

ITALIANS ADVANCE.

UDINE, Italy, Oct. 24. The Italian army is making a general attack along the whole line from Switzerland to the Adriatic. preceding five months of the Austro-Itailan war, the Italians have been directing their efforts to the penetra-ting of Austrian territory and the capture of strategic points for the purpose of securing Italy against the ossibility of Austrian invasion. In the opinion of the Italian general staff this has been accomplished, and the war is now entering its second phase. It is estimated here that the Italians have taken 25,000 prisoners during the war, and have put out of action upwards of 100,000 men. Italian losses, including killed, wounded and prisoners, amount to about 45,according to official figures which is the lowest percentage of losses sustained by any of the belligerent nations.

BAD WEATHER CHECK BULGARI-

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 24. The Bulgarian invasion of Serbia has made further progress, according to an official statement from Sofia received here to-day, although the advance is delayed by bad weather.

GERMAN FRONTIER CLOSED.

GENEVA, Oct. 24. Germany is again closed, from Basel to Constance, to travellers of every condition, and no steamers are allowed to approach the German shore of Lake Constance. It is assumed, as heretofore, that the clos ing of the frontier is to keep intelligence, regarding the movements of German troops, from escaping.

A GERMAN REPORT.

T BERLIN, Oct. 24. German troops have crossed the Drina River into North Western Serbia near Vizgrad, and are pushing southward along the Serbian heights, according to an official statement given out by the German army head-quarters. It is also announced that Bulgarian troops have captured the Serbian towns of Negotin and Regly-

WANT TROOPS NOT TERRITORY.

LONDON, Oct. 24. What progress the British and French troops are making in their advance northward to the relief of Serbia, is still withheld, but there are misgivings in many quarters that Serbia never will be saved in this way. Greece's apparently authentic demand for Allied soldiers to insure er safety rather than Allies concesions to expand her dominions, as the Duckworth St. and constituted price for aligning herseli against the Central Powers and Turkey, carries the implication that she regards the forces landed at Salon

MEMORIAL SERVICE.

LONDON, Oct. 24. The memorial service for Miss Cavell, the English nurse who was executed by the German authorities in Brussels, which was meant to be an unobtrusive tribute, is developing into national proportions. Premier Cabinet have announced their intention of being present at St. Paul's Cathedral on Friday, when the service will be held. Public bodies and eading hospitals throughout the country are sending delegations.

Six members of the crew, who were asleep in the orecastle at the time of the exploson, were drowned. The Rumina had been captured by a German submarine, and a German officer was in charge. PARIS. Oct. 24. LONDON BUDGET. LONDON, Oct. 24. The Austro-Germans, in the north, have begun a more vigorous offensive and have crossed the Danube near Orsova. This brings much nearer the linking up of the armies of the Germanic allies with those of Bulgaria and opening the way through Bul



garia to Constantinople. Their sucgaria to Constantinople. Their success is not being achieved without heavy losses, as the Serbian veterans, well entrenched in their mountains, are offering a stubborn resistance, for four hundred thousand Allied and are making the invaders pay a big price for every mile of country inbig price for every mile of country invaded. 

thing we call the soul. Always breath deeply, as without the assistance of the lungs muscles remain flaccid and torpid. All mechanical exercises which are taken indoors, begin with relaxing movements so as to reduce the body to a condition of perfect flexibility. The order of practice is to begin with the fingers; withdraw the vital force to the muscles; make the fingers feel numb and then shake them.

The hand comes next, then the forearm, the whole arm, the head, torso, foot, lower leg, whole leg, eyelids, and lower jaw. 



Play Football.

They Often Mob the Team That Beats

The news that Steve Bloomer, John

Cameron, the Tottenham Hotspur man, and several other famous old footballers are among the Englishmen interned in Germany is a reminder that despite their scorn and hatred of everything British, the Huns were, before the war, only too eager to take lessons in football from us.

For that purpose they engaged Bloomer, Cameron, and other celebrated professionals. Plainly envious of the physical benefits of footballing as compared with those of their own national pastimes of duelling and beer swilling, the Germans became "mad" on the game.

The army authorities, from the allhighest Kaiser downwards, encouraged football playing, and even the Crown Prince himself was once photographed in football kit. At that time his special mania was to be "very English."

Too Sluggish for Football.

That the Germans have never proved themselves very adept at our winter game is not the fault of their mands a sprightliness of movement acteristic of the heavily built, sluggish minded sons of the Fatherland as a whole.

The French, the Belgians, and the Scandinavians, are much better footballers than the Germans, and the Danes, perhaps the cracks of the Continent at the game, are streets ahead of them.

And not only are the Germans unmanners over the game are atrocious. They have no more idea of playing the game in a proper sporting spirit than they have of waging war cleanly and decently.

They can't stand being beaten-and as it has generally been their lot to lose against "foreign" teams, some shameful scenes have taken place on German football grounds.

Certain members of the Sunderland club could a tale unfold in this connection. A few years ago after the season here-the German football season goes on into June. by the way -they accepted an invitation to play a series of matches in Germany.

Without at all exerting themselves they mostly did pretty much as they liked. Their superiority was so gallliked. Their superiority was so galling to the German players and spectators that affairs culminated in the side being badly mobbed after one match. The Englishmen were kicked at struck at, and blasphemed at, and although surrounded by a hostile crowd, out of which they had literally to fight their way, some of them re-

The Austrians and Hungarians, though more skilled in the arts of the game than their Allies, have equally bad manners over football.



London, Oct. 15 .- "There is only one power that can stop the Armenian atrocities, and that is Germany, declared Viscount Bryce at a meeting to-day at the Mansion House in sup port of the Lord Mayor's fund in aid of the Armenian sufferers. He de clared that the only remedy was to bring the pressure of world opinion particularly of neutral opinion, to bear on Germany and force her to take action.

Viscount Bryce who proposed a re colution condemning the reported at rocities, paid tribute to the intelligence and progressiveness of the Armenians, who, he said, were far superior to the Mohammedans, and he declared the case was not so much one of religious fanaticism as it was of deliberate extermination of a peo ple of whom the Turks were envious The horrors of the massacre ex eeded anything in the history of per secutions, declared the speaker. Women and children, he said, had been driven across the Arabian desert and and whipped by the Turks, who went mad, and at Trebizond carried their victims out to sea in boats and drowned them. "Women, many of whom were as highly civilized as any of us." he declared, had been sold into slavery, where they were Mohammadnized. He declared untrue the excuse offered by the Germans for the Turks to the effect that the Armenians had rebelled, the speaker declaring that the Armenians were quiet and unoffensive until forced to defend themselves.

In seconding the resolution Cardinal Bourne said that the evidence was so strong that even Germany was not able to deny the massacre. Neutrals, he said, should follow the example of Pope Benedict, who wrote a personal protest and plea to the Sultan. Popular Plumer. The Politest Man in the British Army.

"This retirement, carried out de iberately, with scarcely any loss, and in the face of an enemy in position, reflects the greatest possible credit on Sir Herbert Plumer and those who so efficiently carried out his orders." Such was the tribute which Sir John French recently paid to General Plumer in his despatches concerning the second battle Ypres. The tribute, however, scarcely surprising, for in no military leader does the War Office repose greater confidence.

Plumer is fond of saying that the only way to learn the art of battle is to fight. To him an hour of experience is worth a year of textbooks. General Plumer's record of service dates back to 1884, when he took part in the Egyptian campaign, and fought with such gallantry that he was mentioned in despatches, and received the medal with clasp and the Khedive's Star. It was in the Matapele campaign and the Boer War, however, that he made his greatest name. Few men, indeed, came out of the South African War with a more

brilliant record. "Tommy" has always regarded Plumer as the soldier's friend, although, on account of his regard for dress, he is known as the "Dandy General" and the politest man in the British Army. 


