PRIDAY, the eighth day of the month of June, in the twenty-ninth year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, being the Fifth Session of the Eighth Provincial Parliament of Canada, as continued by several prorogations to this day:

His Excellency the Right Honorable Charles Stanley, Viscount Monck, Baron Monck of Ballytrammon, in the County of Wexford, Governor General of British North America, and Captain General and Governor-in-Chief in and over the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and the Island of Prince Edward, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., being seated in the Chair on the Throne, the Honorable the Speaker commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to let the Assembly know "It is His Excellency's pleasure they attend him immediately in this House;"

Who being come with their Speaker, His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to open the Session by a gracious Speech to both Houses.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I am happy again to avail myself of your advice in carrying on the Government, and I trust that you will find in the magnificent Buildings erected in the city chosen by Her Majesty as the Seat of Government, increased facilities for the despatch of public business, while they will prove adequate to the great future of this Country.

Ŕ

Immediately after the termination of the last Session of Parliament, I convened, by instructions from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, a Council of Trade including representatives from the different Provinces of British North America.

I have directed the proceedings of this body to be laid before you.

I shall direct to be laid before you the papers relating to the termination of the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States of America, and to the negotiations on the subject of our commercial relations with that Country.

It has now become still more imperative to open by an extension of the trade of the

Country with other Nations new markets for the varied products of our industry.

In consequence of the notice for the termination of the Reciprocity Treaty, I deemed it needful, with the assent and approbation of Her Majesty's Government, to send a deputation representing the colonies of British North America, during the winter, to the West Indies and Brazil, to ascertain the best means of developing and extending commercial relations with those Countries. The period at which the Delegation returned from their mission is so recent that no Report could as yet have been presented, but as soon as received, it will be communicated to you.

The threats and preparations for attack on Canada constantly and openly made by a body organized in the United States of America and known as Fenians,' compelled me, since Parliament rose, by the advice of my Ministers, to call out for active service a large

portion of the Volunteer Militia Force of the Province.

The spirit displayed by the people and their ready response to my proclamation have

received the well merited approval of Her Majesty's Government.

The events which have occurred within the last few days afford additional proofs of

the necessity for the precautionary measures adopted.

The Province has been invaded by a lawless band of Marauders, but I congratulate the Country that they were promptly confronted and within twenty-four hours compelled to

make a precipitate retreat.

I deplore the loss of life and the sufferings which have been entailed upon the gallant body of the Canadian Volunteers in the engagement which took place in repelling so promptly the invaders who had attacked the country; and I feel assured that you will not omit to alleviate, as far as may be in your power, the miseries so wantonly inflicted on many families. But while I grieve for their individual loss, I must congratulate the country that the first note of danger has shewn that Canada possesses in her Volunteers, a body of men ready to peril their lives in defence of their Queen and Country.

The entire people have been thoroughly aroused by recent occurrences; and it must now be apparent to all, that the whole resources of the country, both in men and means,

will at any moment be cheerfully given in repelling any invasion of their homes.

In the measures of defence which I have been called upon to take, I have received the unremitting support of the Lt.-General Commanding, and of Admiral Sir James Hope. It is also a source of unfeigned pleasure to me to acknowledge the gallant devotion displayed by the Officers and men of Her Majesty's Military and Naval Forces in Canada.

I am happy to be able to state that the President of the United States has issued a Proclamation declaring that serious infractions of the laws of that country have been and are being committed, by evil disposed persons, within the Territory and Jurisdiction of the United States, against the British Possessions in North America, and requiring all officers of his Government to exert every effort for their repression. I trust that the course thus adopted will ere long prevent this country from being subjected to further attacks from the citizens of a nation on terms of amity with Great Britain.

The maintenance of the Force on active duty, which the Government has been com-

pelled to call out, has involved an Expenditure to a large amount which was not provided

for by the votes of last Session.

The accounts of this expenditure will be specially laid before you, and I feel confident that you will immediately pass a Bill indemnifying the Government for this unavoidable

departure from the provisions of the Audit Act.

Recent occurrences shew the necessity of extending to Lower Canada the Act, Cap. 98 Consolidated Statutes for Upper Canada, to protect the inhabitants of that section of the Province against lawless aggression from subjects of Foreign Countries at peace with Her Majesty. It has also been necessary for the preservation of law and order, to adopt a

course similar to that taken in the present Session of the Imperial Parliament, for the temporary suspension of the writ of Habeas Corpus. I invite your immediate consideration of these necessary measures.

I have fixed, by Proclamation, the first day of August next as the time at which the Civil Code of Lower Canada, passed in the last Session of Parliament, shall come into

operation.

The Code of Civil procedure of Lower Canada, as reported by the Commissioners, shall be submitted for your adoption during the Session.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I have desired that the Financial Accounts for the current year and the Estimates of

expenditure for the next year shall be laid before you.

I congratulate you upon the very satisfactory results of the commerce of the Country during the past year: the Revenue has been so largely in excess with the Estimates as to enable me, without inconvenience, to provide for the heavy and unexpected charges entailed upon the country.

Honorable Gentlemen and Gentlemen:

The position which the great question of the Union of the Provinces of British North America has assumed is now such as to induce the expectation that the measure will be shortly carried into effect. I therefore hope and believe that it will be found practicable during the present Session to adopt such proceedings as may be necessary for completing the details of the scheme as regards this Province, and I venture to express the confident expectation that the next Parliament which will be held within these walls will not be confined to an assembly of the Representatives of Canada, but will embrace those of all the Colonies of British North America.

I am happy to be able to congratulate you on the general prosperity which pervades all classes of the community in the Province, and I pray that your Councils may be guided by Divine Providence to secure that which is the true end of all Government, the moral and material advancement of the great body of the people.

His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to retire, and the Legislative Assembly withdrew.

Ordered, That all the Members present during this Session be appointed a Committee to consider of the Orders and Customs of this House and Privileges of Parliament, and that the said Committee have leave to meet in this House when and as often as they please.

The Honorable Mr. Campbell presented to the House the Report of the Honorable the Commissioner of Crown Lands, for the year ending 30th June, 1865, and also for the

The Honorable the Speaker presented to the House the Report of the Librarian on the state of the Library of Parliament.

Ordered, That the same do lie on the Table, and it is as follows:-

To the Honorable the Legislative Council of Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled:

The Report of the Librarian on the state of the Library of Parliament, respectfully sheweth:-

That the removal of the Library of Parliament from Quebec to Ottawa has been

effected without loss or any serious amount of injury.

The packing up of the books was commenced, in Quebec, on the 28th of September last, and was completed on the 26th of October. The removal took place by means of barges, along the line of river and canal navigation, in order to avoid the delay and difficulties attending transhipments, or exchange of vessels, which would have been incurred

by the adoption of any other mode of transport. Notwithstanding the lateness of the Season, and the unfavorable weather incident thereto, the barges arrived at their destination

without impediment.

Owing to the unprepared state of the new Parliament Buildings, it was found impossible to unpack the books until several months after their arrival in Ottawa. The intended Library not being yet finished, the Picture Gallery, together with certain rooms adjoining it, was fitted up for temporary use in the meantime. The proximity of these apartments to the respective Chambers of the Legislature will be the means of affording convenient access to the books by Members during the sitting of Parliament.

access to the books by Members during the sitting of Parliament.

It was not until the beginning of February that the rooms aforesaid were in a condition to admit of being made use of for the reception of the books. But on the 5th day of February the unpacking commenced and was continued until the 15th of March, when all our available space being occupied, it became necessary to apply to the Board of Works for further accommodation. The wants of the several Departments rendered it a difficult matter to comply with our requisition; but at length it was decided to make over to us a room which had been originally intended to serve as a Smoking Room for the use of Members of the Legislative Council.

The completion and fitting up of this apartment occasioned further delay, and it was not until the 9th of May that we were able to resume unpacking the remainder of the books. Since then we have been busily engaged in the arrangement and classification of the books in this and other parts of the Library; but notwithstanding extra assistance which

we have been authorized to employ, the work is not yet entirely finished.

Nevertheless, at the present time, the whole of the books belonging to the Library, with the exception of the class of French Law, which still remains at Quebec in charge of the Commissioners for Codifying the Laws of Lower Canada, has been unpacked, and, for the most part, carefully arranged and classified, so far as the limited space at our command will permit.

Understanding that the labors of the Codification Commission are drawing to a close, Your Librarian has notified the Secretary that the French Law Books should be returned to the Library without loss of time, in order that they may, if possible, be available for the

use of Members during the present Session.

