HELD IN THE CENTENARY CHAPEL, IN THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN,
On Tuesday Evening, the 4th of June, 1850.

REV. RICHARD KNIGHT IN THE CHAIR.

After an abstract of the Report had been read by the Rev. ROBERT COONEY, the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted:—

I. Moved by the Rev. William Temple, of Fredericton; seconded by the Rev. Michael Pickles, of Annapolis—

That the Report, of which an abstract has been read, be adopted, and published under the direction of the Committee.

II. Moved by the Rev. Ephraim Evans, of Halifax; seconded by the Rev. William Smith, of Saint John North—

That this meeting offers its grateful, and devout acknowledgements to Almighty God, for his continued sanction and blessing vouchsafed to the venerable Parent Society, in common with other similar Protestant and Evangelical Institutions. *And also*, for affording to this Auxiliary, an opportunity of celebrating its twenty fourth Anniversary.

III. Moved by the Rev. John Brewster, of Newfoundland; seconded by the Rev. Ingham Sutcliffe, of Mill Town—

Whereas this meeting entertains for the Parent Society, the most sincere respect and affection, it rejoices to hear of the improvement that has taken place in its funds during the past year; but still, as the income for that period, is not equal to even the diminished expenditure of the year, it is hereby resolved that the most strenuous efforts shall be made, to render the Society's means commensurate with their obligations and their wishes.

IV. Moved by the Rev. W. Smithson, of Sheffield; seconded by the Rev. George Miller, of Saint Andrews—

Being convinced that it is "not by might, nor by power," but by the spirit of the Lord that the diffusion of Christianity throughout *the world*, is to be accomplished—this meeting earnestly recommends that fervent prayer be offered up to God, for such a copious out-pouring of the Holy Ghost, upon the various agencies employed for the attainment of that object, as will render them efficient and *prosperous*.

V. Moved by the Rev. Arthur McNutt, of Bridgetown; seconded by the Rev. George M. Barrett, of Saint Stephen's—

That the thanks of this meeting be given to the Collectors for their valuable services during the past year; and that they be requested to retain their ap-

pointments—That a similar acknowledgment be tendered to the friends and supporters of this Institution, and that they be solicited to continue their liberal patronage?—and further, that the Rev. RICHARD KNIGHT be TREASURER; the Rev. ROBERT COONEY be SECRETARY, and that the following gentlemen, with the Ministers of the District, form the

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REPORT, ETC.

THE recurrence of such an Annual Festival, as the one we are now celebrating, suggests topics upon which gratitude, benevolence, and love, may expatiate freely, and in accordance with their own principles and feelings. This being the case, there cannot be any dearth of matter, or any scarcity of detail—no lack of motives, nor want of the *material* from which conclusions, arguments, and appeals are usually derived. The Statue of MEMNON, say the Heathen Mythologists, emitted sounds of music, as soon as the rays of the sun fell upon it; and from the image of SAINT JANUARIUS, it is affirmed, blood issued on his anniversary, or “FEAST DAY.” One of these is a Grecian Apologue—the other is a Romish Legend. The first is admired as a beautiful conception, and a classical mode of illustration; and the second is regarded, by certain lovers of the marvellous, as a notable interposition of God. But *your* Committee, in presenting their twenty fourth Annual Report, speak of that which was from the beginning, which they have heard, which they have seen with their eyes, which they have looked upon; and their hands have handled of the word of life.

At the close of another year, and when they are called upon to resign the trust you so generously confided to them—they hear a voice, coming from “THE WAY OF THE EAST”—a voice as if Moses himself, spake to them from “The top of Pisgash,” and said, “Remember the days of old, consider the years of many generations; ask thy Father, and he will shew thee; thy Elders, and they will tell thee.” DEUT. 32—7.

