ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND WORTHY CHIEF
TEMPLAR.

CITY OF OTTAWA Oct. 1st 1861.

Officers and Representatives:—

With heart felt gratitude to Almighty God, for his preserving and watchful care over our beloved order since last Annual Session, I congratulate you on the favourable auspices under which we now assemble. Here in the Capital of Canada—where, ere long, our legislators will assemble, to deliberate on the affairs of state, are we congregated to offer up our solemn prayers, and to enter our protest against the fell destroyer of our country's hope. God grant that our meeting here may be fraught with much good to our fellow men, by awakening new, and more earnest feelings on behalf of the cause of temperance. May the new Parliament buildings now in course of completion, never be desecrated by intoxicating drinks, and may those legislators who hereafter assemble within those walls have pure and enlightened views of what most concerns our country's welfare—the morality of the people—and give us a wise law removing entirely that foulest of all curses, whose universal result is demoralization and ruin.

This being our Annual Session you have a right to expect, nay, demand, from those you have entrusted with official position, a full

report of their official acts during their term of office, and I have much pleasure in rendering you an account of my stewardship.

Two years ago you gave me your confidence by electing me your chief officer. I felt then, as I have always felt the grave responsibilities resting on the presiding officer of so large and influential a body as the Good Templars. Many of you are aware of the peculiar position the order was in at that time, and no doubt, had your fears for its future. Racked by internal dissensions and opposed by an unrelenting opposition from without, our noble ship was in danger of being swamped between the contending influences, or thrown upon the breakers. And when I was coolly told by some from whom I had a right to expect support, that by the end of the year I would not have 40 temples to preside over, I felt more deeply the responsibility of the position I occupied, and troubled lest the prediction should prove true, and I should be unable to pilot our noble ship safely through.

Feeling assured, however, that our principles were pure, and having full confidence in the God of Love, who never forsakes the right, I resolved, having taken the helm, with his blessing, and the assistance of a noble crew, to guide our ship safely into harbour, or go down with her to the bottom. Thank God, we were not swamped, we were not cast upon the breakers, 'tis true we encountered many terrific storms, from false, though professed friends, and open enemies, but we weathered them all, and with colours flying landed safely in port. All praise is due to those noble and devoted friends who stood firm and unshaken amid the shock of such contending influences. But when at the expiration of my first year of office, you unanimously elected me again your chief, I felt that renewed energy was required at my hands to see that we retained the position gained.

The past year has been one of no less importance than the former. The obstacles to our progress if not of so prominent and violent a nature, have demanded no less careful attention, and in my opinion our success has been equally as great. This is however, for you to decide.

Having given you a somewhat lengthy report at our Semi-Annual Session, I shall make this my Annual Report as brief as circumstances will permit.

From the reports of Deputies, letters received from private sources, and from personal inspection in several Counties, I am able to

report our order, if not numerically as strong as was at one time reported, it can be said that our members are more firmly grafted in our principles, and entertain a stronger attachment to the peculiarities of our particular institution. In some parts of our jurisdiction, it is true a little more regularity and accuracy might be observed in the private work of the order, and so it would if those who have the supervision of the Temple would exert themselves a little more to get acquainted with our working. Deputies and Degree Templars, should make this their special duty.

Since last session we have had an increase in new Temples of 39, and during the year of 89, this you will perceive is an increase over last year.

This is certainly very encouraging, and illustrates the truthfulness of the remark in my last report that "our order needs only to be presented in order to command the support and sympathy of all lovers of temperance and the race."

When we take into consideration that the past six months has been a very busy time throughout the whole country, politics being the all absorbing theme, the attention of all parties being towards the political struggles going on, and that the summer months, owing to the busy nature of the season, being inconvenient for holding evening meetings, we may well wonder, and feel grateful that our success has been as great as it has. Since last session we have instituted four Temples in Eastern Canada. This is another source of encouragement and rejoicing. We now have in that section of the Province five good Temples, two of which are in the City of Montreal. To Br. Wm Hay belongs the credit of first planting our standard in Eastern Canada, and of instituting all the temples we have in that section.