In view of the speedy arrival of these books, Your Librarian would respectfully urge upon your Honorable House the necessity of providing some additional apartment, contiguous to those we now occupy, for library purposes. The rooms already assigned to us are quite inadequate for the commodious accommodation of our books. In many instances we have been compelled, from want of space, to range the books in double rows upon the shelves, a plan which does not admit of their being readily seen or consulted. It is estimated that two years, at least, will elapse before the permanent Library will be ready for occupation. Meanwhile it is absolutely indispensable that some further space should be assigned to us, not merely for the reception of books, but also for the display of the valuable maps and charts belonging to the Library, which cannot be conveniently consulted under present circumstances.

Before the departure of the Government from Quebec, Your Librarian, pursuant to the instruction he had received from the Joint Library Committee, addressed a letter to the Rector of the Loval University, expressing the grateful thanks of the governing body and officers of the Library for the use of the spacious apartments in the University Buildings, which had been generously placed at the disposal of the Legislature for the accommodation of a large portion of the Library, for which no room could be found in the Parliament House, during a period of six years, free of all charge to the Province. He availed himself of this opportunity to request the acceptance by the University of certain duplicate volumes and Astronomical apparatus, belonging to the Library, which the Committee had directed him to present to the University, as a slight acknowledgement for the favors received from that Institution. A copy of the correspondence upon the occasion is hereunto appended.

The additions to the Library since the close of last Session, have been necessarily few in number, and have not seemed sufficiently important to justify the printing of a supplementary catalogue. Moreover, the time of your Librarian and his assistants has been much occupied in the endeavor to arrange and classify the books, so as to afford the best facilities

for their convenient reference.

In the present crowded condition of the Books, and unavoidably defective arrangements, Your Librarian has been unable, as he had hoped, to obtain for this Report an exact enumeration of the number of volumes in the Library, and the number of those which are absent from the shelves and cannot be accounted for. These particulars he is compelled to defer until a future opportunity, when he hopes to be able to render a satisfactory account of the state of the Library, and of the provision which has been made for its permanent care and preservation.

LIBRARY OF PARLIAMENT, Quebec, 4th October, 1865.

Io the Reverend the Rector of the University, Laval,

SIR,—At the time when the Government is about to remove its offices to Ottawa, the Directors of the Parliamentary Library would fail in their duty if they were not to express their most sincere thanks for the liberality exercised toward them by your Reverend predecessor and yourself, in permitting them to occupy suitable apartments in the University Buildings, as a place of deposit for a large portion of the Library, and by declining to accept any compensation for the use of these apartments, or for the heating of the same, during the six winters that we have passed in Quebec.

In the Session of 1864 the Joint Committee on the Library, in anticipation of the removal of the seat of government to Ottawa, after deliberating on the most suitable method of acknowledging your liberality, resolved, and recommended to both Houses of Parliament, to offer to the Library of the University the gift of an Orrery, and of a certain number of volumes of which duplicate copies exist in the Library of Parliament. This recommendation received the sanction of the Legislative Council and of the Legislative

Assembly.

I am accordingly empowered in the name and on behalf of the Two Houses of the Legislature, to express to you their deep sense of the obligations you have laid upon them by so freely and generously supplementing the defective accommodation for the Library in the Public Buildings of Quebec; and to pray you to accept, as a souvenir of the service rendered to the Government by your Institution, the Orrery above mentioned, together with the Books enumerated in the accompanying List.

At the same time I beg you to believe, Reverend Sir, that the officers of the Library will ever retain a lively recollection of the kindness and attention invariably displayed towards them by yourself and the other gentlemen connected with the University, and that they will always rejoice to hear of the continued prosperity of the noble Institution

over which you preside with so much dignity and success.

The Order of the Day being read, for the consideration of His Excellency's Speech from the Throne, at the opening of the present Session,

Which being read by the Clerk,

The Honorable Mr. Christie moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Armand,

That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, to thank His Excellency for His Gracious Speech at the opening of the present Session of the Provincial Parliament.—

To assure His Excellency that we are grateful for his expression of pleasure at availing himself of our advice in carrying on the Government and trust with him that there will be found in the magnificent Buildings erected in the City chosen by Her Majesty as the Seat of Government increased facilities for the despatch of Public business, while they will prove adequate to the great future of this Country.

To thank His Excellency for having directed to be laid before this House the pro-

ceedings of the Council of Trade, including Representatives from the different Provinces of British North America, which His Excellency has informed us that he convened, immediately after the termination of the last Session of Parliament, by instructions, from the Secretary of State for the Colonies; and also papers relating to the termination of the Reciprocity Treaty with the *United States* of *America*, and to the negotiations on the subject of our Commercial relations with that Country.

To agree with His Excellency that it has now become still more imperative to open, by an extension of the trade of the Country with other Nations, new Markets for the varied

products of our Industry.

To assure His Excellency that this House will give its best attention to the Report which His Excellency has been pleased to announce his intention of communicating to Parliament as soon as received from the Deputation representing the Colonies of British North America, which in consequence of the notice for the termination of the Reciprocity Treaty, His Excellency deemed it needful, with the assent and approbation of Her Majesty's Government, to send during the Winter to the West Indies and Brazil, to ascertain the best means of developing and extending Commercial relation with these Countries.

To express to His Excellency the great pleasure with which this House has learned that the threats and preparations for attack on Canada constantly and openly made by a body organized in the United States of America, and, known as "Fenians" having compelled His Excellency, since Parliament rose, by the advice of his Ministers, to call out for active service a large portion of the Volunteer Militia Force of the Province, the spirit displayed by the people and their ready response to His Excellency's Proclamation have

received the well merited approval of Her Majesty's Government.

To agree with His Excellency that the events which have occurred within the last few days afford additional proof of the necessity for the precaution a y measures adopted.

To rejoice with His Excellency that the Province having been invaded by a lawless band of Marauders, they were promptly confronted and within twenty-four hours com-

pelled to make a precipitate retreat.

To unite with His Excellency in deploring the loss of life and sufferings which have been entailed upon the gallant body of the Canadian Volunteers, in the engagement which took place in repelling so promptly the Invaders who had attacked the Country; and to assure His Excellency that we shall not omit to alleviate, as far as may be in our power, the miseries so wantonly inflicted on many families.—But while grieving for their individual loss, to express to His Excellency the feeling of pride with which this House accepts his congratulations to the Country on the fact of the first note of danger having shewn that Canada possesses in her Volunteers a body of men ready to peril their lives in defence of their Queen and Country.

To concur with His Excellency in the belief that the entire people have been thoroughly aroused by recent occurrences; and that it must now be apparent to all, that the whole resources of the Country, both in men and means, will at any moment be cheerfully given

in repelling any Invasion of their homes.

To express to His Excellency the high gratification of this House at being informed that, in the measures of defence which he has been called upon to take, he has received the unremitting support of the Lieutenant General Commanding, and of Admiral Sir James Hope, and to assure His Excellency that it is to this House, as well as to him a source of unfeigned pleasure to acknowledge the gallant devotion displayed by the Officers and men of Her Majesty's Military and Naval forces in Canada.

To rejoice with His Excellency that the President of the United States has issued a Proclamation declaring that serious infractions of the laws of that Country have been and are being committed, by evil disposed persons, within the Territory and Jurisdiction of the United States, against the British Possessions in North America, and requiring Officers of his Government to exert every effort for their repression; and to unite with His Excellency in trusting that the course thus adopted will ere long prevent this country from being subjected to further attacks from the Citizens of a Nation on terms of amity with Great

To assure His Excellency that the maintenance of the Force on active duty, which the Government has been compelled to call out, having involved an Expenditure to a large amount which was not provided for by the votes of last Session, this House will cheerfully concur in passing a Bill indemnifying the Government for this unavoidable departure from

the provisions of the Audit Act.

To thank His Excellency for having invited the immediate attention of this House to the consideration of a measure for extending to Lower Canada the Act, chapter ninety-eight of the Consolidated Statutes for Upper Canada, to protect the Inhabitants of that section of the Province against lawless aggression from subjects of Foreign Countries at Peace with Her Majesty, of which recent occurrences have shewn the necessity, and also of a measure similar to that enacted in the present Session of the Imperial Parliament for the temporary suspension of the Writ of Habeas Corpus, which had become necessary for the preservation of law and order.

To express satisfaction at being informed by His Excellency that he has fixed, by Proclamation, the first day of August next as the time at which the Civil Code of Lower Canada, passed in the last Session of Parliament, shall come into operation; and that the Code of Civil Procedure of Lower Canada as reported by the Commissioners, will be sub-

mitted for adoption during the Session.

To convey to His Excellency a sense of the gratification with which this House has learned from His Excellency, that the position which the great question of the Union of the Provinces of British North America has assumed is now such as to induce the expectation that the measure will be shortly carried into effect; and that His Excellency therefore hopes and believes that it will be found practicable during the present session to adopt such proceedings as may be necessary for completing the details of the scheme as regards this Fiovince, and entertains the confident expectation that the next Parliament which will be held within these walls will not be confined to an assembly of the Representatives of Canada, but will embrace those of all the Colonies of British North America.

