### A BLOODY BATTLE IN THE PHILIPPINES; SIX HUNDRED NATIVES ANNIHILATED

United States Troops at Terrible Cost Wipe Out Gallant Band of Moros After Fierce Two Days' Combat on Volcano Cone.

Manila, March 9. - An important action between American forces and hostile Moros has taken place near Jolo, Fifty enlisted men were killed, a commissioned officer was wounded, four enlisted men were wounded, and a naval contingent operating with the military sustained 32 casualties. The Moros lcst 600 men killed.

#### Battle Raged Two Days.

Major-General Leonard Wood, commander of the division of the Philippines, reports as follows from Jolo capital of the Sulu Islands:

"A severe action between troops of the naval detachment and constabulary and hostile Moros, has taken place at Mount Dajo near Jolo. The en gagement opened during the afternoon of March 6 and ended in the morning of March 8. The action involved the capture of Mount Daja, a lava cone 2,-100 feet high, with a crater at its sum mit, and extremely steep. The last 400 feet were at an angle of 60 degrees, Rev. Robert A. #### Corbin Blames Missionaries

San Francisco, March 9. - "There will be no war between the United States and China," said Major-General Henry C. Corbin, upon his arrival from the Orient on the steamer Korea yesterday. "So far as I have been able to observe, the reported disturbances in China have been grossly exaggerated, and conditions are not nearly so alarming as one would be led to suppose from reports that have been published abroad,

throughout the western world." That there have been disturbances is quite true, but I do not think they will break the peace of China and the United States, or any other nation.

"Aside from this chief source of anti-foreign feeling, the troubles in China are due to the presence of missionaries. I was assured by a very prominent Chinese that the Chinese are not at all friendly to the presence of foreign missionaries.

"The Chinese have perhaps a more firmly fixed religious belief than any other people in the world, and they look upon the religions of the western world with scant favor.'

#### The Empire Grows

London, March 9. - As the outcome of a suggestion by Chamberlain when he held the post of colonial secretary, a unique blue-book was published yesterday, recording forty years' growth of the British Empire, as revealed by the census of 1901. The blue-book shows that since 1861 the area of the empire has increased from eight and a half million to near twelve million square miles, and the population from 250,600,000 to 400,000,000, of which only 54,000,000 are whites, and 58,000,000 Christians.

The Cleveland Plaindealer is under the mistaken impression that the law has been conceived in a unneighborly spirit, as an act of retaliation for the proscription of Canadian money in the United States. It points out that Canadian coins circulate freely in Cleveland, and all along the lakes on the American side, and adds:

#### AN INTERNATIONAL NUISANCE.

[From the Philadelphia Inquirer.] Emperor William of Germany is becoming an international nuisance. He is always swaggering around with his chest thrown out and one hand on his sword hilt, while the other twists and twirls those famous mustachios, calling attention to the chip on his shoulder, and talking of the terrible things he is prepared to do if some one will be kind enough to afford him the opportunity; and while there is less disposition than there used to be to take him seriously because it has been noticed that he is a good deal of a bluffer and blusterer, who, while always talking of war, takes very good care not to engage in it, the fact that it is in his power to precipitate a convulsion if the fit should take him

cannot be overlooked. It is as though some reckless boy by way of bravado and his vanity tickled by the alarm he is provoking, should insist upon playing with fireworks in the vicinity of an open powder magazine. He does not mean to produce an explosion, but the possibility that he may do so before he knows it makes those who watch him nervous. It is the same way with the Kaiser. He is not happy unless he is occupying the center of the stage in the full blaze of the limelight, and as he has found by experience that the surest way of attracting attention and of making an attentive world sit up and notice is to talk about his army and navy in such a way as to communicate a covert threat, he seldom misses an opportunity to afford himself this dangerous satisfaction.

Not long ago he remarked with a pleasure which he took no pains to conceal that he could not take a walk abroad without causing a quiver of widespread apprehension, and it is an indication of his peculiar make-up that a circumstance, which by a right-minded man would be recognized as a reproach, is by the Kaiser regarded as a tribute. He thinks it is something fine to be considered the chief menace to the public peace, and like the bad boy who has made himself a terror by his mischievous tricks, he revels in his badness and tries to make himself out worse than he really is for the sake of the impression which he sees he is producing.

These remarks are suggested by the thoroughly characteristic reply made by him to the congratulations of the Regent of Brunswick in connection with the celebration of his silver wedding. "My first and last thought," said the Kaiser, "is for my fighting forces by land and sea," and then he went on, "may God grant that war does not come," adding by way of conclusion: "Should it come, however, I am firmly convinced that the army would acquit itself as it did 35 years ago." Now, the hypocrisy of that is not less disgusting than the inflammatory intention of it is reprehensible. The Kaiser must be very well aware of what ever one else thoroughly un derstands, that there is no danger to the peace of Europe from any direction but his own. There can be no war except of his making and there will be no war unless he deliberately provokes it. Under these conditions rilegious. For him merely to mention

war in the way he did is to increase the chances of its occurrence. A man who acted in private life as the Kaiser does in public affairs would either be put under bonds to keep the peace or be confined in an asylum as a dangerous lunatic. 

Directors' Report INSURANCE ACCOUNT-The volume of new business was 3,637 policies for \$6,014,576, being an increase over 1904 of 185 policies for \$966,408. With the exception of \$65,000 written in Newfoundland, the new business was all written within the Dominion of Canada. The total amount of assurance in force is \$44,199,954 under 29,788 policies, being an increase over 1904 of \$3,-

INCOME-The total income for the year was \$1,956,518 91, derived from premiums, \$1,547,506 45; interest and rents, \$407,563 94, and profit from the sale of real estate, \$1,448 52.

