



Famed as Mathematician


Ross., O., Nov. 6.—Cyrus B. Halde-man is considered one of the foremost mathematicians in the world. Scientists frequently seek his counsel. And his name stands out conspicu-ously at nearly every convention of mathematicians both in this country and abroad, though he does not at-tend any of them. Yet Haldeman never attended col-lege a day in his life. Stranger still, his neighbors have heard little of the fame that has come to him.

to him. They know him only as a mender of broken clocks and watches. That is his real vocation. Algebra, geometry, trigonometry and calculus merely are side issues with him—just favorite pastimes. But his knowledge in these subjects has made him a charter member of the Mathematical Association of Amer-ica, the American Association for Ad-vancement of Science and the Royal Society for the Encouragement of the Arts, Manufactures and Commerce in London.

He contributes regularly to mathe-matical publications. His analyses of difficult problems are cited frequently in text books.



GAPT. JOHN HALL GIVES UP POST

Commander of S. S. Montreal is Retiring From C. P. Service.

"It's hard to realize that I'm 61 years of age, that 45 years of my life have been spent at sea, and that when I take my ship into Glasgow at the end of this voyage I'm through with her forever. It's very difficult to sever con-nections all at once, and almost pain-ful to think that this will be my last trip here in the service of the com-pany. I'm coming out next year with Mrs. Hall on a holiday, but it won't seem the same. I'll miss the responsi-bilities that fall on the man in com-mand of a ship." In this way Capt John Hall, com-mander of the S. S. Montreal, expressed his feelings to officials of the Canadian Pacific line on Tuesday when he visited headquarters on his last tr'o to that port in command of his ship. Responding to the lure of the sea at an early age, Captain Hall has dedi-cated his life to it. In his 45 years of sea life, he has served on 17 ships, that have covered some 975,000 miles, and in that time he has visited ports all over the globe. Capt. Hall began his career with the old Allan Line, and when the Allan interests were ab-sorbed by the Canadian Pacific, he be-came identified with the latter com-pany. Becords show that Cant Hall was been spent at sea, and that when I

Records show that Capt. Hall was fourth officer on the Sarmatian, the Grenam, the Manitoba and the Sibe-rian, from 1891 to 1894; that he was third officer on the Siberian in 1896; that he was second officer on the Scan-dinavian in 1898, and first officer on the Siberian in May, 1908. In June of 1908 he was given his first ship, the Orcadian, and from then until now he has commanded the following ships: The Hibernian, Numidian, Grampian, Corsican, Tunisian, Montfort, Sicilian, Scandinavian, Bosworth, Marburn, Marloch and Montreal. His progress was steady and rapid and his repu-tation as a navigator has been of the best. He is well known and well liked by frequent travelers over the North Atlantic route.

Mr. McCrea announced that during the last month a new preserve of some 800 square miles had been created, bringing the total area of crown game preserves in the province up to 3,271,040 acres. The newest preserve, known as the Superior, was located between the City of Port Arthur and the Village of Schreiber, lying to the south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway. In general, the minister's address was of an entirely informative char-acter, statistics playing a major role. The province was divided into six dis-sat London, Ottawa, Orillia, North Bay, Fort William and Patricia. Aside from the executive staff, there were some 107 employees, wardens, and so forth, under the department. As to the fur industry, the total number of pelts taken in 1928 was 769,070-a value to the trappers of \$3,182,395. Some 20,222 hunting li-censes had been issued during the year. In the same period the 284 fur farms of the province had increased their animals to 3,277. Mr. McCrea devoted some time to the success which, he said, had at-tended the placing of English ring-necked pheasants. So well had the birds become adapted to Ontario con-ditions that one day's shooting had been possible both this year and last. 
