## Independence in the Home.

Three young matrons were chatting over their family affairs one day.

Said one of them, "Oh, I must tell you the good news. My Mother-in-law is going to live with us this winter after all. She's going to take an apartment with her widowed sister."

"Isn't that fine?" cried one of the matrons.

"I'm so glad," said the other. And then, being young people with an unusual sense of humor, they all began to laugh at their own frankness.

"I suppose we ought to be ashamed of ourselves for talking this way," said the young woman who had announced the "good news."

"But what's the use? We all feel that way and we might as well admit it. And I know it isn't because we dislike our mother-in-law, either. I'm sure mine is a dear. She can't do enough for us and I'd as lief so much rather not have anyone in our little house except David and the baby and me. Isn't it queer? I'm ashamed of myself sometimes, but I just can't help feeling that way."

"Do you think this woman had anything to be ashamed of? I don't."

She was merely expressing the universal desire for independence of life. Of course if the mother-in-law had needed a home, it would have been her duty to give it and give graciously; and knowing her, I feel sure that she would have done so. But I don't blame her, nor the other women for being glad that they could preserve the unity of the family and their own independence.

I believe that every human being, or group of human beings, should have all the independence possible without infringing upon the rights and privileges of others.

I believe that if we all allowed each other more independence we should be happier.

For instance, I think children are far better off when they are allowed all the independence of action compatible with the rights of the rest of the family and their own best interests. If possible, a child should have a room which belongs entirely to him and be king within that room. He should be allowed to arrange it to suit himself, and should be responsible for its condition. The rest of the family should respect his rights by knocking before entering.

Again, I think husbands and wives are far happier together when each allows the other a large measure of independence. A great deal of unhappiness is caused by assuming that husbands and wives must like exactly the same things and spend all their leisure time together. Now two people may love each other most tenderly, and yet each enjoy certain things which the other does not. The conventional assumption in such cases is that one or both must be sacrificed to a unity of interests. Why should anyone be sacrificed? Why shouldn't the husband read and the wife play cards with their neighbors for an hour or two, if he likes best to read and she to play bridge? They will still have plenty of time to be together and will probably enjoy that time much more.

Chains are burdensome things even when they bind us to those we love.

We all enjoy independence and by that same token we ought to be willing to give it to others.

## LONDON GOSSIP.

LONDON, October 28th, 1913.

### MORE DRESS REGULATIONS.

At the Royal party to be given to those who present wedding gifts in connection with the forthcoming wedding of Prince Arthur of Connaught and the Duchess of Fife the prescribed wearing apparel is to be ordinary evening dress, with white waistcoats and trousers. The party is being given by the King, and in ordinary circumstances what is called "frock dress" would be worn, meaning evening dress with knee-breaches and silk stockings. The first cards prescribed but subsequently other cards were sent out. The change is made no doubt in consideration of the fact that the invitations on this occasion extend beyond the range of those usually attending functions where frock dress is worn, and no doubt a good many persons will be grateful for being spared a needless expense. Originally frock dress was

worn only at Marlborough House, in the days when King George was Prince of Wales. In 1887, during the Jubilee, at a time when there were several ruling Sovereigns in London, Lord Rosebery gave a party at which frock dress was worn. In the reign of King Edward and during the present reign it has always been worn at dinners given by the King and Queen at Buckingham Palace, and it is also worn by the host at a dinner where the King and Queen are present. The order that white waistcoats are to be worn is an innovation. On the subject of waistcoats King Edward was very particular. No officer of the Royal Household was ever permitted to wear one during a period of mourning. White waistcoats on this occasion are intended to indicate the fact that this is a wedding party.

### ANOTHER ROYAL ROMANCE.

In connection with the visit to this country of the Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heir to the throne of Austria-Hungary, which is to take place next month a romance is recalled of rather unusual type in the Austrian Royal House, as the wife of the Archduke, Princess Hohenberg, was neither a singer nor an actress, nor even a lady-in-waiting of the Austrian

Court, but an ordinary young girl of extremely good family going into "Viennese society. Countess Chotek was a very pretty, distinguished-looking girl, but the same might have been said of dozens of her friends and relations, and she might never have emerged from their ranks had it not happened that she and her family spent a winter at Montreux, where the Archduke was also spending some time. There was at the time a very exclusive Austrian and Polish society wintering at Montreux. It was also a very gay one, and for a time the inclusion in its ranks of so excited a personage as the Archduke was regarded by the younger members as rather a trial, for, with the best will in the world not to spoil fun, a Royal personage sometimes has a too formal effect on any circle he joins. By degrees, however, it was observed that Countess Sophie Chotek and the Archduke appeared to have done a very human and simple thing—they had fallen in love with each other. There were obstacles, of course, but it is a paradox that in Austria, the most exclusive of all countries, Royal "mesalliances" occur more frequently than elsewhere, and the Emperor's consent was obtained in due course. The marriage, which is, of course, morganatic, took place in 1900, when the Countess Sophie was raised to the rank of Princess Hohenberg.