To thank His Excellency for his congratulations on the general prosperity which pervades all classes of the Community in the Province, and to unite with His Excellency in praying that our Councils may be guided by Divine Providence to secure that which is the true end of all Government, the moral and material advancement of the great body of the

people.

The first paragraph of the said Resolution being again read,

The Honorable Mr. Christie moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Armand, That the same be adopted.

After Debate,

The question of concurrence being put thereon the same was unanimously resolved in the affirmative.

The remaining paragraphs of the said Resolution being again read and the question of concurrence put on each they were unanimously agreed to.

Crdered, That the Honorable Sir N. F. Belleau and the Honorable Messieurs Christie and Armand be appointed a Committee to draft an Address founded on the said Resolution.

The House was adjourned during pleasure. After some time the House was resumed, and

The Honorable Sir N. F. Belleau reported an Address prepared by the said Committee as follows:

To His Excellency the Right Honorable CHARLES STANLEY, Viscount Monck, Baron Monck of Ballytrammon, in the County of Wexford, Governor General of British North America, and Captain General and Governor in Chief in and over the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and the Island of Prince Edward, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council of *Canada*, in Provincial Parliament assembled, respectfully thank Your Excellency for Your Gracious Speech at the opening of the present Session.

We are grateful for Your Excellency's expression of pleasure at again availing yourself of our advice in carrying on the Government, and we trust with Your Excellency that there will be found in the magnificent Buildings erected in the City chosen by Her Majesty as the Seat of Government, increased facilities for the despatch of public business,

while they will prove adequate to the great future of this Country.

We thank Your Excellency for having directed to be laid before us the proceedings of the Council of Trade, including representatives from the different Provinces of British North America, which Your Excellency has informed us that you convened immediately after the termination of the last Session of Parliament, by instructions from the Secretary of State for the Colonies; and also the papers relating to the termination of the Reciprocity Treaty with the United States of America, and to the negociations on the subject of our Commercial relations with that Country.

We agree with Your Excellency that it has now become still more imperative to open, by an extension of the trade of the Country with other Nations, new Markets for the varied

products of our industry.

We will give our best attention to the Report which Your Excellency has been pleased to announce your intention of communicating to Parliament as soon as received from the Deputation representing the Colonies of British North America, which, in consequence of the notice for the termination of the Reciprocity Treaty, Your Excellency deemed it needful, with the assent and approbation of Her Majesty's Government, to send during the winter, to the West Indies and Brazil, to ascertain the best means of developing and ex-

tending commercial relations with those Countries.

It has been with great pleasure that this House has learned that the threats and preparations for attack on Canada constantly and openly made by a body organized in the United States of America, and known as "Fenians," having compelled Your Excellency since Parliament rose, by the advice of Your Ministers, to call out for active service, a large portion of the Volunteer Militia Force of the Province, the spirit displayed by the people, and that their ready response to Your Excellency's Proclamation, have received the well-merited approval of Her Majesty's Government.

We agree with Your Excellency, that the events which have occurred within the last few days, afford additional proofs of the necessity for the precautionary measures adopted.

We rejoice with Your Excellency that the Province, having been invaded by a lawless band of Marauders, they were promptly confronted, and within twenty-four hours compel-

lcd to make a precipitate retreat.

We unite with Your Excellency in deploring the loss of life and the sufferings which have been entailed upon the gallant body of the Canadian Volunteers in the engagement which took place in repelling so promptly the Invaders who had attacked the country; and we shall not omit to alleviate, as far as may be in our power, the miseries so wantonly inflicted on many families.—But while grieving for their individual loss, it is with a feeling of pride that this House accepts Your Excellency's congratulations to the country on the fact that the first note of danger having shewn that Canada possesses in her Volunteers a body of men ready to peril their lives in defence of their Queen and Country.

We concur with Your Excellency in the belief that the entire people have been thoroughly aroused by recent occurrences; and that it must now be apparent to all, that the whole resources of the country, both in men and means, will at any moment be cheer-

fully given in repelling any invasion of their homes.

We are highly gratified at being informed that, in the measures of defence which Your Excellency has been called upon to take, you have received the unremitting support of the Lieutenant General Commanding, and of Admiral Sir James Hope; and we assure Your Excellency that it is to this House, as well as to you, a source of unfeigned pleasure to acknowledge the gallant devotion displayed by the officers and men of Her Majesty's Military and Naval forces in Canada.

We rejoice with Your Excellency that the President of the *United States* has issued a l'roclamation declaring that serious infractions of the laws of that country have been, and are being committed, by evil disposed persons, within the Territory and Jurisdiction of the *United States*, against the British Possessions in *North America*, and requiring all officers of his Government to exert every effort for their repression; and we unite with

• Your Excellency in trusting that the course thus adopted will, ere long, prevent this Country from being subjected to further attacks from the Citizens of a Nation on terms of amity with *Great Britain*.

The maintenance of the Force on active duty, which the Government has been compelled to call out, having involved an Expenditure to a large amount, which was not provided for by the votes of last Session, this House will cheerfully concur in passing a Bill indemnifying the Government for this unavoidable departure from the provisions of

the Audit Act.

We thank Your Excellency for having invited the immediate attention of this House to the consideration of a measure for extending to Lower Canada the Act, Chapter Ninety-eight of the Consolidated Statutes for Upper Canada, to protect the Inhabitants of that section of the Province against lawless aggression from Subjects of Foreign Countries at peace with Her Majesty, of which recent occurrences have shewn the necessity, and also of a measure similar to that enacted in the present Session of the Imperial Parliament, for the temporary suspension of the Writ of Habeas Corpus, which had become necessary for the preservation of law and order.

It has given us great satisfaction to be informed by Your Excellency that you have fixed, by Proclamation, the first day of August next, as the time at which the Civil Code of Lower Canada, passed in the last Session of Parliament, shall come into operation; and that the Code of Civil Procedure of Lower Canada, as reported by the Commissioners,

will be submitted for adoption during the Session.

We desire to convey to Your Excellency a sense of the gratification with which we have learned from Your Excellency, that the position which the great question of the Union of the Provinces of British North America has assumed, is now such as to induce the expectation that the measure will be shortly carried into effect; and that Your Excellency, therefore, hopes and believes that it will be found practicable during the present session, to adopt such proceedings as may be necessary for completing the details of the scheme as regards this Province, and entertains the confident expectation, that the next Parliament which will be held within these walls, will not be confined to an assembly of the representatives of Canada, but will embrace those of all the Colonies of British North America.

We thank Your Excellency for your congratulations on the general prosperity which pervades all classes of the Community in the Province, and we unite with Your Excellency in praying that our Councils may be guided by Divine Providence to secure that which is the true end of all Government, the moral and material advancement of the great body

of the people.

Which said Address being read by the Clerk, was unanimously agreed to.

Ordered, That the said Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General by the whole House.

Your Committee beg to direct attention to the smallness of the outlay for the Legislative Printing of the last Session, which they deem to be just matter for congratulation,—the whole amount being only \$14,580.46, while under the system that prevailed prior to the organization of the Joint Committee, the work of a Session of equal length would have cost at least five or six times the amount.

GENTLEMEN, -In accordance with the Standing Order of the Committee, I now pre-

sent the accounts for Printing, Binding and Printing Paper.

For the verification of the Printing Accounts, there is a complete fyle of the several Documents printed, each endorsed with its cost in detail; they are numbered, those of the Honorable the Legislative Council from 1 to 307, and those of the Legislative Assembly from 1 to 866, inclusively, in all 1173 vouchers.

There was much delay in the issuing of the Journals and Sessional Papers of the last Session, owing to the premises occupied by the Contractor for the binding being destroyed by fire; unfortunately they contained the whole of our printed sheets which were totally consumed. The cost of those sheets was \$4,000, on which we had an insurance of \$3,000, but by great care, and an exercise of the utmost economy, we have replaced all that was necessary for preservation, for that sum, so that in a pecuniary sense, nothing was lost.

Mr. Trudelle, the Contractor for the binding, has transferred his Contract to Mr. Desbarats. I submitted the Documents in relation thereto to one of the Law Officers of the Legislative Assembly, who declared it to be in due form of law, and to contain all the provisions necessary for the proper carrying out of the Contract. Mr. Trudelle's Sureties have also become Surety for Mr. Desbarats.

During the past year the several services have been most efficiently performed. The work is ordered through the proper channels, and paid for according to the prices specified in the Contracts, without a single dispute or complaint.

The annexed Balance Sheet shews that the Parliamentary Printing for the past Ses-

sion has cost \$14,580.46.

Of Charles Mitchell, and Isabella his wife, of the Village of Norval, in the County of Halton; praying for an Act to authorize the sale of certain lands and to apply the proceeds of such sale for the benefit of all parties concerned.

