The Crops in Scotland.

A week or two of the most seasonable weather proved a godsend to farmers in the South, enabling them to save fair average crops in excellent condition. Those in the North have been far less fortunate. We hear accounts even from the midland and northern counties, where the latter districts have been visited by tantalizing bursts of wind and wet. But the news from Scotland is simply terrible. It has been a bad season from the first, with a higher and more steady rainfall than has been experienced for many years. Crops were somewhat late, and now when they should be ready for reapling, rain is descending heavier than ever. The treacherous gleams of sunshine which break the gloom, do the grain positive injury, by making it sprout. In the Lothians and Perthshire—that is to say, in the richest arable districts—the ripe grain is rotting as it lies beeten down by the drenching rains. There is a strange absence of wind, too, so that nothing has time to dry in the intervals of more favorable weather. In the south the harvest has commenced, but in Aberdeenshire and farther to the north we hear that, should the weather prove propitious, it is hoped that it may begin in a week or two. Mr. Froude will soon repeat on the lyceum platform some of the brilliant narratives which he has made so striking in the pages of his history. The novelist, deorge Macdonald, who is now in Boston, will be one of the prominent lecturers of the coming season. Miss Emily Faithful, who has made herself an authority in certain branches of social science, especially in connection with the opening of new and neseful careers for her own sex, arrived on Tuesday, and will be heard on the lecture-platform in various parts of the country. Lastly, we have to announce the arrival of Prof. Tyndall, with the necessary apparatus for repeating in America the popular scientific courses with which he has made such a marked sensation in London. All these distinguished visitors will doubtless receive a cordial welcome, and will find listeners quite as eager and appreciative as they have ever found on the other side of the ocean. Their success will doubtless tempt many to follow in their footsteps; and in a year or two New York, Boston and London will exchange lecturers, poets, humorists and men of science, with as much regularity, as they now exchange breadstuffs, cotton and manufactured wares."

We publish to-day a timely and sensible article from the Stratford Beacon on the subject of Provincial and District Exhibitions. Every at-Beacon on the subject of Provincial and District Exhibitions. Every attentive observer will admit that there is much truth in its remarks respecting the management of the Provincial Exhibition, and the effect which such management has had in keeping it at the same old standard, and preventing that expansion which the ever growing resources of the Province require. It is admitted that some little life was infused into the management on the reorganization of the Provincial Association by the Local Government, but the reforms then effected have not been followed up with that promptness and spirit which the advancement of the Province in all departments of industry demanded. The establishment and maintens of large District Shows, like those held in London, Hamilton, and Guelph, are partly due to this fact, and now that they are on a self-sustaining basis, the question materially occurs, whether the old Provincial Exhibition, as at present worked, can in future be maintained on the same footing and with the same degree of success. It is the general belief that it cannot, for already it has felt the effect of the District Shows, which both in the number of entries and in the attendance, almost rival their old competitor.

Threa years ago a western city (London) tried the experiment of holding a great fair of its own. It was thought by timid persons to be a bold undertaking, but it succeeded at once, and that, too, without legislative aid. Another city (Hamilton) in the west made a similar venture, and with the like encouraging result. And then one of the more considerable towns (Guelph) entered the lists, and it, too, was rewarded beyond its most sanguine anticipations. So that instead of having one fogyish Provincial show, we have now several live exhibitions, which have taken root, and have become exceedingly popular with the people. They are the exponents of the growth of the localities wherein they are held, and are not only apparently permanently established, but under proper management are likely to

wherein they are held, and are not only apparently permanently established, but under proper management are likely to attain a considerable degree of expansion. Without probably intending it, they are already powerful rivals of the Provincia show, taking from it its pressige, proving more useful to the country, and threatening to celipse it in point of magnitude.