### A NEW INTERNATIONAL UNDERSTANDING.

The visit of the French President

to Madrid may or may not result in a Franco-Spanish alliance. Probably we shall never know exactly what the arrangement is. I notice that the French papers are speaking of the Franco-Spanish "Entente Cordiale"—that is to say something indeterminate between the specific understanding ("entente") and an out-and-out alliance. The upshot of it will be that Spain enters the somewhat mysterious grouping known as the "Triple Entente" which will now presumably become the "Quadruple Entente." France in this case would gain several important strategic advantages. She would be able to transfer her troops from the Pyrenees to the eastern frontier. She would have virtually a land route to her North African empire. On her side, Spain would receive French assistance in the pacification and development of the Spanish zone in Morocco. Undoubtedly there would be some sort of military and naval convention probably unwritten or certainly secret.

### COMPLIMENTS FOR CANADA.

In their selection of new names for the four vessels which are to maintain their Canadian-West Indian service, the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company have paid a compliment to the Dominion. The Goth is to be the Caraque, the Gaelic the Cobegua, the Carmarthenshire the Chaleur, and the Pembrokehire the Chignecto. Caraque is an inlet of the Bay of Chaleur in Nova Scotia, connecting with the Bay of Fundy by Minas Channel. The origin of Chaleur has been indicated. Chignecto is an inlet of the Bay of Fundy. The Goth and the Gaelic were until lately units of the Union-Castle fleet. All four of the vessels which are intended for the new service were built at Belfast by Harland & Wolff.

### THE WAR AND PEACE OUTLOOK.

Even yet it is very difficult to decide the probabilities of the issue of a war between Turkey and Greece at this juncture. In the past two Balkan wars the even balance of chances as estimated before hostilities began was immediately dispensed by the fortune of war. There is, indeed, no standard by which you may gauge success and failure in modern war upon pre-conceived calculations. The whole world knows that this time last year the Turks were totally unprepared and inefficient, and that the Bulgarians were at least well trained and organized. Yet the astounding list of casualties published by Bulgaria recently, shows what may be the cost of defeating even an inefficient enemy. Greece and Turkey are not, professionally speaking, exhausted armies. At least they are only exhausted in that armies long in the field have a great disinclination to continue fighting. Yet it has to be remembered that the Turkish armies have now had the organization and the training that they originally lacked, while the Greeks have not the reserve of partially trained troops to fall back upon which was at the disposal of the Ottoman General Staff. The pity is that Europe cannot find a formula to stop the whole thing.

### JEWELLED SHOES.

The desire to wear jewels in strange places appears to have grown tremendously amongst our fashionable people in recent years. Jewelled heels are the latest eccentricity. There is a big show of them at this year's shoe and leather fair at the Agricultural Hall, London. They are French heels, high and with a waist; are made of wood beautifully colored; and are adorned with elaborate designs in jewellers' work which can be attached to any shoe, and cost perhaps three or four times as much as the shoe itself. Admiring the exquisite colored glazing of these heels, I discovered that the coating is not invariably lacquer or enamel, but that occasionally celluloid is used. Celluloid is, of course, a highly inflammable substance, and should certainly not be used for this purpose. Fashion has also revived shoe buckles, and some are shown of very great merit. One firm has an exhibition of court shoes ranging from the plain unadorned, black leather shoe of the American Ambassador and the court shoe of a clergyman, with its simple silver buckle, to that of a member of the Royal Household, with its highly elaborate buckle of gold.

The Battenburgs have always been a peculiar family here, and I notice that among the candidates for membership of the Royal Automobile Club now awaiting election are Princess Leopold and Maurice of Battenburg. The younger Prince has only just reached the age limit of membership, and the circumstance emphasizes the fact that Princess Henry, of Battenburg's younger sons have now to be reckoned as interesting recruits to the social life of the capital. The prolonged periods of residence abroad which were necessitated in the case of prince Leopold by indifferent health, have had the effect of establishing his physique. He is fully competent to discharge his military duties, and his younger brother also is devoting himself to the profession to which their father gave his life.