Of Thomas A. M. Hubert and others, of Coteau St. Pierre; praying that measures be taken to improve and clean out the stream known as "Petit Lac St. Pierre."

Of the Trustees of the Quebec North Shore Turnpike Road; praying against the passing of the Bill to authorize the construction of a new Bridge over the River St. Charles at Hare Point.

Of John Elliott and others, of the Town of Brantford; praying against the passing of the Bill to legalize certain agreements of the Grand Trunk and Buffalo and Lake Huron Railway Companies, unless provision be made therein for the payment of the debts due by the latter Company to the Town of Brantford:

Of M. Sawyer and others, of the County of Hastings; praying for a grant of land in aid of the construction of a Railway from Belleville to the Mineral regions of North Hastings.

Of Patrick McCabe and others, of the Township of Wickham, in the County of Drummond; praying against the division of the said Township into two separate Municipalities.

Two Petitions of the Municipal Council of the County of Wellington; praying for an Act legalizing a By-law of the said County, granting a Bonus to the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway Company; and also praying that any Rules of this House which would interfere with the same, may be suspended.

And of the Reverend Wellington Jeffers, D. D., and others, Trustees of the Queen Street Toronto Wesleyan Methodist Church; praying for a Bill vesting certain property in the said Trustees, under the Statutes relating to the property of Religious Societies, and under the "Model Deed" of the said Wesleyan Methodist Church.

The Honorable Mr. Boulton, from the Select Committee to whom were referred the Returns of the several Sheriffs in Upper Canada, presented their Report.

Ordered, That it be received; and the same was then read by the Clerk, as follows:

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL COMMMITTEE ROOM, 11th July, 1866.

The Committee to whom were referred the Returns of the several Sheriffs in *Upper Canada*, made in pursuance of Addresses from this House of last Session, in regard to poundage charged by them on executions whereon no sale took place, and to the Expenses

of advertising land for sale for Taxes, beg leave to Report:

That they have examined the said Returns relating to poundage, and are very much surprised to find that the said Sheriffs, have, in manifest violation of the provisions of the Common Law Procedure Act, and of the decisions of the Judges of the Superior Courts, exacted poundage on executions whereon no sale took place. Your Committee cannot avoid reprobating in the strongest terms the course thus pursued by the Sheriffs, and particularly after the proceedings of this House last Session; and to declare their unanimous opinion, that, should such a course be persevered in, any Sheriff so violating the law should be dismissed from his Office. Your Committee consider that the Sheriff's effice is one of great honour and profit, and should be conducted with the strictest integrity; and no suspicion should exist that a public officer exacts from the poor and unfortunate any fees which are not sanctioned by law; and Your Committee consider it to be the duty of either

Branch of the Legislature to inquire into abuses, and if possible to prevent a continuance of them.

By the provisions of the Common Law Procedure Act, although Sheriffs are prohibited from receiving poundage on executions where no sale takes place, a discretion is very properly left to the Judges to allow any Sheriff additional fees in any particular case where the Sheriff can satisfy the Court or Judges that he had much additional trouble, and ought to receive further remuneration therefor, they may allow it. However, in cases of this kind the Judges would not be influenced by the Sheriffs, but, while considering what was just towards these Officers, would not disregard the unfortunate and poor debtor.

It would seem by the Sheriffs thus persevering in demanding poundage where they are not entitled to it, that they are unwilling to submit to the judges any claim for extra trouble or services as if they were apprehensive of not obtaining justice. Your Committee are convinced that in no instance where they have been appealed to, have the judges failed to afford ample remuneration to any officer of the Court in their power. In illustration of this view, it may be remarked that the judges on a claim of the Sheriff of the County of Wentworth for \$6,000 for poundage, allowed \$3,000 over and above all ordinary fees. A sum doubtless amply sufficient to indemnify him for any extra trouble or service in the matter.

The Committee append hereto the amount of poundage received on executions for the last year, on which no sales took place, and also a statement of the amount received for advertizing land for sale for taxes. Your Committee consider that the expenses of advertizing lands for sale for taxes are very great, and do not seem to be based upon the

principle adopted by printers of charging by the line or number of words.

The system adopted by the Sheriffs generally of charging a percentage of the amount due upon each lot or separate piece of land respectively, your Committee consider operates very injuriously and oppressively towards those who unfortunately have the most taxes to pay. This will in all probability be guarded against in future by a provision in the new Assessment Law introduced into the other Branch of the Legislature. Your Committee are very much surprised to find that those Sheriffs whose returns are not mentioned in the annexed schedule have not thought proper to comply with the Addresses of this House, but have acted in total disregard of its authority.

Your Committee have also examined the Petitions of Casimir Stanislaus Gzowski and another, of Toronto, praying for an Act authorizing the issue to them of Letters Patent for improvements in treating certain ores and alloys, and in obtaining metals and other products therefrom, and find that no notice has been given; your Committee, however, recommend the suspension of the Fifty-third Rule in this case, as it will be competent for them, as a Committee on Private Bills, to provide that no injury to any party shall arise therefrom.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The Committee appointed to assist Mr. Speaker in the direction of the Library of Parliament, and to act as Members of a Joint Committee of both Houses on the Library,

beg leave to present a First Report.

The Committee have had under their consideration the Petition of Mr. Todd, Librarian to the Legislative Assembly, soliciting the patronage of the House to a work which he is about to publish, upon "Parliamentary Government in England, its origin, development and practical operation." This work will be completed in two volumes, of which the first is announced for publication in London in January next. From the ability and research displayed by Mr. Todd in the preparation of this treatise, the Committee are persuaded that it will prove of great utility to all statesmen and politicians throughout the British Empire, and they deem it a matter of congratulation to Canada that the first practical treatise that has ever appeared upon Parliamentary Government should emanate from this Province, and be written by one who has been so long and creditably known as an officer of the Canadian Legislature. They therefore recommend that fifty copies of this work be purchased for the Library, to be paid for upon receipt of the volumes. Had the application been deferred until after the publication of the book, the Committee could in all probability have advised the purchase of a larger number of copies; but, under existing circumstances, they have thought it best to limit their recommendation for the present, to this amount. Hereafter, if necessary, further copies of the work could be ordered for distribution to Members of the Legislature.

The Committee have examined the new and enlarged edition of Mr. J. O. Côté's little pamphlet, entitled, "Political Appointments and Elections in Canada, from 1841 to 1865." Viewing this manual as a very useful compilation and as likely to be unremunerative to the author, unless it be liberally encouraged by the Legislature, they have agreed to recommend the purchase of two hundred and fifty copies thereof, to be distributed to the Members of both Houses.

They have also considered the Petition of Dr. William Canniff, the author of a work on the Principles of Surgery, recently published in the United States, soliciting the purchase of copies of his book, which he has printed at his own expense. Dr. Canniff is a native-born Canadian, who has had considerable experience in his profession at the Crimea and during the late American War. He has also filled the Chair of Professor of Surgery in one of the Toronto Schools of Medicine for several years, and the present work is the substance of Lectures delivered in that capacity. This book is perhaps the first treatise upon Medical Science that has been written by a native of Upper Canada. The Committee accordingly recommend the purchase of fifty copies, as an encouragement to the Author, the same to be distributed amongst the Library Exchanges and the Schools of Medicine throughout the Province.

The Committee have carefully considered the Petition of Mr. Notman of Montreal, requesting the Legislature to subscribe for copies of his "Portraits of British Americans," which he is now issuing, in parts, with Biographical Sketches from the pen of Fennings Taylor, Esq. The Committee bear willing testimony to the elegant style in which this work is got up, and to the attractive notices it contains of many persons who have obtained distinction, in various walks of life, in this and the neighboring Provinces. Nevertheless, for obvious reasons, they have deemed it inexpedient to afford public patronage to a work which professes to delineate the characters of living Statesmen, who are still actively engaged in public life. They have accordingly refrained from recommending a compliance with the prayer of this Petition.

I am well aware that the terms in which you speak of my official conduct are not in-

tended by you as a mere formal and ceremonial expression of your opinion.

I rejoice to find that those who have had the best means of observing my acts, and who are most deeply interested in their results, should feel themselves at liberty to record their cordial approbation of my manner of administering the duties of my office during a period not uneventful in the annals of the Province whether we look at its external relations or its domestic condition.

I value the feelings you entertain towards me if possible more highly on public

grounds.

This community is just about to enter on a new and noble phase of political existence. The proceedings of this day afford a happy augury for the future in the illustration which they supply of the harmonious working of the elements of which our constitutional system is composed.

I think I shall best evince my gratitude for the many marks of consideration which I have received at your hands, culminating in the Address which you have now presented to me, by promising that so long as it may be Her Majesty's pleasure that I shall continue your Governor, my actions shall be guided by the same principles which have secured for me your commendation, and that when our official connexion shall cease, I will use the position which the favour of the Queen has conferred upon me to promote in the Imperial Legislature those views which I conscientiously believe best adapted to advance the true and permanent interests of the people of Canada.

