

President of Poland Assassinated at Warsaw.

Shot While Conversing With British Minister -- Prince George to be Operated On -- Mysterious Fleet on Mysterious Mission -- French Hospital Ship Burned to Water's Edge.

PRINCE GEORGE ILL.
LONDON, Dec. 18. Prince George, the King's youngest living son, will be operated on for appendicitis almost immediately according to the Daily Mail. He is 23 years old and a naval cadet.

POLAND'S MURDERED PRESIDENT.
WARSAW, Dec. 17. The body of President Narutowicz, who was assassinated on Saturday, will lie in state during the great public ceremony. Narutowicz visited the Art Exhibition here against the advice of Premier Nowak. He was shot while conversing with the British Minister, William Max Muir, who had just offered congratulations on his elevation to the Presidency. "Congratulations, you say," replied the President. He had scarcely spoken the words when three shots rang out in quick succession. He sank slowly to his knees, then collapsed slowly, dead. He leaves two children, a daughter of sixteen and a son in the twenties. One of the President's last acts was to telegraph Count Samozvski, Polish Minister in Paris, and his rival in the final balloting for the Presidency, thanking him for cordial congratulations.

AUSTRALIAN ELECTION.
MELBOURNE, Dec. 18. Although Premier W. M. Hughes expresses the opinion that the Nationalists will still be the strongest party as a result of yesterday's general elections, present figures indicate the defeat of the Government. It is impossible to forecast the result owing to incompleteness of the count, and the effect of the allotment of preferences. The Labor Party, is at present leading with forty-four seats, the Government twenty-three, the Country Party six, Liberals and Independents three.

REFERRED TO HOME SECRETARY.
LONDON, Dec. 17. After a demonstration of the unemployed in Trafalgar Square to-day, a deputation was sent to Buckingham Palace in an orderly attempt to present a petition to King George. The King declined to see the men, and referred them to the Home Secretary.

TULSA'S CARGO ON FIRE.
CHARLESTON, Dec. 16. The Shipping Board steamer Tulsa is fighting a fire in her cargo of cotton waste and bagging, according to a radio message received here last night. The flames were believed to be under control, the latest message received here last night. The flames were believed to be under control, the latest message said, and the vessel is attempting to reach Savannah.

DISABLED AND ADRIFT.
BOSTON, Dec. 16. The coastguard cutter Acushnet last night broadcasted radio messages to all vessels in range to be on the lookout for the French schooner Salitro, disabled and adrift, with two men on board. She was blown from her anchorage off Nantucket on Tuesday, and has not been seen since two days ago, when the Acushnet lost sight of her. The captain and two of the crew went ashore Tuesday seeking water, and the schooner was blown off in their absence. She had two thousand cases of alcohol aboard, bound from Cuba for Antwerp.

U.S. MAY HELP.
LONDON, Dec. 16. Diplomatic and financial experts of London newspapers, voice the general opinion that the rumor of the United States or International loan to Germany runs far ahead of fact. Reports suggest possible financial assistance to Germany, and the fact of Ambassador Harvey's departure for Washington next week, coupled with intimations that the Harding administration is disposed to exert a helpful influence to European affairs attract wide attention and fill many columns in the daily papers.

LAUSANNE TREATY.
LAUSANNE, Dec. 16. Drafting the Treaty of Lausanne is now in progress, but it is impossible that any complete document can even be initiated before Christmas.

JAPANESE STEAMER ABLAZE.
LOS ANGELES, Dec. 16. Fire in the hold of the Japanese steamer Chicago Maru, lying in the outer harbor with a three-quarter million cargo, got beyond control to-day. One hundred passengers were taken off to-day, and the sailors' feet were burned by hot decks. The steamer is in the round the world service and arrived here yesterday from New Orleans.

A MYSTERIOUS FLEET.
PERNAMBUCO, Dec. 18. The passengers and captain of the

The captain and a number of his hands went ashore and during their absence a large number of the inhabitants, regardless of the pretensions of the remaining members of the crew, took charge of the ship, stripped her of everything that was movable and left her bare. —North Sydney Herald.

MR. JAMES BOGGAN.

(H. F. SHORTIS in Daily News).
A link of the past has been broken by the death of Mr. James Boggan, one of our most enterprising and successful master coopers, and a highly respected and well-known citizen of this city, which occurred at his late residence, 238 Theatre Hill on Friday evening last, after a long illness, borne with truly Christian fortitude and submission to Divine Will, and fortified with all the rites of the Catholic Church. Mr. Boggan was born in St. John's 78 years ago, son of Mr. John Boggan, a highly esteemed resident of St. John's, and served his apprenticeship under his father, who carried on an extensive business in years gone by. After the death of his father James carried on the coopering business on a large scale, and by honesty, industry, integrity and enterprise, he succeeded in establishing one of the most extensive and prosperous trades in this city in his line. It may be said that an invariable courtesy marked his every word and gesture. He was a man of many gifts. He possessed a charm of manner which made him an addition to any circle in any rank of life, for his was that quick sympathy which enabled him to fit himself without conscious efforts to mix with men of all ages and every rank. He always took the deepest interest in the affairs of the city which had for their object the welfare of his fellow-citizens, and always supported any measure which he believed was for the advancement of his countrymen generally. Even-handed, even-tempered, fair and just in all his dealings, truly charitable in mood and thought, judging without harshness and quick to listen to the claims of others, to his intimates he was always the sympathetic and helping friend, whose friendship shone the more brightly when friendship's services were needed. He possessed a natural genius for music, and it was to this he turned during his spare moments, and few those moments were because he was never as happy as when busily at work amongst his employees in his extensive and well regulated cooperage.

But it was as a most consistent and exemplary Catholic that his chief characteristic shone forth, believing, in the words of a high dignitary of Holy Church, that Religion, taken as a synonym of Faith, brings happiness to this world, because, as its etymology tells us, it binds men to God, and in this sacred union, men will find light for their mind to love and to act, and strength for their will to accomplish and assist. Every deserving case of charity received the support of Mr. Boggan, without distinction, and few in this city has been a more constant and liberal benefactor than the deceased, and the beautiful and costly statues and altars, etc., which he has presented to the Church and Convents stand there today as memorials to his generosity. Above all he never forgot the orphans, more especially at Christmas season, and now he rests in peace, within sound of the bells at Belvedere, and I am sure as the Angelus rings out, the good Nuns and the fatherless and motherless little ones committed to their charge, will raise their pure voices to Heaven in prayer for the repose of the soul of their late true friend and benefactor, James Boggan. The prayers for the dead were recited in the Cathedral last evening by the Rev. Dr. Greene. Mr. J. T. Martin conducted the funeral arrangements, and the large concourse of citizens who attended the funeral was evidence of the high respect and esteem in which James Boggan was held by all classes of our community. Interment took place at Belvedere. Requiescat in pace.

A Wealthy Poet.

Samuel Rogers, who was born at Stoke Newington in 1783 and died at his house in St. James's Place, on December 15th, 1855, achieved in his day considerable reputation as a poet. Of his works, probably the "Pleasures of Memory" and "Italy," are the best remembered; but, fortunately for himself, he was not dependent upon poetry for a livelihood. The head of a private banking house, he always possessed a substantial fortune, and it was as a man of taste and letters, as a patron of artists and authors, and as the friend of almost every notable man for half-a-century and more, that Rogers principally engaged the public attention. At his celebrated breakfast parties, persons of almost all classes and pursuits were to be found. In this way, he made the morning meal famous as a literary rallying point, and during the London season there was scarcely a day on which from four to seven persons were not assembled round his hospitable board in St. James's Place. There, discussions about books or pictures, anecdotes of the great of old, some witty sayings of Sheridan, Erskine, or Horne Tooke, some special trait of Fox, some apt quotations or fine passages read aloud, some incident of foreign travel recounted—all flowed on without restraint and charmed the hours until noon. A shrewdness and distinct acidity of sarcasm characterized Rogers's talk, and it is certain that not a few of his friends regarded his powers in that line with apprehension. In fact, it is recorded that, when he was present, there was evident among the company an unwillingness to be the first to leave. Yet he was a generous and charitable man, of whom it was not truly that his purse ever was open to distress and that merit always found in him a discerning patron.

Where Loss is Gain.

Among the striking features of the humane convention at St. Paul was the stereoscopic exhibition of the financial losses sustained by the meat packers and railroads through cruel treatment of livestock in transit. A representative of the Institute of American Meat Packers stated that 3,716,141 pounds of meat in 1918 had to be removed on account of bruises to cattle; that the total loss that year in pork from injuries to hogs was 15,254,000 pounds; that the corn required to raise this amount of lost pork was 1,605,900 bushels. Pictures were thrown upon the screen showing the bruises, cuts, etc., sustained by the animals as seen when dressed. Then came photographs of the clubs, prodpoles with sharp metal points, and whips which drovers and others used in handling cattle, sheep and swine. This expensive campaign now being carried on by the railroads and packers is purely from the point of view of profit and loss. The published report makes no appeal to the men who handle these animals except on the ground of financial loss. "Stop abusing livestock," it says. "Every blow means a bruise. Bruise means wasted meat." We rejoice for the animals' sake that at last the financial loss incurred by cruelty is resulting in the animals' gain—Our Dumb Animals.



Produce and Provisions

(From Saturday's Trade Review.)
Codfish—The exports of dried codfish amounted to 28,402 quintals this week as follows:—
From Outports—By schr Rita M. Cluett from W. Webb & Sons, Rencontre, 2,740 quintals to Oporto; by schr General Allenby from the Marystown Trading Co., 4,566 quintals to Oporto; by schr. General Ironsides from Elliott & Co., Change Islands, 4,630 quintals to Oporto and by schr. Gay Gordon, from Harvey & Co., Belleoram, 3,614 quintals to Oporto.
From St. John's—By Schr. Cape Race from Juan Lazo 8,000 quintals to Seville; by schr. J. H. Sinclair, 1,491 quintals from Goodridge Export Co., A. H. Murray, and A. E. Hickman to Barbados. By schr. Douglas E. Parks 2,891 quintals to Macao for orders and by S.S. Beverton 150 qts. to Boston from T. S. Devine and A. E. Hickman and Co.



Cod Oil—The demand for cod oil in the foreign markets continues good. The exports this week were again heavy and totalled 65,322 gallons as follows: by S.S. Harmony to London, 23,676 gallons from Joe Bros. Ltd., and C. F. Bennett & Co. By S.S. Belverton to Boston, 41,646 gallons from Tessier & Co., Jas. Baird, Ltd., A. S. Rendell.

W. A. Munn, T. H. Carter, A. E. Hickman Co., F. Hallett and J. B. Orr. About 4,000 tons have been shipped of this season's oil. The figures for each month beginning with July are as follows:—

 Sept. 262,675 galls.
 Oct. 148,840 galls.
 Nov. 264,137 galls.
 To Dec. 15th 112,845 galls.
 Total 912,308 galls.
Cod Liver Oil—There is no improvement whatever in the C.L.O. situation. The Norwegians have been and are still offering their oil at very low prices and this makes it impossible for us to get buyers for our oil at an increase over their offers. The bulk of the Norwegian oil should soon be marketed and as their new catch starts a few weeks after the New Year they are certain to be forced to higher levels as the value of all kinds of oil have materially advanced so that

the livers of the codfish will be worth much more than they were last year.
Flour—The market is steady at last weeks prices. Imports for the week are slack—only 200 barrels by S.S. Manoa from Montreal and by S.S. Silvia from New York. The total imports to St. John's to date are now levelled up to the record of last year viz: 20,700 barrels. The present local quotations are \$28.50 for Fat Back, and S. Clear; \$33 for Fine But, \$26.50 Spare Ribs and 45¢ Grocers Family-Mess per barrel. The heavy trade is over for the fall and desultory orders chiefly for lumber camps are now the only ones to be filled.
Beef—A market scarcity has again developed in Boneless Beef. Packers will have none to offer till January. The low price prevailing for this quality the past six months, resulted in abnormal consumption which about cleave the available supplies. St. John's has imported 10,000 barrels to date for 1922 more than in 1921. The figures are 36,600 as compared with 26,208 barrels. The local quotations are \$21.50 Bos Family, \$21 Ex. Family, \$19 Family Special and Boneless.
Flour—The wheat market is strong this week. The quotation reached the high point of 124 and Winnipeg 103. The Australian and Argentine crop reports indicate a shortage which is said to be the cause of the advance. The imports this week were 12,975 barrels by S.S. Manoa and 4,597 barrels by the Mapledawn from Montreal; total 17,572 barrels. The total imports to St. John's are now ahead of 1921 viz: 290,950 barrels as against 290,000 last year. The local price is still \$9.00 per barrel, wholesale.
Molasses—There is a firm feeling in the molasses market on scarcity of stocks and the price is likely to advance about five cents a gallon in the New Year. The drain on stocks held in St. John's was heavy the past month in response to outport orders for the winter supply. The holdings are now quite low, especially of Choice molasses. The quotations are this week 30 cents per gallon for Fancy wholesale in puncheons and 80 cents for Choice in barrels.
Sugar—Further advances were made in American granulated this week. In the New York market the price is now 4 cents a pound for "Raws" and \$8.00 per 100 pounds for refined. These prices are the highest for the year. The stocks of raws in Cuba are said to be one million tons less than last year at this date, which is no doubt the chief cause of the recent advance. The St. John's wholesale quotation is now \$11.75. It looks now very likely that the market will hold this high level through the winter. The imports to St. John's to date are 77,117 cwt., as against 68,327 last year. Present stocks in the local market are light.
Tea—A sensational advance has taken place in the price of tea in the foreign markets, which no doubt will soon be reflected in this market. The total increase amounts to about 14 cents per pound and is said to be caused by shortage in Chinese crops. Dealers predict that the advance will go to twenty cents from the low point during the winter. Local prices are likely to advance soon, as they are now below the cost of importation.
Potatoes—The first big 1922 importation of Canadian potatoes occurred this week, when the Canadian Sapper brought 3,107 barrels from Charlottetown, P.E.I., to various importers. They are an excellent quality and find a ready sale. They are all "Reds" as the "Blues" did not thrive to any extent this season at P.E.I. The local wholesale price is \$3.50 to \$3.60 per sack of 180 pounds, and \$1.80 per half sack of 90 pounds. Home-grown potatoes are offering on mill ddays for \$3.00 per barrel. Farmers are unwilling to move their stocks until confident of mild weather.
Hay—The local quotation for hay to arrive in \$40 per ton this week. Sales of stocks in hand are being made at \$39 to \$39.50 wholesale for No. 2 Timothy received by the St. Lawrence route; but as this navigation is over for this year, hay imported by rail and steamer will be subjected to a higher freight and local prices will advance accordingly. The imports were heavy this week, viz., 5,230 bales by S.S. Manoa from Montreal; 1,747 by S.S. Canadian Sapper from Charlottetown, and 784 by S.S. Mapledawn from Montreal; total 7,761 bales.
Oats—The local market is now well supplied. This week the S.S. Mapledawn brought in 10,352 sacks from Montreal, the Canadian Sapper 9,362 sacks from P.E.I., and S.S. Manoa 2,000 sacks from Montreal; total 12,352 sacks or 49,408 bushels. The oats from P.E.I. are of a superior quality. The Blacks are quoted at \$3.90 per sack of 4 bushels and White at \$3.70 wholesale. The markets in Canada continue easy on big supply and are expected to hold so for some months.

Peers in Borrowed Robes.

Court dress for movers and secondors of the Address in the House of Commons has frequently been "let" in the past and the supply of full regimentals to Army and Navy officers in an everyday occurrence. In the huge wardrobe of the firm there is every conceivable kind of uniform and dress. Even that of the King's Bodyguard of Scotland could be hired.

Strange Courts And Customs.

