Abusing Privileges.

There is a certain class of people in this world who are regularly given to abusing their privileges. Sometimes their conduct results in the privileges being withdrawn and withdrawn unfortunately, not only from them, but also from those who used their privileges rightly; sometimes it merely causes infinite trouble and difficulty to someone.

One of the department stores in my home city has always been remarkable for the courtesy which it has shown in the matter of exchanges. Anything within reason—and sometimes much more than that—this firm would do. Recently, I heard someone say, "So-and-So & Co. are not so good about exchanging things as they used to be." If that statement is true, there is a good reason for the change. For, again and again, I have known of the courtesy of that firm being abused. I know one woman who bought a green silk lamp shade, used it six months, and then actually exchanged it. If the privileges of exchange are curtailed by So-and-So & Co., I think the woman who took back that green lamp shade will be partly to blame.

As I waited for my white gloves at the glove cleaning counter the other day, I heard one clerk say wearily to another, "I've just had two more lost checks reported. Seems as if there wasn't anything but lost checks lately. If those slips meant as much trouble to them as it does to us, there wouldn't be so much carelessness. I can tell you." There was another case of abused privileges. This time it did not result in the privilege being taken away, because that would be practically impossible; it simply meant infinite trouble for someone.

Again many stores are very liberal in their delivery privileges. At some shops in the larger cities, even the least expensive purchase may be sent free of charge. But there is such a thing as using this privilege reasonably and stopping there. To be sure, you have a RIGHT to send even the little parcel which you could easily slip into your hand bag, but the idea of the system is merely to relieve the customer of cumbersome packages, and when you oblige the expressman to make a special trip to your house to bring a toothbrush or three pairs of stockings, you are grossly abusing your privilege.

There is reason in all things. Just because the shop grants you these privileges as a matter of business, does not justify you in abusing them. Decent people have some sense of honour and decency in business dealings as well as personal relations. Besides, there is a human element in everything. You have an idea that it is only the firm which suffers when you abuse one of its privileges. Nine times out of ten some individual is also affected. Witness the incident of the white gloves.

Household Notes.

While it is advisable to pack a water bag flat, occasionally there is necessity for rolling it. If so, it is well to lay a piece of cloth or paper over the bag first, then there will be no possible danger of the sides of the bag sticking together.

To use cold halibut or other white fish remove the bones and flake it and arrange it in layers in bread crumbs and seasoning in a buttered baking dish. Cover the top with buttered crumbs, turn in hot milk to moisten sufficiently, sprinkle grated cheese over and bake.

Cases of scissors, containing three, four or five pairs of scissors of assorted sizes, make an acceptable gift as any woman can wish. Some of these cases are quite handsomely ornamented with silver, a monogram being added sometimes to give a distinctive and personal touch.

When prunes are to be stuffed it is well to select large ones and soak them over night. Then cook them ever so little. Drain and let them dry before stuffing. A mixture of chopped nuts and figs makes a delicious filling for this fruit. After stuffing the prunes should be rolled in confectioner's sugar.

To break up a cold fill the bathtub half full of warm water. Get in and turn in more hot water until the limit of endurance is reached. Then go immediately to bed, lying between blankets and piling on much cover. If a glass of hot lemonade is taken it will help the opening of the pores and the necessary perspiration.

English molasses pudding is made of one cupful of chopped raisins three-quarters of a cupful of molasses, a teaspoonful of soda beaten into the molasses, three tablespoonfuls of melted butter, one egg, one and one-half cupfuls of flour and one and one-half cupfuls of sweet milk. Steam for one hour in the oven.

To make a good milk sherbet, take one quart of milk, one pint of sugar, the juice of three lemons, the rind of one and the white of one egg. Dissolve the sugar in the milk and put into the freezer. Turn the handle quickly until the mixture thickens. Then add the whipped white of an egg, the lemon juice and rind and freeze hard.

To make celery slightly and crisp cut white tender stalks into two-inch lengths and score the pieces lengthwise about half an inch from each end until both ends are fringed. Drop them into a pan of ice water in which a slice of lemon is soaking, and let them stand for an hour before serving. Dry thoroughly before putting on the table.

Raisins will make a delightful beverage. Take one pound, seeded, two pounds loaf sugar, three lemons and two gallons of boiling water. Cut the thin yellow peel from the lemons, cover it with boiling water, and when the water has cooled add the juice of the lemons and the raisins and sugar. After it has stood for several days, strain through a jelly bag and bottle. It is then ready for use.