This brother has worked very energetically during the past year to disseminate the principles of our order and has been instrumental in organizing twelve new Temples. The actual number of members in connection with our order I am in no position to state, Deputies not having complied with the recommendation of last session, to furnish me with a detailed report. Brother Marlet is the only one who has taken this trouble, and I would respectfully recommend the adoption by this G. Temple of the form of report used by him, a copy of which is hereunto annexed, for the future guidance of all Deputies.

In the absence then of the necessary information, I beg to refer you to the report of the G. W. S. for a statement of our numerical strength.

I have not deemed it advisable during the past year, to call the Executive together, only one case absolutely demanding their consideration having come up and this was acted on by correspondence.

Other matters that would have demanded their consideration I have been able to settle agreeably to all parties without calling them together, and though I have had a little extra labor the Grand Temple has been saved expense.

Since last Annual Session charges have been preferred against four Temples of our order, for violation of Constitution and rules of Grand Temple as follows:—Hamilton, No. 9; Rose of Thamesville, No. 462; Ingersoll, No. 109; and Innerkip, No. 229.

The first had the action of the Executive Committee, and resulted in the surrender of its Charter. It was, however, resuscitated on the following week, and is now in as flourishing a state as any temple of our order. In the cases of Ingersoll and Innerkip Temples, I took on myself the responsibility of acting, without calling the Executive together, and succeeded in arranging matters to the satisfaction of all the parties concerned, the difficulty being merely an informality in their proceedings. In reference to No. 462, I have been unable to get any satisfactory reply from them, and when written to on the subject they attempt to bring a charge against their accuser. The only action therefore I have taken in the premises has been, to order the Pass-word to be withheld from them, and I now refer their case to you for action.

Nearly all the official decisions given by me during the year will be found in my Semi-Annual Report, and having received the sanction of the Grand Temple, it is unnecessary to recapitulate them here. The following are additional since that time and I submit them for your consideration.

1st.—That as the new Ritual is the only one issued by the Canada Grand Temple, and the first degree of the old Ritual being therein dispensed with, members who have taken the degrees under said new Ritual are entitled to all the privileges of full degree members when visiting degree Temples working under said old Ritual.

2nd.—That a presiding officer has not the power to order the Secretary of a temple to erase any portion of the minutes of a previous meeting, on the grounds that said portion was illegal.* The minutes should show what actually took place, be it legal or otherwise.

3rd.—That any officer of our order whose duty it is to pay over money, coming into his possession, to the Treasurer, failing so to do violates his obligation.

4th.—That a Deputy has not the power to deputize or authorize a Degree Templar, or P. W. C. T. to instal officers.

5th.—That where a number of parties are to be expelled for non-payment of dues, they must be balloted for separately and with Ball Ballot and not as a whole.

6th.—A member takes a card from temple B paying his dues in advance for a year or more, but in the course of a few weeks deposits said card in temple C. It is asked must he pay his dues in temple C. at the commencement of the following quarter before he is entitled to the Pass-word?—Decided: that as temple C. has no authority to demand from temple B payment of the member's dues, and he has subscribed to the laws of temple C. he is amenable there to and must pay his dues therein the same as any other member before he is entitled to the Pass-word.

7th.—That a temple passing a resolution prohibiting the proposal and initiation of females, and adhering thereto forfeits its Charter.

8th.—That a Deputy or Degree Templar using the quarterly Pass-word which they have officially received, for the purpose of working their way into a temple, while at the same time they have not paid their dues to their respective temples, thereby forfeit their commissions and are liable to a charge for a violation of their obligations.

*Since giving the above decisions, I have received a copy of the R. W. G. Lodge proceedings and find that that body coincides with the view here taken. In reference to the latter the R. W. G. Templar says a W. C. T. so ordering is liable to a charge for violation of obligation.

The correspondence of your G. W. Chief, during the past year, has greatly exceeded the former year, and more especially during the past six months—far too large, (I am convinced, the most of you would say, had you to answer the numerous communications) for a non-salaried officer. I have sent a communication containing more or less written matter to every Temple and Deputy of the order; and from the nature of the information asked for, by several of my correspondents, I frequently had to send in reply from 12 to 15 closely written pages. These lengthy epistles had reference to matters connected with our order, extending over several years past. I regret that my numerous correspondents could not have been with us at this session, that the order in general might have been benefited by their aid and united labours.