Clause B.

"Sub-section sixteen of section twenty-seven is repealed, and the following substituted:

"16. Before the second Wednesday in March of each year, any local Council may pass a by-law for preventing and prohibiting the sale of any spirituous, vinous, alcoholic, "or intoxicating liquors."

Clause C.

"Sub-section sixteen of Section twenty-six of the said Act shall not apply to by-laws passed in virtue of the preceding sections. The Secretary-Treasurer shall transmit a copy of the said by-law to the Collector of Inland Revenue, who shall not grant any license for the sale of such liquors in any local municipality in which such sale has been so prohibited by by-law, even although the County Council should, during the same month of March, authorize the sale of such liquors in the County."

"Before the second Wednesday of March in each year, every local Municipal Council shall have power to make by-laws, which shall not be inconsistent with the provisions of chapter six of the Consolidated Statutes for Lower Canada, for the following purposes:

"1. To authorize the sale of any spirituous, vinous, alcoholic and intoxicating

" liquor, subject to such restrictions as they may deem expedient.

"2. To determine under what restrictions and conditions, and in what manuer, the Revenue Inspector for the District shall grant licenses to shop-keepers, tavern-keepers or other persons for the sale of liquors.

"3. To fix the sum payable for each license, provided that it shall not in any case be

The Governor General transmits for the information of the Honorable the Legislative Council, Copies of two Despatches which he has received from the Secretary of State for the Colonics.

Mr. Cardwell to Lord Monck.

(Copy-Canada-No. 72.)

Downing Street, 30th June, 1866.

My Lord,—I have received your Despatch, No. 51, of the 11th inst., in which you enclose copies of two Acts passed by the Legislature of Canada, authorizing respectively the summary imprisonment of persons charged with certain offences against the peace of the Colony, and the trial in *Lower Canada* by a Militia General Court Martial, of persons levying war against Her Majesty in that Province.

I rely on your discretion for the use you will make of the extensive powers, and do not doubt that you will have recourse in every case, in which it may be possible to do so, to

the ordinary tribunals for the punishment of offenders.

I hope that the total failure of the recent senseless attempts to disturb the peace of the Colony will have relieved your Government from all apprehension for the future, and will enable you to deal with the persons who have fallen into your hands with deliberate consideration of the various reasons which should affect your treatment of them, and without incurring any appearance of precipitation or undue severity.

The Earl of Caernarvon to Lord Monek.

(Copy—Canada—No. 4.)

Downing Street, 7th July, 1866.

My Lord,—I observe that the recent act of the Canadian Parliament authorising the trial by Militia Courts Martial of Foreigners and others who are guilty of, or accessory to, acts of aggression or hostility in Lower Canada, has formed the subject of a communication from my predecessor in this Department.

This Act, which is copied from an Act passed in 1838, for the protection of Upper Canada, and is made applicable to the Lower Province, is of an exceptional character,

and to be justified by the exceptional circumstances of the time.

I shall advise Her Majesty to leave it to its operation. At the same time I am unwilling to lose any time in expressing my earnest hope that recourse will not be had to any

but the usual tribunals for the trial of offenders.

When, in 1838, a similar act was passed for *Upper Canada*, the general condition of the Province was, in many respects, a very critical one. Such happily, I understand from Your Lordship's Despatches, is not now the case. Thanks to the loyalty of all classes in Canada, and to the good faith and co-operation of the *United States* authorities, all aggression from this territory has been baffled and no immediate danger appears to threaten the peace of the Province.

There remains doubtless some natural resentment on the part of those who have been exposed to so wanton and criminal an outrage, but I am confident that Your Lordship and your advisers are fully alive to the wisdom of moderation in such a case, and of confining the punishment of the offenders, as far as practicable, within the limits of what may be

required for the protection of the Province now and in the future.

But under any circumstances Her Majesty's Government consider it on every account to be desired that the persons concerned in this insane and lawless enterprize should be tried with all deliberation, and should not be deprived of any advantages which can be claimed under the ordinary forms of law.

And it would be to them a cause of serious regret if any step were taken from which it could be inferred that the British Authorities were either unwilling to await the ordinary course of justice, or distrustful of the spirit in which it would be administered.

The Committee also beg leave to recommend that in the view of the next Session of Parliament being a Session of the Confederated Provinces, a sufficient number of the Departmental Reports, which are usually submitted to Parliament, be printed for the use of the Federal Legislature, as well as the Local Legislatures of *Upper* and *Lower Canada*, such numbers to be computed on the same scale, numerically, as at present.

The Committee having had under their consideration, that portion of the First Report of the Select Committee appointed to assist Mr. Speaker in the direction of the Library of Parliament, so far as the interests of the Legislative Assembly are concerned, and to act as Members of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Library, which referred to the expediency of authorizing the compilation of a general Index to the Journals of the Legislative Assembly, from the year 1852, to the close of the present Parliament, and which, when completed, was recommended to be printed and distributed under the direction of the Speaker and the Printing Committee. Your Committee have taken communication of a report on the subject of the Winter Navigation of the Lower St. Lawrence, presented to your Honorable House on the 16th day of May, 1860, recommending "that an humble Address be presented to His Excellency "the Governor General, praying him to be pleased to recommend that a Survey may be "made of the Ports of Bic, Rimouski and Father Point, or of any other place in the "Lower St. Lawrence, in order to ascertain whether it is possible to construct there a "Harbour of Refuge for Vessels navigating the River St. Lawrence, below the Port of Bic, and to order that the keepers of the light-houses in the Lower St. Lawrence, under "the control of the Government be instructed to make observations as to the state of the "Gulf and River St. Lawrence during the Winter, and that such practical trial may be "made as His Excellency may deem expedient, in order to ascertain whether it is possible "for Steam Vessels to run with safety (and at what period) in the Lower St. Lawrence, "after the closing in the autumn, and before the opening in the spring, of the season of "Navigation at the Port of Quebec."

Your Committee have also taken into consideration the opinion expressed by the Quebec Board of Trade, "that it is of the utmost importance to the interests of Canada" that the practicability of establishing a Winter Port in the Lower St. Lawrence be ascer- tained, and that a memorial be addressed to the Provincial Government, urging that one

"or more Steamers be prepared to make the experiment next season."

Your Committee have also examined with care the communications and documents which have been addressed to them in answer to the questions they have put to experienced mariners and persons who have interested themselves in the question which has been the subject of their investigations; and your Committee have accordingly resolved to recommend the voting of an humble Address to His Excellency the Governor General, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to cause practical experiments to be made with Steam Vessels of sufficient power and size, and also to cause supplies of coal for such Vessels to be deposited at the Harbours of Bic and Tadousac, in order that it may be ascertained to what extent it is possible safely to navigate the Lower St. Lawrence in the Winter season.

Ordered, That the Clerk do go down to the Legislative Assembly and acquaint that House that the Legislative Council have passed this Bill without any amendment.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the Bill intituled, "An Act to amend and con"solidate the Act to impose a tax on dogs, and to provide for the better protection of
"sheep in Upper Canada," was read a third time.

The question was put whether this Bill shall pass?

It was resolved in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the Clerk do go down to the Legislative Assembly and acquaint that House that the Legislative Council have passed this Bill without any amendment.

The Order of the Day being read for the third reading of the Bill intituled, "An "Act to render valid certain Deeds passed before Notaries now deceased, and further to "amend the seventy-third chapter of the Consolidated Statutes for Lower Canada,"

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Letellier de St. Just, seconded by the Honorable

Mr. Prud'homme, it was

Ordered, That the same be postponed until Monday next.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the Bill intituled, "An Act to prevent the un"lawful training of persons to the use of arms, and to practice Military evolutions or
"exercises; and to authorize Justices of the Peace to seize and detain arms collected or
"kept for purposes dangerous to the public peace," was read a second time.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Campbell, seconded by the Honorable Sir N. F.

Belleau, it was

Ordered, That the said Bill be committed to a Committee of the whole House at the next sitting thereof.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the Bill intituled "An Act to amend the Act of "the present Session, intituled, 'An Act to amend and consolidate the several Acts respect"'ing the Municipal Institutions of Upper Canada,'" was read a second time.

The Honorable Mr. Campbell moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Fergusson Blair,

That the said Bill be committed to a Committee of the whole House presently.

The question of concurrence being put thereon, the same was resolved in the affirmative, and

The House was then, according to order, adjourned during pleasure, and put into a Committee of the whole on the said Bill.

After some time the House was resumed, and

The Honorable Mr. Aikins reported from the said Committee that they had gone through the said Bill, and had directed him to report the same, with several amendments, which he was ready to submit whenever the House would be pleased to receive them.

Ordered, That the said Report be now received, and

The said amendments being then twice read by the Clerk, and the question of concurrence put on each, they were severally agreed to.

