BATTLE CRISIS IS MORE SATISFACTORY;

LULL BEFORE THE NEW STORM BREAKS

FOE'S LINES RAKED BY CANUCK CANNON FOR ENTIRE NIGHT

Heavies, Mortars and Light Guns Sweep the Enemy Front For Thousands of Yards, While Creeping Barrage Hammers

His Communications.

Canadian Army Headquarters, by W. A. Willison, Correspondent of the Canadian Press, March 30.—From early last night until 6 a.m. today the noise of guns has been persistent upon the whole front from the south the noise of guns has been persistent upon the whole from from the south to Hill No. 70 in the north. Steadily for over ten hours our heaviest field guns, trench mortars and machine guns maintained their fire on thousands of yards of front against the enemy trenches, support and assembly areas, communications and strong points. At 11 o'clock and again at 5:30 our artillery fire increased to battle intensity, the enemy assembly and concentration areas and communication roads being raked with creeping barrages. The intensity and duration of the fire was such that

no enemy attack developed north of Oppy, CHASED THE BOCHES. Before the great battle began two enemy attempts were made to raid our lines. At one point an enemy party was sent over to see if our front line was occupied. It was challenged by one of our bombing patrols. The enemy attacked the post. In the fighting which followed the Bosche was driven out of our trenches by rifle fire and pursued by a Canadian bombing squad. Two prisoners were captured and numerous casualties were

nflicted on the Hun. Our casualties were nil. Another raid against our positions was completely defeated, with estimated enemy casualties of 20. The raids were preceded by heavy artillery and trench mortar barrages. The enemy placed a box barrage around one of our posts and advanced to attack in two parties, one 20 strong and the other afteen. Machine Gun Squad Cut Off From Force Doing Great Execution.

London, March 30 .- The British line held magnificently throughout Friday, according to Reuter's correspondent at British headquarters in France.

British Army Headquarters in France March 20 .- The German attempt to force the British back along the Scarpe and capture Arras cost them an enormous price in casualties, although they used ten divisions. North of the river the British held to their positions and wavered but slightly before the enemy onslaught. South of the river, however, the British retired slightly between Fampoux and Boisleux.

FRENCH FIGHT DESPERATELY. Paris March 30 .- French troops, supported by reserves, are offering desperate resistance to powerful assaults of the enemy, the war office announces.

LULL BEFORE NEW STORM.

BRITISH LINES STRENGTHENED

ATTACK BROKE DOWN. The statement follows: "North of the Somme only local actions have taken place. South of the Somme the enemy's attacks yesterday at Demuin and Mazieres succeeded in pressing back our troops from the latter village. We secured a number of prisoners in our counter-attacks. At Demuin all the enemy's attempts to capture the village broke down after sharp fighting, which lasted throughout the afternoon.

COUNTRYSIDE FILLED WITH BODIES.

London, March 30.—The Morning Post's correspondent in France draws a gruesome picture of battlefield conditions. "Prisoners state that the countryside is full of bodies, and that the air is horrible with the odor of death," he writes. "Wells cannot be used. The ruined villages are impossible as billets because they are strewn with German dead. There are piles of bodies along the roads and between them. Relief Work The Past Winter.

In December an appeal was made to the secretary for fuel because of the general shortage in London. A committee was appointed to interview the dealers, with the result that more than 200 soldiers' families received 500 pounds each, between 50 and 60 tons of coal being delivered by the G. W. V. The centre section of the Springbank dam, 130 feet long, caved in at 3:30 on Good Friday afternoon. The break is a direct result of the severe flood and ice jam during February. GENERALISSIMO FOCH

Gen. Ferdinand Foch, new allied generalissimo, is of Basque origin. He was born at Tarbee in 1851, but was raised at Metz. Rather than become a German after the annexation of Lorraine, Foch preferred to return to France and help to prepare France for the struggle with Germany which he believed ultimately would take place.

He entered the polytechnic school with the number 72. He left it the 45th of his class—a rank that was not considered as justifying hopes of a great future. He never dazzled by this brilliancy, but he showed that wonders could be accomplished by application.

application.

Foch began by mastering the strategy of the war of 1870 in its minutest details. Knowing the mentality of the Germans, he counted upon their repeating in future conflicts the manoeuvres that had succeeded. He also expected them to make some of their old mistakes. In his teachings at the superior war school, and his writings, he held always to the idea of an inevitable aggression by Germany. aggression by Germany.

Given Stars in 1907.

The stars of a general were given Foch in 1907 and the command of the superior was solved.

