The Finns are very angry at the constant abridgement of their liberties, and threaten to revols if this is carried any further. The Government, on the other hand, is resolved to bring Finland on the same standing as the other provinces of Russia and to allow it no liberties whatsoever. To say the least, the present condition of affairs appears strained, and the Russian Government will certainly not be the one to give way.

London, Jan. 16 .- A Cabinet Council lasting three hours was held to-day. financial terms of the Home Rule Bill are financial terms of the Home Rule Lin are said to be substantially arranged. In the first bill the ratio of Ireland's contributions to the imperial exchequer was 1-15th, totaling 23,242,000 per annum. The new proposals, based upon juster data, will make Ireland's contribution only 1-23rd, equaling £2,070,885 per annum. Another important feature in the Irish financial scheme is that a loan shall be granted from the imperial to the Irish exchequer to enable the Irish Administration to start fair.

The agents appointed in Great Britain are stationed as follows: Mr. Stewart, at Inverness; Mr. Fleming, at Dundee, Scotland, and Mr. Woods, ex-M.P.P., of Manitoba, in the English Midland Counties.

TRIESTE, Jan. 16.—A terrific storm has swept this city since 10 o'clock this mornswept this city since 10 o'clock this morning. Sleet or snow has fallen incessantly and the wind blew a hurricane. Half the trees in the streets were snapped of close to the pavement and four tram cars tumbled from the tracks. It has been impossible for vessels to enter the harbor. Two cabs with horses and drivers were caught in the current where the water was receding and were carried into the harbor and drowned. Fifty persons have been injured by falling trees, tiles and chimneys.

ROME, Jan. 16 .- The Pope created four teen cardinals at the consistory to-day, the teen cardinals at the consistory to-day, cub-list not including any Americans or Cana-dians. Archbishop Vaughan, of West-minster, was clevated to the cardinalate; also Archbishop Logue, Primate of Ireland, Archbishop Krementz, of Cologne; Prince Archbishop Kiopp, of Breslau; Monsignor Mocenni, Papal under-secretary of State; Monsignor Persico, accretary of the Pro-paganda and others. There being in all paganda and others. There being in all six Italian cardinals, two French cardinals, two Prussian, one English, one Irish, one Hungarian and one Spanish cardinal. Pope Leo in his allocution thanked God for haveled the state of Leo in his allocution thanked God for having preserved him to celebrate his epiacopal jubilee. This event, he said, would be regarded by men as a sign of the divine protection extended over the church in these calamitous days through the preservation of the Supreme Pontiff. The Pope announced in addition to the cardinals named the creation of two cardinals reserved.

Both vessels were so badly damaged that they sank a short time after the collision. All on board both steamers were rescued except three men from the Agesian, who drowned before assistance

LONDON, Jan. 17.-A dispatch from Lendon, Jan. 17.—A dispatch from Messina states that the collision between the Italian steamer San Marco and the French steamer Algeric, resulted in much greater loss of life than was at first reported. The steamers collided Sunday night in the Straits of Messina and both sank. Five of the persons on board the Algeric were saved, but the fate of the others is not known, and it is supposed they were drowned. Seventeen persons were saved from the San Marco. Two of her crew are missing and are presumably dead.

## A TRAIN ON FIRE !

Frightful Accident on a Russian Railway Line.

Forty-Nine Dead and Twenty Terribly Burned and Injured.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 17.—As a train omposed of several cars filled with recruits was running from Statusk to Samara to ay flames burst from the foremost carwas running from Statusk to Samita to day flames burst from the foremost carriage. The train was going at full speed and the tongues of fire swept backward, and in a few minutes all the cars were blazing. The engineer did not stop the train until he had ran a considerable distance. In the meantime there was a scene of indescribable confusion in the cars. The recruits—or, at least, as many as could do so—loaped from the windows and doors. Some of them landed uninjured in snowbanks, while others, who landed in the cleared track were killed. Those who were unable to get out of the cars were burned to death, for the train was entirely consumed. Some of the men were terribly burned before they jumped. When the confusion bad somewhat subsided, the officer in charge of the recruits, who had saved himself by jumping, called the roll of his men. It was found that 49 of them were dead and 20 roll of his men. It was found 49 of them were dead and 20 bly burned and otherwise injured. terribly burned and otherwise injured. It is supposed some of the men in the forward car were skylarking and upset the stove. The draft caused by the onrushing train caused the flames to spread with such great rapidity that nothing could be done to extinguish them. It is claimed the engineer was guilty of criminal negligence in not stopping the train as soon as he saw

