## LOWER RIVER

Steamers From St. Michael Are Expected to Arrive Within the Next Few Days.

## FLEET WINTERED NEAR ST. MICHAEL

And Would be in Shape to Leave as Soon as Ice Broke.

## FLEET TONNAGE 24,000 TONS

Many Contracts Made For Carrying Freight for Other Than Big Companies—Will be Busy Season.

One of the most interesting topics of conversation along the water front just now is, which will be the first boat up from St. Michael this year and when will it probably arrive? Last year, which was an extremely early season as compared with the present, the first steamer to arrive from St. Michael was the Sarah on July 8. The year before, the Sybil was the first boat in, arriving July 16, followed two days later by Dawson for down river points last year was the Lottie Talbot, which cast off her lines early in June and arrived at St. Michael June 16. From telegraphic reports received it is known that ocean going vessels have already made a round trip to Nome, discharging their cargoes on the shore ice a mile or so from the land, and it is quite probable that news as to the final break up of Bering sea and the mouth of the Yukon may reach here via Seattle before the arrival of the first boat from down river. In that event the time of such arrival could be calculated within a day or two as orders given to the St. Michael office as to dispatch a boat for Dawson at the earliest possible moment regardless of whether the steamers have arrived from the south or not. A considerable shortage in several lines in one of the company stores here has made it imperative that their stock be replenished as soon as possible. From inquiry today at the office of the Northern Navigation company the information was elicited that a steamer is expected at any time within the next week, and if orders dispatched to St. Michael some time ago are received in time the first boat to arrive will be the T. C. Power or possibly the Hannah. The Power is a very fast and powerful

steamer and while exceled by the Hannah in size and equipment is fully her equal when it comes to stemming the current of the mighty Yukon.

During the winter with the exception of those which spent the closed season in quarters near Dawson, but two of the company steamers were wintered on the Yukon. All of the others of the fleet were pulled out on the beach near St. Michael last fall at the close of navigation and were ready this spring to take the water as soon as the ice had disappeared. Heretofore, nearly all the steamers belonging to the three companies now merged into the Northern Navigation Company wintered in sloughs near the Holy Cross Mission, some 500 miles up the river from the sea. In the spring, before making a trip to Dawson it was necessary to go to St. Michael after a cargo which would delay their arrival at this point a week or ten days.

In speaking with Capt. Grey this morning in regard to the prospective business of the lower river this year, some interesting facts were learned. The captain now has under his immediate supervision all the steamers, tugs and barges formerly belonging to the A. C. Co., the A. B. Co., and the N. A. T. & T. Co., and the sum total presents a most formidable carrying fleet. Of the river steamers there are no less than 30 with a combined tonnage of 19,000 tons; barges in use aggregate 6,000 tons more, and at St. Michael for harbor use in transferring loads to the river steamers there are barges of still further 5000 tons capacity. There are also ten tugs and steamers used for towing purposes and about the harbors. Three round trips is what each steamer is supposed to make each season and with all the company steamers in commission it is possible to lay down in Dawson this season by that line alone over 50,000 tons of freight. Whether the entire fleet will be in use or not is problematical, though at the headquarters of the company confidence is expressed that their boats will have all they can accommodate during the season, as a number of heavy contracts have been entered into with firms outside of those immediately interested in the combine. In the placing of such contracts there is no discrimination in favor of the combine, outside companies receiving the same rates and consideration as those directly interested in the navigation company.

## Made a Loan to a Robber.

## MEETING OF MINERS UNION

## STEAMBOAT NEWS.

The steamer Closset which arrived Sunday with a scow in tow made the trip from Whitehorse in 40 hours, excellent time when the tow is taken into consideration.

As an indication of what the season's business may amount to in the transportation line, during the last 15 days of June the White Pass line of steamers handled as much freight as they did at any time last season during the entire month.

Several rafts of logs for the mills arrived last night from up river.

The Canadian left this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Steamer Sybil arrived in port this morning at 11 o'clock with six passengers and a general cargo of 62 tons. The stage of water on the upper river still continues excellent.

The Flora left Whitehorse early this morning and will arrive sometime tomorrow.

The Canadian arrived yesterday evening with a large list of passengers, a heavy mail, and a big consignment of freight.

## THEISS GIVEN SIX MONTHS

For Stabbing Frank Billow on Hunker Last May.

The trial of John Theiss for stabbing Frank Billow on May 9, at 21 below Hunker, was heard this morning by Justice Craig who found Theiss guilty and sentenced him to six months at hard labor.

The trouble which ended in the stabbing occurred while the cooks were getting breakfast on the morning of May 9. An order was given by the head cook which was resented by Theiss and a quarrel ensued which ended in the stabbing.

