Guelph Council, C. O. C. F., meets this evening.

**Regular meeting of Progress Lodge, I. O. O. F., this evening.**

The members of the County Council are visiting the hospitals this afternoon.

At the meeting of the County Council this morning Mr. Kirkwood, M. P., occupied a seat beside the warden.

Remember the fancy dress carnival at the rink to-morrow night. The ice will be reserved for those in costumes until 9 o'clock.

Several complaints have been made to the police about parties throwing ashes on the streets, and a citizen will be up to-morrow charged with this offence.

Mr. and Mrs. M. S. Foley, of Montreal, were in the city Wednesday on a visit to Mr. Foley's mother, preparing to set out for a trip to Cuba and their orange groves in Florida.

Bishop Hawkins, the elderly colored divine who is well known throughout the Dominion, delivered a lecture in the B. M. E. church Wednesday night.

Mr. H. E. Gilbert, superintendent of the poultry department of the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, arrived in the city this morning and will read a paper at the 12th annual meeting of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union, which is in progress at the Ontario Agricultural College.

The many friends in this city of Dr. and Mrs. Kennedy (nee Miss Anna Doran) will be sorry to learn of the death of their infant son, which occurred at their home in Pheleston, this morning. The remains will be brought to this city and the funeral will take place from the residence of Mrs. Kennedy, Glasgow street, on Saturday morning, at 10 o'clock.

The Rev. Gabriel Johnston, of Milland, Ont., who gave a most interesting lecture here a short time ago, will deliver a lecture next Wednesday evening in St. George's school room, on his experience in the civil war between the Northern and Southern States. The Bible Association are getting up an excellent series of programmes as well, so everyone can expect a thoroughly enjoyable evening.

AN ACCIDENT.—What came very near being a fatal accident occurred at Goldie's mill this morning. Harry Paisie, a man well up in years, was ascending one from the main shaft which they have for conveying coal from the train to the coal house, when it fell against the wall, breaking three ribs. The ambulance was at once sent for and the injured man was taken to the General Hospital.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT.—While skating on the Ontario road on Wednesday, Frank, the 6-year-old son of Mr. John Scott, met with a painful accident. It appears that he was skating down the hill, when he struck a stone and fell against a sharp piece of iron, inflicting a severe gash just below the knee. The little sufferer was at once taken home and a doctor summoned, who put six stitches in the wound. To-day he is getting along nicely.

**EXCITING RUNAWAY.**  
A Valuable Horse Breaks its Leg and Has to be Shot.

An exciting runaway occurred on Arthur street on Wednesday afternoon when a valuable horse broke its leg.

It appears that Mr. H. E. Anderson, of the Dominion Bank, was driving a merry load of young people around the city. On reaching Mrs. Hall's residence in Arthur street, a short call was made. Then the horses were again started off.

When in front of Mr. Wm. Morris' house the sleigh collided with a tree and was broken, the horses only carrying away the tongue and front bows. They continued to run till they reached Dyson's harness shop and then turned around and dashed into a trench between the sidewalk and fence.

Several men hurried to the scene and attempted to extricate the animals. But this proved quite a task, the box drain having the first taken up. When the animals got out it was found that one of them had broken its leg. It was assisted to the Wellington livery and a veterinary surgeon was called.

It was, however, unable to do anything in the matter and the horse was shot.

The team was owned by the Wellington livery and the animal which was destroyed was a valuable one.

Another Runaway.  
A runaway occurred on the Market square on Wednesday evening, when a farmer and his wife had an unpleasant experience.

It appears that a number of boys were coasting on the Northumberland street hill when their sled ran into a farmer's rig. The horse became frightened and started off at a break neck pace.

In turning around in front of the Queen's hotel, the occupants of the cutter were thrown out, but fortunately escaped without any injury.

The coasters did not, however, come off so fortunate, as Charlie, a young son of Mr. Charles Dempsey, received a severe cut in the back of the head, besides several bruises.

