A FACER FOR THE CONSERVATIVES

Announcement of Preliminary Work on H. B. Railway Strikes Campaign

Regina, Sask., Aug. 11.—The Hudson Bay railway question has become so closely linked up with the Saskatchewan election campaign that almost the sole topic of discussion here today was the announcement from Ottawa that 100 surveyors will be sent out next week by the Dominion government to locate the route of the Bay line.

Admits Its Telling Effect. Even the Haultain supporters now admit that the pronouncement for the commencement of construction of the line will not be heavily in favor of the Conservatives on Friday's voting and the Conservatives are openly regretting the policy adopted by Mr. Haultain on the Hudson Bay railway question.