The Corner in Pork.

Press dispatches state that "the clique began buying pork during the cholera scare, when it was going begging at \$10 a barrol. Manipulation aside, the mainspring under the market is the shortage of hogs. Each day has added some evidence of the strength of the situation. The scarcity of hogs at this season is largely attributed to the plenomenal meteorological conditions in the spring, when it rained so long that the farmers began to think they would not have a chance to plant any corn. What to do with the hogs was a question with no corn to feed them on, and they concluded that it would be better to take what they could get for their pork products then than run chances for a lower price. The consequence was that there was a very free movement in pork last summer, which left a slim home contingent. One report states that the probable percentage of hogs for January, February and March of this year will be but 68 per cent, of the supply of hogs for October, November and December of last year. All Europe Suffering from the In tensely Cold Weather.

Harbors Icobound, Railway Traffic Delayed and Many Persons Frosthitten. A Dozen or More Persons Frozen

London, Jan. 17.—Reports of the extreme cold come from all parts of the continent. The harbor at Kiel is completely icebound. All over Germany railway traffic is delayed and in some parts suspended. Between Rome and Genoa railway communication is maintained only with the greatest difficulty. Yesterday was the coldest day of the winter in Vienna. Few ventured out as the dazzling whiteness of the snow was almost unendurable and a person's nose or ears would freeze during a five minutes' walk. to Death. Forty Degrees Below Zero at Sparts, Wis.-Great Suffering Among the Winnebagos-Trains Blocked on the N. Y. Central-A Contrast at Halifax, N. S. KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 16 .- Not for 30 amoust discovered with a sound of France several small railway accidents have been caused by the snow drifts. No trains are run on the railway between Castellandar and Narbonne, Chartres and Magny. The train which left Chartres on Saturday night is still embedded in the snow.

High winds prevailed along the coast of Spain. Many fishing boats have returned. Railway traffic has been suspended in Galicia and the Biscay Provinces. All mails arrive in Madrid many hours late.

Immense snowdrifts have been piled up along the Swiss frontiers, so that communication over the border is interrupted.

In Southern Italy the weather is the most severe in many years. Ice forms in the streets and snow is drifted along the highways. A dispatch from Naples says Vesuvius and other mountains thereabouts are covered with snow.



OIL IN EUROPE AND ASIA. Darius Probably the First Standard Oil Magnate.

In Athens, writes F. B. Sanborn to the Boston Advertiser, I met a gentleman not long since at the Caspian Sea, near which Russian lake there have been extensive long since at the Caspian Sea, near which Russian lake there have been extensive oil wells of the Czar's subjects, all dug and, to some extent, worked by Americans. He tells me that now the American competition in petroleum is so great that the Russian oil no longer commands a living price, and that the business is greatly depressed in that part of the Russian empire. Mentioning to him the English story that the petroleum of that region had poisoned the waters of the River Volga, so that the fish are all dying, he told me that could hardly be, since the Caspian Sea abounds in excellent fish and yet is covered with oil, so that a person bathing in it, as he did, finds himself anointed with petroleum on coming out. He said that the fine Russian steamers on the Caspian have their engines run with oil from the wells near Baku, which is the Oil City of Asiatic Russia.