The very principle in which WESLEYAN METHODISM originated, was in its nature and character, essentially Missionary; and the aspect under which this principle appeared, and the manner in which it operated, impressed upon it a strong resemblance to the apostolic institution. The Ministry originated the membership, and by the blessing of God made them “*to be a people who were not a people.*” The first Methodist Preachers were specially called of God; and were “SENT FORTH” by him, “to turn men from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God.” Like the sons of Zebedee, they left all, and followed Christ—they had “neither purse, nor shoes, nor scrip”—they had nothing, and yet they possessed all things

—the love of Christ constrained them ; a desire to snatch poor sinners, as brands from the burning, animated them ; the great head of the Church signally owned their labours ; the fruits of their faith and zeal sprung up as the grass of the field, and as willows by the water courses ; and through the mercy of God continued unto their sons and successors in the Gospel ; our faith, catching

“ — the old prophetic fire,”

can confidently, and rapturously sing—

“ So shall the bright succession run,
Through the last courses of the sun ;
While unborn Churches by their care,
Shall rise and flourish large and fair.”

Your Committee, before they enter more fully into the statements which it is their duty to furnish, embrace this opportunity to render their unfeigned thanks to Almighty God, for his great kindness to “ the Parent Society,” and to all its tributaries during another year ; and for having, in the vast field of its evangelistic toils, again “ crowned the year with his goodness.”

Your Committee now respectfully solicit your attention to a brief sketch of the principal places occupied by the parent body; and while they show you this honoured agent of "the Most High," sowing beside all waters, preaching "the everlasting Gospel to every nation, and kindred, and tongue, and people;" and labouring to make the putcasts of an alienated world "*fellow-citizens with the Saints, and of the household of God*"—while this scene unfolds itself before us, let our souls, and all that is within us say—O Lord most mighty, let thy chosen ones,

"Fly on the rebel sons of men;
Seize them with faith divinely bold,
And force the world, into thy fold."

NEW BRUNSWICK.

The munificence of British Christianity as distributed through "the Wesleyan Missionary Society," has very freely, and for a long time, flowed into this Province. This department of benevolence is like a mighty river, deep, and wide, irrigating and fertilizing the countries through which it passes, making the thirsty land springs of water; and turning the barren land into a fruitful field. A rich and copious stream from this river, has been, for many years, dispersing its influence through this District; and the fruits of that dispersion are, the conversion of souls—the formation of Churches—the erection of Schools—the dissemination of the Sacred Scriptures; and the going forth of that righteousness which exalteth a nation.

There are twenty three central, or principal stations in this District. In these there are seventy one Chapels, and upwards of one hundred and fifty other Preaching Places. These various places are supplied by twenty four Missionaries, and Assistant Missionaries, all of whom, are constantly engaged preaching the word in season, and out of season—warning every man, and teaching every man, in all wisdom, that they may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus. A very efficient body of other agents, amounting to about five hundred and eighty, and consisting of Local Preachers, Leaders, and Sunday School Teachers, are also actively engaged in the same good work. These honoured fellow-labourers are a great blessing to us; and their zealous co-operation with the Ministers, has contributed very largely, to our connexional diffusion and consolidation in this country. The Church membership amounts to nearly FOUR THOUSAND fully accredited; besides one hundred and sixteen on trial. According to the

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latest returns, our Sabbath Schools afford Religious Instruction, to at least TWO THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED Children of both sexes; while, at the lowest calculation not less than TWENTY SEVEN THOUSAND SOULS, including Church Members and Scholars, regularly attend upon our ministry. When it is remembered that this amounts to fully one-eighth of our provincial population; and that our numbers have been frequently and greatly reduced by emigration, we are furnished with abundant reasons for rendering thanks unto God, and taking courage. And never perhaps, were these hallowed feelings more sensibly felt, or the effects they produce more unequivocally displayed, than at the close of the last "*District Meeting*," when "the Missionaries," "*anointed with the oil of gladness*," and honoured with a renewed commission to preach the Gospel, repaired to their several spheres of labour, offering this sacrifice of praise to Him who had counted them faithful, and put them in the Ministry.

"Joined in one spirit to our head,
Where he appoints we go;
And still in Jesu's footsteps tread,
And show his praise below."

But this section of the Society's operations, is favoured by a most excellent Educational Institution—one that greatly enhances the importance of "*THE NEW BRUNSWICK DISTRICT*;" and renders it very conspicuous among the out-posts of British Methodism—your Committee alludes to

THE WESLEYAN ACADEMY.

