Hotels of French City Are Ta xed to Capacity, While Meals Cost a Goodly Sum-New spaper Correspondents Are Wondering Where They Will Stay.

Paris. Dec. 3.—Paris is filled to overflowing. Prices of all hotel rooms, following the requisitioning of 25 hotels for peace conference, purposes, have doubled and tripled and are still going up. Food in restaurants and prices generally are similarly mounting.

A breakfast of coffee, bread and butter continues to cost between \$1 and \$1.50 at hotels. It is virtually impossible to lunch or dine for less than \$3 or \$4 for a simple meal. # FOR WILHELM'S TRIAL Will Pass Through Thames-

Representatives of German Administration Reach the Netherlands Capital.

Copenhagen, Dec. 5.—A delegation from the Berlin Soldiers' and Workers' Council has arrived at The Hague, a Berlin dispatch reports. The message Indicates that its presence at the Netherlands capital has to do with negotiations concerning former Emperor William in progress at the German legation at The Hague, the nature of which is not stated.

A Berlin dispatch on December 2 announced that a number of the Soldiers' and Workers' Councils in Germany had requested the Government to have the ex-emperor tried by a German tribunal. It was added, however, that the Government would submit the question to the national assembly, which body is not yet in being. The recent visit to Holland of a German emissary, Admiral von Hintze, former foreign secretary, was said to be for the purpose of obtaining the formal abdication of William II., which has since taken place.

Six Thousand Enemy Aliens Arrested on Presidential Warrants.

Washington, Dec. 5.—The story of how enemy agents have been caught, disloyalty suppressed, draft slackers apprehended, dangerous Germans interned, explosions and other sabotage prevented and opensy scorets forested out for explosions and other sabotage prevented, and enemy secrets ferretted out for use against their armies abroad was given to the public today in Attorney-General T. W. Gregory's annual report. Through a great corps of department of justice civil officers, secret agents and citizen volunteers this big job of policing has been accomplished, said the attorney-general, with a minimum disturbance to the normal life of communities and with constant effort to avoid encroaching on freedom of speech, action and political criticism.

Referring to enforcement of the espionage act, Mr. Gregory said:

"This department throughout the war has proceeded upon the general principle that the constitution rights of free speech, free assembly and petition exist in war time as in peace time, and that the right of discussion of governmental policy and the right of speech again are the most fundamental rights in a democracy."

British Minister of Munitions In Address at Dundee States

That Government Has Decided Uupon Nationalization of the Railways. London, Dec. 4.—The British naval authorities have decided that it will be unnecessary to demand the return of Helgoland to Great Britain from Germany, Winston Spencer Churchill, the minister of munitions, announced in a speech at Dundee tonight. Mr. Churchill also said the Government had decided upon the

nationalization of the railways. "We enter the peace conference," said Mr. Churchill, during the course of his address, "with the absolute determination that no limitations shall be imposed on our right to maintain our naval defence. We do not intend, no matter what arguments and appeals are addressed to us, to lend ourselves in any way to any fettering restrictions which will prevent the British navy main-

taining its well tried and well deserved supremacy.' The Island of Helgoland, formerly Danish, was ceded to Great Britain in 1814. In 1890 Great Britain ceded it to Germany, who began developing it into an extremely important naval base. It lies in the North Sea off the mouths of the Elbe and Weser and of the entrance to the Kiel canal, which it dominates.

The island was a German naval stronghold throughout the great war. Its occupation by the Allies was under consideration shortly after the signing of the armistice, when the German naval revolution made it appear doubtful if Germany would comply with the naval terms of the armistice. These, however, seem since to have been fulfilled nearly in their entirety.

### BRITAIN'S NAVY CRUSHED OUT THE ENEMY'S LIFE AND ASSURED THE FREEDOM OF THE WHOLE WORLD

London, Dec. 5.—The work of the British navy during the war was lauded by Sir Eric Geddes, first lord of the admiralty, in his address opening the saming the British navy. British sea power. Sir Eric concluded, had been the pivot on which the fate, not only of the war. admiralty, in his address opening the "sea power" exhibition of pictures and relics in London today.

