



The Immigration Commission Makes Decision After Long Trial.

Vancouver, Sept. 10.—Dmitrio Starikoff, leader of the Russian workers' union, agitator, revolutionary, I. W. W. and alleged Nihilist, who spent five years in the underground prisons of Siberia as a punishment for his political activities when in Russia, was yescal activities when in Russia, was yescal activities when in Russia, was yesterday ordered deported to Russia. This decision was arrived at by the immigration commission after a trial lasting since August 23, during which a strong effort was made by the defence to escape conviction.

Theodore Golven, alias "The Doctor," was also ordered deported.
