#### Die in Droves For Crown Prince.

London, April 14.-Colonel Repington, the military correspondent of the London "Times," sends that journal the following account of his visit to

"The Germans now have thirty divi sions around Verdun. At a moderate estimate, they suffered 150,000 casualties during the first month of the battle. They are getting no rest. The French are assuming superiority in ar-

tillery. They continue their are all day and night. They hold every road reserve position, ravine, wood, and possible billeting zone under their fire No German within five miles of the French guns can be sure of a moment's rest; and while the 250,000 German infantry suffered the bulk of the losses, there are probably 125,000 men of the artillery, supply, and other men of the arthers, supper, arms and services who also suffered

much. "General Petain is not above giving wants it very badly and if it forms a not easily defensible salient like Malancourt: but he is a tickler for the price and will not allow the enemy to come on until he is ready to pay three lives for one. In every unexpected corner machine guns watch to strike. The chief theatre of fighting remains on the northern front. It is onthis front that the main masses of German artillery are posted in two main groups-one about Septarges, the other around Beaumont. Flank positions on the northern frontnamely, Avocourt and Malancourt on the west, and Vaux on the east—are utilized mainly for the tactical purposes of aiding the northern attack. The German position in the Woevre Plain is bad, and the artillery on this side seems to be willing to stop firing when it is left alone Since the failure of the great attack on Fort de Vaux, the Germans have dropped back a few hundred vards from the

entanglements of the French. "The whole northern front is carpeted with German dead. A French patrol went out by night to examine one of the foremost German trenches which had been reported full of men by our air observers. The trench, in fact, was full of Germans, but all were dead.

"Since this great attack failed the Crown Prince has resorted to his favorite method of disconnected and partial attacks. He did the same in the Argonne when he commanded there, and on one occasion made attacks with twenty-six battalions ir. succession, taken from twenty-one different regiments. Before Verdun he is making similar attacks, using up his divisions one by one. We are fortunate to have him here; but, just as in the Argonne, he was given all he needed with bountiful hands in the vain hope of connecting his name with victory. So now the whole German line is being drained of men and guns to save him from failure. He appears beneath everything as a mmander, and but for his birth would have long since been rejieved."