Prefer-ring a more active command he re-signed in 1912 and commanded suc-cessively the eighth and twentieth army corps, and proved that he was one of the few military writers or professors who also was an efficient handler of men in the field. professors who also was an efficient handler of men in the field.

The war found Foch at Nancy, the headquarters of the twentieth corps. His corps was attached to Gen. Castelnau's army, and he was selected to command a new army concentrating behind the centre forces marching to the Belgian frontier to meet the Germans. tler to meet the Germans.

Get away for a moment from the clamour of the street; go into your room, at once, or to-night if you are not now at home, and ask yourself this question:

"Have I actually done anything that could count as National Service for my country during the forty bloody months of her suffering?"

Put down in hours the actual time that you have worked. Then, if before your conscience you can say, fearlessly, that you have done a man's service to your country, well and good-we know that you will do even more. But if there is the thought drumming through your mind that all - everything that you have done, is a mere nothing, just a sop to conscience, then as you are worthy of your manhood, make a speedy decision to devote the next few months of your life to National Service.

Outside of our armed forces only one kind of civilian labour ranks as National Service for men. That is Service on a farm.

That is why the Government in all seriousness exempted the farmer and the farmer's helper from military service.

If you are not quite sure whether your work could be done by a woman consult the list of occupations. These do not include all occupations. There are many others.

Sheer necessity urges that many men in these occupations should give place immediately to women, while they, the men, take up farm work temporarily.

This applies particularly to single men who can move with little or no inconvenience. Positions can also be found for married men who wish to move their families to the country.

Organized Labour Endorses This Crusade—Remember That!

In a memorandum to members they specifically, as a matter of national necessity, agree to:

- (a) The exemption from compulsory military service of all farm help.
- (b) The substitution of female for male help in order that certain classes of male help may be released for essential National Labour Service, that is, Farm Labour.
- (c) The stipulation that women who temporarily replace men who go upon the farm shall receive the same pay for service equal to the man replaced, so that the rate of wages for men shall not

Farm Wages Are Good

At present farm wages with board are in many cases equal to, if not better, than city wages without board. So that the handicap of wages should not be magnified.

A day of reckoning is coming; a day when that irresistible force, Public Opinion, will judge a man by his work, and will judge employers by the work they are retaining men to do.

Men and women will look hard at the clerks in stores, offices, warehouses and factories. We are down to elementals to-day, and our people will not tolerate the thought that while so many of our sons are perishing in the bloody struggle in France, so many men are doing work that can easily and efficiently be done by women without sacrifice to their womanhood or health.

Remember Your Effort Is Voluntary

The production of food is the paramount work of Canada to-day.

In going to work upon a farm, the farm is actually your channel of National Service. That is the attitude you should take towards the matter.

We owe it to our nationhood and to our Allies, who stand with us through the Ordeal by Battle to see that no effort is spared to insure to them a sufficient food supply.



Military Service Act

Important Announcement to All

EXEMPTED MEN

and to the Public Generally

N dealing with the very large number of claims for exemption brought forward for consideration in connection with Class 1 under the Military Service Act, it has occurred, as was inevitable, that as a result of false statements and difficulties put in the way of investigation, some individuals have secured exemption whose proper place is in the Army.

It is not the intention of the Government to allow these men to evade permanently their obligation to bear their part in the military defence of the Country and of the ideals for which we are fighting. To do so would defeat the purpose of the Act, and cause grave injustice to men in the second class necessarily called out to fill their places.

Exemptions Granted on False Grounds

It is, therefore, proposed to scrutinize carefully all exemptions granted to date in order to separate those which have been granted on false or insufficient grounds from those that are well founded.

With this object in view the various Registrars under the Military Service Act have been instructed to issue a series of questionnaires to exempted men. These questionnaires must be filled up correctly and returned promptly under penalty of forfeiture of exemption for failure to do so.

Exempted Men Who Have Changed Address

It is therefore important in their own interest that all exempted men who have changed their address since their exemption was granted and who have not already notified the Registrar of such change should notify him at once. Under the Regulations it is the duty of exempted men to keep the Registrar advised of any change of address, and failure to receive the questionnaire by reason of neglect of this duty must be treated as equivalent to failure to return the questionnaire after receipt.

Citizens Urged to Assist

In many instances information has been furnished by members of the public which has led to the cancellation of exemptions obtained by false or misleading statements. Further co-operation of this character is invited. The Government regard it as the Duty of all loyal citizens, not only to the Country. but to the men at the front, to assist in this way in securing reinforcements on a just and legal basis. Correspondence of this character will be treated as strictly confidential and will receive the fullest investigation.