This establishment, as our friends know, is situated in a healthy and delightful part of Sackville, in the County of Westmoreland. They are also, so well acquainted with its history, that any allusion either to its origin, or progress is quite unnecessary. From its commencement until now, it has always enjoyed the confidence of the public; and although the number of students, owing to the depressed state of the country, is not so large now, as at former periods, that confidence remains unabated. The claims of the institution have also been kindly recognized by the local Government and the Legislatures of both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, from which sources it has frequently received very liberal pecuniary aid. This Academy is now in a very efficient and flourishing state. The education afforded in the higher branches is really a Collegiate course; and any young man who will go through the whole CURRICULUM, is fully qualified to take a Bachelor's Degree in any University. The design of its munificent founder is steadily promoted by a long tried and competent faculty; the arduous duties of "*THE PRINCIPAL*" are discharged

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with proverbial efficiency and fidelity; the office of "CHAPLAIN" is sustained by a gentleman eminently fitted for that important station; and the whole is under the supervision of a Board of Trustees, duly Incorporated.

In pursuance of our usual course we shall now present a brief, but consecutive view of the Society's operations, commencing with those in

EUROPE.

IRELAND.—This country continues to derive great advantage from the undiminished zeal and abundant labours of its devoted Missionaries. Through good report, and through evil report—under many disadvantages, and often in the midst of privations and vicissitudes, they proclaim "the Sinner's friend," and preach those vital truths, the cordial reception of which would make

"Every child of Adam free."

The Gospel, has not, your Committee, is sorry to say, free access to the mass of the population in Ireland; but it is a gratifying fact that in many places. The Roman Catholics manifest an ardent desire for religious instruction. May God hasten the day, when this "Green Isle," shall be disenthralled; may his word have free course, and run, and be glorified; and then the "little one shall become a thousand," and the "the small one a great nation."

GERMANY.—At Winnenden, in the Kingdom of Wirtemberg, the operations of the Society are still prosecuted by Mr. Muller, and his assistants. The spread of evangelical truth is opposed in various ways. Hindrances growing out of political excitement, and out of other causes are constantly rising up; but the spirit of religious enquiry extends; and many experience the saving effects of "the Gospel." There are, dispersed through sixty different places, upwards of one thousand individuals united together in church fellowship.

FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND.—At Paris, a considerable improvement in the English Congregation has taken place during the year; but the French department of the work has not recovered from the shock which it received from the late political convulsions.

The Teacher whom the Committee were enabled, by the liberality of the esteemed Treasurer of the Society, THOMAS FARMER, Esq., to place at *Bar-le-Duc*, is prosecuting his labours under circumstances of considerable interest. A great sensation has been produced in the neighbourhood. Several Roman Catholic villages are welcoming his ministrations. In some instances, the Municipal Authorities place themselves at the head of the movement, and offer the Parish-Schools, and even the Mass-Houses or Churches, for Protestant worship. The Priests have become alarmed, and are endeavouring to excite oppo-

sition. Complaints have been made to the Government against the proceedings of our Agent, and a struggle is likely to ensue. The importance of this new Station is increased by the consideration that it is the only Protestant interest in the extensive department of the Meuse.

The French and Swiss Circuits, generally are efficient, or present indications of improvement.

At GIBRALTER, the schools are (Mr. Alton reports) in efficient operation, and well answering the design of their establishment.

The foundation of an extensive Spanish work, it may be reasonably hoped; is being silently laid, by the religious training of so large a number of Spanish children. The process may be comparatively slow, but succeeding generations will witness the beneficial effects.

ASIA.

THE SINGHALESE DISTRICT, SOUTH CEYLON.—The Society's Mission in this quarter has to contend with serious difficulties—has to encounter formidable opposition from different quarters; but notwithstanding these untoward circumstances, a considerable improvement has taken place during the year. An increase of piety is very apparent in several of our members; the recent conversion of a considerable number of precious souls has greatly enlarged our borders; and results of this heart-cheering character, are expected to ensue from the labours of the newly appointed Catechists.

Four new Chapels have been built during the year; and four more are in course of erection. Considerable activity has been excited among the Buddhists in behalf of their own system, and in opposition to Christianity. This circumstance is viewed as a sure indication that the truth is felt to be powerful, and that the interests of the Gospel are advancing. There are one thousand two hundred and fourteen members in Society, chiefly native converts; and had "the Committee" adequate funds at their disposal—the Schools could be more efficiently sustained, and thereby rendered of great service to "the Church."