From almost every section of the Country, I have received communications in reference to our Constitution, all calling for a repeal of the alteration made at last annual session relating to the election of all the officers in subordinate Temples, and asking for a return to the old law. Before dismissing the subject of correspondence, permit me to remark, that the chief annoyance my extensive correspondents gave me, was the large number of unpaid letters sent to me: This should not be. Temples should bear in mind, that although the payment of a single letter may be a matter of little importance, but the payment of upwards of a hundred amounts to quite a sum.

By reference to a resolution moved by Br. Campbell, which will be found on page 19 of the printed minutes of last session, you will observe that additional labours were placed upon your G. W. Chief Templar, and in obedience to that resolution I received tenders up to the 13th day of April, for the printing of the minutes, and of three tenders received Br. McWhinnie's tender was the lowest, and the contract was awarded to him.

In order to secure as large an attendance, at this session, as possible, I applied to the Managers of the several Railway lines for the privilege of Representatives passing to and from Ottawa at one fare, and as you are all aware by my circulars of the 20th August, I succeeded in obtaining that privilege. The thanks of this Grand Temple are justly due to J. Hardman Esquire, of the Grand Trunk Railway; and Messrs! Bell & White of the Prescott and Ottawa Railway for their kindness in acceding to our wishes in this matter. It is to be regretted that many more have not availed themselves of the facilities thus afforded to attend this session. In this connection I have only further to state, that my application to the

Manager of the Great Western Railway met with a polite refusal—fortunately, however, it has not militated against us on the present occasion, as parties, who otherwise would have taken that road, went a little farther north and patronized the Grand Trunk.

Owing chiefly to the unhappy state of affairs in the United States, we had no representatives at the last session of the R. W. Grand Lodge; but I am happy to say that the next meeting of that body will be held in Detroit, so there is nothing to hinder us being represented at the next session.

At the last session of the R. W. G. Lodge, that body resolved that where only one Representative is present from a Grand Lodge, he or she may cast all the votes such Grand Lodge is entitled to, thus leaving it with Grand Lodges to send one or more Representatives as they may feel disposed. It was also decided to send the minutes of that body, only to such Grand Lodges as may order them paying therefor ten cents per copy. If, therefore, you wish to have said minutes you will have to instruct your G. W. Secretary to procure as many as you may require—

The following suggestions on Constitutional Law having been but lately handed by me to the Committee on constitution, I submit them here for your consideration.

1st.—The Grand Temple should decide on a stated period for which a member should be expelled when that penalty is adopted by a Temple for violating article 2nd of the Constitution.

This subject is of more importance than may at first sight appear—individuals violate their pledges, and Temples are continually in the habit of voting that they be suspended for five minutes and then reinstated. The vote having been called and the five minutes expired the party is led forward for re-obligation—not having been out of the Temple at all. This course of procedure I hold to be detrimental to the best interests of the Order and directly opposed to the spirit of our Constitution—amounting, in fact to no penalty at all—being nothing more nor less than a burlesque on the mode of punishment prescribed.

2nd.—I would suggest that the present system of having a Degree Templar appointed for each Temple be dispensed with, and instead thereof a Deputy for each Temple be appointed to hold office for one year, receiving a commission from the G. W. C. T., and

having the same powers as those now held by a County Deputy, except that he is limited to his respective Temple : and further that the said officer be restricted both by Constitution and Commission from holding office in said subordinate Temple—I would then recommend that one or more parties be appointed for each County to have a general supervision of the Temples in their respective localities. institute Temples &c..

3rd.—I would further enjoin that it be made incumbent on the W. C. T. of every Temple to have the proceedings of the Grand Temple read in the Temple over which he presides within one month after they are received, and that a neglect to perform this duty be considered, and so made a violation of his obligation and be treated as such.

I am led to make this suggestion from the fact that in some of our Temples the proceedings are never read at all, and thus the members are kept in ignorance of passing events, instead of being informed in all that pertains to our working. The difficulty does not exist in an unwillingness on the part of the members to listen to the proceedings, long though they may be—but in a desire manifested by some to prevent them being heard—and hence some Temples never know whether the proceedings are ever sent to them or not. Our members are daily coming in contact with those who bring objections against our working, and are unable to meet those objections in the satisfactory manner they otherwise would, were they in possession of the information that our proceedings afford. Had this objection been acted on long since very much correspondence would have been saved the officers of this Grand Temple.