C., just before the battle of Marathon. Ardericca is the name of that oil city, and Herodotus says it produced three things—salt, asphalt and oil—all from the same well—whence they were drawn with a sweep and bucket, as the old-fashioned Yankees still draw water—and as it is drawn in Greece, when the people are ioned Yankees still draw water—and as its drawn in Greece, when the people are ingenious enough to have a well-sweep, and keep it in repair, which is not always the case. The heavier salt and asphalt hardened and separated, while the lighter oil was collected in tubs and pails and tanks. So that Darius, the Great King, was at the head of the first Standard Oil Company of which history makes mention—unless Hebrew or Egyptian chronicles have something more ancient to offer.

J. W. Davidson, Gallagher's alleged accomplice, was called, and gave his testimony, which corroborated Gallagher's.

George W. Crail, the dispatcher of the

Gallagher. Court then adjourned.

Why is it that there has been so much rejoicing in London, St. Thomas and Port Stanley over the prospective opening up of direct commerce with Cleveland, Ashtabula and other points on the United States side of Lake Erie?

Why is it that so many Canadians indorse the project for establishing direct communication between Great Britain and Canada by means of fast Atlantic steam-

Why is it that many millions of Cauadian money have been spent in deepening the St. Lawrence and connecting streams, in order to make it easier for ocean vessels so reach the head of navigation?

One is prompted to ask these question at a time when it is announced by those in power at Ottawa that the system of trade restriction, which has been in force for the west this. for the past thirteen years, is to be con-

We have had men in the midst of us professing to believe that it is all wrong to encourage trade, defending taxes on imports of almost every description, with the object of discouraging commerce; and doing everything in their power to make believe that the advocates of unfettered frade are the enemies of their country, are ampatriotic, traitors, and so forth.

A new light has dawned, however.

These men do not yet jola with us in de-

manding that every unnecessary shackle shall be removed from international trade by river, lake, son, or land, but they feel inclined to rejoice that men can be found to aid in reopening trade with our neighbors,

This is a hopeful sign. The object lesson which the re-establishment of direct trade with Cleveland teaches is that if it is profitable to trade in taxed coal, it will be nore profitable to trade in untaxed coal.

GEMS FROM LAURIER.

Hon. Wilfrid Laurier has returned to his country home in Arthabaskaville, but he has left behind him, in the speeches which he delivered at Hamilton and Toronto, the strongest incentives to effort on the part of all patriotic Canadians, no matter what their political antecedents.

The keynote of Mr. Laurier's masterly addresses have been Freedom of Trade; the goal he aspires to reach is emancipation from every tax that is not needed for revenue and the steady extension of our opportunities to buy and sell without let or hindrance from monopolists or self-seeking politicians.

Here are a few gems from the Toronto ddress of the honorable gentleman:

Here are a few gems from the Toronto address of the honorable gentleman:

"Of all the signs, sir, which I have found in the Province of Ontario which make me go back to my own native Province with a sense of pride and of hope unbounded, is this fact, that I have found the young Liberals of Ontario—the young men, I should also include the young Conservatives—eager to do their best for their native country, as their ancestors have done in the past. (Hear, hear.) It is a most hopeful sign that you see the young men of this country determined at no distant day—determined as soon as the occasion offers—to do their best for the country, which indeed must be admitted, much as we love it, to be a suffering country. A week ago to day you heard the ministers of the crown in this city, and to-morrow you will hear them again, piling up before you figures and statistics in a vain effort to convince the people that they are happy and prosperous. (Laughter.) Sir, what a delusion! I should say what an insult to common sense and common honesty. (Hear, hear, and cheers.) To tell us, indeed, that this country is prosperous when a country like Cauada, which can easily shelter and feed and give happy homes to at least 100,000,000 of men, cannotretain the paltry 5,000,000 of fafairs, Mr.

Until we have attained that result there can be no peace for the Liberals, but it must be constant warfare."



Lawyer — His Body Interred at Lowell, Mass.