IN NORTH CEYLON, OR THE TAMUL DISTRICT, the several departments of the work are in a very encouraging state. This is more particularly the case at JAFFNA; in TRINCOMALEE; and on the BATTICALOA STATION. From the latest reports it is very evident that "the true light" is advancing in these benighted regions; and that neither the lectures lately delivered in defence of Hinduism, nor the ostentatious idolatries lately practised in the Temple of SIVA, and in other places, will prevent it from accomplishing the end, whereunto it was sent, namely the illumination of them that sit in darkness.

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The Educational condition and prospects of this District are very encouraging.

THE MADRAS DISTRICT has sustained a heavy loss in the death of its exemplary and devoted Chairman, and General Superintendent. But although the Lord removes the agents, the work still goes on. He is continually "bringing many sons to glory;" to some of his labourers he says—"IT IS ENOUGH, COME UP HITHER;" and then he sends "other labourers into his vineyard."—The general aspects of this Mission, it may be said, have varied little during the year. The congregations and Societies remain in the same state; but both, we have no doubt, would be greatly improved, if a more efficient sub-ordinate agency could be created. HELP—MEN OF ISREAL HELP. The state of the work in "*the Mysore*" is truly encouraging. In many places "the fields are white unto the harvest"—this is particularly the case in the Bangalore Canarese-station; and also at Coongul. The latest official statements, speak very favourably of the outward walk and deportment of the members generally; and express gratitude to God who enables them to walk in the truth, and unto all well pleasing. The Missionaries bestow a great deal of time, and a great deal of labour, on the translation of the Holy Scriptures into the Canarese language; they are also endeavouring to revise former translations; and these sacred toils, super-added to their other numerous engagements, make them in labours more abundant.

AUSTRALASIA AND POLYNESIA.

The various Missions belonging to the Society in this quarter, are steadily rising in importance. According to the annual returns recently received, TEN new Chapels have been erected, and FOUR other preaching places provided. The number of hearers has proportionably increased; and an addition of six hundred Church Members is reported. The Committee are highly gratified to hear of the financial exertions that are made with a view to ultimate pecuniary independence. Indeed abundant evidence is afforded of the zeal and success of the Missionaries in every department of their work.

It has been found necessary to enlarge the York-street Chapel, in the Sydney North Circuit, by the erection of a gallery. The Chapel now contains sittings for Twelve Hundred persons. The cause at Surrey-Hills has increased so considerably in importance, that it is deemed desirable to constitute a separate Circuit. A large place of worship is requisite to provide for the rapidly increasing population.—The general aspect of the work in the Melbourne Circuit, in the Colony of *Australia Felix*, or Victoria, is reported as "very encouraging."—The Society's Mission in *South Australia* is rapidly rising

in importance, and extending its beneficial influence throughout the Colony.—In *Western Australia*, the Mission embraces as large a sphere as could well be occupied by a single Missionary.—The Hobart-Town and New-Norfolk Circuits, in *Van Diemen's Land*, are in a prosperous state.

"A rill, a stream, a torrent flows;
But pour the mighty flood;
Shake the nations—sweep the earth;
Till all proclaim thee God."

NEW ZEALAND.

The review of the operations of the Society's Missions, in *New Zealand*, during the past year, affords much gratification.

In every department of the work there is activity and progress. The Missionaries have been greatly cheered by the arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher to take charge of the Establishment for the education of their children; and Mr. and Mrs. Reid have made a very encouraging commencement of their duties at the Native Training Institution, and the Central School. The influence of Christianity is more decidedly manifested among the people generally within the influence of the Mission, in the gradual enlightenment of their minds, and the elevation of their character; and, as a consequence, a growing improvement is taking place in their temporal condition. Nor do these views of the state of the work depend exclusively upon Missionary evidence. They are amply supported by the independent testimonies of others, who, from their position have the means of examining the subject for themselves, and are placed in circumstances which shield them from the suspicion of allowing their judgment to be warped by any undue bias or partiality.

From the very best sources of information it is evident, that Christianity has taken a firm hold upon the native mind, and is steadily working out its beneficial results; and the Missionaries are cheered, by beholding on every side, the pleasure of the Lord prospering in their hands.

