Mexican President, Along With 1,000 Loyal Followers, Seeks Safety in Flight Into Mountainous District -Departing Troops Destroy Trains and War Materials They Were Unable To Take With Them.

Vera Cruz., May 15.—(By the Associated Press).—President Carranza, who with a force of loyal troops has been resisting rebel attacks near San Marcos, state of Puebla, for the last five days, has broken through the rebel lines to the southeast and, accompanied by 1,000 men, has fled into the mountains between Puebla and Oaxaca, according to advices received here this morning. After abandoning their last positions, the Carranza troops destroyed their trains and war material which could not be carried with day at Beauclaire, the residence of Sir them. Generals Murguia and Urquiso, with some of the Carranza Philip Sassoon, near here, that the Spa troops are still fighting near San Marcos for the purpose of the fleeing president.

CARRANZA LEAVES SMALL FORCE TO CONTINUE BATTLE

Vera Cruz, May 15.—President Carranza, who, with loyal followers, has been fighting a grim battle against revolutionary forces near San Marcos for the last five days, has escaped capture, at least temporarily, according to dispatches from the battle zone.

Accompanied by 1,000 of his men, the president has broken through the insurgent lines near Chalchicomula, about 50 miles east of Puebla, and is believed to be in the mountains near Oaxala. He left behind him a force of Government soldiers, which is still fighting in an effort to delay pursuit of the fugitive chief executive. the British cruiser Cambrian and the United States transport Portland arrived Nere today.

Report to the Citizens On L. & P. S. R. Wages

The employees of the London and Port Stanley Railway on April 9, 1920, applied to the minister of labor at Ottawa for a board of conciliation to determine the scale of wages which should be paid under a new agreement

The board of conciliation met, and after hearing the evidence of representatives of those interested, submitted its findings to the minister of labor, who forwarded the result to the commission and to the employees, under date of May 10.

The commission at a meeting Friday night received and considered the finding, and decided to accept the recommendation of the board of conciliation that the schedule of wages, as herewith published, be adopted.

The commission presents for consideration of the citizens of London a comparative statement of the scale of wages recommended by the board of conciliation for the London and Port Stanley Railway; the rates of wages paid by the Niagara, St. Catharines and Toronto Railway, which is part of the Canadian Government Railway System, and also the rates paid on the Lake Eric and Northern Railway, which is owned and operated by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

Both Niagara, St. Catharines and Toronto Railway and the Lake Erie and Northern Railway rates were agreed upon and accepted by the employees of those Railways in March, 1920.

EXPERIMENTING IN NATIONALIZATION.

the nationalized industries. As a governing body, parliament controls large government departments. These departments are not run for profit, in the commercial sense. They represent the agencies by means of which national services are rendered. They are financed by means of taxes. Over them parliament exercises control istration

As trustee for the owners of large railroad and shipping interests, the situation of parliament is essentially different. It must necessarily regard itself as representing the body of shareholders. The nanagement and policy is to be controlled by it. No major disposition can be made without its con-sent. But, if national ownership of railways and steamships is to have a fair chance of success it must be kept free from "political" influences. Parliament must be content to leave minor policies to the responsible directors and details to the expert managers. It, and through it the public, should receive reports, balance sheets and statements of profit and loss. On these documents and on major matters of policy, parliament should base its criticisms and exercise its controlling powers. In the interval it must trust to the discretion of the directors and managers.

If this difference in functions be lost to view, f nationally-owned industries are treated as though they were administrative departments, the experiments which are being involuntarily made will be carried out under conditions which predispose them





LAURENCE KEESHIG FREE

English Girl Is Married to Brother of the Accused.

WIARTON, May 14.—Developments in the war-time romance which has aroused much interest in this district during the past week today followed one another with dramatic rapidity to a totally unexpected denouement, when Laurence Keeshig, alleged to have contracted a bigamous marriage with an English girl, was dismissed by Magistrate B. B. Miller, no appearance being entered in police court this afternoon for the prosecution.

Laurence Keeshig, a member of the Cape Croker Indian band, was taken into custody yesterday on two charges, one of assaulting his Indian wife and the other of bigamy. The prisoner,

The story of the alleged bigamous marriage became public property early in the week, when Miss Marion Engall arrived in town from England and registered at the Aldcat Hotel, according to report, as Marion Keeshig. She was also alleged to have received mail and cables from England addressed to her as Mrs. Laurence Keeshig. The brought with her a beautiful sixmonths-old baby.

Day of Surprises.

The first surprise of today was the announcement that Miss Engall, who is said to be well connected both in England and in this country, had been married yesterday by Rev. T. G. Mc-Ateer at the Methodist Parsonage, to Willis Keeshig, brother of Laurence Keeshig; and the second surprise was the unexpectedly sudden ending of the matter in the police court this after-

matter in the police court this after-On the charge of beating his wife, Laurence Keeshig, was found guilty by the court, but a plea by his squaw for lenlency secured for him suspended

sentence.

In connection with the bigamy charge In connection with the bigamy charge, both Laurence Keeshig and the English girl denied having been married. They told the court that, while Laurence Keeshig was stationed in England at the military records office, he was billetted at the home of Miss Engall, and while there was visited by his brother Willis, who met the girl and they became engaged. Willis Keeshig gave corroborative evidence.

Charge Dismissed.

Crown Attorney Dixon of Walkerton, who is said to have ordered the arrest of Laurence Keeshig, was not present and no material evidence for the prosecution being presented the magistrate dismissed the case.

It was stated today by Willis Keeshig that the little child which Miss Engall brought with her from England is a little one that she has adopted, Following the publicity given to the story Laurence Keeshig is reported to have said that he will prosecute the newspapers for defamation of character.
