## BASEBALL NOTES AND JOTTINGS

**Vics Score Over the I.C.R. on Monday Assisted by Mr. Errors**

The game at the bawlyard on Monday evening could be best described as a "swat fest" and a "comedy of errors," when the Vics and I.C.R. battled for the bigger end of the gate receipts. The encounter was viewed by a good attendance of the youth and beauty of the town, newly-weds, moneyed magnates, and the general public. The evening was all that could be desired, and many beautiful costumes were shown, the latter fact might interest some who have not yet paid the price of admission to the expensive seats in the stand beside the aforesaid magnates and is given as information absolutely free.

The I.C.R. took the field and Delaney opened the Vics innings. He and Roy who followed, swung three death dealing swings at a Blaud's pill which like the Irishman's flea was in two places at the same time, then Stewart got an infield hit. With Pond up Stewart stole second went to 3rd on Lavoie's error, and then Hedley promptly struck out leaving Stewart without visible means of support on third.

For the I.C.R. Mersereau hit to right, Shirley advanced Mersereau to second, where he was out after Duncan's catch of Keith's fly. LeBlanc struck out, Shirley dying at first.

In the second innings the Vics got a good connection with the ball, getting five hits and assisted by a few errors tallied six runs. Fraser first up hit through third. Mowat got to first on Shirley's error, and with McLean up both effected a steal, Matthews scored and Mowat brought up on third on passed ball by Mersereau, then McLean struck out. Mowat scored on a passed ball, and Duncan fanned. Delaney got to first on Mersereau's bad throw, then Roy hit to left field for three bases scoring Delaney. Roy followed on Stewart's hit to centre for two bases, Stewart stealing third with Pond at bat, whose single scored Stewart. Fraser flied out to Roy leaving Pond on first. Six runs. Some innings.

The Railway Boys, Woods, Davis, and Malcolm were out at first in consecutive order (i.e. one after the other). In the third session the Vics got McLean to first where he died, and the Railway boys then gave up thinking about "Jack's Wife" and the Vics took a hand in dreaming of the glorious creature. Lavoie went into the box in the fifth and berated his appearance by an error giving Mowat first base. McLean got free ticket both advancing on passed ball by Mersereau. Duncan out at first. Delaney struck out. With Roy at bat, Mowat and McLean scored on bad throw by Mersereau. Roy struck out.

In the Railway half, Mersereau hit to left field. Shirley safe, going to second and Mersereau to third on Mowat's error. Keith flied out to Duncan. Mersereau scored on LeBlanc's out at first. Woods hit to left scored Shirley, Woods dying on first when Davis struck out.

## COUNCIL MEETING TUESDAY EVENING

**Assessment for this Year Fixed a \$36,000—A Slight Increase.**

The Town Council met on Tuesday evening in the Council Chambers, His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding. There were present councillors Alexander, Miller, White, Quinn and Pinault.

The minutes of last week's meeting were read and confirmed.

Communication was read from the Canada General Electric Co., with regard to the account for the new street lighting plant was referred to Electric Light committee.

Communication was read from Mr. J. W. McCready, secretary of Union of New Brunswick Municipalities asking if there were any names to be forwarded as delegates for the convention of municipalities at Saskatoon in July. Letter read on table.

The following reports of committees recommending payment of accounts were received and adopted, viz councillor White, Police and License committee, \$94.50; White, Fire protection, \$90.89; Miller, Finance, \$46.03; Alexander, Water and Sewerage, \$5.51.

Before the Finance report was adopted which included a bill for Graphic printing and advertising, Councillor Pinault said that there were two printing establishments in this town and he did not see why Mr. C.S.O. Crockett should not receive some of the printing orders of the town. He also questioned the amount paid out for advertising Dog Taxes and the purchase of dog tags, the sum paid out nearly amounting to the total amount received from dog taxes last year which was \$15.00.

Councillor Pinault was informed that the latter question was in the magistrates hands, not the council. In reply to the first question regarding printing matter, His Worship informed councillor Pinault that personally he had always found that the Graphic charged only about half of what the other man did, and no doubt that would be taken into account when printing orders were placed. The matter then dropped.

Councillor Pinault presented to the council a new proposed grade on Roseberry Street from Minto to the subway, which after discussion was accepted by the council. This will call for the raising of the street level about 2ft 7in at its lowest point.