THE FRIENDLY ISLANDS.

The Journal of the Rev. Walter Lowry, lately published in the "Missionary Notices," has brought these Islands, and the Feejee Missions, with great advantage before the friends, and supporters of the Society. And at the last Anniversary, after some general allusion to the work in these Stations, the Report adds—

"Some of the Missionaries and their families have been visited by affliction, which will probably render necessary their removal to a more salubrious climate. To this painful topic, considerable prominence, of course, is given. And information is also communicated respecting the interruption which has been experienced in the Training

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Institution, the buildings in which it had been commenced having been twice levelled to the ground by destructive hurricanes. These discouraging circumstances exercise the faith and patience of the Missionaries, and at the same time, give them a strong claim upon the sympathy of the friends and supporters of the Society at home. But the Local Reports from the District exhibit also a bright side of the question. From *Tonga* the Missionaries write, that they realize the gracious promise of the Saviour to his faithful servants in the ministry of the Gospel, "Lo, I am with you always;" and that this cheers them in the difficulties and trials with which they have to contend."

FEJEE.—The Mission-work in the important District of *Feejee* has suffered serious interruptions from the diminution which has taken place in the number of faithful labourers, male and female, chiefly by the visitations of disease and death. The Committee have made arrangements for supplying, in part, the vacancies which have thus been created, by directing that three new Missionaries should be sent, as soon as possible, from *Australia* to *Feejee*; but considerable time must necessarily elapse before they can acquire the language, and thus be able to enter upon the work in full efficiency. The brethren who have been left in the District, under the accumulated burden of cares and labours, which will continue to press upon them until they obtain adequate help, especially need all the aid which can be afforded by the sympathy and prayers of the friends of the Society. The official Reports from the District contain much information, which is thus partly of a painful character, but, on the whole, warranting the most cheering anticipations as to the ultimate triumph of Christianity throughout dark and cannibal *Feejee*. May the Lord hasten it in his own good time, when this people shall be added to "the Church," and included among the Saviour's triumphs in the Islands of the Sea.

AFRICA.

There are three Districts in Southern Africa, and the official communications from all, are upon the whole, satisfactory. The progress of the work is attested by an increase in the aggregate number of communicants; and by the fact, that in almost every station, there has been during the year, a greater, or lesser number seeking for admission to the privileges of Church Membership. The field comprised in these Districts is very—*very* extensive, and the cultivation of it, involves privations, trials, and hardships, of which Europeans can form no adequate conception. But the love of souls, and a desire to bring the outcasts of *HAM* to a participation of all "*new covenant*," blessings, lightens every care, makes the rough places smooth; and so engrosses the heart of our devoted brethren, that it is their meat,

and their drink, and to do the will of him that sent them to make AFRIC free indeed.

The Report from Cape-Town is very satisfactory. During the year a gracious visitation from above has been experienced, and the labours of the Missionaries have been attended with much success. A considerable number of individuals, having experienced the saving power of the Gospel, have become consistent members of our Religious Society.

A nett increase of ten Church-Members has taken place at Khamies-Berg, in Little Namaqualand. From Nisbet-Bath in Great Namaqualand, the Missionary reports that they have had many indications of good in the Circuit during the year. Some of the parents are endeavouring to instruct their children, and "train them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." A number of young persons are making pleasing progress in reading, and "evinced a strong desire to be instructed in the things of God." There is consequently a great demand for copies of the New Testament, of a convenient size for them to carry in their pockets while attending to their flocks and herds in the fields; which demand the Missionary regrets he has not yet been able properly to supply.

The review of Missionary operations in the *Albany and Kaffraria* District, during the last year, is highly encouraging. The Mission-Stations which were suspended during the war, have been, so far as pecuniary means would allow, resumed under very auspicious circumstances. An influence appears to rest upon the minds of many of the Chiefs and people highly favourable to the Mission-cause. The promised blessing of the Great Head of the Church has, in a very marked manner, accompanied the use of the appointed means. The beneficial effects of the "Watson Institution," the Mission-Schools, and the press, are now becoming strikingly manifest. An improved Class of Native Teachers is rising up, and the whole country, embraced within the limits of the District, presents a more hopeful and inviting prospect than was ever before witnessed. Were an adequate number of devoted English Missionaries employed in the direction of the native agency, and in the general management of the Missions, the anticipation of most important results might now be reasonably indulged.

