Germans didn't know there was a Manoury army," says the second

Frenchman, "and he drove von Kluck away from Paris."

"It wasn't Foch or Manoury either," chimes in a third Frenchman. "It was Gallieni who saved Paris. Gallieni got together an army of 60,000 men in Paris on Sept. 5, and he sent them out from Paris in taxis to the Marne and this fresh strength turned the tide against the Germans. It was Gallieni who did it."

"Who was it who saved Paris?" I asked an Englishman.

"I don't believe in the bally allies quarrelling," says the Englishman, "but it was General French and his 70,000 Englishmen who did it. The Germans didn't know they were anywhere near the Marne and when Gen. von Kluck turned his flank toward the Marne and started east to meet the forces of the Crown Prince of Germany, Gen. French saw that he had him, and he struck at him like lightning and routed him. It was the greatest thing ever done in human warfare. Paris was saved that day!"

"Yes, without a doubt," speaks up one of the Frenchmen, who has been quarrelling with his compatriots. "History will probably say that the English saved Paris. History is always twisted around to give the English the best of it. Twenty-five years from now little children will be spanked in school for not remembering the date on which the English rescued Paris from the German hordes."

And, with this bit of sarcasm, he leaves the cafe, muttering that everybody knows that it was Gen. Joffre who saved Paris.

Yes, indeed! The allies are sticking together; that is, the soldiers of the allies are sticking together. But, with the civilians of the allies it's quite another matter. You can see this early in the Great War, that three sets of histories are going to be written, telling about what the allies did in 1915. And these histories are going to disagree just as radically as do the talkers of all nations in the cafes of Paris.

**FIRST THROUGH TRIP OVER C. N. RAILWAY**

General Manager Enthusiastic on His Return — Line Now Complete From Winnipeg to Vancouver

Winnipeg, Man., June 4.—M. H. MacLeod, general manager of the Canadian Northern Railway, returned to Winnipeg this morning after completing the first through trip to Vancouver over the company's main line. Mr. MacLeod was jubilant. "I traveled on a gasoline jigger over the last 800 miles through the mountains," he said, "in order to make close observations on the work.

We have put down a track that will not need rebuilding later on, and we expect to be ready for traffic in about two or three months. We have over 1,000 men at work at the present time ballasting the line, and we are going ahead to put up stations and other equipment. No details have been worked out as yet as to freight and passenger service.

"In all my experience I have never seen the crops looking better than they do this year," he said. "Through conversation with my superintendents and others whom I have met I have estimated that there will be a 25 per cent. increase in the area under crop along our line."