PAYMENTS TO POLICYHOLDERS-The payments to policyholders consisted of death claims, \$231,924 10; matured endowments, \$159,450; purchased policies, \$64,168 88; surplus, \$87,928 85, and annuities, \$9,422 56; being a total of \$552,914 19. The death claims which fell in during the year amounted to \$269,214, and though slightly in excess of those in the preceding year, were very light, and much below the expectation.

THE EXPENSES AND TAXES were \$348,491 76, and profit and loss \$1,-519 18, making a total of \$350,010 94, or 17.8 per cent of the total income.

ASSETS-The cash assets at the close of the year were \$8,846.658 42, and consisted of Mortgages, \$4.265,533 86; debentures and bonds, \$3.245,401 89; loans on policies, \$988,670 39; premium obligations, \$28,810 60; real estate, including the head office building, \$56,281 08, and cash in banks and at head office \$261,960 60. Adding to this the due and deferred premiums, \$272,121 08, interest and rents due and accrued. \$177.312 65, the total assets amount to \$9.296,092 15. It will be observed that, as in the past, we still continue to invest our funds in securities of a non-speculative character, and that we hold them on our books at their net cost.

The interest on our investments has been very well met, especially in the city of Winnipeg, where on mortgages amounting to \$745,555, the interest in arrear at the close of the year was only \$57. In the Province of Manitoba and the West generally, there is a tendency to defer payment of installments of principal on account of the desire to purchase more land. All payments, both for interest and principal, have, however, been very well met, and were quite equal in that respect to the previous year. In Ontario and elsewhere the mortgage collections have been exceptionally good, and at the close of the year there was interest in arrear of only \$16,317, the largest part of which fell due in the closing days of the year, and has since been paid. The active demand for money during the year kept our funds well employed at good rates of interest. The average rate realized on our funds

THE LIABILITIES were again computed on the same standard as in former years, viz.: Combined experience table with 4 per cent interest for all business up to Jan. 1, 1900. From that date to Jan. 1, 1903, on the Institute of Actuaries' Table, with 31/2 per cent interest, and thereafter on the same table with 3 per cent interest. The reserve computed upon this standard of valuation amounts to \$8,210,064 24, and the total liabilities are \$8.342.091 03. The surplus over all liabilities on the company's standard of reserve, as above mentioned, is \$954,001 12, being an increase for 1904 of \$181,928 25. On the Government standard of valuation our surplus would be \$1,263,905.

As in former years, the executive committee has examined all the securities and verified all the entries relating to them on the company's books.

The commissioners for the Nova Scotia Government have just returned from Boston, where they bought the standard-bred stallion Achille, a son of Bingen and Starlight. Bingen has a trotting record of 2:061/4. and was sold at auction for \$32,000, while Starlight, a daughter of Electioneer, with a record of 2:15%, was a \$15,000 horse at two years old. It is to be hoped, though, that when the Ontario, or any other government in this country, proceeds to the consideration of the encouragement of the horse of speed, it will give serious heed to the representations of those who are interested in, and desirous of, maintaining a steady and intelligent improvement in the stock, rather than to those whose attle tude towards an industry of the value of sixty-seven millions of dollars is one of ignorance and indifference, if not of actual hostility, and who would see no cause for regret if the horse were exterminated .- The Globe.

The next international ocean yacht race of general interest is that promoted by the Hawaii Yacht Club for next May. The start will be from San Francisco May 5, and the finish off Diamond Head Light, Honolulu. The total distance in a direct line is 2,100 miles, and the season of the year will materially favor the contestants, so that a fast passage is assured. The time allowance regulations are very simple and liberal, the basis being on an hour per foot for the entire distance. In computing the length load waterline is taken, added to half of the total amount of overhang. It is probable, the Vancouver Province says, that there will be one Canadian competitor, Mr. Alex Maclaren's Maple Leaf, fiying the flag of the Royal Vancouver Yacht Club.

AUTO RESTRICTIONS

Londoners Interested in Legislation Which Is Anticipated.

The Toronto Automobile Club, at its annual meeting, discussed the anticipated legislation in which many owners of autos in London are also very much interested. President W. A. Kemp, in his address, drew attention to the fact that if the feeling at present existing in the rural district regarding the new mode of transportation were realized, all drivers of motor vehicles would see the necessity of using every possible precaution to avoid accidents. The auto being comparative new, trivial accidents were reported in the daily press, while similar accidents which occur in connection with other mcdes of transportation were never heard about. Several methods adopted by the club to discourage speeding were recounted. In Chicago last year there were in use 2.100 street cars, against 3 600 aut mobiles, while the number of people run over by street cars was 337, against five persons by automobiles. Personally he believed the present law was not unfair, with the exception of the 15-mile speed limit, which was certainly unreasonable when an automobile was sole occupant of

"I believe," he said, "our members are making an honest effort to live up to the spirit of the law, but the effect of the present law has been that a great many of our members and officers, who have been doing their utmost to keep from frightening horses, have been summoned because they exceeded a limit of 15 miles per hour on a smooth road, with no one nearer than the horizon. I do not think that any of us would object to any reasonable restrictions, but we should be allowed to use what common sense we have when we are within one-eighth of a mile of any person or horse-drawn vehicle.

"I would not undertake to outline any policy for the coming year, but I am satisfied if all the members of this organization carry out the spirit of the present law, and apply the golden rule to all users of the road, the prejudice which now exists will soon wear away."