WESTERN AFRICA.—The official communications from the Sierra Leone District are very cheering. Progress is apparent in every department of our operations. From Free-Town the Missionaries write—"The past year has been one of the most glorious success. The Holy Spirit has been largely poured out upon ourselves, and

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the Church. God has owned his word; many have sought and obtained Salvation. The Chapels are crowded to excess. The Lord has given us a great multitude of precious souls for our hire." Great and successful exertions are being made in the Educational department; and the Missionaries, in their reference to "THE TRAINING INSTITUTION," speak of it in this encouraging strain. "The young men of this and kindred institutions are our hope. We look to them as the future instruments, under God, of spreading the knowledge of the Redeemer throughout this vast continent; and we trust that, by prayerfulness and diligence on our part, and with God's blessing on the work of our hands, they will be prepared to sow the precious seed of the Word in the hearts of their benighted countrymen, which shall spring up unto everlasting life."

On the Gambia, the good work of the Lord still advances; and the expectations which were formed a year ago, have been more than realized. An increase of piety among our people—a considerable increase of Church Members—Chapel extension—and augmented subscriptions to the general Mission Fund, are the pleasing and prominent features of this Mission.

THE GOLD COAST, ASHANTI, AND OTHER PARTS OF GUINEA.

The reports from "the Gold Coast are, generally of a very gratifying character. God has lately made bare his arm; and is now at work on our behalf." Such is the language, which, like a stream of love, flows from the heart of one of our brethren, in his recent correspondence with the Mission House. Signs and wonders result from the divine operation; and these consist chiefly—of an increased moral influence diffused in every direction—of congregations increased in number, and improved in piety—and of newly opened spheres of usefulness. To these must be added the giving way of *fetish prejudices and customs*; and the crowning fact, that SIX OF THE NATIVE CONVERTS have been recommended as fully qualified to act as CATACHISTS in the service of the Society.

A very gratifying testimony in favour of our Mission in *Ashanti* has been given by Sir William Winniette the Governor of the Gold Coast. It is contained in the Journal of his visit to *Kumasi*; and was made the substance, principally, of a Despatch, addressed to the Right Honourable Earl Grey, and printed by order of the House of Commons during the last Session of Parliament. Thanks be to God for these encouraging tokens of his favour; they strengthen the hands and confirm the hopes of his servants; and enable them to say with increased confidence—the Fetish Priest—the Slave

Dealer—the Idolater, and all that are opposed to the salvation of GUINEA, will be vanquished by the word of the Lord, and the glory of His power. The Schools are in a very efficient state, and promise to yield an ample recompense for all the labour expended upon them. SELAH.

WEST INDIES.

These are the oldest of the Society's Missions, and from their commencement until now, they have always been regarded with unabated interest, and undiminished affection. In their formation, the Missionary enterprise, for which the Wesleyans are now so distinguished, was first developed. The objects of their Christianity were then an enslaved, and a degraded race. The Helots, or Public Slaves of Sparta never were so badly treated; nor were the Serfs of ancient Saxony or Poland, so hard worked, or so cruelly punished. But these are familiar and authenticated facts; and future historians in order to be impartial, must associate with their account of the wrongs and sufferings endured by the Slaves in the West Indies, a record of the never failing charity, and indomitable energy displayed by "The Methodists," in order to redress these grievances, and make the subjects of them a free and happy people.

These beautiful Islands are now suffering deeply under what, your Committee, cannot but regard as an inconsistent and ruinous policy; and while as Christians, they are ready to "render to *Cæsar, the things that are Cæsar's,*" they cannot but say, that in this case, the conduct of our rulers, militates alike, against the temporal, and spiritual interests of "all ranks, and conditions of people" in the West Indies.—In these views we are fully borne out by the subjoined extract from the *last Report of "the venerable Parent Society."*

The Society's Missions in the BRITISH WEST-INDIES continue to present an unfavourable aspect. The deteriorating influences which have been at work in these Colonies, since the alteration in the duties on sugar, still prove a serious counteraction to Missionary operations. Increasing poverty is injurious to the spiritual interests of the people, by absorbing many of them to such an extent in cares and anxieties respecting outward things, that they become negligent of the public ordinances of Religion; and, from the same cause, the pecuniary receipts of the Missions are so considerably diminished as to render it necessary to contract the sphere of Missionary effort just at the juncture when the peculiar circumstances of the people require for them increased, instead of diminished, pastoral attention and care. The Committee have

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made as liberal grants towards supplying the deficiency in the Local Receipts as the state of the Society's Funds would allow, but they are not able wholly to meet the emergency of the case. In the Local Reports from the several Districts, there is much that is encouraging. In many places there is a gracious work in progress, and the efficacy of the Gospel Ministry in the conversion of Sinners from the error of their ways is delightfully apparent; but the good which has been effected has been so overbalanced by the oppressive evils which prevail, that a very considerable diminution in the aggregate number of Church-members in the British West-Indies is the painful result.

BRITISH AMERICA.

All the Provinces comprised under this head, are deeply indebted to the Christian liberality which so pre-eminently distinguishes "the Fatherland." The Churches of the Saviour, in "the British Isles," have always evinced a very lively interest in the spiritual welfare of these Colonies. Their parental solicitude and brotherly kindness have been exercised towards us for many years. These gracious principles have developed themselves not in "pastoral addresses" merely—not in Letters of condolence, or Epistles of commendation; but in large pecuniary grants, and in the sustentation of numerous and successful Missions. These acknowledgments and assertions, in their widest latitude, and in their fullest signification, are due, in a special manner to "THE BRITISH WESLEYANS." May the Lord remunerate them; may he give unto them "good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over."

Your Committee do not deem it necessary to enter into the details of all the districts in this part of our transatlantic possessions. The uniform and regular course of operations is not very unlike that which obtains in Great Britain. In the Cities and large towns, particularly, there is a strong resemblance to the home circuits; and hence, in these departments, there are not many incidents that need special notice. These exceptions however, are very few, so far at least, as "THE LOWER PROVINCES" are concerned; and of the extensive, very *extensive* rural portions of these Provinces—of them it may be emphatically said "THESE ARE MISSIONARY GROUND." Yes; and as such they need the sympathy and assistance of the Parent Society; and but for the aid which that Society renders to them, many of them would be, even now, in a state of spiritual destitution and wretchedness. From Indian reserves—from the solitary homes of new settlers—from the back

woods—and from the distant shores. The macedonian cry is constantly issuing—“COME OVER AND HELP US.”

Your Committee cannot bring their notice of this portion of the vast field of Methodist Missions to a close, without bestowing a remark or two on the subject of

EDUCATION:

The Wesleyan Methodists have always entertained right views on this great question; and the soundness and the accuracy of these views, have been acknowledged by some of the most enlightened Statesmen of all parties. **KINGSWOOD**; and **WOOD HOUSE GROVE**; their Theological Institutions; their Collegiate establishments—their Grammar Schools, and **DAY SCHOOLS**; their Training Schools, and Industrial Schools; all these, like “a cloud of witnesses,” rise up before us in **GREAT BRITAIN**—in **IRELAND**—in the **COLONIES**, and in the “**ISLANDS OF THE SEA**”; and prove that the Wesleyans are the steadfast friends, and zealous promoters of “**EDUCATION**.”

We have adverted in a previous part of this Report to our excellent Academy in Westmorland; and we could, if it were necessary, adduce the most conclusive proofs that it has been a great blessing to the country. It originated in the private munificence of a Wesleyan. **THE LEARNED PRINCIPAL**, who has presided over it from the commencement, is a Wesleyan Minister; and the generous support it has experienced, is an evidence, that this denomination of Christians, are as favourable to the diffusion of learning; as they are opposed to sectarian prejudice, ignorance, and bigotry.

The want of connexional Day Schools is very painfully felt throughout this District; but especially in “*the City of St. John*”; and your Committee hope, that the ample funds left for this purpose, by the late **MR. MARK VARLEY**, will soon become available; and that the speedy establishment of the contemplated institution, will be an incentive to other opulent brethren, and say to them, “**GO THOU AND DO LIKEWISE**.”