STEPS TO TAKE IF CAR CATCHES ON FIRE

The average motorist probably has a vague idea of what should be done in extinguishing a fire on his car in case such a misfortune should befall him. The following suggestions from the fire marshal of Ohio may prove valuable in an engrence. n an emergency: The most important thing to remem-The most important thing to remember in case of a fire is to keep cool. A few seconds lost in panic at the start may result disastrously.

At least one small fire extinguisher should be on every car. It should be placed where it may be readily accessible. The small extinguisher is indispensable in handling a gasoline fire and is also useful in fighting any other kind of blaze about the car.

In the absence of an extinguisher sand or dirt can be used, but it should be remembered that if sand is thrown into the carburetor mechanism incalculable harm is likely to result.

Do not use water in attempting to extinguish a carburetor fire or other gasoline fire. This merely tends to spread the fire.

If the engine backfires use the starter to turn the motor. If this does not draw the flames into the manifold use the extinguisher. This should put out the fire with little difficulty.

If the fire has reached the drip pan extinguish that first and then work up to the carburetor.

If the fire is caused by ignition of gasoline from hot exhaust, short circuit, or other conditions about the car, the extinguisher should also be used with equally good effect.

Do not invite destruction of your car and probable injury to yourself by lighting a match to see how much gas there is in the tank.

TO START FUEL AGAIN. TO START FUEL AGAIN.

In every gravity fuel system there must be a means for air to enter the tank to replace the gasoline that has been drawn off. Usually the opening takes the form of a small hole in the filler cap. If this minute opening gets clogged with dirt, the flow of fuel will stop. Symptoms of this trouble are just the same as if the supply of gas had been exhausted, but investigation shows plenty of fuel in the tank. Removal of the obstruction starts the flow again.







It Protects Car Owners From Fire and Thaft.

AND ALSO DAMAGE SUITS

Every Motorist Should Realize Necessity of Carrying a Policy.

The necessity for a fire extinguisher, spare tire and an adequate warning signal has been emphasized, but there is one accessory which is more important even than all of these. This particular accessory is not to be carried in the tool box nor even in the tonneau of the car. In fact, it is doubtful if it will ever be found on the car itself or even on the person of the owner; rather will it be reposing peacefully in the safe deposit box of the wise motor-

Every motorist should be impressed with the vital necessity of an insurance policy protecting him against claims for damage resulting from personal injury to a pedestrian or occupant of another vehicle. The motorist who is "careful" and who never drives so fast that the vehicle cannot be brought to a stop "within fifteen or twenty feet," is probably the most difficult one to convince of the practical utility served by such a policy. 

SHAFT BEARING HINTS.

SHAFT BEARING HINTS. In replacing a bearing on a front wheel spindle for which it is a tight fit, the car owner sometimes slips the bearing on the taper end of the spindle and then uses the wheel as a hammer to force it home, wheel and bearing sliding into position on the spindle at the same time. This is poor business, as the strain on the bearing may break the hardened shoulder of the inner race, which is meant to withstand wear, but not shocks of this kind. The best way of accomplishing this work is to slip a short length of pipe over the spindle, the inner end resting against the inner race of the bearing. By hammering the outer end of the pipe carefully, the bearing will slip into place without trouble. In replacing a bearing on a front

TERMINAL CONNECTION TIP. In making an ordinary connection to a battery terminal, the stripped end of the wire should be wound around the binding post in a clockwise direction. When the screw is tightened, it will be turned to the right, and with the wire wound in the same direction, there is a tendency for it to wrap all the tighter around the post. When the wire is wrapped the other way around, it tends to unwrap when the screw is tightened.

It is a safe presumption that they appeared only when the sky was overcast with low-lying clouds, and that these were made to serve as a screen for the images projected by a stereopticon. Rain clouds are usually at a height of about half a mile above the earth. To project images so great a distance as this would be impractical. Too powerful a light would be required, and other difficulties would be introduced that might be impossible to overcome. The thing could easily be done, however, with the aid of an aeroplane, carrying an ordinary stereopticon, and flying from 700 to 1000

feet below the clouds.