Ordered, That the said Bill be read a third time presently. The said Bill was then read a third time accordingly.

The question was put whether this Bill shall pass?

It was resolved in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the Clerk do go down to the Legislative Assembly and acquaint that House that the Legislative Council have passed this Bill, to which they desire their concurrence.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the House was adjourned during pleasure and put into a Committee of the whole on the Bill intituled, "An Act to amend the Law respect" ing the Inspection of Leather and Raw Hides."

After some time the House was resumed, and

The Honorable Mr. Vidal reported from the said Committee that they had gone through the said Bill, and had directed him to report the same to the House without any amendment.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Sanborn, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Armand, it was

Ordered, That the said Bill be read a third time presently.

The said Bill was then read a third time accordingly.

The question was put whether this Bill shall pass?

It was resolved in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the Clerk do go down to the Legislative Assembly, and acquaint that House that the Legislative Council have passed this Bill, without any amendment.

A Message was brought from the Legislative Assembly by their Clerk, with a Bill intituled, "An Act to amend Chapter Six of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, intituled, 'An Act respecting Elections of Members of the Legislature,'" to which they desire the concurrence of this House.

The said Bill was read for the first time.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Campbell, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Alexander, it was

Ordered, That the said Bill be read a second time on Monday next.

The House was then adjourned during pleasure. After some time the House was resumed.

The Honorable Mr. Campbell moved, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Fergusson Blair, To Resolve:

1. That by the 38th paragraph of the Resolution of this House, passed on the third day of February, 1865, for presenting an humble Address to Her Majesty, praying that She may be graciously pleased to cause a measure to be submitted to the Imperial Parliament, for the purpose of uniting the Colonies of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, in one Government, with provisions based on the Resolutions which were adopted at a Conference of Delegates from the said Colonies, held at the City of Quebec, on the 10th of October, 1864, it is provided that "for each of "the Provinces there shall be an Executive Officer, styled the Lieutenant Governor, who "shall be appointed by the Governor General in Council, under the Great Seal of the "Federated Provinces, during pleasure; such pleasure, not to be exercised before the ex"piration of the first five years, except for cause; such cause to be communicated in writ-

"ing to the Lieutenant Governor immediately after the exercise of the pleasure as afore"said, and also by Message to both Houses of Parliament, within the first week of the first
"Session afterwards;" and that by the 41st paragraph of the same Resolution it is provided
that "the Local Government and Legislature of each Province shall be constructed in such
"manner as the existing Legislature of each such Province shall provide":—and it is further
now resolved, that in the opinion of this House the appointment of the first Lieutenant
Governor shall be provisional, and that he should hold office strictly during pleasure.

2. That under and subject to the Constitution of the Federated Provinces, the executive authority of the Lieutenant Governor of Lower Canada and Upper Canada respectively shall be administered by each of such Officers according to the well understood prin-

ciples of the British Constitution.

3. The Great Seal of each Province of Lower Canada and Upper Canada, shall be the same or of the same design, in each of the said Provinces, as that used in the said Provinces respectively, at the time of the existing Union, until altered by the Local Government.

4. That there shall be a Local Legislature for Lower Canada, composed of Two Chambers, to be called the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada.

5. That there shall be a Local Legislature for Upper Canada, which shall consist of

One Chamber, to be called the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada.

6. That the Legislative Council of Lower Canada shall be composed of twenty-four Members, to be appointed by the Crown, under the Great Seal of the Local Government, who shall hold office during life; but if any Legislative Councillor shall, for two consecutive Sessions of Parliament, fail to give his attendance in the said Council, his seat shall thereby become vacant.

thereby become vacant.
7. That the Members of the Legislative Council of Lower Canada shall be British Subjects by birth or naturalization, of the full age of thirty years; shall possess a continuous real property qualification, in Lower Canada, of four thousand dollars over and above all incumbrances, and shall continue worth that sum over and above their debts and liabilities.

8. That if any question shall arise as to the qualification of a Legislative Councillor in

Lower Canada, the same shall be determined by the Council.

9. That the Speaker of the Legislative Council of Lower Canada (unless otherwise provided by the Local Parliament) shall be appointed by the Crown, from among the Members of the Legislative Council, and shall hold office during pleasure, and shall only be entitled to a casting vote on an equality of votes.

10. That each of the twenty-four Legislative Councillors of Lower Canada shall be appointed to represent one of the twenty-four Electoral Divisions thereof, mentioned in Schedule A. of the first chapter of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, and such Councillor shall reside or possess his qualification in the Division he is appointed to represent.

11. That the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada shall be composed of the sixty-five Members to be elected to represent the sixty-five Electoral Divisions into which Lower Canada is now divided, under chapter two of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, chapter seventy-five of the Consolidated Statutes for Lower Canada, and the Act 23 Victoria, chapter 1, or of any other Act amending the same, in force at the time when the Local Government shall be constituted, as well for representation in the Local Legislature thereof, as in the House of Commons of the Federated Provinces; Provided that it shall not be lawful to present to the Lieutenant Governor for assent any Bill of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Lower Canada by which the limits of the Electoral Divisions mentioned in the schedule hereto annexed, marked A, may be altered, unless the second and third readings of such Bill in the Legislative Assembly shall have been passed with the concurrence of the majority of the Members for the time being of the said Legislative Assembly, representing the Electoral Divisions mentioned in the said schedule marked A, and the Assent shall not be given to such Bill unless an Address has been presented by the Legislative Assembly to the Lieutenant Governor that such Bill has been so passed.

12. That the Legislative Assembly of *Upper Canada* shall be composed of eighty-two Members, to be elected to represent the eighty-two constituencies in *Upper Canada*, such constituencies being identical, whether for representation in the Local Legislative Assembly or for representation in the House of Commons of the Federated Provinces, and

which constituencies shall consist of the divisions and be bounded as is provided in the schedule hereto annexed, marked B.

13. That until other provisions are made by the Local Legislature of Lower and U_{p-1} per Canada respectively, changing the same in either of the said Provinces, all the Laws which at the date of the Proclamation, constituting the separate Provinces of Lower Canada and of Upper Canada, shall be in force in each of the said Provinces respectively, relating to the qualification and disqualification of any person to be elected or to sit or vote as a Member of the Assembly of the Province of Canada, and relating to the qualification and disqualification of voters and to the oaths to be taken by voters, and to Returning Officers and their powers and duties, and relating to the proceedings at elections and to the period during which such elections may be continued, and relating to the trial of controverted elections and the proceedings incident thereto, and relating to the vacating of the seats of Members and to the issuing and execution of new writs in case of any seat being vacated otherwise than by a dissolution, shall respectively apply to elections of Members to serve in the said the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada and in the said the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada,

14. That the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada and the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada respectively, shall continue for four years from the day of the return of the Writs for choosing the same, and no longer, subject, nevertheless, to either the said the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada, or the said the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada, being sooner prorogued or dissolved by the Lieutenant Governor of either of the

said Provinces respectively.

15. That there shall be a Session of the Legislature of each of the said Provinces once at least every year, so that a period of twelve months shall not intervene between the last sitting of the Local Legislature in one Session, and the first sitting thereof in the next Session.

16. That it is expedient that any Act of the Imperial Parliament which may be passed for the Union of the Colonies of British North America, should contain a provision that the division and adjustment of the debts, credits, liabilities, properties and assets of the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, should be referred to the arbitrament of three arbitrators, one to be chosen by the Local Government of Upper Canada, the other by the Local Government of Lower Canada, and the third by the General Government; it being further provided that the selection of the arbitrators shall not take place until after the General Parliament for British North America and Local Legislatures for Upper and Lower Canada have been elected—and that the third arbitrator shall not be a resident in either Upper or Lower Canada.

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign:

We, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Legislative Council of Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, humbly approach Your Majesty, for the purpose of praying that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased to cause a measure to be submitted to the Imperial Parliament, for the purpose of providing for the Local Governments and Legislature of Lower and Opper Canada respectively, when the Union of the Provinces of British North America is effected, with provisions based upon the following Resolutions, which have this day been adopted by the Legislative Council:

To Resolve :

1. That by the 38th paragraph of the Resolution of this House, passed on the third day of February, 1865, for presenting an humble Address to Her Majesty, praying that She may be graciously pleased to cause a measure to be submitted to the Imperial Parliament, for the purpose of uniting the Colonies of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, in one Government, with provisions based on the Resolutions which were adopted at a Conference of Delegates from the said Colonies, held at the City of Quebec, on the 10th of October, 1864, it is provided that "for each of "the Provinces there shall be an Executive Officer, styled the Lieutenant Governor, who "shall be appointed by the Governor General in Council, under the Great Seal of the "Federated Provinces, during pleasure; such pleasure, not to be exercised before the ex-"piration of the first five years, except for cause; such cause to be communicated in writ-"ing to the Lieutenant Governor immediately after the exercise of the pleasure as afore-"said, and also by Message to both Houses of Parliament, within the first week of the first "Session afterwards;" and that by the 41st paragraph of the same Resolution it is provided that "the Local Government and Legislature of each Province shall be constructed in such "manner as the existing Legislature of each such Province shall provide":—and it is further now resolved, that in the opinion of this House the appointment of the first Lieutenant Governor shall be provisional, and that he should hold office strictly during pleasure.