A receipt for sugar cookies is as follows: Four even teaspoonfuls of flour, one even teaspoonful of soda, two even teaspoonfuls of cream of tartar, one heaping coffee-cupful of butter, two teaspoonfuls of sugar and milk enough to make a pastry. Mix the flour,

The toastmaster is the owner of a full dress suit who is used at a lodge banquet as a substitute for humor. The Premier Sir Edward Morris denies the statement published in the New York Post in a message from its London correspondent, that in arranging for the flotation of the 1912 loan he had to increase the underwriting commission from 1 to 1 1/2 per cent.

The Premier's denial is much too ambiguous. It is much too diffuse and too little definite. It runs thus: "We have the authority of the Premier for saying that the terms for floating the loan of 1912 are exactly the same as those for the loan of 1910."

It follows, therefore that the terms of flotation were not exactly the same for the two loans. If, however, the Premier's denial relates solely to the commission, the same criticism is applicable.

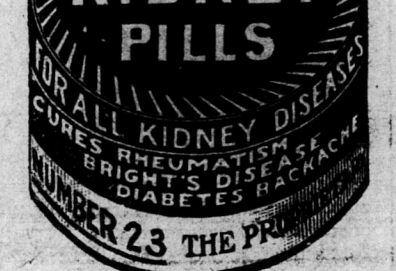

Class Discrimination.

Editor Evening Telegram.
 Dear Sir,—In his letter to the Evening Chronicle of the 12th inst., Doctor Grant labours hard to prove a point against your correspondent re the treatment of second class passengers at Port aux Basques in general and George Cosser in particular. The learned doctor, however, much against the grain has to admit the accuracy of the details as already published, and does not even attempt to disprove one of our statements. The facts of the Cosser case were given as they occurred and neither Doctor Grant nor anyone else can draw a red herring across the trail by taking grandiloquently of their own superior knowledge of how these matters are managed outside of Newfoundland. It was asserted by your correspondent that the Government repudiated liability for cost in the Cosser case. Dr. Grant admits that the procedure involved no cost on the Government. Thee who paid the expenses? Will the Dr. be good enough to inform us if he was sufficiently philanthropic to pay Cosser's board for 2 days and the wages of the watchman who shadowed him for the same period? and will he while he is about it explain why he found 48 hours detention of Cosser long enough to prove that he was not infected with any contagious disease? Surely the doctor is asking a too credible public a bit too much. And it might also be up to Dr. Grant to explain why he thinks Port aux Basques the only door through which infectious diseases might be brought.
 Why is it that similar regulations are not adopted and enforced at all other ports of entry in Newfoundland. At St. John's, for instance, numerous passengers are arriving by steamers from Canadian and United States ports, and they are not all first class passengers either. Are the second class travellers compelled to submit to vaccination there while the first are exempted? What is law for one port should be equally law for another.
 Dr. Grant alleges that there is not the slightest discrimination whatever by Port aux Basques. Now, Doctor, aren't you pitching it strong when you ask us to swallow this. If second class passengers are obliged to submit to vaccination when first class ticket holders may pass without, isn't this discrimination and class legislation? You admit that Cosser was allowed to go home without being vaccinated, because you have to admit it. Had he allowed himself to be ejected you would have scratched him, but he was just a little too smart for you.
 And in conclusion, Dr., the world sorehead is one with which you were very familiar a few years ago. You know the breed. Make your hay while the sun shines.

Was Almost Drowned.

Man Dragged Overboard from Dock—So Long Under Water That Jiggers Were Used—Restored to Consciousness After Two Hours' Work.

Thos. Connors, one of the workmen at the floating dock, South Side, had a narrow escape from death yesterday afternoon. While the dock was sunk to take in a vessel, the man became entangled in one of the heavy ropes connected with the chocks and was dragged overboard and went to bottom with it. Intense excitement prevailed, as he went in 18 feet of water, and not resurfacing for five minutes, he was given up as lost. Jiggers were procured and the men were dragging the bottom for him when some of them pulled up on the rope and the unfortunate came up on it feet foremost. He was to all appearances lifeless, but foreman P. Murphy and others rolled him on a barrel and after getting the water out of him resorted to artificial respiration. After two hours of what appeared to be fruitless effort, it was noticed that the body was becoming warm and that there were evidences of respiration, and continuing to work on him the man came to. He was then driven home and a doctor called, and was very ill last night. He had a narrow escape from drowning.

Policeman Dismissed.

