It is the custom, when a man wishes to be free when the seals are being discharged, for that man to pay another to do the work for him. I paid a man to do my work, and it is nobody's business but my own. There are many laborers in St. John's who would be glad to see every man pay another to discharge the seals.

In conclusion, I would say, that I do not have to go about begging men to recommend me, as Tuff does, and as his master, Captain Kean, does. It looks now as if the latter gentleman has induced Tuff to come out in his behalf, and other weak-kneed ones as well.




