A National Bar-room.

Twelve years ago, before the great political overturn of 1896, several members of the Commons were reported to have indulged discredibly at the bar during some of the all night sittings of the House. The Liberal Government came into power, with the help of temperance people who were attracted by the promise of a plebiscite on the liquor traffic, and the implied promise of subsequent legislation.

At one of the first sessions of the new House, Mr. Speaker announced that the internal committee of the Commons had passed a resolution closing the bar of the House of Commons, "to take effect at once." This action was applauded, not only in Canada but in the United States and Great Britain. Doubtless this approval was deserved at the time, for a new broom sweeps clean, and the besom of the Liberal party was at that time making short work of many ancient and privileged abuses.

But this reform does not seem to have been permanent, if we are rightly informed by a letter read by the Rev. H. R. Grant, Secretary of the Nova Scotia Temperance Alliance, at a Camp Meeting held recently at Berwick. This letter from Mr. W. R. Goldie, of Truro, stated that hearing of the bar was open the writer had personally investigated the matter last February. He had found it in full operation. Men, whom he assumed to be members and their friends, were drinking, many bottles, plainly labelled, were on the shelves, and there was a man behind the counter supplying orders. He had no difficulty in gaining access to the bar. He was also informed upon credible authority that the House of Commons' bar was open for business on Sundays as well as on weekdays.

Upon further investigation he was informed that the bar was conducted by one Samuel Cassidy. He secured copies of the Auditor-General's report for the years 1902-1907 inclusive, and found that Samuel Cassidy was in receipt of a salary for seasonal services. In the report of 1907 the item read: "S. Cassidy, 157 days, at \$2.75, \$431.75," suggesting the fact that the business of Canada were taxed \$2.75 per day during the sessions of parliament for the payment of a man who has the monopoly of the bar which was closed in 1902. Mr. Goldie did not find any direct account of rental for the bar for the said bar, or of rental for profits received from the sales. He was informed that the profits went to the man who conducted this administrative department, which along with \$2.75 per day of public money would give him a very fair revenue for doing the heads of Canadian legislators.

After visiting the bar Mr. Goldie denounced it in several public meetings, and protests were forwarded to Ottawa from many quarters. Soon after this he noticed the statement in several papers that the bar had been closed. On returning to Ottawa he found a man posted near the door of the bar. He was informed, was to keep the servants of the House from entering, but the masters were allowed to pass in and out at their pleasure and to take a friend with them. Servants, it was said, entered the bar by another route.

In the "Freedom of the Press" of July 15, 1908, Mr. Richard Blair referred to the bar. Mr. Pugsley asked:

Has the price of kerosene oil, corn-meal, flour, tobacco, sugar or any one of the necessities, so called, of life been reduced to the consumer? He promised to secure these, and we speak frankly when we say that he has not fulfilled his promise.

Neither is Laurier in anything but a pretence to do so. We do not believe that he ever intended so to do, it was promised to secure votes, he got them and will again. 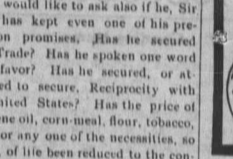
Argin, what has Sir Fred done to put down and make graft impossible?

Blanes did not Sir Fred, by his vote, prevent investigation? 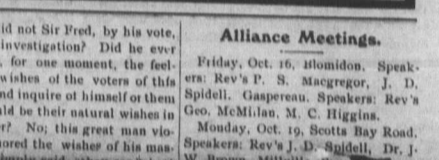

Editorial Notes.

The Western Chronicle professes great distress because of the participation of the clergymen in the present election campaign in this county. It makes a subtle threat that because of the action of the ministers the election may be voided. How about a cabinet minister attempting to buy a whole community with the promise of a post office? Does our contemporary fail to see the point?

Wolfville people will be glad to learn that we are to have a much improved light service in the near future. The Acadia Electric Light Co. has this week entered into a contract with the Canada General Electrical Co. for the installation of an up-to-date alternating current system, which will include new pole line and a new system of wiring. The apparatus will be the very best obtainable and the new system will be in operation by the middle of November.