Lowell, Mass., Jan. 16. — It was barely 3 o'clock this morning when Huntington Hall, where the remains of Gen. Batter reposed in state, was opened to the public. There were thousands waiting then to look upon the dead, and more than 20,000 people gazed at the face of the departed warrior. The greater portion of this throng of sightseers came from out of town. The trains were packed, and the streets were filled with sleighs and vehicles of every description. The crush on the sidewalks was frightful, and the police found it difficult to prevent injury to the women and children. One woman fainted and was carried unconscious into a neighboring store. A child was trampled upon and was carried into a doctor's office with a badly-sprained arm, while many women emerged from the crowd with torn clothing. Nothing like this crush has ever before been seen in Lowell.

Although there were insignia of mourning on all the buildings in the neighborhood there was little semblance of it in the crowd. Fakirs were present in scores, loudly calling their wares as they sold pictures of the dead general and brief biographical sketches of his life. At 11:30 the hall was closed and the body of Gen. Butler was surrendered by the G. A. R. to the State military authorities. To them was assigned the duty of giving it a military burial. Only those who held cards of admission secured entrance to the church, and they numbered only 850. Among them were: Gov. Russel and staff, the Governor's Council and the committees of the Legislature, ex-Govs. Banks, Ames and Brackett and the surviving members of Gen. Butler's council in 1883, Gov. Smith and staff of New Hampshire, and members of State Legislature, Gen. John Palmer, past commander-in-chief of the G. A. R., came from Albany, and the present commander was represented by Inspector-General Goodale and aides.

At the church Rev. Dr. Chambre and his assistant, Rev. George S. Sinclair, conducted the services, the surpliced choir chanting selections from be elected by acclamation.

Mr. John Deverell, for many years brigade-major of the Twenty-second Battalion and formerly of the British regulars, died at Woodstock on Friday.

Great Interest Excited in New England Over the Cape Breton Coal Deal. Over the Cape Breton Coal Deal.

Boston, Mass., Jan. 16.—The Herald says: Great interest has been excited in Boston and throughout New England by the announcement that Henry M. Whitney and a syndicate of Boston capitalists have obtained control of the coal mines of Cape Breton. From information gleaned in Boston it is probable that the deal consummated is of even more gigantic dimensions than this and embraces not only the coal mines but a large area of undeveloped amineral properties and the rail-ways connecting the raines with navigation. Many millions of Boston capital will, it is said, be invested in this enterprise, which is understood to include a great extension in the output of coal in that island, the construction of a railway from Sydney, where it will connect with the Intercolonial system to Louisburg, a port on the scaboard open all the year round; the opening up of iron, copper and gypsum mines and the establishment of smelting furnaces and other industries.

All the coal mines have been consolidated under one lease, and the period of the lease, it is said, is fixed for 60 years.



THE WEATHER.

Toronto, Jan. 16-11 p.m.—The storm center which was south of Nova Scotia last evening has moved northeastward across the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and the weather has cleared up and turned cold again in the Maritime Provinces. To-night there is a storm center to the northward of Manitoba moving eastward, and gales prevail in that Province and in the Territories. The weather has continued fair and cold in Ontario and Quebec.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 12°—30°; Edmonton, 12°—36°; Prince Albert, 12° below—25°; Qu'appelle, 6° below—16°; Winnipeg, 30° below—2° below; Port Arthur, 14° below—25°; Quebec, 10° below—4°; Halifax, 14°—34°.

The objection we would have to this wholosale exemption business is, that it frees some from taxes and not all, that what it takes off some it To the Editor of the ADVERTISER: business is, that it frees some from taxes and not all, that what it takes off some it places on others, that it violates a well recognized principle in economics that the burden of taxatin should be in proportion to our ability to pay, that the capitalist is relieved while the burden is made heavier on the masses. We conceive the best way to increase prosperity and promote progress is by some system or other distributing wealth more thoroughly and justly, not still more concentrate it in the capitalist.

To avoid these objections Mr. Yates should have some method by which to adequately compensate the masses for the extra burden placed on them, but the writer fails to see how it is to be done by the single tax system.


