EGINNING in a small way, the growth of what is now known all over Canada and the United States as the "LONDON OLD BOYS," has been phenomenal. drawn by varying circumstances into other and different environments, still retain a warm affection for the home of their youth.

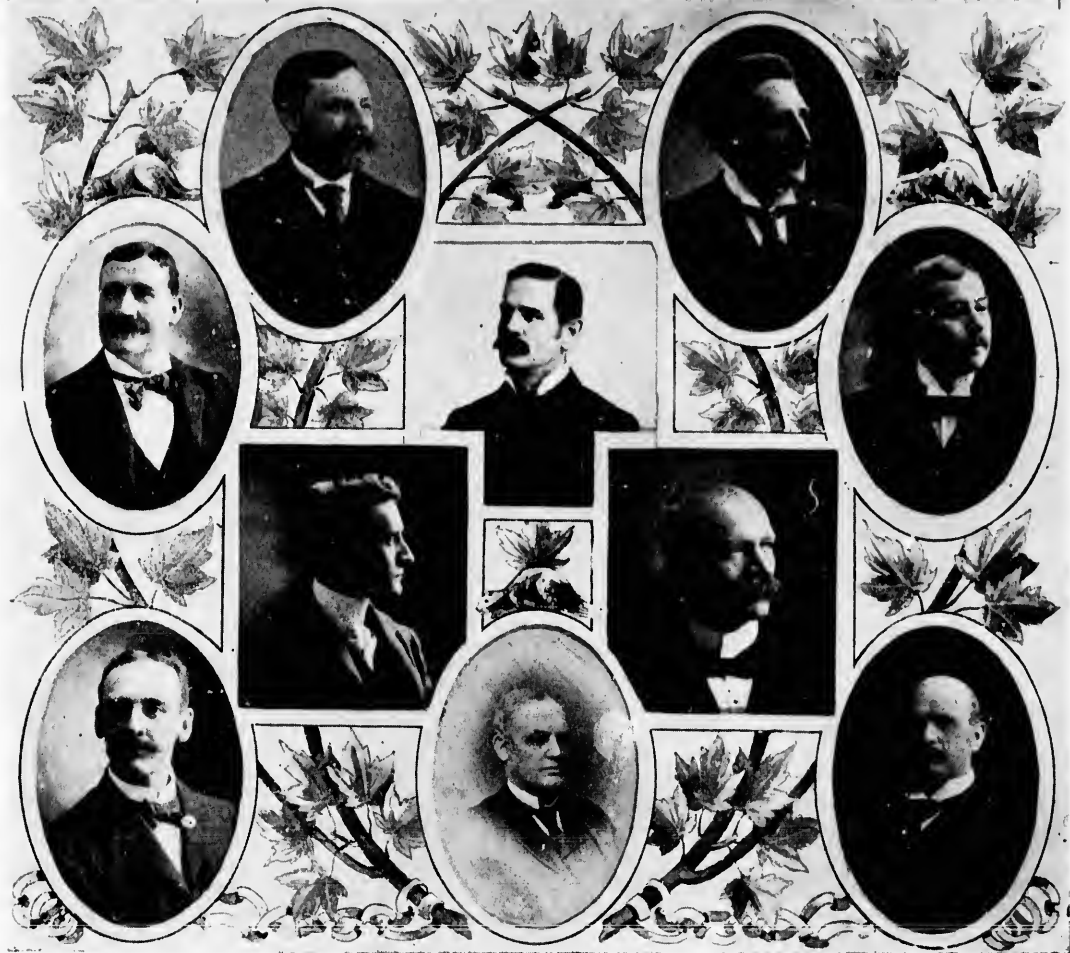

The City of London



AS INCORPORATED in the year 1855. Its first Mayor was the late Murray Anderson. The city covers 4,478 acres. There are 14.29 acres in Victoria Park, and 35.65 acres in Queen's Park. The streets are wide and pleasant, being laid out with boulevards on either side and lined with rows of stately Maples.

The City of London owns the line of railway extending from London to Port Stanley, together with stations, bridges, and all necessary buildings. This road is now operated by the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway Co.

London has the best equipped and most modern Hospital in Western Ontario. The estimated value of the buildings and grounds is \$150,000. Other charitable institutions are the St. Joseph's Hospital, the Mount Hope Orphanage, the Protestant Orphan's Home, the Asylum for Insane, the Aged Women's Home, the Old Men's Home, the Home for Incurables, the Convalescent Home, the Children's Aid Society Home—all of which are doing a grand work.

London is well supplied with churches. It has 41, many of them costly and imposing edifices which would be a credit to a city of much larger proportions. Its Young Men's Christian Association building is a model of perfection.

London is the educational centre of Western Ontario. It has 18 public school buildings. In addition to public schools it has the Collegiate Institute, the Normal School, the Western University, the

Sacred Heart Convent, and a splendid Public Library, which may be classed as an educational institution.

Besides being the headquarters of No. 1 Military District, and having the annual camp, London has the advantage of Wolseley Barracks and "D" Company Infantry. Three branches of the volunteer service are also quartered here, viz., the London Field Battery, Nos. 1 and 2 Troops of Cavalry, and the 7th Regiment of Fusiliers.

The drinking water of the citizens of London is as pure as crystal and sparkles like champagne. It is piped from Springbank, where are natural springs absolutely free from all injurious organic substances. The water-power furnished by the river is utilized to elevate the spring water to the top of a high hill, where the reservoir is situated.

There are six chartered banks of the soundest standing in London, viz.:—The Bank of Montreal, the Bank of British North America, the Merchants Bank, the Canadian Bank of Commerce, the Molsons Bank, and the Bank of Toronto.

London, like the grand old London of England, has its Covent Garden Market, its Blackfriars and Westminster Bridges, its Hyde Park, its St. Paul's Cathedral, its Oxford, Regent, Piccadilly, Pall Mall, Cheapside, Kensington and other street names. The London Court House is an exact copy of Malahide Castle, Ireland.

London is a bustling centre of commerce, and is the divisional point of the three greatest railway corporations on the continent, viz.:—the Grand Trunk, the Canadian Pacific, and the Michigan Central. It also has connection with Lake Erie through its own railway operated by the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway Company. More trains come into and go out of London in a day than any city in Canada.