Theiss this morning stated that he had tried to avoid the trouble but that he had been aggravated until he was unable to stand it and in the mixup the knife had been used, how or why he did not know. The trial ended by the justice giving him the sentence as above stated.

What is said to be the finest specimen of Mastodon relics was recently taken from 43 Gold Run. It consists of a skull, shoulder blade, jaws, teeth, an immense tusk and several other parts of the anatomy of a huge prehistoric animal. It is to be set up and will be on exhibition at Cleveland's Dome roadhouse.

The number of cases on the docket in the gold commissioners court is so great as to almost preclude the possibility of any of those connected with the court from enjoying a vacation this summer. The time of the calendar is full to the last of September. Gold Commissioner Senkler will probably take his usual two weeks hunting excursion in the fall, but beyond that there will be no interruption in the ceaseless grind of the court.

### SEATTLE'S TRAGEDY.

The late tragedy in Seattle is but the natural sequence of the elevation of unprincipled men to important and responsible positions. The position of chief of police of the city of Seattle is a better one than the office of sheriff of the county and the man who can faithfully and fearlessly perform the duties of the office must be far above petty gain by bribery. The lately murdered Meredith was evidently not sufficiently broad or sufficiently imbued with the moral courage to hold himself above and aloof from those to whom rigid enforcement of the law means retirement from business. Meredith drilled with this class until, when he attempted to extricate himself, they "peached" and morality and decency demanded and accomplished his retirement.

Betrayed by his erstwhile friends the lawless element whom he prostituted his position to screen and protect; repudiated and branded as a rascal by those who had placed confidence in him and shown that confidence by elevating him to a position of responsibility and trust, Meredith became imbued with the desire for revenge brought about at the point of a gun. The result was his own death at the hands of one from whom there is no doubt he formerly accepted bribes in order that the law he was sworn to defend might be violated.

The death of one desperate character (Meredith was desperate or he would not have been out as he was—a walking arsenal) by another who, when cleared of his crime by the civil law, as he probably will be, will suffer few if any feelings of remorse or compunctions for having disobeyed the injunctions of the moral law. Conscience and Considine parted company long ago.

The shooting of Meredith by John Considine is but the result of crookedness in officialdom, one milestone that marks the highway traveled by grafters, bribers and all others whose ways are evil.

It is to be hoped that the recent revivification of such wholesale crookedness in Seattle will cause to be awakened there a realization of the fact that it is today the most wicked city on earth and that steps, sure and certain, will be taken to purify her vitiated atmosphere.

### IS WHOLLY YANKEE.

A little paragraph is going the rounds of the newspapers to the effect that J. Pierpont Morgan "is English by birth and by education." On the contrary, J. Pierpont Morgan comes as close to being of pure American ancestry as any man in the United States. His father, James Spencer Morgan, while an English banker, was an American citizen, having been born in West Springfield, Mass., with a long line of American ancestry. After a successful career in business and in banking in this country, he went to England and 1853 to become a member of the banking firm of George Peabody & Co.

His wife, the mother of J. Pierpont Morgan, was a daughter of the poet, John Pierpont, who was himself born in Connecticut. J. Pierpont Morgan, the son, was born in Hartford, Conn. Neither is he English by education. On the contrary, he was educated in the Boston schools primarily, and finished his education in the University of Göttingen, Germany. Moreover, his business career has been entirely in the United States. It is true he is a partner in the banking firm of J.S. Morgan & Co., of London, the successor to the house established by George Peabody; but he himself has always retained his

residence in New York since he left the German university, a boy of 20, in 1857. He was the New York agent of the London house during his earlier business career, but subsequently embarked in the banking business on his own account, largely aided, of course, by his connection with the powerful London concern.

J. Pierpont Morgan certainly is not English, either by birth, education or immediate ancestry. He is a product of the United States, both personally and in the methods which he has evolved.—Seattle P.-I.

Back in Chicago people are dropping dead on the streets from heat. Thermometers by the dozen went out of business in Dawson last winter after registering from sixty-eight to seventy-two degrees below zero, yet no persons dropped dead on the streets from cold. All of which goes to show that from the standpoint of climatic healthfulness, Dawson can give Chicago a handicap and still come in ahead on the home stretch.

Notwithstanding the very heavy fall of snow last winter, augmented by spring downpours of rain, reports of scarcity of water for sluicing purposes are now coming in from nearly all the creeks in the district.

# OVER THE DIVIDE.

By Ed. A. Hering.

Both Dominion and Gold Run claim operators are suffering from low water part of the time, there being but one-half a sluice in the upper part of both creeks. When one dam is closed those below are dry till the upper one is filled and the water makes its way back to the creeks, consequently men are not getting it over half time.

The organizers of the miners' union have held two meetings at Cariboo and a branch has been started. The membership is fair to start and is growing every day.

