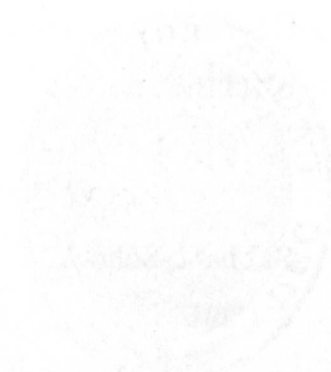

REPORT OF THE KIRK-SESSION.

The Kirk-Session submit the following report for the year ending 31st August, 1877 :

With gratitude to God, who giveth the increase, we record the prosperity of twelve months more. The stated services of the Sabbath have been maintained without interruption, and we have enjoyed at the appointed seasons the observance of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. There are now upon our roll 340 communicants, and the number of families connected with the congregation is 200. During the year 45 were added to the number of communicants—of whom 12 were received by certificate, and 33 on profession of their faith in Christ. The total number who have communed during the year is 285. The number of deaths within the congregation has been 27, of whom 7 were communicants. The number of baptisms has been 26. Letters of dismission have been granted to 3, so that the net increase during the year is 35.

The Sabbath Schools during the year have been well sustained, and the Session takes much pleasure in expressing their gratification with the zeal and diligence of the Teachers and other office-bearers. The Sabbath School, as an auxiliary to the Church, is second only to the Christian home. The place where valuable truths have been acquired becomes endeared to the student, and the memories which cluster around it are more fondly cherished in proportion as the importance of these truths are realized in after years. The Sabbath School, therefore, serves not merely to impart to the children of the Church a knowledge of those facts which, under the influence of the Holy Spirit, make them wise unto salvation, but early implants in them a love for the Courts of the Lord's House and an attachment to the Church of their fathers.

To promote the efficiency of the Sabbath School much may be done by occasional visits of the parents. The Bible Classes seem not to have been appreciated as they should be. Affording as they do an opportunity for more mature religious instruction, they should be, to a large extent, the stepping stones from the ordinary Sabbath School classes to the commu-

nion of the Church, where the knowledge previously acquired is to be turned to practical account in the active service of the Redeemer.

As the Sabbath services are to the Church universal what the family altar is to the home, so is the weekly prayer meeting to the individual congregation what secret prayer is to the inner life of every believer. May we not, therefore, reasonably infer that as he grows weak who neglects to pray in secret so the congregation in which the weekly prayer meeting is not well sustained cannot be strong.

We are entering upon another year. It becomes us to consider—"the time is short, therefore work while it is day for the night cometh when no man can work," and "whatsoever our hands find to do, do it heartily as to the Lord and not unto men."

Looking not upon our own, "debt and revenue" only, but also upon the things of others, the vast and inviting fields at home and abroad, more urgently than ever claim our attention and liberality. Young men must be educated for the Ministry, Missionaries must be sustained in waste places, and the aged and infirm Ministers and their helpless families must not be forgotten in our benefactions.

Your labour is not in vain in the Lord.

"He that goeth forth and weepeth bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

The School and Classes meet every Sabbath afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The number of scholars on the roll is two hundred and sixty, and the average attendance during the year has been one hundred and ninety-six. The largest number of scholars present was two hundred and thirty, exclusive of Mr. Woods' Bible Class. The largest attendance during the year, including Teachers, Bible Class, &c., was two hundred and eighty-five, and the average attendance two hundred and thirty-five.

The studies during the year were the Westminster Lessons upon the International Series.

Since the last annual report the hall has been painted and fitted up in a very handsome manner, and no means spared to make it comfortable and attractive for the scholars, for which kindness we are indebted to the Ladies Missionary Association.

It is to be regretted that out of the twenty-eight teachers on the roll only six are male teachers. Will not a few more of the male portion of the congregation attend the school and assist in this important work.

The school still continues to support two orphans in India, as well as contributing to the maintenance of the Canadian school there.

The annual pic-nic was held in July and was well attended by the children as well as by the adults of the congregation.

The annual Christmas Festival was held on Christmas week and was much enjoyed by the children. Suitable addresses were delivered by several gentlemen. A pleasing feature in the programme was the presentation of a handsome writing desk to Miss Irving for her faithful and gratuitous services as Organist of the school, which position she continues efficiently to fill.

The quarterly children's service, also the praise services were held as on the previous year.

As will be seen from the Treasurer's Report the school this year has not received the usual annual collection from the congregation, which we fear may prevent it from being kept up to its present necessary state of efficiency.

A Bazaar in connection with the Sabbath School was held in December last, and proved to be a great success, the amount realized being four hundred and twenty-eight dollars and thirty-five cents (\$428 35). One hundred dollars was given to the Ladies Missionary Association in consideration of their foregoing their usual Christmas sale, and the balance, three hundred and twenty-eight dollars and thirty-five cents (\$328 35), to the Organ Fund of the Church.

It is with deep regret that we have to record the removal by death of Mr. Muir, who, while with us, was one of our most faithful and useful teachers, always ready to do anything in his power to advance the interests of the school.

Finally, the members of the school have great cause to thank the Divine Teacher for the success which has attended their humble efforts for the year now closing.

REPORT OF PORTSMOUTH SABBATH SCHOOL.

It is with pleasure, at the close of another year, I have to report that with a zealous and efficient supply of Teachers, devoted to the Master's service, the work of the school for the past twelve months has been eminently successful.

The daily contributions by the children amounted to \$20.79, the amount realized from our Annual Soiree was \$43.65. About 100 volumes were added to the Library, making over 400 volumes in all. The average daily attendance was sixty, being a slight increase over last year.