A reporter called at this gentleman's store this morning and learned that the injured boy was getting along very favorably. He was also informed at this place that the farmer's name was Joseph Brubaker, of Guelph township.

TRY ASKED FOR MORE.  
The Government Will Consider the Request of the Agriculturists.

TORONTO, Jan. 28.—A deputation from the Provincial Electoral and Agricultural Societies waited on the Minister of Agriculture at the legislative buildings yesterday for the purpose of presenting a petition for an increase of \$200 in the Government grant to the 490 electoral societies in the province.

Mr. Dryden met the deputation in the library Messrs. Hardy, Harcourt and Gibson were also present.

Mr. McLennan, M. L. A., introduced the visitors and the ministers listened to addresses from Messrs. J. T. Murphy, Norfolk; A. A. Wright, Beaufort; E. Jackson, of St. George; Walker, Kingston; and Judge Mosgrove, Ottawa.

**County Council.**  
Messrs. Mutrie and Hobson moved the adoption of the report of the special committee appointed to strike the standing committee.

Messrs. Smith and Fletcher moved in amendment that the name of Mr. McNab be struck off the House of Industry committee, and that Mr. Nicholl be substituted.

Messrs. Marshall and Ransom moved that the names of Messrs. Nicholl and Mutrie be added, and the by-law amended to make the committee 5 instead of 3.

After some discussion the amendments were lost and the motion for the adoption of the report carried.

On motion of Messrs. Nicholl and Stewart, a by-law was introduced by-law No. 447, and to authorize the county treasurer to prepare a list of lands three years and over in arrears for taxes and to proceed to collect the same according to law.

The by-law was read a first and second time.

From the secretary of the South-Wellington Farmers' Institute, asking for the usual grant of \$25.—Referred to Finance.

From the treasurer of the Prisoners' Aid Association, asking for a grant.—Referred to Finance.

From R. Doyle, ex-rev. of Arthur, in reference to a commission in connection with county roads.—Referred to County Roads.

From the county of Oxford, asking this council to lend their co-operation in repealing Sec. 30, Chap. 56, Ontario Statutes, 1890.—Referred to Legislation.

From the county of Grey, with a petition to the Lieut.-Governor of Ontario, that the existing school laws be amended so as to abolish union High and Public School Boards.—Referred to Legislation.

From the council of the county of Elgin, asking co-operation in petitioning the House of Commons to pass such legislation that all cattle exported from the Dominion will be allowed the full space of two feet between the sides of the pens, whether classed as stockers or otherwise.—Referred to Legislation.

Several accounts were presented and referred.

**HOUSE OF INDUSTRY.**  
Dr. GROVES, surgeon of the House of Industry, presented his tenth report. The report says: The fact that the death rate is so low is ample proof that the inmates of this institution are being carefully tended by those in charge of them.

Then followed a list giving the names, ages, dates, and cause of death in each instance. There were eight deaths, the ages being 91, 83, 81, 77, 73, 37, and 45. The report in conclusion says: "The proposed new hospital wing will fill a need long felt, and will go far to realize what I imagine is the fundamental idea of the House of Industry—that is, that it is a refuge not for the healthy alone, but also for those who are sick and homeless."

In conclusion I may add that I have endeavored to carry out your instructions in the matter, trusting that what I have done will meet with your approval.

**COUNTY RE JAMES MASSIE.**  
EX-WARDEN Mutrie received the following: That as instructed by the council at the late session in December, I wrote to the Hon. Oliver Mowat, Attorney General, calling his attention to the action of James Massie, Esq., in paying off the South riding in reference to the long standing claim due by him to this county. I sent him a full history of the case from the time Mr. Massie's name was appointed warden, also copies of letters I received from Mr. Massie when corresponding with him on the matter. In conclusion I may add that I have endeavored to carry out your instructions in the matter, trusting that what I have done will meet with your approval.

