Social and Moral Reform Discussed in the Morning and Resolutions Passed—Foreign and Home Missions at Other Sessions—More Workers in the West the Pressing Need—Dr. McLeod Criticizes Recent Attitude of Catholic Church—New Glasgow the Next Meeting Place.

A very busy day was spent by the members of the Presbyterian Synod yesterday which is this year meeting in St. David's church. At the morning session the report of the committee on moral and social reform was read and adopted. Dr. J. Shearer, secretary of the moral and social reform work of the church gave an interesting address on this subject.

THE BETTING LAWS.

Dr. Shearer discussed the law covering public betting. Under the criminal code of Canada a bookmaker does not stand in one place, which the speaker said was obviously ridiculous. He named several states from Louisiana, Illinois, Texas, California and Washington. Japan had made getting unlawful. Canada is in the same position.

THE WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC.

Speaking of the white slave trade Dr. Shearer said that it was believed that 60,000 girls were lost in the United States and Canada this year. The third resolution was to the effect that the fact that the girls are rescued from that life was apt to come home to us, to any of us.

REPORT ON MORAL AND SOCIAL REFORM.

Dr. W. H. Smith of Fredericton, made the report of the Moral and Social Reform committee. The report told thoroughly of conditions in all parts of the three provinces with reference to the reports from the Presbyteries. The section devoted to Sabbath observance showed that the Sabbath was being observed in the home as the St. John river and the loading and unloading of vessels.

He also touched upon the necessity of providing playgrounds for the children. He reviewed the work for missions. THE VALLEY RAILWAY.

Mr. Pugsley has published another letter concerning the Valley Railway which makes it clear that he is doing nothing to forward the enterprise, and that the Federal Government is simply playing with the proposition.

The record as it stands is this: When a delegation from the Valley district came to Mr. Hazen he told the delegates that the Provincial Government would do all that was possible in combination with the Dominion Government to forward the enterprise.

Mr. Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Graham and Mr. Pugsley met the delegation and heard the proposition. Mr. Laurier said: "This is a proposal of a definite kind which will have to be considered."

Mr. Carvell, M. P., wrote some time afterward to say that the delegation and the Provincial Government had not furnished sufficient information.

In June Mr. Hazen wrote to Mayor Chestnut, stating that he was still awaiting the promised answer from Ottawa. The Provincial Government was anxious that the Dominion Government should say whether the plan proposed was acceptable.

Mr. Pugsley began by intimating that no definite proposition had been made, though the Premier himself had pronounced the proposition a definite offer.

This was clearly obstructive. No legislation was required to ascertain whether the Department of Railways would see the line as part of the Government system.

The Federal Government has the main financial responsibility in the case. The Provincial Government has no money to build trunk railways such as Mr. Pugsley says this one must be.