4th.—I would further suggest that the time for holding the sessions of this Grand Temple be altered from April and October, inasmuch as those two months are very busy ones throughout the County, and prevent many from attending our sessions, who otherwise would.

5th.—I would strongly urge the Grand Temple to take active and speedy measures to again petition Parliament on the subject of a prohibition law. The Legislative will shortly meet—don't let the session pass without letting your voice be heard on the subject. Let our importunities be constantly kept before them—peradventure through fear of being wearied they may grant our petition.

Brothers and Sisters: Our labors for this session and another

year are now commencing: Let me entreat you to give the different subjects that may come up, your careful consideration. Subjects of vast importance to the interests of the order, will demand your attention—the eyes of the whole order are on you, aye, and the eyes of those not of us, are directed towards this session, wisely and prudently, let this session show, that you have in view the future prosperity of our noble Institution: If there be errors in our working scruple not to search them out, and eradicate them, and show to your enemies, that you are not backward in correcting your errors when known to exist, and also to convince your Brothers and Sisters of the order, that you watch with vigilant care all that pertains to our working. The Constitution is to undergo revision, at this session. The committee who were entrusted with that matter, have spent much labour and time over it, and I have no doubt they are prepared to give you a document that will bear inspection. Let the different clauses be thoroughly examined and properly understood before receiving your sanction. Be equally careful in relation to other matters that may claim your attention, in short speeches, much thought and prompt action, and therefore make this session a profitable one.

To conclude this lengthy report, permit me to tender you and the whole order my heartfelt thanks for the courtesy extended to me on all occasions during my two years office as G. W. C. T., and now at the expiration of my term of office, in delivering up to you the trust committed to my care, let me express the hope, that my successor may receive the same sympathy and support, and may our order prosper under his rule. God grant that the future of our noble order may be bright and glorious—may unity and brotherly love reign supreme—and our principles extend wider and wider, until all shall acknowledge the benign influences of Faith, Hope and Charity.

It is only known to Him who ruleth all things, how many of us may ever meet again in Grand Temple Session. Before another six months pass away, many here present, may be called hence.—May we be prepared to meet that call clothed in the white robe which Christ the Redeemer of the world gives to all those who put their trust in him, is my heartfelt and earnest prayer.

does not make Good Templars of us. That coldness and indifference are contagious, and hence bad elements to have in our social circles. Such, then, have been removed, and now there remains but very little that is not good and true.

Peace and contentment I have good reason to believe prevail throughout our entire order. The storms that have threatened our good old ship are subsiding, if they have not entirely passed by. For such reasons, and many others, that could be mentioned, I think I am warranted in saying, that our beloved order was never in a more healthy and efficient condition than at present. I must here refer, in passing, to the indefatigable labours and zeal of our staff of Deputies, with few exceptions, a most faithful and effective staff. My heart would prompt the honorable mentioning of some few names; but prudence withholds. I do not say there are no better in our order; but I do say we have not yet found them out.

I feel it my duty to report, that some Temples meet only once in two weeks—such being their law. Also, that Temples do not report, as a general thing, all on their books, but such as are clear, from which two results arise, namely, diminution of funds in the treasury, and an incorrect report of membership—making our numerical strength much less than it is. During the past year 89 new Temples have been instituted; and this in consideration of the fact that the ground had been pretty thoroughly gone over previously, speaks volumes in favor of our progress, and the earnestness of our Deputies. We rejoice, however, most heartily that our noble standard has been firmly planted in Canada East; and I trust that our order there will speedily be enabled to claim and sustain a Grand Temple of its own.

The following is, so far as facts have come to my knowledge, a correct statistical report of our order. Two Temples have been charged during the past year with violation of Constitution, which will come before you in another report, as also a protest, entered by members of the order, against a deputy.

The charge preferred by Bro. Wm. Campbell against Rose of Thamesville Temple No. 462, we recommend shall be referred to a special committee to report thereon forthwith.

We approve the decisions given, and invite the special attention of members thereto.