Councillor Quinn brought before the notice of the council the condition of the basement of the house occupied by Mrs. Allen C. Miller, which had been flooded by sewerage for nearly a month. Councillor Alexander informed the council that the matter had been brought to his notice, but the break and stoppage of the sewer pipe was on the property and could not be repaired by the town. It was a matter for the proprietor of the house to attend to. After further discussion the matter was left in the hands of the Board of Health.

The council then went into committee of the whole to deal with the assessment for the year 1913. Deputy Mayor White was chosen chairman. After due consideration the following assessment was recommended to be imposed, and adopted by the council.

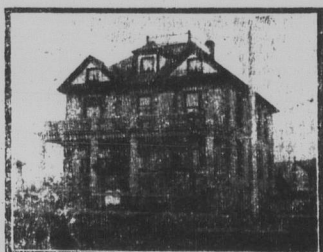

To the Editor of the Graphic:

Dear Sir:—  
In Mr. Shannon's letter of April 17th he charges me with lack of knowledge of the English language. Coming from him that seems rather funny. The people where he came from call everything she, except a man's wife and they call that he. They call "dis dat" and "dat dis." The strange thing about Mr. Shannon's letter is he never means what he says. He writes a letter advising the sale or lease of the I. C. R. and complains that he is called the man who wants to sell the I. C. R. In his next letter he wants to sell the I. C. R. In his next he wants the I. C. R. to take over the branch lines. Now, Sir, there were strong delegations sent from the counties of Gaspe and Bonaventure to Ottawa last winter to ask the Government to take over the Bay de Chaleur and Gaspe Railway. If those men instead of asking the Government before the Government would begin to advocate the sale or lease of the I. C. R., what would their people at home think of them? Why, Sir, they would call them lunatics. They would not dare to show themselves back.

When he states that I said New Brunswick was all bog, he is far from the truth as he is many other charges. I simply refer to the bog land between Moncton and Bathurst and the mountains along the Metepedia River. Mr. Shannon does not appear to understand the meaning of the word "Metepedia", or where it begins or ends, and thinks J. Fenderson's farm is on the Metepedia River. It was not all bog either, J. Fenderson's mill and farm is on the Sayabec River. I was called to Sayabec in 1896, to build furnaces, and since that time have been there at all seasons doing similar work, as the place was rather lonely I spent much of my time in the evenings and Sundays with J. Fenderson. Long before he became a lumberman, I can well remember the toads and frogs furnishing the music for the mosquitoes to bore holes in our skin. J. Fenderson cleared the said bog more to get rid of the pests than any profit. He was three dollars out for one in, but being a wealthy mill owner he did not mind. They had horses, and sawdust, and means which poor a man could not have.