Yesterday afternoon Constable Carnell, who is only a few months in the police force, arrested a drunk opposite the Post Office and tumbled him into a cab. The prisoner jumped out at the other side, when the officer becoming excited struck him and also kicked him, then permitting him to go away. When the man jumped from the cab he fell heavily and cut his head. Indignant citizens present denounced his conduct and Sgt. Savage took a report of the affair. A few days ago the officer gave notice of his resignation, but on getting the facts today J. G. Sullivan summarily dismissed him.

Broke His Leg.

While coming down over Buckmaster's field last night a resident of the higher levels tripped in a hole in the meadow and broke his left leg at the ankle. He was found lying on the ground crying with pain by a boy named Dooly, who ran to the stand, secured a cab and drove him home. A phone message from Mr. Jesse Whiteway's residence brought Dr. Cowperthwaite, who set the limb, after which Const. Nugent summoned the ambulance and he was taken to hospital.

Left With Trout Fry.

Mr. M. Murray, warden of Murray's Pond hatchery, left here a few days ago for Carbonara bringing along a considerable quantity of rainbow trout fry. Mr. Murray placed them in charge of two residents, who had gone to the trouble of preparing ideal spots for their distribution. A communication recently received stated that the fry were progressing splendidly.

On Game Protection.

Mr. Joseph Pennell, Supervisor of Fishery Wards, has just completed an extensive trip to Pistolet Bay, around Cape Norman, for the Game and Inland Fisheries Board. He went from Bonne Bay to Pistolet Bay in a dory accompanied by one man, accomplishing this lonely journey in a fortnight. Mr. Pennell has visited every river on the whole of that part of the coast and is bringing back complete reports.

PATIENTS FOR HOSPITAL.—Miss Johanna Kenny, of Fermeuse; Mrs. J. Grace, of Placentia; and John O'Leary, of Deer Hr., T.B., all very ill, were taken to Hospital today by Mr. Ell Whiteway.

BRUCE'S PASSENGERS.—The S.S. Bruce arrived at Port aux Basques at 6.30 a.m. today bringing Mrs. R. Anderson, Miss A. Anderson, R. Grogan, Miss M. Moore, Mrs. E. Poole, Mrs. E. J. Warren and S. H. Hamilton.

PECULIAR INCIDENT.—When the Sagona was coming from Labrador on Wednesday evening it was very foggy. The ship was surrounded by thousands of birds known as stormy petrels. Hundreds of them alighted on the decks and rigging of the ship and some were captured by the crew.

SCARLET FEVER.—Two new cases were reported to the Health Authorities yesterday. The outbreak at Trepassey is being stamped out by Dr. Giovannetti, and within the past few days not a single new development occurred nor has there been any deaths reported.

WORKING UP CASE.—Last winter a firm in the West End found that there was a leakage of goods, &c., from their premises, and as the leakage could not be traced properly, private detectives were engaged to try and locate the parties who were acting crooked, but did not do so. 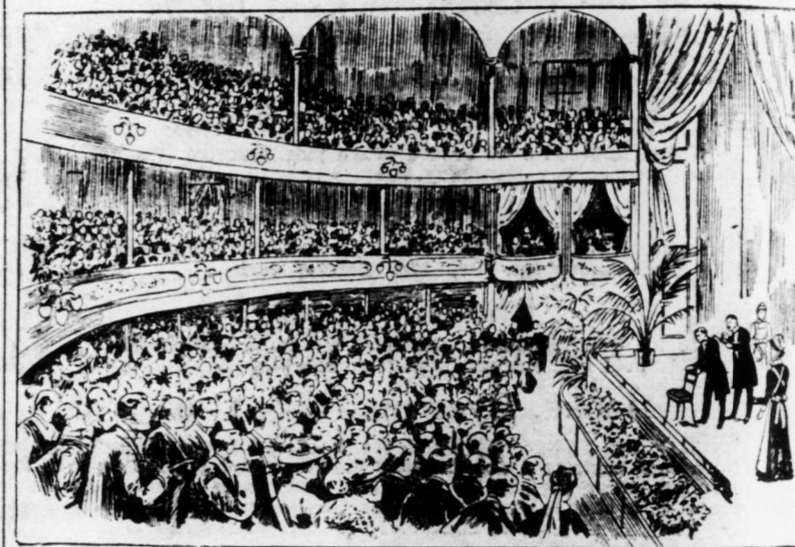

