Enemy Unprepared for Either Artillery Bombardment or Infantry Attack.

This is the first installment of a report by Sir Max Altken. [Canadian Press.]

OTTAWA, March 30 .- A graphic story of the fighting in Northern France and Belgium has reached the Government from Sir Max Aitken Canadian eye-witness, who accompan led a party of press representatives to the front in the region occupied by the British army. The report follows:
