

Augmentation of the Pay of Royal Naval Reservists Newfoundland.

The Government of Newfoundland have decided to augment the pay of Newfoundland Royal Naval Reservists so as to place them on the same footing as men of the Newfoundland Regiment.

Under the provision of the War Measure Act, authority is given to the Minister of Militia to deal with the matter of augmentation of pay of the Royal Naval Reservists, Nfld., in consultation with the Senior Naval Officer, St. John's.

It is ordered that a sum of 33c. per day be placed to the credit of each Naval Reservist from the time of commencement of the war, in cases where men were then serving, or otherwise, from the time when their services began up to the time of discharge, or of death, or to the 30th of September, 1917, inclusive.

As the rate of pay of Naval Reservists was increased from October 1st, 1917, and as the difference between the amount they receive and that allowed the members of The Royal Newfoundland Regiment is 17c. per day, this difference will also be credited them from that date.

The foregoing amounts will not in any case be made a payment from Admiralty sources. The Minister of Militia, St. John's, Nfld., is solely responsible for the issue of any sums due.

Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve men serving in any of H. M. Ships, including all members of the Trawler Reserve and those in Defensively Armed Merchant Ships etc., are eligible for the pay as set forth, and should be informed of the following alternatives as regards the method of payment:-

(a) Payment will be made on personal application to the Minister of Militia, St. John's.

(b) Payment will be made to the nominee of any Reserve man, on written application duly witnessed, to the Minister of Militia, St. John's.

(c) Sums due will be placed to the credit of Resesrve men who do not desire to avail themselves of the foregoing and can be drawn by them at the expiration of their service.

All communications of any description with regard to these payments are to be made to the Minister of Militia, St. John's, direct.

Payment will commence on 1st May, 1918.

In cases where members of the Royal Naval Reserve (Newfoundland) have been killed in action or died of wounds or sickness, or through any other cause, the amount due as Augmentation Pay will go to the Estate of the deceased. The authority to obtain the Estate of the deceased is, in case of a Will, Letters of Probate; and in case there is not a Will, Letters of Administration. Such letters are issued by the Supreme Court of Newfoundland on the Petition and Proofs of Executor of the Will, or the next of kin. If the Estate does not exceed \$500.00, after the proof of the facts has been obtained the petition can be applied for by the Minister of Justice.

With reference to the foregoing, it is suggested that the next of kin of Reservists who are now serving should communicate with them and request them to send their instructions to the Militia Department. No action can be taken until such instructions are received.

Next of kin of deceased Reservists will be communicated with in due course when their claims have been proved.





LONDON, May 15. The Admiralty restriction on navigation in the northern part of the North Sea, in consequence of the laying of a great mine field for the purpose of foiling submarines, became operative to-day and hereafter all shipping in that area must comply with stringent regulations or ignore them at their own peril. After darkness no ship will be allowed within the prescribed area which lies between the coasts of Norway and Scotland, and any vessel finding herself there half an hour after sunset must anchor in accordance with the Admiralty's directions. The regulations include strict rules affecting all except warships entering and leaving the ports of northeastern Scotland as well as the Orkney and Shetland Islands. The vast barrier which seems to have been overestimated in extent in earlier reports is now said to cover approximately 22,000 square miles. Many details obviously cannot be divulged and some of those printed appeared to be based on assumption by non-official experts, but it is generally accepted that the barrier is designed to fence in as far as possible U-boats and other enemy craft in the northern end of the North Sea in the same manner as the barrier across the Straits of Dover already effectively blocks their access to the Channel. It is remarked that as the barrier is intended to exclude submarines the mines must have been laid at an unusual depth to cover the limit of the average submarine capacity. The forbidden area necessarily leaves a gap on each side on the east, because the territorial waters of Norway must be respected, and on the west to preserve a passage for shipping and to allow freedom of action for the grand fleet. But notwithstanding such limitations confidence is expressed that the new measures combined with the recent oprations at Zeebrugge and Ostend must greatly handicap the movements of the U-boats and further discourage the hopes that the Germans have placed in the submarine campaign.

GERMAN POSITIONS ATTACKED.

PARIS May 15. French troops yesterday evening attacked German positions near Hailles on the front below Amiens and captured a wood on the west of the Avre River, it is announced officially. The Germans made a counter attack and were beaten off with severe losses. During the night there was a violent bombardment north of Mont Didier and between Mont Didier and Noyon. There is nothing to report elsewhere on the battle front.

THE SUB. QUESTION.

LONDON, May 15. Asked in the House of Commons today by Robert P. Houston, a Liverpool Shipowner, for information as to our successful operations in capturing enemy submarines around the coast during the past three weeks, Thos. McNamara made this reply: "On the whole, the general trend of the submarine warfare has progressed quite satisfactorily since the first

of January." FRENCH ADVANCE THEIR LINE.

LONDON, May 15. Marshal Haig's report from the British headquarters in France tonight says there was local fighting in which French troops captured several prisoners and successfully advanced their line early in the morning in the sector north of Kemmel Village. Elsewhere there was nothing beyond artillery activity on both sides of the

FIGHTING FOR HILL FORTY-FOUR WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES IN FRANCE, May 15 .- Hard fighting continued in the neighborhood of Hill 44, north of Kemmel, which was stormed and retaken late vesterday by French troops. This much disputed elevation has changed hands many times recently but the French were still holding the Germans off at 2 o'clock this

GAVE LIFE FOR OFFICER.

LONDON, May 15. Colonel Percy Archer Clive, Member of the House of Commons for the South Division of Hertfordshire, gave his life on the west front a few days ago in a gallant attempt to rescue a wounded officer. Colonel Clive, at the head of his battalion of Lancashire Fusiliers, had just straightened out the line by a successful counter attack when it was reported to him that the Colonel of the regiment on his left was lying severely wounded between the battle lines. Colonel Clive went out immediately alone to aid the wounded Colonel and was killed by a German sniper. Subsequently the wounded Colonel was brought in by stretcher bearers.

DEATH PENALTY.