### CHICAGO MURDERER

Confesses to killing 16 people at various times.  
After being arrested for murder of a Tango teacher.  
The police began their greivous investigation of the almost unparalleled confession recently of Henry Spencer that he is the murderer of sixteen persons.  
Following his arrest recently for the murder of Mrs. Mildred Allison Roxroat, the Tango instructor, at Wheaton, Illinois, a week ago, which was made at the home of a woman who had notified the police of his case which the Tango teacher had taken with her on her fatal trip to Wayne. She was lured there on the pretext that she was to instruct a class in the dance. In it was part of her clothing and not far away the revolver with which Spencer ended her life.  
Spencer, in his confession, has asserted that he had sent the following to their graves, and told repeatedly the manner of their going:  
One of two farmers shot near Zion City, Ill., in the Spring of 1903. Peter Niedermeir, one of the car-barn hand-its, who afterwards was hanged, killed the other he said. Obtained \$560.  
Policeman Timothy Devon and Charles Pennell shot in August, 1892, when they surprised Spencer and a man named Murphy breaking into a house. Murphy now dead.  
Fannie Thompson, body found January 1, 1908, gagged and bound in bed in Michigan Avenue rooming house. Robbed of diamonds worth \$1200.  
Former wife, at Belle Isle, Mich., beaten to death and body burned.  
Former New York widow, name forgotten.  
Former wife, near Fort Montgomery, N.Y., beaten to death in woods. Robbed of \$300 and diamonds worth \$500. Former maid to Helen Gould.  
Aged man in Washington Park last spring, shot and body thrown in lagoon. Got \$200 in cash.  
Two girls at Paw Lake, Michigan, in May or June. Beaten, and bodies thrown in water.  
Girl at Delta Lake, Wis., in June, killed with hammer and body thrown in lake.  
Woman in house Notre Country Hospital; used hammer and burned clothes. Got \$140 and rings.  
Woman in house at Fulton and Halsted streets about eight months ago. Used hammer and burned clothing. Robbed house.  
Saloon keeper on Van Buren street, near Aberdeen, shot man and wounded wife, while robbing saloon.  
Man shot and killed in alley under south side elevated railroad about a year ago.  
Mrs. Mildred Allison, Roxroat, shot near Wayne, Sept. 25, and body placed on railroad track.  
Ida Oliver, killed with hammer Nov. 9, 1912. Body thrown into drainage canal and recovered May 29.  
The man who claims this almost unbelievable record is a Chicago product. He does not know his real name and first he remembers he was in the home for the Friendless, located within a block of the scene of his arrest last night. He has spent half of his 32 years in the State Penitentiary at Joliet. He was sentenced twice for wholesale robbery and was returned twice following violation of paroles.  
He is shot, weighs about 145 pounds, wears glasses, and has the appearance of a clerk, whose life has known little excitement. He has been a devout worshipper at the prayer meetings of the Immanuel Baptist Church, and attended the wedding of his pastor's daughter three nights before he accompanied Mrs. Roxroat down a lonely stretch of railroad track near Wayne, grasped her by the neck and placed a revolver to her head.

### Tobacco.

Tobacco is a weed which is raised at great care and expense in the night-riding portions of the United States and elsewhere, and is totally consumed by fire later on, there being no insurance.  
In fact, three-quarters of the arson in the world is committed upon tobacco. Every day a \$1,000,000 of tobacco goes up in smoke, and yet no effort is made to treat it with asbestos or to make it fireproof in any particular.  
Many substitutes for tobacco are often used, such as rope, cabbage, excelsior, tar paper, jute bagging and twine, but unfortunately the substitutes burn as readily as the tobacco.  
In fact, this is even more unfortunate than the inflammability of tobacco itself.  
Tobacco is grown in the warm sunshine and consists of large bunches of flat, broad leaves which absorb the said sunshine and convert it into nicotine, a deadly poison which is said to kill a man at forty paces if it is inhaled. When the tobacco is ripe it is chopped off and dried in bundles, after which it is made into cigars, torches, fumigators, plug cut, cigarettes, snuff and other contagious articles.  
Tobacco was first used by the Indians and was discovered by Sir Walter Raleigh, who made seagulls out of it and used them to divert his mind from his sickness on his way back to England. When Sir Walter lighted up his first cigar in England and set ear blowing double bluffs of dense smoke through his mouth and nose and ears his servant threw a pail of water over him and called out the fire department. This method of breaking the cigar habit is not in vogue to-day.  
Tobacco can be smoked, chewed, inhaled or eaten with equally distressing effects upon those who do not use it.  
Most boys begin the use of tobacco at the age of ten and continue until their fathers discover the fact—after which they discontinue the custom until they are too large to thrash. Tobacco readily becomes a habit and fastens talons of steel upon its victims, who will sometimes sell their vote or their everlasting friendship for a good cigar.  
There are many kinds of tobacco. Some kinds will remove the lining of the throat neatly in a few minutes, while other kinds cost a king's ransom and smoke like rarified velvet. Some tobacco when smoked, will attract the attention of the health department four blocks away, while other kinds when made into cigars sell for \$1 apiece, and make kings contented with their jobs.  
The United States could save a million dollars a day by refraining from tobacco. This would be glorious if we could be convinced that the million would not be spent for gasoline or Cabaret dinners.