LITTLE-KNOWN RELICS OF THE PAST.
In the early days of October every year there is held in Bristol the last surviving Court of Pied Poudre (Pie Powder Court) in England.
These courts date back for seven hundred years, and the object of them was to "determine the claims of persons passing through them who cannot make any stay there." They were called Courts of the Pieds Poudres (dusty feet) on account of the dusty feet of the suitors, and were held in towns where they were periodical fairs.

Trying Cases in the Market.
The Pied Poudre Court at Bristol, at which the Recorder presides, is opened in the market according to the old custom, but later moves on to the Guildhall, which is more convenient. Here all kinds of actions can be heard, as long as they arise in the town itself. Although the court stays open a fortnight, there are not many complaints.
A most famous ancient court which has a wide powers, but is practically unknown to the layman, is the Court of Arches. Here important cases are heard relating to the ornaments or furniture of any church or cemetery or concerning ritual in the province of Canterbury. The president of this is a barrister, who is known as the Dean of Arches.
The Liverpool Court of Passage is another court quite unknown outside its own radius. In actions which arise in the town it has almost complete jurisdiction. This is one of the few remaining Borough Courts of Record which were started in the Middle Ages!

What a British Election Costs.

The cost of a contested election in England to the individual candidate is a serious matter. The chief sources of expense are printing and advertising. Referring to the accounts of my last election I find the former totalled £319.

This sum was incurred over the issue of my election address to every elector in the constituency, the three original posters I had designed and scattered broadcast to hasten the discomfiture of my opponent, the portrait cards, for display in the windows of my supporters, a quantity of leaflets, and the poll-card that told the electors the polling stations where they were entitled to record their votes.

Advertising cost me £130, which included the rent of hearings. Salaries, as might be expected, came to a substantial figure. For the central office and the eighteen branch ones I paid out £423; 10 sub-agents received £66, 14 clerks £63 18s. 7d., while messengers cost £40. In addition, my head agent received £109.

Public meetings, of which 24 were held at an average cost of 17s. 6d., were cheap enough, as was the hire of 26 committee rooms (15 on election day only) at 10s. 6d. apiece.

Compared with these modest figures, £12 for telegrams was exorbitant. My personal expenses, comprising my hotel bill during the three weeks' campaign amounted only to £24.

The total cost of getting into the House of Commons came to £3400 odd, but while I secured a tangible reward for the outlay involved, my defeated opponent, whose expenses equalled mine, had nothing to show for his money.



Our Dumb Animals.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF AGENT FOR WEEK ENDING DEC. 15.

Attended to the landing of 45 head of cattle, 9 sheep and 16 horses from the Canadian Sapper, one horse was accidentally killed on the passage down; everything possible was done for the comfort of the cattle. It was one of the stormiest passages the ship had met for the season. The cattle were all landed immediately and all watered and fed. I also attended two cartloads of cattle at the Railway Station. I might say here that there is not sufficient food put in the car for those cattle, they were watered on the 8th and did not arrive here until the 11th, the Secretary Mr. Leslie Curtis is investigating the matter. I had them watered and fed at Neal's Wharf after leaving the train;—the railway company having no facilities at the freight sheds. I also received several complaints from sick persons in reference to the howling of dogs which are left out all night annoying them very much. I received a phone message also on Wednesday night in reference to the matter, but was powerless to remedy it. All horse owners have promised me to keep their horses covered when standing with rugs. I think if people would do their shopping earlier at this season of the year, it would give the express men a chance to get their horses in earlier and dried off. I was also asked to humanely put to death a faithful old mare owned by a resident of the West End. The animal had rendered good service and the owner rather than sell her had her humanely put to death. I also attended to the landing of 3 horses from the Silvia. The animals were imported by Mr. Joseph Judge, they were comfortably boxed and covered and secured against all weather. Mr. Judge is loud in his praise of the Captain and officers, crew and passengers during the passage, who were keenly interested in the horses and saw to their comfort enroute.

Brigus Notes.

The 53rd Annual Meeting of Royal Standard, L.O.A., No. 59 took place in the Lodge Room Monday evening, 11th inst., and was largely attended. To Clean Lamps.

Have two good-sized bags with draw-strings, one of dark material, the other of light.