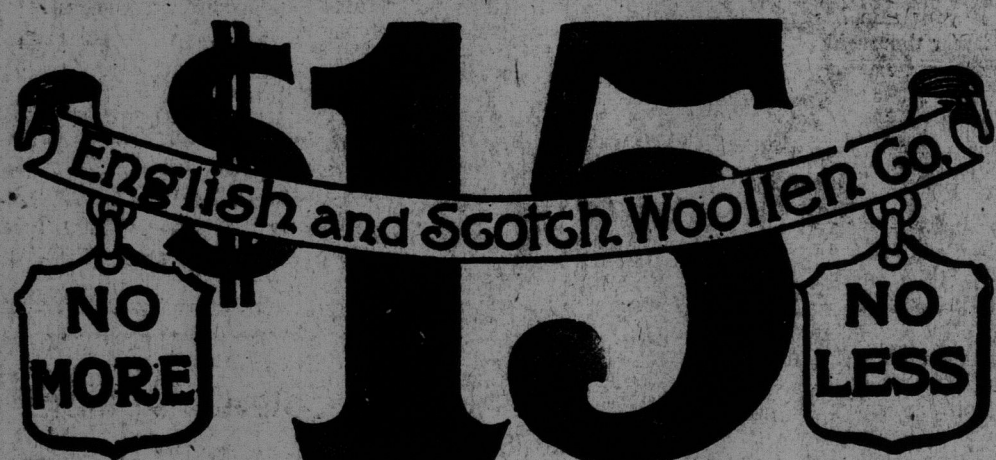

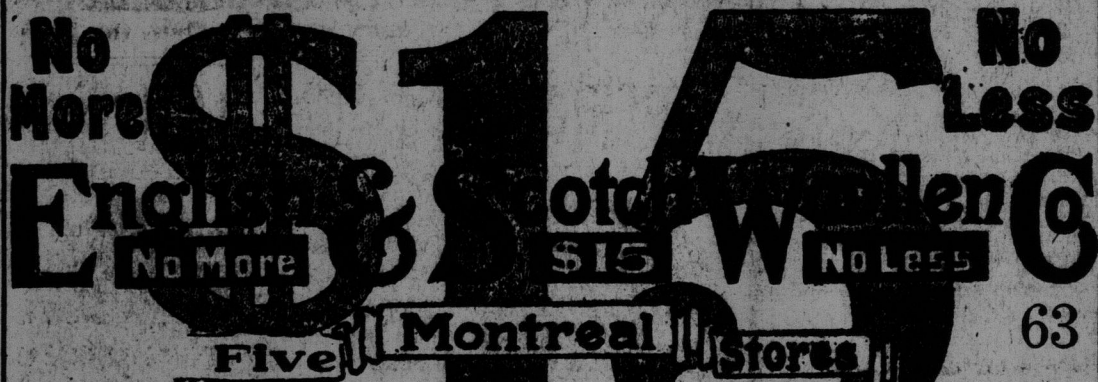

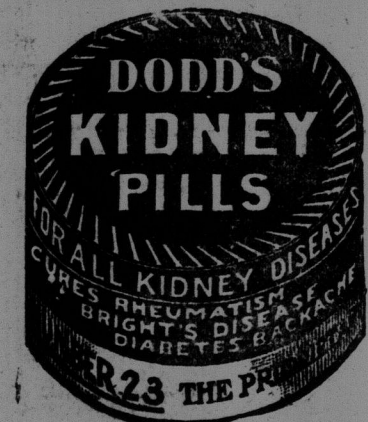

A letter received by a Chatham man from a friend in London, says that Andrew Baldwin, who was wounded in battle is now well on the road of recovery. He is in the Duchess of Connaught hospital. It is hinted that Mr. Baldwin has been reported for great bravery shown on the battlefield.

Major Norman Edgar, 8th Battalion, reported wounded, was one of the best known military officers in the west and was one of the original officers of the 19th. He is a native of Chatham.

Paris, May 10—The story of a German woman's love for a British officer, and how she sacrificed liberty in order to see him has been revealed before a court-martial here.

Franklin Susan Pommerich, aged thirty-six, a governess, born at Dresden, appeared to answer a charge of being in the possession of false identification papers. The judges found her guilty on one count only, and sentenced her to four months' imprisonment, the exact period she has already been detained, but she must leave France and not return for two years.

After the outbreak of war Miss Pommerich asked for a week's holiday, saying she was going to London, but instead of doing so she went to Havre and then to Rouen in search of her old sweetheart.

Unsuccessful in her quest, she went to Switzerland, and in the meantime her employers received an anonymous telegram asking her to consider it was paid the German, who gave details of how the reply was to be sent to disarm suspicion.

There was a dramatic scene in court when she told her story about the British officer.

"I loved him," she said simply; "I love him now; I shall always love him. It is as an Englishwoman, I look upon England as my country. I hate Germany." As she said this she struck the rail with her clenched fist.

Maitre Philippe addressed the court for the defence. Taking the evidence, he broke it piece by piece.

## TWO ST. JOHN MEN WHO HAVE GIVEN LIVES FOR RIGHT

News of Death of Joseph Briggs Confirmed; Also Ellsworth Reid—Geo. W. Boone Wounded

A letter to Miss Ollie Livingstone, 69 Murray street, from her cousin, Private Fred Rolston, of No. 2 Company, Princess Patricia's, confirms the news, published in the Times some days ago, that Joseph Briggs, brother of Policeman George Briggs, had been killed in action. He writes that he saw Briggs shot down, but could do nothing for him, though along side of him. "He died a brave hero."

In another letter Private Rolston describes those terrible days of recent fighting as "a real hell." Telling of one day, he says: "Shelling started at five o'clock in the morning and lasted till dark. It was a slaughter house, a sight I never will forget as long as I live. I was in the thick of it with my company. Only about fifty of us came out all right, but it will not be long before we are back again to give the Germans some more cold lead. I think we made every bullet count that day. Every man did his best. It is a hard sight to see your comrades shot and shelled to death. You care for nothing; I know I did not."

Private Rolston has been at the front for four months.

Geo. Boone Wounded

A telegram received today by Mrs. Westley Boone, 417 Haymarket Square, brought the sad news that her son, Private George W. Boone had been wounded in France, while fighting with the 17th Battalion, to which he had been transferred from the 12th. He is about twenty-three years of age, and was well known about the city. He had been employed with R. J. Currie, harness-maker, Waterloo street, and was popular in Y. M. C. A. circles. He left St. John last fall in the infantry company from here, for the 12th Battalion. The last letter received from him a few days ago said that he had been through some heavy fighting but had escaped without injury. Besides his parents, the young soldier has two brothers and seven sisters at home.

## SELF-DENIAL DAY RESULTS PROMISE TO BE EXCELLENT

Self-denial day for the benefit of the Belgians was a pronounced success in the city yesterday. ## MORE ABOUT I. C. R. AND POLICE IN COURT

The case against Constable Roberts of the I. C. R. depot, charged with interfering with Detective Worrell while the latter was in the execution of his duty in the depot on May 19 and 20, was continued in the police court this morning. John Lawlor, Joseph McHugh, Frank Curran and Conductor Charles Clark testified for the defense. The defendant arose and, addressing Detective Worrell, said: "You may be from Scotland yard, but I am from Grand Lake. I am simply the depot constable and will not be interfered with by any city official. I am going to fight this thing to the bitter end and I have lots of backing in the city to do so."

The second charge against the defendant was taken up. Detective Worrell said he visited the depot on important business, while in the discharge of his duties was interfered with by the defendant. Special Patrolman Barrett corroborated the statements.

The defendant denied the charge and said he had made his remarks general when he ordered the cows out of the lavatory, and told them there was too much loading going on there. He said he had gone there because he had been told that two detectives had entered the place. He said he wanted to see what was going on there.

Magistrate Ritchie said there was no desire to punish anyone and regretted that the incident had occurred. There should be a better understanding between the officials and, he said, the hatchet should be buried. He was of the opinion that when a detective was appointed Mr. Ross should be notified so that he in turn could inform his men and thus they would be able to work in harmony.
