The RAILROAD.—We take the following extracts from the Fredericton Correspondence of the Carleton Sentinel. Our contemporary and his correspondent "W." are entitled to a "free ticket" and will get it too, when the railroad is in operation. We heartily endorse W.'s opinions on our Railroad, and have stated long since that it will be the "Great Trunk Line between Quebec and the Atlantic," and proudest beyond contradiction, that it will pay well, in fact, better than any other railroad in the Province.—[Ed. Standard.]

While this undertaking (the European and North American Railway), is attracting attention, and its advocates are doing their best to show it in its best position, the advocates of the now Great Trunk Railway from St. Andrews to Woodstock and Quebec, have been steadily pressing their claims, and to the credit of the Legislature be it said, that their application for a loan to complete this work has not been disregarded, and the Province has taken stock to the amount of £60,000 currency. This shows the confidence now existing in the future success of the line. The fact is, 'tis the only Rail Road in the Province that will ever pay. The road from St. Andrews to Woodstock will no doubt be completed in about two years, when it will be pushed forward to Quebec. The persevering industry and zeal of the Carleton County people, is a full guarantee of the final completion of this road to Quebec. To John Wilson, Esq., who is now here, and Capt. Robinson, M. P., too much praise cannot be awarded. Your Representatives, are also entitled to much credit for the able manner in which they advocated the claims of this undertaking, nor must I forget to add this: to the Hon. Mr. Connell, whose best energies have been exerted in this matter, great credit is due, his influence and exertions in the Council at this time is of the utmost importance. I some time ago mentioned that the Counties of Charlotte, Carleton, and Victoria looked to J. H. Gray and R. D. Wilmet, Esqrs., for support in the matter, and they did not look in vain, it was nobly rendered. I am happy too to add that W. H. Needham and Thos. Pickard, Esqrs., are entitled to much praise for the manly and timely support they rendered to this Bill. The division was, against the Bill:—Esq., Reid, Gordon, Montgomery, Hamilton, Tilley, McLeod, Stevens, Gilbert, Johnson, Sales, and Ritchie, all the rest of the House voted in favour of it.

Your people will doubtless present Mr. Ritchie with a leather medal for the good feeling he has displayed toward them, but I would advise you not to get it up without giving Charlotte and Victoria an opportunity of testifying their gratitude, as it might create a jealousy. The Hon. Gentleman felt too much ashamed to say a great deal, but his looks betrayed a savage satisfaction when he voted against the Bill.

Let the people of Charlotte, Carleton and Victoria know, that William Johnston Ritchie, Esquire, M. P., for the County of St. John, voted against a Bill to facilitate the construction of a Railway from Saint Andrews, to Woodstock, this too after the members from the above Counties had in a manly straightforward manner voted of sectional feeling, voted for the sum of £300,000 for his pet Railway. Let them keep it in their memories, that such a man must never with their consent be permitted to hold any office of trust or emolument in the Province; he has proved himself unworthy their confidence."