The largest transfer of Dominion property made this year was consummated last week when a French company represented by Mr. L. Pillard bought the Barrett property from Mr. Joe Barrett. The sale includes 32 below upper, 12 above lower, 9 above lower and hillside left limit 12 above lower. These are all rich claims and the work will be continued under direction of Mr. Pillard. Machinery on each claim, wood and all improvements are included in the transfer. It is rumored that the price paid was upward of quarter of a million dollars.

Mr. Barrett says Klondike is good enough for him and he is going out prospecting.

Wm. Hindle has bought the Kelly plant from 22 below upper and moved it to 7 above upper, where it will be used for summer work.

Richard Finn of 17 above upper has closed down for the summer. Mrs. Finn will spend the summer in California while he prospects some lower Dominion property.

Mr. J. E. McAlpine is ground sluicing ready to shovel in. Last summer proved the shallow hillside to be very rich ground. The water is brought in canvas hose from 1 below upper. Mr. McAlpine recently bought all the left limit hillside from 10 to 5 below upper. Lower 10 is being worked and when the creek claims adjoining the remainder of the ground are worked out some hydraulic work on a large scale will be done.

Messrs. Deberg and Rasp have one of the simplest self-dumping buckets in operation on the creek. When one sees it work he immediately remarks why didn't someone think of it sooner. The buckets are pulled up with the ordinary tripod and pulley but run up and down a track with grooves to hold them in place. They are hoisted above the shaft and then slightly lower catching a cross bar in two sockets. The handle or bail of the bucket sets a little to one side of the center and

the bucket immediately turns over shooting the dirt into the sluice box. The bucket is then raised a foot and allowed to descend, the cross bar striking a trigger and knocking it down over the sockets and drops on down into the shaft. The device was arranged by Mr. Krevig the foreman who is somewhat of a genius in practical mining, as many little improvements show.

Messrs. Coleman and Nelson are working in the creek bed of 33 below upper, using scrapers attached to a cable and hauled up to the waste pile by steam power. They have had a large amount of old tailings to remove as well as the creek bed, but will shortly be shoveling in 34 owned by Nelson is handling some very rich ground, shovelling into the boxes from an open cut.

Mrs. Weisman owner of lower 31 below lower left limit, hillside, has returned to Dominion after spending a winter outside. The work on the claim has been in charge of Mr. Frank W. Morrison who has been in charge of the claim and has done some very fine work, opening up the ground and the dirt being handled at the present is of the best. Mrs. Weisman feels quite gratified with the results and will retain her present manager to work out the ground.

The Acme grocery store has moved the lower branch from 35 below lower to 32, in larger quarters and are fixing up a store quite metropolitan in appearance.

Mrs. Peter Berstrom has opened up a new laundry and bath house on 32 below lower. The bath rooms are very neat and above all a plentiful supply of warm water is always on hand.

W. G. Stoney has opened up a bakery, general merchandise and notion store on Sluice box avenue, 32 below lower. He is doing business in a tent and is kept quite busy.

Mr. W. Anstie gave a very pleasant social dance at his hotel 'The Palace' four below upper last Friday evening. Rain kept a number at home, but those who attended were well paid for their bravery in facing the storm and a thoroughly good time was had. Miss Hartman as hostess made every one feel at home and not till the sun was well up did the merry party start homeward.

Fourth of July will be celebrated on Dominion creek at Cariboo City. A program of sports is being prepared including a grand tug of war and the celebration will close with a grand ball at the Dougherty hotel.

### KNIFE CASE POSTPONED

In Police Court Until Friday—  
Alleged Rapist Dismissed.

In the police court this morning before Inspector Wroughton, Harry Wingfield was brought up on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, the case arising out of the rough and tumble scrap in front of the Regina late Saturday night, wherein four men much the worse for the cargo of hootch they carried, chased, frightened and badly beat the delendant.

H. E. Ridley, attorney for Wingfield, asked for a continuance until Friday at 10 p. m. which was granted. Corporal Piper, who has charge of the prosecution, stated that the complainant Gleason was confined to his bed and would not be able to appear for several days. Gleason is said to look as though he had been run through a thrashing machine. The police are still investigating the case and it is certain the delendant will file counter charges against his assailants.

The only other criminal matter disposed of was the rape case against W. Chapman. The delendant was arrested June 9 under a complaint sworn to by Helen Lynch, an elderly maiden of 50 summers, and has been confined in jail ever since. In reviewing the evidence adduced at the hearing, Inspector Wroughton stated there was scarcely enough to warrant binding Chapman over to the territorial court and he very much doubted a great deal of the testimony given by the complainant. The case was dismissed and Chapman was warned against trifling in the future.

Inspector Scarth heard a number of small debt cases which were taken under advisement.