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, July 18. A circumstantial story of an attempt on the life of President Taft is being vigorously denied to-day by White House officials and Chief Wilkie of the Secret Service. It was said that a bomb, wrapped in a package, was received in the executive offices and placed upon the desk of Sherman Allen, one of the Assistant Secretaries at the White House, who has just been appointed Assistant Secretary to the Treasury. The package was intended for the President, him without first passing through a but correspondence never reaches secretary's hands, and Allen opened it. The report was that as he unwrapped the package he discovered an infernal machine, said it have been charged with dynamite, with a burning fuse, which Allen quickly extinguished with his hands.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 18. Canadian, Australian and African athletes at Stockholm, according to the Times correspondent, favour entering a single team from the whole Empire in future games, instead of entering the Colonies separately. "We have an analogy in the case of

the United States," adds the correspondent. "whose score points include Indians and Hawaiians." Conan Doyle, in a letter to the Times, strongly advocates the foregoing plan, and says: "I would go further and seek among the Ceylon or Malay swimmers, Indian runners and Sikh wrestlers for possible winners."

Special to Evening Telegram. MELBOURNE, July 18. Answering a question in the House of Representatives with reference to a report that the American Beef combine was establishing meat packing works in Australia, Premier Fisher said the Government would spare no efforts and no expense; but would use all the means within its power to protect Australia from the rapacity which has characterized the operation of the American Beef Trust in other countries.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, July 18. A London cable says that as a precaution against a suffragee descent on the Royal Garden Party at Windsor, this afternoon, 200 plain-clothes men mingled with the 10,000 guests in the Castle grounds. Extra bodyguards also watched over the King, Queen and Cabinet ministers. Scotland Yard had received a hint that the suffragettes intended to break up the party.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, July 18. Mitchell-Innes, in charge of the British Embassy, appeared at the State Department this afternoon, and notified Secretary Knox that for some reason unknown to him the Panama protest, which had been expected at New York yesterday, had not yet arrived. It was agreed to refrain from discussion pending receipt of the papers.

Special to Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, July 18. The Allan Line announces that the Pomeranian will be retired from the route, and be used as a relief ship when the traffic is heavy. The Sardinian is now being overhauled at Glasgow, and due to sail on July 31st for Philadelphia by way of Liverpool and St. John's.

Special Evening Telegram. MELBOURNE, July 18. The House of Representatives has unanimously adopted a motion setting forth that on the opinion of the House the system of providing for bonus or rebate of canal dues to American shipping using the Panama Canal would be detrimental to the interests of Australia. Premier Fisher said that he hoped the matter would be amicably settled by the Governments of Britain and the United States.

Special to Evening Telegram. LEIPSI, July 18. Lieutenant Preuszer, a German military aviator, was killed to-day, as he was landing after a flight. The machine struck the ground, and violently turned over twice, the aviator being caught beneath the engine.

Special to Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, July 18. The American fishing schooner Hattie Heckman, seized at Barrington for a violation of the fishing laws, will be fined and released on bond. The vessel is American, but the crew is Canadian.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 18. Negotiations for a settlement of the dock strike have again failed. Tuesday's conference adjourned until last night, when it was announced that no progress had been made.

BELL ISLAND REGATTA.

The Bell Island Regatta this year, which takes place on the 27th inst., promises to be the best ever held on the Iron Isle. Great preparations are being made by the Committee for it, and on that day the entire plants of both mining companies, as well as of all the merchants, will be closed down, which is the only day in the year outside of Christmas and Good Friday that a whole general holiday is proclaimed on Bell Island; hence the more than usual interest that is always manifested in the Bell Island annual Derby Day. The first race starts at 10 a.m., and altogether there are ten races on the programme. A band from St. John's will attend and enliven the occasion with music. The race course, which is a mile and one-eighth, is situated at the historic Beach, and starts at the Government wharf at the Beach to the Dominion Pier and return. Several people from St. John's and other places have signified their intention of attending, and no doubt very many more from the Metropolis will take advantage of this visit to the Island. Owing to the Regatta being on Saturday, a magnificent chance is being afforded the city people to cross the Island on Saturday morning, leaving St. John's about 6 or 7 a.m. and going by way of the Cove, or else leaving St. John's by the 8.45 a.m. train and going via Kelligrews, reaching the Island before noon. The visitor who thus avails of either of these routes on Saturday can see the Regatta that day, attend the ball at night, spend Sunday visiting the mines, Wabana, the piers, Lance Cove, or the beautiful country village of the East End, and return on Monday. The grand ball of the season, known as the "Annual Regatta Ball," takes place on the night of the Regatta, starting at 8 p.m. Special music is being arranged, a city orchestra being engaged for the occasion, and to lovers of the light fantastic a regular treat is assured. On the whole, from 10 a.m. till midnight on Saturday, July 27th, a great time is certain on Bell Island. Come along then, ladies and gentlemen of St. John's and elsewhere and see the Bell Island Regatta, which as a Regatta and outing comes second alone to the St. John's Regatta.