The careful attention of our readers is directed to an article on the first

page of this paper, headed "A National Bar." This article is copied from the Montreal Daily Witness, which can never be charged with trying to make political capital out of the statement. The Witness, as everybody knows, is a strong Liberal journal—though always a fair one. Its remarks will be of special value in view of recent statements made at a public meeting here concerning the abolition of the bar in the House of Commons.

Notwithstanding the very disagreeable night there was a good attendance of towns people at the opening lecture of the College, which took place last Friday evening in Assembly Hall. The faculty and students of the different educational institutions were also present. Rev. J. W. Brown, Ph. D., of Gasperau, was the speaker, his subject being "Gnosticism." The address was a scholarly one, indicating deep research and careful preparation. At the close of the lecture the new members of the College faculty, Prof. W. A. Coit, R. E. Bates and H. G. Hartman, were introduced and made fitting remarks.

The Maritime Baptist.

The organ of the Baptist denomination of the Maritime Provinces says, "We have hope that the time may not be so very far away when the large body of honest and intelligent voters to be found in every constituency will refuse to be controlled by the party machines, when it will be imperatively demanded that the men put in nomination shall be in a high degree worthy of respect and support, when the man who is drunken or dishonest and the man who is known to have used the opportunities of public position to line his own pockets will no longer dare to ask for election to the Parliament of Canada."

Men addicted to drunkenness and dissolute habits, men shamelessly immoral in their lives, men whose great aim and effort in public life has been to triumph for their party rather than the welfare of the country, and men who are in politics purely for the sake of personal advantage, will no doubt be found in the coming Parliament, as such men have been in preceding Parliaments, and many votes of temperance men and Christian men, be manifest a persistent effort on the part of every Liberal-Conservative in this county with a many Liberals to run a clean election and support the reform candidate.

"Can this go on indefinitely? We hope not."

The Maritime Baptist, also quotes with approval from The Montreal Star as follows:

"Any man who sat in Parliament or its committees and openly obstructed enquiry into charges of wrongdoing or into suspicious accounts, should be removed from the path of the light. This country cannot afford to have a single member of Parliament who will sell his mandate for a private profit. It cannot afford to have a member of Parliament, who will use a position of trust for his own enrichment. It cannot afford to have a member of Parliament who will constitute himself a defender of 'grafters' and a bulwark of equities. It cannot afford to have men in public life of notorious evil character. Yet it is clear that we cannot depend upon the parties to purge themselves. They are led in their professions, but their 'machinery' appears to be in the very grasp of men who hold their professions and will set the best intentions at naught. These latter secure the nominations and stand forth as the standard-bearers of purity, honesty and integrity. This is more than faria; it is perilous to the public welfare. It teaches the rising generation that character does not count. It instills into our young men the lesson that the proper way to get on in life is to profess the highest principles for the getting of the simple and then to utterly ignore them in practice, that they may line their own pockets. To what end their teaching will lead, must be all too plain."

The cure now lies with the electors. They must purge Parliament. They must demand the men who have shown themselves unworthy of trust. They must not let their previous parties, in this policy, if followed everywhere, will be the cause of the ruin of the better Parliament of justice than the Parliament of men who have been tried and found wanting. And we say, best be it.

The Candidates.

DEAR SIR,—The campaign now in progress and which will terminate on the 26th of this month is not merely a contest between the two great parties of this country, but a contest for the principles of righteousness on the one hand and the upholding of wrongdoing on the other.

The present representative of the county of Kings and the reform candidate are characters of distinct and opposite types. The former has since his youth up been the subject of many scandals, and his political life has left a slimy trail of 'vain tricks and dark ways.' If elected and the government is sustained he will go back to be an abettor and conspirator with the grafters and continue the practice of irregular and questionable methods with doubtless greater degree.