2. That under and subject to the Constitution of the Federated Provinces, the executive authority of the Lieutenant Governor of Lower Canada and Upper Canada respectively shall be administered by each of such Officers according to the well understood prin-

ciples of the British Constitution.

3. The Great Scal of each Province of Lower Canada and Upper Canada, shall be the same or of the same design, in each of the said Provinces, as that used in the said Provinces respectively, at the time of the existing Union, until altered by the Local Government.

4. That there shall be a Local Legislature for Lower Canada, composed of Two Chambers, to be called the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada.

5. That there shall be a Local Legislature for Upper Canada, which shall consist of One Chamber, to be called the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada.

6. That the Legislative Council of Lower Canada shall be composed of twenty-four Members, to be appointed by the Crown, under the Great Seal of the Local Government, who shall hold office during life; but if any Legislative Councillor shall, for two consecutive Sessions of Parliament, fail to give his attendance in the said Council, his seat shall thereby become vacant.

7. That the Members of the Legislative Council of Lower Canada shall be British Subjects by birth or naturalization, of the full age of thirty years; shall possess a continuous real property qualification, in Lower Canada, of four thousand dollars over and above all incumbrances, and shall continue worth that sum over and above their debts and liabilities.

S. That if any question shall arise as to the qualification of a Legislative Councillor in

Lower Canada, the same shall be determined by the Council.

9. That the Speaker of the Legislative Council of Lower Canada (unless otherwise provided by the Local Parliament) shall be appointed by the Crown, from among the Members of the Legislative Council, and shall hold office during pleasure, and shall only be entitled to a casting vote on an equality of votes.

10. That each of the twenty-four Legislative Councillors of Lower Canada shall be appointed to represent one of the twenty-four Electoral Divisions thereof, mentioned in Schedule A. of the first chapter of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, and such Councillor shall reside or possess his qualification in the Division he is appointed to represent.

11. That the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada shall be composed of the sixty-five Members to be elected to represent the sixty-five Electoral Divisions into which Lower Canada is now divided, under chapter two of the Consolidated Statutes of Canada, chapter seventy-five of the Consolidated Statutes for Lower Canada, and the Act 23 Victoria, chapter 1, or of any other Act amending the same, in force at the time when the Local Government shall be constituted, as well for representation in the Local Legislature thereof, as in the House of Commons of the Federated Provinces; Provided that it shall not be lawful to present to the Lieutenant Governor for assent any Bill of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Lower Canada by which the limits of the Electoral Divisions mentioned in the schedule hereto annexed, marked A, may be altered, unless the second and third readings of such Bill in the Legislative Assembly shall have been passed with the concurrence of the majority of the Members for the time being of the said Legislative Assembly, representing the Electoral Divisions mentioned in the said schedule marked A, and the Assent shall not be given to such Bill unless an Address has been presented by the Legislative Assembly to the Lieutenant Governor that such Bill has been so passed.

12. That the Legislative Assembly of *Upper Uanada* shall be composed of eighty-two Members, to be elected to represent the eighty-two constituencies in *Upper Canada*, such constituencies being identical, whether for representation in the Local Legislative Assembly or for representation in the House of Commons of the Federated Provinces, and which constituencies shall consist of the divisions and be bounded as is provided in the

schedule hereto annexed, marked B.

13. That until other provisions are made by the Local Legislature of Lower and Upper Canada respectively, changing the same in either of the said Provinces, all the Laws which at the date of the Proclamation, constituting the separate Provinces of Lower Canada and of Upper Canada, shall be in torce in each of the said Provinces respectively, relating to the qualification and disqualification of any person to be elected or to sit or vote as a Member of the Assembly of the Province of Canada, and relating to the qualification and disqualification of voters and to the oaths to be taken by voters, and to Returning Officers and their powers and duties, and relating to the proceedings at elections and to the period during which such elections may be continued, and relating to the trial of controverted elections and the proceedings incident thereto, and relating to the vacating of the seats of Members and to the issuing and execution of new writs in case of any seat being vacated otherwise than by a dissolution, shall respectively apply to elections of Members to serve in the said the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada and in the said the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada.

14. That the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada and the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada respectively, shall continue for four years from the day of the return of the Writs for choosing the same, and no longer, subject, nevertheless, to either the said the

Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada, or the said the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada, being sooner prorogued or dissolved by the Lieutenant Governor of either of the said Provinces respectively.

15. That there shall be a Session of the Legislature of each of the said Provinces once at least every year, so that a period of twelve months shall not intervene between the last sitting of the Local Legislature in one Session, and the first sitting thereof in the next Session.

16. That it is expedient that any Act of the Imperial Parliament which may be passed for the Union of the Colonies of British North America, should contain a provision that the division and adjustment of the debts, credits, liabilities, properties and assets of the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, should be referred to the arbitrament of three arbitrators, one to be chosen by the Local Government of Upper Canada, the other by the Local Government of Lower Canada, and the third by the General Government; it being further provided that the selection of the arbitrators shall not take place until after the General Parliament for British North America and Local Legislatures for Upper and Lower Canada have been elected—and that the third arbitrator shall not be a resident in either Upper or Lower Canada.

"The Council of every Town shall consist of the Mayor, who shall be the head thereof, " and of two Councillors for every ward, and if the Town has not withdrawn from the juris-"diction of the Council of the County in which it lies, then a Reeve shall be added, and " if the Town had the names of five hundred freeholders and householders on the last " revised assessment roll, then a Deputy Reeve shall be added, and for every additional "five hundred names of persons possessing the same property qualification as voters on such roll, there shall be elected an additional Deputy Reeve."

4 .- IN INCORPORATED VILLAGES.

"The Council of every incorporated Village shall consist of one Reeve, who shall be

"the head thereof, and four Councillors, and if the Village had the names of five hundred freeholders and householders on the last Revised Assessment Roll, then of a Reeve, Deputy Reeve, and three Councillors, and for every additional five hundred names of persons possessing the same property qualification as voters on such roll, there shall be elected an additional Deputy Reeve instead of a Councillor."

5.—IN TOWNSHIPS.

"The Council of every Township shall consist of a Reeve, who shall be the head thereof, and four Councillors, and if the Township had the names of five hundred free-holders and householders on the last Revised Assessment Roll, then the Council shall consist of a Reeve, Deputy Reeve, and three Councillors, and for every additional five hundred names of persons possessing the same property qualification as voters on such Roll, there shall be elected an additional Deputy Reeve instead of a Councillor."

"67. No Reeve or Deputy Reeve shall take his seat in the County Council, until he has filed with the Clerk of the County Council a certificate under the hand and scal of the Township, Village or Town Clerk, that such Reeve or Deputy Reeve was duly elected, and has made and subscribed the declarations of office and qualification (unless exempted therefrom) as such Reeve or Deputy Reeve; nor in case of a Deputy Reeve, until he has also filed with the Clerk of the County an affirmation or declaration of the Clerk, or other person having the legal custody of the last revised Assessment Rolls for the Municipality which he represents, that there appears upon such Rolls the names of at least five hundred freeholders and householders in the Municipality for the first Deputy Reeve elected for such Municipality, and that no alteration reducing the limits of the Municipality and the number of persons possessing the same property qualifications as voters, within five hundred for each additional Deputy Reeve, since the said

" rolls were last revised has taken place."

" 87. The electors of every City shall elect three Aldermen for every Ward, on the first Monday in January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, one of whom shall retire annually, in rotation, and on the first Monday in January in each year thereafter, shall elect one Alderman for each ward, in the room of the retiring

"member, unless chosen by acclamation on the day of nomination."

"117. The necessary declarations of office and qualification may be administered to the members of the Council and Mayor elect in Cities and Towns by the Clerk thereof."

"120. In case no return be made for one or more wards in consequence of non-election, owing to interruption by riot or other cause, the members of Council clect, being at least a majority of the whole members of the Council when full, shall elect one of the Aldermen elect in Cities, to be Presiding Officer, at which election the Clerk shall preside, and such officer shall take the necessary declarations and possess all the powers of Mayor, until a poll for such Ward, Wards, or Electoral Division or Divisions, has been held under a warrant in the manner provided for in the one hundred and twentyfifth Section of this Act."

