

Oshawa, July 31. - While the steamer Argyle was passing Newcastle on a meenlight excursion trip out of Oshawa on Friday night, Norman Hill, 14 years of age, a bellboy at the Queen's Hotel, fell overboard and was drowned. New York, July 29.-In a small but neat and comfortable, flat in West Twenty-ninth street, lives an elderly, careworn man, who is known to his neighbors by the mysterious title of "The Beggars' Tailor." The "beggars' outfitter" would be a more appropriate sobriquet, for the elderly man's trade has nothing to do with the making of clothes. He equips and fits out professional mendicants for the practice of their trade. His business address, for obvious rea-

sons, he does not advertise, and there are no cork legs or eye-bandages disfiguring the cosy little room which he calls his parlor. "A mendicant who has not mastered the tricks of the trade," said the "beggars' tailor," "has no more chance of making money than has a pugilist who has not learned to box. He must get an outfit. 



WOMAN ECLIPSES CAPTAIN WEBB

ineteen-Year-Old Australian (irl Has Wonderful Swimming Record.

London, July 29 .- "Do you think the mericans will like my swimming?" This question was asked under somewhat remarkable circumstances. It ame from Miss Annette Kellermann, of Australia, who had just got well started on her recent long-distance wim in the River Thames. During his journey she completely overshadowed all previous performances under similar conditions, including that of Captain Webb, making 134 niles in 3 hours 54 minutes and 16

While thus creating a new world's record, the Australian girl found no lifficulty in carrying on a most aninated and interesting conversation with your correspondent, who, with her ather and her official timekeeper, occupied a launch which kept about an par's length away from the fair swimmer. Miss Kellermann began her henomenal swim with a dive off hisoric Putney bridge, and in spite of the long distance and the fact that the had talked nearly all the way, as the freshest member of the party when she got out of the water at Blackwell pier and ingenuously de-nanded something to eat. This Australian girl is curious to

now how her swimming will be regarded by Americans, because she will isit the United States, probably early n September. Before that, however the will attempt several little aquation eats—notably to swim the English hannel. Miss Kellermann, who is low ony 19, has never before been lefeated in any contest of long-distance wimming or artistic diving, either by nan or woman.

So far her record is one continuous eport of victories. At 15 she won the umateur mile championship of Ausralia in still, salt water in 29 minutes, which was 3 minutes and 49 seconds laster than any woman in the world ad done. She then made 214 miles in i6 minutes and 30 seconds. When she ad acquired all the amateur Austraian championships Miss Kellermann ecame a professional.

In the last three years she won very Australian long-distance swim naking five miles in 1 hour 48 minutes nd 34 seconds, and 101/4 miles in 4 hours and 23 minutes. So far her other speed records are 100 yards in 1 minute and 18 seconds, the best ever made y a woman; and a quarter mile in 7 inutes and 2 seconds, although she refers the long-distance tasks. She s also the holder of many championship prizes won in her diving con-

This feat has never been achieved by a 'emale swimmer, although Madame Isaacq, a Frenchwoman, tried it last year. Captain Webb was the only man who ever successfully swam the channel, and he took nearly 24 hours. Miss Kellermann thinks she can do the same thing in less time, placing her reliance on her speed. This would be an important help to her as she would then have fewer tides to encounter than would a slower swim-