Now, Sir, as to what he says about my farm, let me tell him I have made more money from my woodland, expenses counted, than I have ever done from my cleared land. I did not buy my farm with the view of making money. At that time there was no real estate agents, no potato bugs, nor brown tail moths. I bought as an emergency, if other things should fail. The emergency was like Borden's emergency, it never matured. I think that Mr. Borden would like today that such a word never entered the English language. I have let much of my stump land grow to wood and can now cut fairly good logs where my predecessors cut hay some fifty years ago. But does Mr. Shannon compare my land or land anywhere on the sea shore to land in the interior of New Brunswick? The land in question, I stated in my letter that I thought that successful farming could be done in New Brunswick along its sea board and make shores, but not to the interior. Mr. Shannon says he has done more for the lumbermen than I have. Now, Sir, I have attended to the needs of that class in seven counties in New Brunswick and Quebec. I am sure the lumbermen could not do without me some one in my place. I never heard of any of them ask for Mr. Shannon or any other real estate agent, but let me tell him that there was one of my most worthy and respected neighbors once asked to be a lumberman. He got a man that had travelled very extensively in the West, and was hailed from place to place in how to build and run mills, without paying one cent. So he got this said man to build and run a mill near my siding. I may as well say I never saw him running, but was told they would run clean out of steam, then send a man into the woods to cut a dry stub to get up the steam, and so on. This is as I got it. Anyway the poor man lost his house and farm and mill and died broken hearted. That certainly is more than I ever did for the lumbermen. Now, Sir, Mr. Shannon says I can not tell him that a crop of trees in every thirty or thirty-five years is as good as a crop every year. He thinks a crop of trees is like a crop of wheat, all grow at once, all ready to cut the same time. Suppose I have one hundred and fifty acres of woodland, with myself, a man and a team, I can cut the logs off ten acres every year. That gives me fifteen years to cut over my woodland. In this way I can have a continuous cut of lumber. So could every lease holder if this method of cutting was carried out. No money is paid to the expense and delay of reforesting. It is only shortsighted people of the Shannon type who are hindering a better than their forefathers, need be caught that way. I would ask Mr. Shannon if cleared land is more valuable than timber land. Why does he say the railway companies have taken the land in reforestation. Can Mr. Shannon point to one deserted farm in New Brunswick or anywhere else that is well stocked with lumber? He can not do it. These are stubborn facts for Shannon. You can find men up the International Railway settled on wooded farms who have left just as good farms simply because there was no wood on them. As to settling fifty thousand people in New Brunswick without interfering with the lumbermen is simply bosh. Has Mr. Shannon forgotten what took place up the International Railway last fall? And have I not heard J. Fenderson's time and again complain that the farmers were ruining his limits, and that they were coming to him starving and asking for work? He moved his winter mill twelve miles in from the Railway in hope of getting clear of the pests, but in a short time they burned his mill. He cannot farm and lumber in the same locality. What has Campbellton gained by the selling of land in the Tobique and Seven Mile Ridge? Now I think this a serious question and one that involves much, and on which depends the welfare of all our Towns and the farmers as well. I have been in and out of the Tobique Road many times and I never saw a bag of potatoes or oats coming out to town. It was all the other way; always hauling feed for man and beast. I concluded that the more farmers, the more would have to be imported into the Country, but where was the money to come from to pay for this food? It surely had to come from the wood, and if there was no wood and all farms and farmers, what then? I could go on and tell what I saw many times, of fields of grain to poor to gather, but space will not permit. Those poor people have to resort to all means to get a dollar and we cannot blame them. They kill moose and deer the whole year round. They get the Lions share of the Road money—when a general election comes on—

# WILL SHIP LARGE QUANTITIES OF ORE

Bright Outlook for the County of Gloucester. Large Shipments Are Ready

"Our company will ship 150,000 tons of iron ore, during the summer," said J. J. Drummond, proprietor of the Drummond Iron areas near Bathurst, yesterday. Up to the present time our shipments have been practically experimental but now we have regular contracts and hope to increase the output each year. The ore is sent to Philadelphia where the business is on a sound basis."

Mr. Drummond said that the company had about 30,000,000 tons of ore in their holdings "we have three vessels under continuous charter for carrying the ore" he continued "and these are loaded at Newcastle. The whole northern part of the province has advanced greatly within the last few years."

The government has thrown open a large tract of land for settlement and farmers are taking up land in all directions. Dredges are at work deepening the Bathurst harbor, and there will be twenty-five feet at low water at the different docks. We expect soon to have a large pulp mill established there.

Accompanying Mr. Drummond were W. F. C. Parsons, of Middleton (N. S.), and general manager of the company, and G. G. Fulton, who had charge of the operations at the mines.

## ANOTHER VIEW

Bathurst, June 16.—The interview published above from the St. John Standard of this date referring to dredging at Bathurst harbor by J. J. Drummond, is very misleading. While it may be true that the Maritime Dredging Company has the contract for the inner harbor work, it is not true that they have the "matter now well in hand." Not an hour's work has yet been done by this company either inside or outside Bathurst harbor. They have no large suction dredge at work, nor any scows here yet.

The suction dredge at work is a government dredge placed at work on outer harbor by the late Liberal government through the efforts of Mr. Tupper, M. P. The outer harbor work is not yet completed, but is progressing favorably. Mr. Drummond "pays a high compliment to the dominion government," says the Standard. The Liberal government deserves this credit by beginning this important work in 1910. The present government ordered the government dredge away from Bathurst in April last, and it was only after a strong delegation composed of Conservatives and Liberals, had gone to Ottawa that Hon. Mr. Rogers was induced to leave the suction dredge at work on the outer harbor and call for tenders for inside work.

If Mr. Drummond is no more accurate touching his opinions on the construction of Drednoughts in Canada than is in his interview touching Bathurst harbor, not much reliance can attach to his "emergency" interview.

**BODY WRAPPED IN SUFFRAGIST BANNER**

**Imposing Funeral Procession Through London Planned**

London, June 10.—It has been decided that Miss Emily Wilding Davison, the militant suffragette who died from her injuries received while interfering with the running of the Derby, shall be buried at her home, Longhorsley, Northumberland, on Saturday. The body has been wrapped in a suffragist banner and a suffragist badge has been placed in her coffin.

The Women's Social and Political Union is arranging an imposing funeral procession across London and a memorial service to be held at the headquarters of the militant organization when the body is placed on the train to be sent to Northumberland.

At the weekly meeting of the suffragettes held in a music hall in London to-day most of the women wore mourning. A telegram was read which had been dispatched to King George in the following words:

"Constitutional methods of approaching our king having failed and Miss Emily Wilding Davison having given her life to call attention to the women's passionate demands for the franchise, we ask the king to give serious attention to this appeal of womanhood!"

**TWO STEAMERS COLLIDE AT SEA**

**Six of Crew of Hinrich are Missing and May be Lost**

Cuxhaven, Germany, June 9.—The British steamer Adenahale, while putting out to sea yesterday, collided with the Hamburg fishing steamer, Johann Hinrich, which was sunk. Four of the crew were saved and six are missing. It is believed they were drowned.

**EFFORT TO PREVENT ANOTHER OUTBREAK**

London, June 10.—The great powers are exerting every effort to prevent the Balkan states from flying at each other's throats, and reports from Vienna indicate, with some success. Russia and Germany, particularly, are busy counseling peace and moderation, and the French government is supporting them, and as the principals creditor, is giving both Serbia and Bulgaria clear warning that in the event of war no financial assistance will be forthcoming either before or after hostilities.

Since Serbia has definitely declared that she will avoid all provocations toward Bulgaria, even should the latter refuse revision of the treaty of alliance, and will wait before proclaiming annexation of the occupied territories, and since Bulgaria has also expressed readiness to do everything possible to maintain peace, it is still hoped the war may be averted.

**NEW YORK'S HOTTEST DAY OF THE YEAR**

New York, June 17.—Yesterday was the hottest day of the year in New York city. There were a large number of heat prostrations, but no fatalities. The mercury reached a maximum of 91 degrees on the skyscraper where the official Weather Bureau is located. The thermometers at the street levels recorded as high as 102 degrees. The temperature had dropped eleven degrees last night.

**TARIFF CHANGES NEXT SESSION**

**Finance Minister to Study Conditions in the West**

Ottawa, June 9.—A revision of the general tariff of Canada will be elaborated this summer. Representations are being obtained from recognized representatives of the industries of the Dominion including the banks and the railways. They will be carefully considered when the schedules are dealt with. It is expected that next session will be largely devoted to the tariff. Finance Minister White is leaving for the West within a few days for the purpose of securing at first hand information of the industrial conditions on the prairies and in British Columbia. In tariff matters the views of the west and east have always differed. The west has frequently demanded free admission of agricultural implements and other articles which its uses largely. The east has stood for protection. The pinch of comparative hard times has made the west rather more insistent than in the past when money was easy. In view of this fact and because the financial situation of the west is worth looking into just now Hon. Mr. White proposes to spend a part of his summer in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia. The extent to which the tariff will be revised next session will depend largely upon what Mr. White learns this summer.

## DECLARES WAR ON LIQUOR TRAFFIC

Toronto, June 5.—At the close of the Presbyterian Pre-assembly Conference yesterday afternoon, a resolution calling for a demonstration act to prohibit the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors was carried with great enthusiasm. It was presented by Dr. A. S. Grant.  
Dr. Grant is not given to emotion but there was a glint of moisture in his eye as he spoke to the audience.  
"God will not save Canada," he said, "until Christian men look to the liquor traffic and say: 'Get off the mat.' My soul is pained with in me because the young men are going down. I want the congress of this church to give an expression on the drink question. I am looking for vengeance, and I want it," said he, amid a torrent of applause. He deprecated all the talk about the budget when it came before the assembly committee. The Presbyterian Church has committed itself in theory, but you are afraid to take your stand, you are afraid of the vested interests. What right has a British man to deal out poison to people in this country? He asked, amid a frantic outburst of cheering. Cut out this business and you cut out the nerve of the evil that is demoralizing the land. If you are going to build up the kingdom of God in Canada, we must root it out."

The enthusiasm broke loose right here. Men got upon their seats and yelled, women and men waved their handkerchiefs, and the place was pandemonium for some minutes.

Quietly and with a dignity of his own this strange man who has consecrated his life to doing good for others, read the following resolution:

- 1.—Whereas, recent scientific investigation has revealed that alcohol is a poison and injurious to life, even when taken in small quantities; and,
- 2.—Whereas, the liquor traffic has become a great economic burden; and,
- 3.—Whereas, the enemy of all social progress, and the cause of much social distress in efficiency, poverty, insanity, crime, and death; and,
- 4.—Whereas, the highest development of individual and national life demands the suppression of the liquor traffic; and,

5.—Whereas, the progress of the kingdom of God is greatly hindered through the traffic in intoxicating liquors;

Be it therefore resolved,—

"1.—That in the opinion of this congress, consisting of all the ministers and representative laymen from all the congregations of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, the time has come when legislation should be secured in Canada, prohibiting the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes.

"2.—That this resolution be forwarded to the general assembly for action.

"3.—That it be a suggestion to the assembly to invite all other religious bodies and temperance organizations to co-operate in a work having for its object the total suppression of the liquor traffic in Canada."

There was another demonstration at its close, and the place simmered with excitement. All the champions of temperance were gathered there, and one of them said, with a ring in his voice:

"War has been declared!"

That was the note of the end of the meeting.

The Rev. I. N. Kerr, Inspector of Schools conducted the service of Sunday the 15th at St. Andrews Episcopal Church.

The exams of the New Carlisle Academy began Tuesday the 18th, and the pupils are anxiously studying and waiting for the results.

The re-building of the New Carlisle Academy will commence in the near future and men are anxiously waiting for the summer's work.

Rev. G. P. Tattier and wife and Mr. J. O. Shear returned home on Tuesday, from attending the great Presbyterian Congress.

They report having a grand time, one or two of the main subjects brought up and enlarged upon by the congress and assembly was the grand stand they took on church union and the temperance question, the latter being unanimous, that all would endeavor to work and pray for the stamping out of the great curse, strong drink, as a body would endeavor to secure government support. Upwards of 6000 ministers and their wives and elders attended the congress and assembly from all over Canada. There was a great feeling of brotherly love and christian spirit manifested such as was never known before and will surely have a lasting influence on all who had the high honor of being present. On Saturday the 10th, the city of Toronto gave to all the delegates a warm reception. The Mayor gave the address of welcome, about 6000 were present on the beautiful University grounds. One of the great features was the grand brass band and the Highland pipes—all dressed in uniform (the kilts). All street cars in the city gave free fare to all delegates during the whole congress.

Rev. G. P. Tattier preached his farewell sermon, Sunday evening the 15th to a large congregation. Taking his text from the 13th of Cor. 58 verse and exhorted his people to be steadfast, unmovable in the work of the Lord. LINE BLOCKED BY  
WRECK AT BATHURST  
Early Thursday evening, June 5th No. 10 way freight, east bound from Newcastle, side-swiped McKenzies west bound special on the east switch at Bathurst station, with the result that the line was blocked for some time and the west bound Maritime express (33) was delayed for about three hours. Apart from the delay the accident was a slight one, and the damage to the rolling stock and roadbed did not amount to much. The way-freight which ran into the was special in charge of Conductor Steve Nickerson of Moncton and Engineer Orville Gilker, of the town.

The accident was caused primarily by the short siding at Bathurst which was not long enough to contain the whole of McKenzies special. The special had a cross on the way freight, at Bathurst, and the only way in which the cross could be accomplished under the circumstances was for the special to pull up through the siding to the west switch let the freight pull down the main line until clear of the switch and then for the special to pull out for Campbellton and thus clear the east switch and main line beyond and thus allow the freight to proceed.

The wayfreight in carrying out the above manoeuvre failed to stop before the east switch was clear, with the result that her engine side swiped the special, smashing a car loaded with lime which was situated about ten cars from the van. No one was injured in the collision.

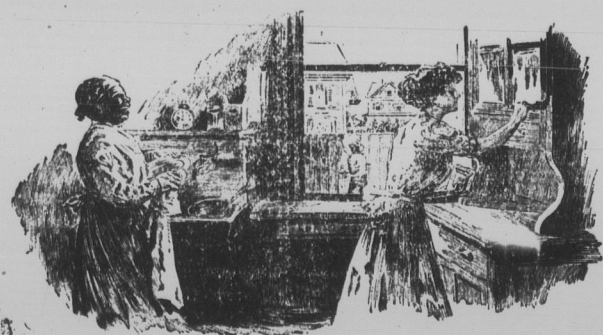