We conceive it of great importance that the Minutes of the R.W. G. L. should be in possession of the Deputies, and therefore recommend a sufficient number be ordered for their use.

We approve the suggestions Nos. 1, 3 and 4, but do not consider No. 2 would secure greater efficiency or regularity on the part of Deputies. Line upon line, and precept upon precept, appear to be the only successful method to effect this object.

We heartily approve the recommendation to petition Parliament, at its next Session, for a Prohibitory Liquor Law—and think the Executive Committee should be instructed to prepare a suitable petition—to be signed by the G. W. C. T. and G. W. S., with Seal affixed, and forward to the House in care of leading temperance members thereof.

Remembering the obstacles overcome in the past, the steady attachment of tried friends whose firmness has been tested, and the established order of God to defend and uphold the RIGHT, we see no cause of discouragement, but everything to urge us forward to fresh conquests.

II. On the G. W. Secretary's Report, we beg to submit the following remarks:

Disciplinary operations are painful, not only to those operated upon, but to the operator—the excision of Temples, once healthy and fruit bearing, is trying in the extreme; but it is well understood by all that such process will leave our great Temperance Tree to thrive and grow more luxuriantly than ever—a sturdy trunk with ponder-

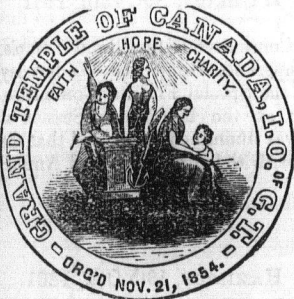
4th. Can a Subordinate Temple pass a By-Law at the regular meeting without two weeks notice being given, and obtaining two-thirds majority?

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Grand Temple, convened at Brother Bellnap's Temperance House, on Wednesday the 13th November, the Report of the Special Finance Committee, appointed by the Grand Temple at the late Annual Session at Ottawa, being laid before them, it was unanimously resolved that the same be published in connection with the minutes of said Annual Session.

at Ottawa met at the house of Dr. Fergusson, and after due deliberation report as follows:

Your Committee on reviewing with care the whole of the books of G. W. S. and the manner of keeping the same together with the vouchers for the several amounts disbursed, beg to submit the following as the result of their long and laborious examination.

First in reference to recommendations of S. F. C. appointed at H. Session and confirmed at Guelph Session the various accounts have been properly transferred from old to New Ledger. The discrepancies chargeable to the *former* G. W. S. so far as known are entered to his debit and so remain. The New Books have been obtained. The General accounts ordered to be opened are not so done in such manner as such accounts usually are done and are therefore unintelligible and unsatisfactory. The accounts of Temples have required corrections which have now been made. A balance sheet, in a separate book, had been prepared, but was not correct, consequently we made out a new one which will be copied in for future reference. We have not discovered any corrupt intention in connection with the errors and neglect above noted.

Secondly in reference to matters as submitted at the Annual Session we have found it necessary to re-model the financial part of the G. W. S.'s report and submit it in a more condensed form. It is to be regretted that *proper* vouchers have not, in all instances, been obtained, which obliges us to require that in future receipts shall be obtained for all monies paid on open accounts, and for cash purchases over one dollar.

We find on examining the G. W. S.'s cash statements a deficit of \$168.43 to be accounted for by him.

We recommend the payment of the following liabilities and in the following order.

B.) viz. on debtor amount received for tax, property and instituting Temples—on Cr. the amount paid out for the Stationery, Express charges, Postage, Printing, Binding, Orders on Treasurer, Travelling expenses of G. O. and salary of G. W. S.

4th. Open printing account, entering on Cr. account, all amounts of contracts and purchases for Printing, Binding, Lithographing, &c., and on Dr., all payments for the same.

5th. The G. W. S. account shall shew his receipts for salary, and the amount of property of Temple purchased for private use on the Dr., and his allowance as G. W. S. on the Cr.

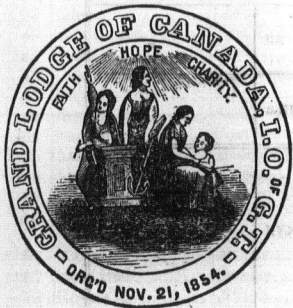