The sea power of the British navy, from the very outbreak of the war, he declared, held all the fleets of the world in a silent grip, crushed the life out of the enemy countries, and assured the freedom of the world by its efforts.

Sir Eric Geddes pointed out that it was the assistance of he navy which had enabled coal, food and munitions to be sent to Italy and France, while Great Britain's own munitions for the western

It was the navy which had enabled the British expeditionary force to be conveyed to France, in which operations more than 16,000,000 men, all told, had been conveyed with a total loss from all causes of less than 5,000. It was the navy, he continued, which enabled the operations to be carried on in Mesopotamia, Macedonia and Palestine, and which had brought about a condition of things which resulted in the breakdown of Bulgaria, while behind the navy was the blockade which crushed the life out of the central powers and made them sue for peace. From 1914 to 1917, Sir Eric stated, the tenth cruiser squadron had kept under guard a stretch of sea 800 miles long, from the Orkneys to Ireland, and had intercepted 15,000 ships taking supplies to enemy countries. 



Mr. Farrell's paper was devoted to a review of the foreign trade situation. "In this matter of economic warfare after the war," Mr. Farrell said, "there should be no ground for misunderstanding our position. An unrepentant Germany, still wedded to her idols of militarism, and the relentless application of superior forces, can establish no right to demand the raising of the economic blockade which has been a most potent instrument in ending the war.

"In pursuance of the policy of combining national and commercial interest the German nation thought itself entitled to plunder its neighbors for her own economic or commercial needs. But when we have exposed German methods it would be a curious way of preventing their revival by committing ourselves to the acceptance of German principles.







Would not a municipal residence for household assistants be of some use in the solution of the problem? They might live at reasonable charges in some such building, having thus a home in the proper sense, parlor, music and recreation rooms, and pleasant social relations. Some few of the larger homes in a Canadian city provide domestic workers with a sitting-room or parlor; the workers in such homes may perhaps not need the accommodation of a residence. But that is not the case in nine houses out of ten. The kitchen is the domestic's reception-room, dining-room and prison cell. Her status is just a peg better in some cases, in more cases possibly a peg or two lower than that of the house-dog, who lies on the rug before the grate-fire, or goes out in the motor with the family. Fine inducements to the energetic, capable young woman! Some of the ki\_dlier mistresses talk of giving their "maids" a "good home." In the same way a stray cat may get a good home.

What is wanted is a residence, a home of not only comfort, but dignity. The household assisant should be intelligent, trained, resourceful, energetic and ambitious. The only way to secure this class of help for the mothers of families is o bring about the right inducements. Such girls should be privileged, and extra well provided for.

As the city pays for the education of children, it may logically assist the mother of the children. Why not a residence? It would, in part at least, pay for itself, and the young women, going forth from it in the morning to their regular hours in their places of household employment, would be one of the most respected classes of the great host of labor. Domestic assistance would be both more plentiful and more efficient. A community owes its mothers of families all and more than all it can do for them.

WHAT SOME MINISTERS LACK.





Reports that a number of cases of influenza have developed in the city this past week have turned attention once more to gargles and disinfectants. Asked in regard to a rumor of a recurrence of "flu," Dr. W. S. Downht m. M.O.H., says, "It is difficult to get a definite idea of the situation, owing to the fact that it isn't possible to get enough data. Inability to secure this data is because of the lack of regulations requiring the physicians to re-

data is because of the lack of regulations requiring the physicians to report influenza cases. Some of the doctors to whom I have been talking have four or five new cases, some more, and some none at all. Some doctors say the new cases are not as bad as formerly. The important thing is for people to continue to take the precautions advocated at the time of the epidemic.

"While some cases are apparently light, no risks are being taken by the doctors for fear of serious developments. The only safe hing is to get medical advice as soon as one feels ill. It may be just a headache, and people are inclined to think everything is influenza now. But it is playing on the safe side."