"Clear motion pictures have already been projected a distance of approximately 400 feet. "Several persons who saw the visions have said that they were 'like the holy picture in the church at Czenstochowa.' If the details of the undertaking are ever told, it will not be surprising if it is found that a photographic reproduction of the Madonna was used, for the reacon that no picture in the world could have been

used with better effect. "The monastery of Czenstochowa is located about 100 miles west of Przemysl and was in possession of the Austrians at the time of the siege. The painting is familiar to the inhabitants of all that part of Europe and is so venerated that before the war it was visited annually by an average of 400,000 pilgrims, many of whom came from East Prussia, Galicia and West Russia, as well as from Poland. According to tradition, it was painted by St. Luke and there is a belief current that it is sometimes miraculously illumined. A reproduction of this picture cast on the clouds, 'surrounded by a halo of bright light,' as reported, which would mean that the stereopsicon slide had been made with a liberal margin of clear glass around the edges, would be readily accepted as a divine message by thes people of simple and strong religious belief.

"Whatver may have been the precise mear for projecting the images, there can be no doubt that they produced the effect intended. Whenever the image of the Virgin Mary was seen hovering over the city, the Austrians, believing they were under divine protection, took fresh hope, while the Prussians became panic-stricken. For hours after each appearance of the vision it was impossible to persuade or force the Russian soldiers to fire, and it is reported that because of this the capture of the city was delayed for weeks. In one typical case, a Russian commander, suspecting a trick by Austrian airmen, ordered a battery to fire at the vision, hoping in this way to bring down the aeroplane that was causing such demoralization among his troops. Instead of obeying, every man in the battery fell to his knees and prayed."

THE TRUNK FISH

By JEANETTE YOUNG NORTON

AY I introduce you to the trunk fish? Although this fish is more or less of a traveler, it appears so seldom in our markets that it is a stranger to most household buyers. Besides this fact, the trunk fish uses so many aliases that it is difficult to discover. Trunk, cow, rock shell,

chapin or plate fish are some of them, The trunk fish is different from others of its species-a sort of left-handed cousin of the shelifishes, its body being encased in an odd bony thatched shell, the jaws, fins and tail being free, but like those of other fishes. Large and serious eyes, a cowlike head and a small mouth give this fish a mild and benign expression. If caught in a net, the fish can exist out of water two or three hours and when put back apparently does not suf-

fer from the experience. These fish tour the waters around the West Indies, where they are abundant, visiting the coast of Africa, traveling from Brazil to the Chesapeake,

and in the Gulf stream to Woods Hole. The full-grown trunk fish is about 16 inches long and heavy in proportion. The flesh is delicate, like that of the crab, and the flavor unusually agreeable. One general way of cooking the trunk fish is to boil it 20 minutes in salted water, drain, cool and remove the meat from the shell. Clean the shell and throw it into cold water. Flake the fish and add to it a beaten egg, half a cupful of crumbs. half a gill of melted butter, the same amount of eream or rich milk, pepper, salt and the juice of an onion. Dry and greass the shell, fill it with the mix-


ture and bake for 20 minutes in a medium oven. The meat may be used in any way in which crab meat is used. Curried and baked in piecrust tartlet shells, it makes a dainty and attractive fish course. It is also excellent flaked and mixed with French dressing and spread thinly on rye sandwich rounds. If the rounds are first spread with mayonnaise, the sandwiches will be a little richer in flavor.

TCLONIC disturbances, variously known as hurricanes, typhoone, cyclones, etc., each year leave in their paths lasting impressions of their devastating force.

The study of cyclonic disturbances has been and is still most ardently pursued the world over, and especially in this country by the United States Weather Bureau. The most valuable instrument in foretelling the existence and approach of cyclonic storms is the mercurial barometer, an instrument in which the weight of a column of air of given cross sectional area is balanced against that of a column of mercury having an equal cross-sectional area. The pressure of the atmosphere is measured in inches instead of pounds, i. e., the pressure of the atmosphere is a certain number of pounds to the square inch and is equivalent to the pressure produced by a column of mercury of so many inches.

"Many theories have been put forward to explain the origin of cyclones, none of which is entirely satisfactory," says a writer in the Scientific American. "How-ver, they originate ever the ocean between the equatorial hot belt and the trade wind regions. Here unsettied conditions of barometric pressure prevail and the generally accepted theory connects the development of the disturbance with the existence of a preliminary abnormal sultry, rainy and

These conditions produce a violent upper draft in the lower layers of the heated and saturated air, and consequently result in the further lowering of the already existing low barometric pressures in this locality. A general overthrowing of the atmosphere occurs, violent inrushes of the air from surrounding areas of high pressure take place, increasing in intensity by the formation of clouds and rain in the ascending currents of air, which in their liberation of latent heat act still further to accelerate the violence of the upward and inward rushing currents.