Mr. Mutrie read the following letter in reply from Mr. J. R. Cartwright, dated Toronto, Jan. 18th: "I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of yours of the 12th inst., with reference to the delay of Jas. Massie in paying off the South riding in reference to the long standing claim due by him to this county. I am glad to say that the same will receive consideration."

Moved by Dr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. Scott, that the report of the late warden on Mr. Massie's case be received and printed in the minutes, along with the reply of the Attorney General.—Carried.

**ASSESSMENT ACT.**  
Moved by Messrs. Scott and McGowan, that the warden and clerk petition the Local Legislature to so amend the Assessment Act that township councils may pass by-laws to extend or continue the same assessment over a period not exceeding five years.—Lost.

A report was read from Mr. James Mays, chairman of the Board of Directors of St. Joseph's Hospital and House of Providence of the township of Guelph, presenting the financial and statistical statements of these institutions for the year ending 30th Sept. last, and a supplementary report to the end of the year. The report went to say: We trust that in the perusal of them, you will see that the Sisters, with their untiring zeal and energy, have done an immense amount of good considering the small amount of money at their disposal.

We invite your honorable council to visit these institutions. Please name a time convenient to you and conveyances will be in readiness. We take this opportunity of again thanking you for the grants bestowed in former years and pray that in your charity and generosity you will make as liberal a grant as possible to the institutions.

INNOCENT POLITICIANS.

There's something funny in the Quebec scandal, remarks the Toronto World. Take Mr. Laurier: He always went out of the room when Pagan, Mercier, Geoffrion and others got down to serious business—that is, going into committee of finance for election purposes. So that he would be free to get up and declare that he knew nothing of any corruption fund and accordingly he is quite shocked when he hears of Mercier's misdeeds. And then there is Mercier himself: He gives his brother checks signed in blank, and when the money is bagged out of the Provincial treasury by way of Langlais, the stationary contractor, and deposited to Premier Mercier's credit, the wicked brother checks it out with the aforesaid blank checks and hands it over to Geoffrion, treasurer of the corruption fund; and so Honora, like Mercier, can call heaven to witness that he knew nothing of the boodle. "You sign the check, we do the rest," is the cry of Mercier's brother.

What a farce on both Laurier's and Mercier's part! Laurier is a fool if he didn't know it, and if Wilfrid Laurier did not know what kind of men he was in association with, and to whom he had given a public pledge that Quebec was to be allowed to raid the Federal treasury if the Liberals succeeded in carrying the Federal elections, then he is the last man in the world to whom the destinies of this country should be entrusted. He lacks the first qualifications of a politician—he is no judge of men. No, Mr. Laurier, that excuse doesn't go on all fours with the Globe's description of you as a heaven-born statesman. By your confession you ask people to write you down as a weak young platitudinarian, a sort of curate in whose mouth butter won't melt.

So ridiculous is the end to which it all comes that La Patrie, the recognized Liberal organ of Montreal, throws up the whole pretence and gives this explanation of the transaction of which Mercier says he is innocent and Laurier is perfectly guiltless:

"The said \$25,000 were touched by Mr. J. A. Mercier with the blank checks of his brother, and were given to Mr. C. A. Geoffrion, who, with this amount coming from a Provincial source, had masses paid for the souls in purgatory. If some readers are satisfied with this explanation we must admit that they are very hard to please."

Mr. Laurier may still protest his innocence; if he does, we must advertise his veracity, his incapacity, his utter lack of knowledge of the men who have been his confidantes for years. He can choose which he likes, but he stands condemned equally with Mercier, who robbed the province that he had sworn to govern and protect in order to put his chief (Laurier) in power at Ottawa.

MRS. FOSTER DYING.

The Wife of the Minister of Finance at the Point of Death.

OTTAWA, Jan. 28.—Mrs. Foster, wife of the Hon. George Foster, is not expected to survive till daylight.

Died of a Broken Heart.