Another Demonstration IN HONOUR OF FATHER CLARKE.

On Tuesday evening at Torbay the people of that place as well as of the nearby settlements tendered a formal welcome to Rev. Fr. Clarke, and the people assembled in the school room of the convent and within a few moments the building was crowded to its utmost capacity by an audience which extended into the grounds outside. The entertainment took the form of a concert and reflected credit upon the good nuns whose pupils were responsible for the same. At the opening address of welcome was read by Miss Ida Thorne and this was accompanied by the presentation to Father Clarke by one of the little tots of a handsome bouquet of flowers. A varied programme was then gone through of songs, dialogues, and recitations, including a very pretty operetta, "The White Garland." At the conclusion of the programme, Mr. Michael Parsons, the President of the Total Abstinence Society, addressed the gathering and repeated the sentiments of pleasure which he had expressed a few days before on behalf of the people in having their late Pastor again amongst them. He referred in glowing terms to the tremendous change that had been made in the parish during Fr. Clarke's forty years of missionary work, and in particular pointed out the revolution that had been accomplished in the temperance movement in the district; a revolution which had taken place purely through the moral suasion of the pastor and the strong example of his own noble life. He was to them the real "Soggarth Arcoon," with them in their daily trials, sharing their joys and sorrows, and at all times ready to listen and to give his wise counsel to the humblest amongst them. At the conclusion of Mr. Parsons' address there was an outburst of enthusiasm and cheering which continued for some moments before Father Clarke could be heard in reply. In his very eloquent response the respected cleric again expressed his pleasure at being with

the people and thanked them sincerely for this renewed expression of their love for him, and assured them he never would forget it. It was for him a great joy to again come amongst them and he hoped that Providence would spare him many years that he might annually avail of the same pleasure. He did, himself, feel indeed that he was more or less a father to them all because he saw faces around him of very many heads of families at whose christenings he had officiated, who he could never forget their kindness to him at this visit and would carry away the happiest recollection of his old parishioners.

Fr. St. John, the present respected Parish Priest, then addressed the gathering, and stated how glad he was to note the respect which his people bore to their former Pastor and how much he well appreciated that this respect was deserved in view of his work amongst them.

The gathering then dispersed, and Fr. Clarke after being besieged with hand-shakes and other demonstrations of affection from the people made his way through the cheering multitude and drove back to town.

A noteworthy feature of Tuesday's demonstration was the very high order of the entertainment; was given and which reflected great credit upon the Rev. Mother Superior and other good nuns in charge of the Torbay convent and who with the people joined heartily in the chorus of welcome.

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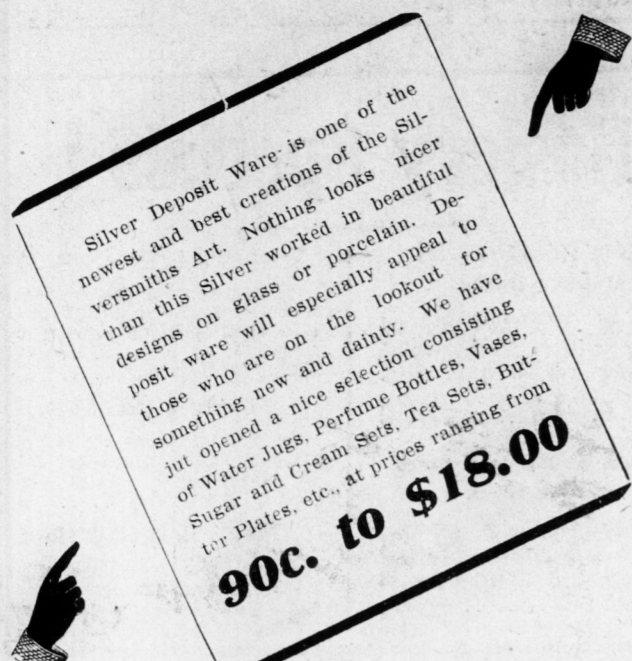

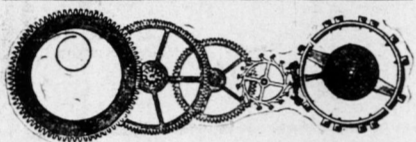