The children also contributed the necessary amount to purchase a very handsome book, which they presented to Mr. W. Lang, on the eve of his departure for Scotland, as a token of their esteem, and in acknowledgment of his long and devoted service of nearly seven years.

REPORT OF BARRIEFIELD SABBATH SCHOOL.

During the past year this school has continued to prosper, although the attendance of scholars during the past few months has not been so large as it was last winter.

It is felt that the school might be made more efficient if more resident teachers could be obtained, who could visit the children in their homes, gather in those who do not attend school, and cultivate more intimate personal relations with their scholars, than teachers can do who are non-residents. At present there are only two teachers in the school who live in Barriefield, the remaining three reside in Kingston.

The scholars have frequently expressed a wish to have a library, the want of which has been felt for some time, but it has not been supplied, partly for want of the necessary funds, and partly because of a doubt in the minds of the teachers regarding the benefits to be derived from ordinary Sunday school literature.

The school continues to co-operate with Mr. T. F. Harkness, C.S.I., and the Portsmouth School, in the support of an orphan in India.

The average attendance during the year has been forty.

REPORT OF MANAGERS.

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH, }

The Managers herewith submit their annual financial statement of the receipts and expenditure for the year ending August 31st.

They regret that the affairs of the congregation are not in a more satisfactory condition, and that their many appeals to the congregation for substantial aid have been practically unavailing.

The Debt is now in a very fair way of being wiped off, and thus a heavy load will be removed from the congregation, and the Managers would specially thank the contributors for the liberality with which the effort has been met. Their thanks are particularly due to one of the oldest members of the church, Mr. A. Somerville, who not only subscribed liberally towards the extinction of the debt, but also still further showed his good-will by making a present to the Managers of the freehold of his pew. We want a few more such presents.

The Managers refrain from any detailed reference to the financial statement. The figures speak for themselves, and a fervent hope is expressed that the item "Balance due the Treasurer" will not be allowed to increase. It represents the amount due by the congregation, or in other words "the amount by which revenue falls short of current expenditure."

The retiring Managers are Messrs. Samuel Woods and W. G. Craig, who are eligible for re-election.

Finally, with thanks to the Almighty for his goodness in blessing our land with returning plenty, let us hope that a spirit of liberality will prevail amongst all, and that a new career will open for old St. Andrew's.

DEBT FUND.

There is little to add to the statement already published regarding the Debt Fund. The total amount subscribed to date is \$2287, and the amount of subscription paid is \$880 07. A detailed list of the subscribers to the Fund, and a statement of the amount received and applied on the Debt, is submitted herewith.

The amount subscribed among so few must be considered very satisfactory by the congregation. There are many yet to be called upon who are greatly desirous of having the Debt paid, and it is confidently hoped that when the whole congregation is fully canvassed, the holders of the Bonds, and those of the congregation who have signed them, will have the satisfaction of seeing that the debt is provided for.

Those who have canvassed the congregation so far, have much pleasure in testifying to the loyalty of the congregation to the Church, and although some are unable to subscribe at present, all are animated by a strong desire to have the debt paid which has rested so long upon our Church, and which has used up so much of our revenue annually in the way of interest, besides being a grievous burden in many other ways.

The Ladies of the congregation have determined upon holding a Christmas Sale for the benefit of the debt fund, it is earnestly hoped that this sale will receive the hearty support from the congregation which the object deserves. After the sale the collectors appointed by the congregation will resume the work of soliciting subscriptions and collecting what is already subscribed. No effort shall be relaxed, it will require the united and hearty co-operation of all to liquidate the debt (\$3500) within the time specified at the congregational meeting held 20th Feb. last, viz. : three years from that date. The funded debt of the congregation now amounts to \$2500 00, and whatever interest may accumulate upon that amount until it is paid.

In soliciting subscriptions care has been taken not to interfere with any other fund of the Church. The subscriptions are definite and exclusively for the purpose of paying the debt, as fixed at the meeting referred to. The amounts received cannot be appropriated for any other purpose whatever.

REPORT OF LADIES MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

The Ladies Missionary Association of St. Andrew's Church in submitting a Report of its proceedings during the past year, regrets that it has not the accomplishment of more work to record, and larger receipts to acknowledge.

A distinguished statesman has said, "Happy the nation which has no history," but while this aphorism may be true of national and family life, it is more than doubtful if it holds good with regard to the life of a Church or of any religious or benevolent Society.

Having nothing to relate implies *stagnation*, where there should be *progress*.

One of the most important departments of labour undertaken by this Association is undoubtedly that of visiting the old, the poor, the sick, and the careless, who claim connection with the congregation, and this work has been carried on with more or less efficiency during the year, resulting in providing some persons with work and others with clothes, thereby securing their own attendance at public worship, and that of their children at Sunday School.

The other work accomplished has been the collecting of \$311 86 for the Schemes of the Church, and the realization of \$333 from the Monthly Sales conducted by the Association, \$163 00 of which were expended for Missionary objects, and the balance, in addition to \$110 41 of last year's receipts, in rendering the Sabbath School rooms attractive and comfortable.

The membership roll shews a decided increase over former years, and while that is a matter for congratulation, it is also a cause for corresponding disappointment that there is not an equivalent amount of energy, zeal and progress in the Association as a whole.

While frankly making this necessary acknowledgment the Association gives most humble and hearty thanks to its Divine Master for the measure of prosperity which has attended it, and prays that His grace and strength may be so given to *all* its members that the present year shall find them working and longing for the coming of His Kingdom.

Sorrowful mention must again be made of the removal by death of a valued member, Mrs. E. H. Hardy, who was ever devising liberal things.