CHATHAM, Jan. 27.—Further particulars in the case of the sudden death of Mrs. John Weeks, wife of a colored laborer, Burke street, North Chatham, show that the woman literally died of a broken heart, the result of heavy and continuous work. PRESTON WAS SQUELCHED.

Hon. John Haggart Disposes of the Organizer.

KINGSTON, Jan. 27.—The street in front of the city hall was blocked this evening before 7 o'clock with crowds of electors anxious to hear the meeting between Hon. Mr. Haggart and W. T. A. Preston. In 15 minutes all the doors were opened every seat in the hall was filled with members of both parties and great excitement prevailed. Mr. John McIntyre, president of the Conservative Association, presided. He announced that Mr. Preston would be given half an hour to make his charges against Mr. Haggart. The latter would be allowed to reply, and then Mr. Preston would be given another turn. The latter started off and went over Mr. Lister's charges concerning section B, and claimed that before it all scandals yet disclosed had been referred to Parliament by the Hon. Mr. Lister as Mr. Haggart's accomplice, and said his affidavit that Haggart had no beneficiary interest in that contract amounted to nothing. It was an outrage on British justice for Parliament to refuse an investigation into the charge made by Mr. Lister.

MR. HAGGART'S REPLY.

Hon. Mr. Haggart replied, at the outset alluding to charges people were making against him in different parts of the country, and expressing great pleasure at securing an opportunity to deny the charges before the face of the person who made them. He pointed out that during the session, and a day before its prorogation, Mr. Lister brought on the old charge and asked for a committee to investigate. Other investigations had taken place over weeks and months, and the members found it would be absurd to start another, which might protract the session weeks longer. He wished for an investigation, and stated so to several members, but they would not listen to the suggestion. After again saying that there was one particle of truth in the charge, and stating that any man who said he was giving money for corrupt purposes told an untruth, he quietly, and during the session, and a day before its prorogation, Mr. Lister brought on the old charge and asked for a committee to investigate.

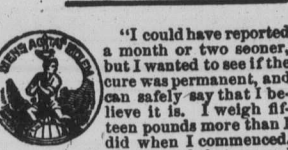

With the conviction that I made a grave mistake in speaking as I did in the excitement of the moment without facts, and now possessing knowledge which proves my statements untrue, I most humbly apologise to all persons attacked in that speech for misrepresenting them, and ask their forgiveness."

And Sir Richard Cartwright Gives the Globe Editor Instructions. MONTREAL, Jan. 27.—Edward Farrer of the Toronto Globe, arrived here to-night from Kingston and proceeded to the Windsor hotel, where he met Sir Richard Cartwright, who is also here. Both afterwards had a long conference with Mr. Laurier, the Liberal leader, when the attitude that the Liberal leaders should assume towards Mr. Mercer was fully discussed. The conference is expected to result in an important declaration from Mr. Laurier, who will commence a tour through Ontario next week.

Telegraphic Summary. The prevalence of gripe is frightening away fashionable people from Brighton and other health resorts in England. The prevalence of influenza will prevent the full numbers of the House of Commons from assembling for some weeks to come.

Mr. Arthur Boyle, of Dunnville, was Wednesday nominated by the Liberal-Conservatives of the County of Monk to contest the seat at the coming by-election. The increased mortality in England resulting from the epidemic of influenza has created a large demand for mourning goods, and many crape manufactories are in operation night and day.

The nominations for a Federal member for Soulanges county, Quebec, took place Wednesday at Catons Landing. Messrs. J.W. Bain and Dr. J.O. Moussau were nominated for the Conservatives and Liberals respectively.

The danger of war between the United States and Chili is over, as the latter country has made ample apology for the Baltimore incident, and will submit to the United States Supreme Court as to the amount of indemnity to be accorded.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 27.—A meeting of the council of the Grain Exchange was held this afternoon, when it was decided to ask the various railways in Manitoba to carry seed grain next spring free of charge.