"150. The Warden of a County may resign his office by verbal intimation to the "Council while in session; or by letter to the County Clerk, if not in session, in which "case the Clerk shall, if required by a majority of the members of the County Council, "call a special meeting to fill such vacancy; vacancies caused by the resignation of a "Reeve or a Deputy Reeve shall be filled by an ordinary election as provided by section

" one hundred and twenty-five."

"371. All Cities and all Towns having more than five thousand inhabitants shall have a Police Magistrate, and the salaries of such Police Magistrates shall not be less

"than on the following scale:

"427. Forthwith after the passing of this Act it shall be lawful for the Governor to " cause such extra number of copies of the Municipal Act, and the Assessment Act, to be "printed, appending thereto a copious index to their provisions, as he may deem expe-"dient; and he may cause any Acts or parts of Acts passed during the present session, " which amend or affect in any way the provisions of the Municipal Act, to be incorporated "with it, inserting them in their proper places in the said Municipal Act, and striking out " of the latter any enactments repealed by or inconsistent with those so incorporated; and "altering the number of the Sections if need be; and a correct printed copy of the said "Municipal Act with the amendments so incorporated, and attested under the signature " of the Governor, and countersigned by the Provincial Secretary; and also a similarly " attested copy of the Assessment Act passed during the present session, shall be deposited "with the Clerk of the Legislative Council, and after such attestation and deposit, copies " of the said Municipal Act as amended, and of the said Assessment Act, printed by the "Queen's Printer, shall be held and deemed to have the same force and effect as the "copies of this Act, and of the Acts amending the same, as passed during the present " session; and the Queen's Printer shall distribute the extra copies of the volume contain-"ing such Acts and index, in the proportion of three copies to each Municipality in "Upper Canada, and one copy to each Member of the Legislative Council and " Assembly."

To these Bills the Royal Assent was severally pronounced by the Clerk of this House in the words following:

"In Her Majesty's name His Excellency the Governor General doth assent to this

Then the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery read the title of a Bill to be passed as follows:

"An Act to postpone, for a limited time, the issuing of Writs for the next Election of Members of the Legislative Council."

To this Bill the Clerk of this House by His Excellency's command did thereupon say:

"His Excellency the Governor General doth reserve this Bill for the signification of

"Her Majesty's pleasure thereon."

Then the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly addressed His Excellency as follows:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

Immediately upon the opening of the present Session, the attention of the Legislature was directed by Your Excellency to the outrages which had been committed upon the soil of Canada by a lawless band of marauders who had crossed the frontier at various points from the neighboring States, and assailed the lives and property of our peaceable citizens.

The formidable aspect of the invasion had compelled Your Excellency, by the advice of Your Ministers, to call out for active service a large portion of the Volunteer Militia Force of the Province, and to incur considerable expense in defending the frontier from aggression. No sooner had we returned from Your Excellency's presence than, with an alacrity and unanimity unprecedented in the history of Parliament, Bills were passed

through all their stages conferring upon Your Excellency the necessary powers for dealing summarily with all those misguided persons who had been or might be hereafter concerned in the senseless movement which is known by the name of "Fenianism," and empowering the Government to act with the utmost promptitude in the maintenance of law and order throughout the land.

It is a subject of sincere congratulation and thankfulness that the loyalty, vigor and foresight which were displayed by the Legislature upon that occasion—and which met with a hearty response and approval from the public at large—have been instrumental in allaying popular excitement, restoring confidence to the community, and frustrating the machinations of the Queen's enemies in their evil designs against Her Majesty's Colonics

on this Continent.

In view of the approaching change in the political condition of British North America, our attention has been seriously directed to the formation of the Local Governments of Upper and Lower Canada, to be connected hereafter by a Federated Union with the Maritime Provinces. Resolutions embodying the opinions of the Legislature upon this momentous question have been matured, agreed upon, and transmitted to Your Excellency

to be forwarded for the consideration of the Imperial Government.

The gradual but decided change of public opinion in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, on behalf of a closer alliance with Canada, the favor with which the scheme of Confederation has been received by the most eminent statesmen in the Mother Country, and the cordial satisfaction evinced throughout these Provinces at the prospect of political union with those who are already so nearly connected with us by ties of interest and friendly intercourse, agree in encouraging the hope that we are about to enter upon a new era, wherein, by the favor and blessing of Almighty God, the British Colonies in North America will become a great, powerful and wealthy nation, cleaving the closer to the Parent State, because of the freedom we enjoy under the beneficent rule of our beloved Oueen.

Notwithstanding the absorbing interest which has naturally attached to the grave constitutional questions connected with the safety, protection and future government of the Canadas, the attention of Parliament has been directed to various other measures of minor importance for the improvement of our municipal system, the tostering of native industry, and the general advancement of our material prosperity. The Code of Civil Procedure for Lower Canada has also received the approval of the Legislature, after mature consideration by a select committee of members of the legal profession from that section of the Province. The number of Bilis, both public and private, which have been just submitted for Your Excellency's sanction, will testify to the zeal and assiduity with which the Legislature has fulfilled its responsible duties during the present Session.

I have now the honor to present for Your Excellency's acceptance a Bill intituled, "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for "defraying certain expenses of the Civil Government for the financial year ending "on the Thirtieth day of June, 1867, and for other purposes connected with the Public

'Scrvice."

The Speaker of the Legislative Assembly then delivered the said Money Bill to the Clerk of this House, who brought it to the Table, when the Clerk of the Crown in Chaucery read the title of the same as follows:

"An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying certain expenses of the Civil Government for the financial year ending on the thirtieth "June, 1867, and for other purposes connected with the Public Service."

To this Bill the Clerk of this House by His Excellency's command did thereupon say:

"In Her Majesty's name His Excellency the Governor General thanks Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."

Then His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to deliver the following Speech:

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I have much pleasure in releasing you from further attendance in Parliament, and I observe with satisfaction the large amount of important business, both public and private,

which you have transacted during the Session.

The completion of the Code of Civil Procedure in Lower Canada, is a permanent memorial of the ability and industry of those who devised and carried the project into execution, and cannot fail to be highly advantageous to those who live within that portion of the Province.

By the Acts for amending the Laws relating to Municipal Institutions, and improving the mode of Assessment in Upper Canada, the Municipal system of that Province,

already admirable, will be further consolidated and improved.

It must be a source of satisfaction to you to feel that the credit of the Province will be strengthened, and her commercial operations will be extended by the changes which have been made in the duties on imports and other financial alterations, tending to reduce the cost of living in Canada.

We may confidently expect that the effect of the tariff which you have adopted will be to provide for the public wants without opening new sources of taxation, and to increase the available resources of the country by enlarging the markets for the industry of the

people

The establishment of Telegraphic connection between the portions of the dominions of our Queen situated on opposite sides of the Atlantic Ocean, has been hailed in Canada with feelings of the utmost satisfaction. The success of this great undertaking cannot fail to advance the progress of civilization, to extend the operations of trade, and thereby to promote the peace and prosperity of the world at large.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I thank you for the liberal provision you have made for the Public Service for the current year.

It shall be my object, and that of my advisers, to administer your grants so as to

secure at once economy and efficiency.

I am particularly gratified that you have enabled me to make provision for those who have suffered by the loss of relations, or have been wounded during the late attack on the Province.

This act is a just tribute on your part to the patriotism of the men upon whom devolves the defence of the Province, and will prove to the survivors that they do not serve an un-

generous or ungrateful Country.

The votes for purposes of Public Desence are on a scale which will enable the Government to improve the efficiency of the Volunteers in armament, equipment and drill, and no exertious shall be wanting to apply your grants with effect in each of these particulars.

Honorable Gentlemen and Gentlemen:

I rejoice that you have completed your part of the plan for the Union of the Colonies of *British North America*, and I shall not fail to transmit to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, for presentation to Her Majesty, your Address on this subject.

In bringing to a close the last Session likely to be held under the Act for the Union of the two Canadas, I congratulate the Parliament which that law called into existence on the retrospect afforded by the events of the last quarter of a century in this Province.

You can mark during that period the firm consolidation of your institutions, both political and municipal, the extended settlement of your country, the development of your internal resources and foreign trade, the improvement and simplification of your laws, and above all the education which the adoption of the system of responsible government has afforded to your statesmen in the well-tried ways of the British Constitution.

The same principles, the application of which has been attended with so much advan

tage in the smaller Union, will be the guide of your course in the larger sphere of action on which you are now about to enter, and I fervently pray that the blessings which you have hitherto enjoyed may be given in larger measure to that new nationality of which you will form a part and the dimensions of which will entitle it to a high place amongst the Powers of the world.

Then the Honorable the Speaker of this House said :-

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

It is His Excellency the Governor General's will and pleasure that this Provincial Parliament be prorogued until Monday, the Twenty-fourth day of September next, to be here holden, and this Provincial Parliament is accordingly prorogued until Monday, the Twenty-fourth day of September next.
