Here's to the Gods. By Austin

Here's to the Gods. By Austin Farker.

(Reviewed by John'F. Carter, Jr.)

Here is worse than heresy; here is lese-majeste. This book advances an idea which should make it profoundly repugnant to the sentimental reading public. Mr. Parker has the temerity to suggest that the love of woman is not the essential goal of a man, but accidental; that adventure, high-throned and colorful, a career, independence, can exert a sway more powerful than the homely manacles of marriage or the lure of unpermitted liaison. All of which the writers of Europe, who hold that "love is woman's life; life is man's love," have proclaimed for centuries, which is not argument that it is a true theory, nor proof that it is false.

To fancy that the mechanism of life is all powerful is to ignore many exceptions. To argue from these exceptions that man's real desire is for a life in which he can "pot another with a machine gun, take a drink because he's thirsty, and love a woman because he wants her," is also bad reasoning. There are many men who hanker after a grand, free, and glorious existence, but who are really too completely wedded to orderliness to relish such a change as their wishes would imply, and there is a large body of feminist opinion which helds, with much force, that men alone are responsible for marriage, morality, and kindred shibboleths. To point to exceptions in the vast army of married men does not mean impending mutiny in their ranks, and Mr. Parker has not advanced so absurd a thesis, but it does supply fascinating material for a novel, and of this material Mr. Parker has taken advantage.


No Inquest Necessary in Case of Edward Appleby's Death.





Rum Running, Drug Smuggling and Ship Liquor

Question. (By Canadian Press.) Washington, Nov. 21.-Members of he U. S. commission which will confer with Canadian authorities at Ottawa late this month on liquor and narcotic border smuggling problems

narcotic border smuggling problems began work today on an agenda to place before the conference.

The commission is headed by Assistant Secretary Moss of the treasury. Members of the delegation declined to discuss the meeting further than to say that there was unanimity of opinion as to the subjects which the Canadians would be asked to consider. It has been stated officially at the treasury that the conference would encompass not only the question of rum running across the border, but narcotic smuggling as well and that in all probability, the ship liquor question would be taken up. Support has been lent to the belief that the question of handling ship liquor supplies would be taken before the conference through the appointment as a member of the delegation of Geo. E. Boren, a special assistant to the attorney general, who has been the department of justice specialist on ship liquor questions.







WILSON WAS RIGHT

Represented America That Europe Needs Now, Declares Financier.

New York, Nov. 20.—After listening to speakers who blamed the United States for the gravity of the situation that has arisen in Europe, Otto H. Kahn, in an impromptu speech at a luncheon of the Foreign Policy Association at the Hotel Astor, called upon this country to again take the moral leadership it held in 1917. He refused to "criticize American policy," but admitted that it had not been what he called a "red-blooded policy." Mr. Kahn followed Lebbeus E. Wilfey, who was Attorney General of the Philippines from 1901 to 1906, and M. E. Ravage, author.

"In 1917, before we had become a military force, President Wilson—"said Mr. Kahn, who paused, and by way of explanation remarked, "I'm not a Wilsonite. Pm a Republican, but it's true just the same—from that great platform in Washington, President Wilson crystallized the sentiment the world was fighting for and shook the Prussian throne. That can be done again.

"The world is waiting for America to say the word. America must say the word that will break the spirit of militarism. The moral power of America is Irresistible."

Mr. Kahn then told a story of the late E. H. Harriman, because he thought it revealed the railroad magnate in a position analogous to that of the United States. Harriman made a move to have himself elected a member of the Board of Directors of one of the great transportation systems, and this question was put to him by Mr. Kahn:
