COAL FROM NOVA SCOTIA. Montreal, Jan. 16. — The civic authorities have ordered 125 cars of soft coal frim the Nova Scotia Steel and Iron Company, and the International Coal Company, divided equally, to meet the demand of the public for fuel. TO BREAK THEIR CHARTERS.

Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 16. — Attorney-General Sheets filed in the supreme court, at the instigation of Governor Nash, quo warranto suits against six big coal companies to oust them from their charters. It is charged that these corporations has entered into a conspiracy to limit the output of coal and to increase and generally control

the prices. Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 16. - In the General Assembly a resolution was inroduced calling on the attorney-general for action on the coal famine, and the house appointed a joint committee to confer with the governor and the railway representatives. A bill was also introduced authorizing the state to take charge of coal lands if the need shall arise from a fuel shortage.

The ill-feeling between Lieutenant-Governor Tillman and Editor Conzales has been brewing for some time, and followed a severe denunciation of Tillman, which Gonzales made in the columns of his paper and on the stump. The trouble between the two men, however, first grew out of a fist fight between United States Senator Tillman and Senator McLaurin, on the floor of the United States Senate. Major Jenkins, who had served with Roosevelt's Rough Riders in Cuba, and who had won a record for bravery and merit, was to have been presented with a sword by the people of South Carolina. The presentation was to have been made by Lieutenant-Governorelect Tillman, who yesterday shot Gonzales. When President Roosevelt withdrew the invitation to a state dinner in Washington, which he had sent to Senator Tillman, because of the fight the latter had in the United States Senate, Lleutenant-Governor States Senate, Lleutenant-Governor Tillman refused to present the sword to Lieut. Jenkins. Mr. Gonzales took up the matter through the columns

The coroner investigated. Members of the jury now declare that the case was one of double murder, and that some third party killed both Mrs. Stucker and the boy.



Public Men, Fast and Present.

The Toronto World very properly rebukes the ghoulishness of some newspapers, which have been canvassing, with ill-concealed satisfaction, the prospect of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's retirement through ill-health. "Any party," says the World, "which banked upon the physical weakness of its opponents would be in a very miserable position." The World adds:

"It would be a source of regret to The World to see Sir Wilfrid Laurier, or any other man of distinction, disappear from politics, whether it approved or disapproved of his conduct and policy. Public life in Canada has been cheapened and impoverished by the disappearance of men like Edward Blake and D'Alton Mc-Carthy, and John S. D. Thompson and Oliver Mowat and William R. Meredith. You might find fault with these men, and dissent from their views, but you felt that they were big men, that they were worth listening to, and that they broadened and illuminated everything

they touched. "It is a rather unpleasant truth that 'the growing time' has not brought us any growth in the size of public men. The day of the old union was supposed to be the day of small things. Yet the public men of that day were Baldwin and Draper, William Hume Blake and Sullivan, Macdonald and Brown, Lafontaine and Cartier and Dorien. Mowat began his career long before Confederation, and the minds of Edward Blake and Cartwright were formed in the same period. Who is there now to compared with them? Laurier and Cartwright are two of the very few men of distinction that are left, and it will be a matter for regret when they pass away, come that day

The World is too disparaging of contemporary public men. When they have finished their life work and have passed from the stage it is probable that another generation will hold some of their names in honor and say there were giants in those days. We are too close to them now; they will be measured more accurately in the perspective of history, just as Canadians of today can appraise the services of Brown, Dorien, Lafontaine, Macdonald, Mackenzie and Cartier more justly than their contemporaries did. If there are fewer outstanding figures now, it may fairly be claimed in public life has not fallen. The present House of Commons is a more capthe union. MAN AND WIFE DROWNED. Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 16.-Frederick Short and Florence, his wife, were drowned while skating on League Island Lake. In the presence of hundreds of pleasureseekers the man and woman skated beyond the danger line, mistaking the shining waters for a continuation of the

KILLED BY A COAL CAR. Detroit, Jan. 16.-Ethel Ecker, aged 12 years, was instantly killed yesterday, her head being severed from her body by a coal car drawn by an M. C. R. engine in Delray. The girl, in company with her sister Mabel, aged 14, was clambering over gondola cars that had been emptied of coal, for the purpose of picking up any chunks that might have been left. As she climbed out of a car it was jerked by the engine. The little one was hurled beneath the cars, and as she fell she screamed: "Mabel, Mabel, I will be

The child landed on her head in front of the heavy moving wheels. She was dragged a car length over the ties. Her sister ran along the other track screaming in vain for the cars to stop. The mother ran to the scene and dragged the remains from under the wheels. She was unable to stand the sight of the decapitated body, and fainted on a neighbor's doorstep. One of the railroad men removed his overcoat and laid it over the dead body. He could not pick up the skull, and it lay in plain sight for several minutes.

OTHER CASUALTIES.

Moses Jackson was crushed to death in the Venus mine at Nelson, B.C., on Tuesday night by a cave-in. He leaves a wife and five small children. A squaw named Smith was burned to death in a tent on the outskirts of St.







DR. McCALLUM REPLIES TO CHIEF JUSTICE'S CRITICISM

Asylum Is Not a Refuge for mentia. Generally it is some childishness of speech or action, due to the senility of extreme age. You will understand this better when I tell you

Wards for Examination Should Be Built in Each County



INSANE asylum is a hospital for the treatment of mental diseases -not a refuge for the aged and infirm," was the statement made

by Dr. G. A. McCallum, in an interview with an Advertiser representative this morning. The statement grew out of discussion of Chief Justice Meredith's rather sharp criticism of the prevailing system of dealing with persons charged with insanity. It will be recalled that in his charge to the grand jury his lordship suggested that the asylum, rather than the jail, was the proper place for the detention and examination of these cases, and hoped that wards for this purpose would soon be added to the asylums throughout

the province.
"Do you think the scheme is feasible?" was asked Dr. McCallum. "No, I do not, for the simple reason that the majority of those that come to us via the jails are aged persons, seeking a home, and once they are in the institution we find it impossible to get rid of them."

"But they, of course, come to you as "They come to us charged as being dangerously insane. As a matter of fact they are afflicted with old age desane.

seem, if we wish to discharge one of these patients as cured it is impossible to find the relatives, and in consequence they are left on our hands." "But the stigma of going to jail would be eliminated were these persons committed directly to an asylum for examination."

"Well, for that matter," said Dr. McCallum, "there's a highly objectionable stigma in going to an insane asylum. Many persons would probably prefer the jail.

Dr. McCallum thinks that the remedy is to be found in the establishing of suitably equipped wards in the various county jails throughout the provinces. The cases per county are few, and the cost would be small. They should, of course, be separate from the criminal wards, and the inmates better fed. It need not be called a jail. Referring to the slowness in removing patients from the jail to the asylum, Dr. McCallum pointed out that the examination evidence had first to be forwarded to the inspector, who in turn forwarded it to the lieutenant-governor. Further delay was often necessary because of the lack of accommodation. At the present time the asylum is entirely filled on the men's side, and there are but two or three vacancies left in the female wards. Dr. McCallum considers that in its administration of the insane asylums the Provincial Government is doing splendid work, nearly one-third of the revenue of Ontario being devoted to the care of the in-


