The land question, which was tho oughly threshed out during the last elections in Alberta and Saskatche wan, has again in default of any :eal issue-been revived by Mr. Hau' tain in Saskatchewan.

In his address at Regina opening the campaign he evolved a grievance from the fact that Saskatchewan, I lieu of the public lands administers by the Federal Government, is to receive in perpetuity an annual cash grant which is now close on to \$500,-000, and which will increase with the population until on a provincial census of 1,200,000 the grant will become \$1,125,000 , remaining at that yearly thercafter.

In the elections of 1905 the school question was made a storm centre by the Conservative party. The West was viguely represented as a Land of Promise over whose future some dire misfortune impended because of some pernicious school system planned to destroy the national life of the country. They found, however, that the Western public was too clear-headed to be talked into believing themselves

The dairy and cold storage branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture has issued a bulletin giving the results made by cow testing associations. The bulletin says:

At Ste. Emelie, Que., in June, 142 cows gave an average yield of 546 lbs. milk, 3.8 test, 20.8 lbs. fat. The best herd average was 631 lbs. milk, 3.8 test, 24.3 lbs. fat. The highest yield of any one cow was 1930 lbs. making testing 3.5. The poorest herd was one of 13 cows that averaged only 392 lbs. milk and 16 lbs. fat. If the 13 cows in this herd had given only enough milk extra to bring them up to the average yield of all the 142 cows in the association they would have given enough milk in the month to make an extra 182 pounds of cheese given enough milk in the month to make an extra 182 pounds of cheese worth \$20.00.