The indrawing currents as previously explained take up the characteristic cyclonic rotation. A vortex called "the eye of the storm," is soon eatablished and in this area of small diameter a partial vacuum exists. Around this vortex the air swirls at varying rates and the storm as a whole takes up a motion of translation following the trough of low barometric pressures. The direction of this translation is in general away from the tropics and to the westward until the elastic yet impenetrable barrier of higher pressure is encountered which causes the storm to curve off into

higher latitudes and to eastward. In the early stages of cyclonic storms they are of small area but great intensity. As they progress they spread out in area and diminish in intensity. The velocity of rotation is greater when the eye of the storm is small and well defined, attaining at times a rate in excess of 100 miles per

The INFLUENCE of the MOON on CROPS

HE old belief that the moon has some sort of influence on plant growth still persists in some farming sections. Some farmers, it is said, refuse to plant crops or to kill hogs unless the moon is in some particular position.

The influence of the moon on the growth of crops, or on other agricultural operations, has always been denied by scientific men. The following brief statement by C. F. Marvin, chief of the United States weather bureau, printed in the Rural New Yorker, shows what they think of the matter:

"It is the general belief of scientists that the moon has no appreciable influence on temperature, rainfall, or any other weather element, or on

plant growth. "Plant growth depends upon temperature, light, humidity and plant food (both in the soil and in the air), and its availability. Obviously the moon neither mellows the ground nor fertilizes it, neither does it alter the composition of the atmosphere; hence it affects neither the mechanical condition of the soil nor the kind or quantity of available plant food.

"If the moon has any influence on plant growth. it would seem that it must exert this influence through its light. Experiment, however, shows that when a plant is so shadowed that it gets only one one-hundredth of normal daylight, it grows but little better than it does in absolute darkness. Full daylight is about 600,000 times brighter than full moonlight; hence one one-hundredth of daylight, already too feeble to stimulate appreciably plant activity, is still 6000 times brighter than full moonlight. The conclusion is that, even in respect to light stimulus, the moon's influence plant growth is wholly negligible."

The UNIFORM of the AMERICAN SAILOR

ANY old customs and traditions have left their trace on the uniform of American sailors of the present day. The wide, flaring trousers suggest a waste of material when seen on a city street, but they are really the most practical shape for duty on shipboard. Because of the looseness they may be rolled up snugly to the knee when the sailor is holystoning the decks, and the flare also prevents them from binding at the knee when the bluejacket is climbing the shrouds. Another important advantage of the looseness is that, combined with the arrangement of the buttons on the side, the trousers may be easily slipped off in the water.

The 13 buttons across the top of the trousers are said to represent the 13 original states. One explanation of the three white stripes bordering the collar is that they commemorate three great English naval victories: The destruction of the Spanish Armada in 1588, the battle of Trafalgar in 1805, in which the Spaniards again were defeated, and the battle of the Nile, where in 1798, the British and French fleets came to grips.

The black tie, prescribed by regulation for American bluejackets, apparently was handed down from the British navy. It was worn by the sailors of his fleet in memory of Nelson after

the death of the great naval hero. The bit of white undershirt showing at the neck is associated with a famous American leader, Admiral Farragut. After his death the sail in which his body was lowered to the water was divided among his sailors, with the request that the pieces be worn across their chests. This established the custom of wearing a white dicky, which is now replaced by the portion of the undershirt.

























Daylight-Saving To Be Rushed Through Both Ottawa Houses

M. S. A. Records Not Burned By Rioters in City of Quebec

QUEBEC. March 30.—The exemption records of the registrar for the Quebec military district, the destruction of which is believed to have been one of the chief aims of the rioters who last night attacked the offices of the Chronicle, L'Evenement, fired the Auditorium building and brought about the intervention of the militia under the provisions of the riot act, are safe.

At an early hour this morning it was announced that the records had been deposited in a specially constructed vault and were intact. A number of papers were destroyed, but they were of an unimportant character. The damage to the Auditorium building is estimated at \$30,000.

There have been no arrests, and so far as is known no serious personal injuries resulted. Chief of Detectives Thomas Walsh had his face badly cut while attempting to make an arrest, and two clerks in the Chronicle office were hit by flying glass and slightly cut.

Military men with rifles are guarding the newspaper offices and the city has regained its usual quietness, the streets being deserted, except for little groups here and there discussing the affair.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—Absolute abolition of wheat and wheat products from the menus of all first-class hotels in the United States was asked of 700 hotelmen by Food Administrator Hoovel here today. The response was an outburst of cheering.

Rising to their feet the hotelmer raised their right hands and pledged themselves to effect a 100 per cent saving in wheat to be sent to the Allice.
