In answer to the interrogations of the Committee Mr. Starnes said that he had in his hands a packet of papers, placed in his keeping in the month of January last by the Hon J. C. Abbott, M. P., and G. W. McMillan. He From New York: bott, M. P., and G. W. McMillan. He was unable to state their contents, but they bore an endorsement, signed by Sir Hugh Allan and G. W. McMillan, by which he (Mr. Starnes) was directed to hold the documents until ten days after the prorogation of the present session of Parliament. He declined to surrender the documents (doct. The Late Mr. John Shedden.

The Gibb, inspealing of the late Mr. John Shedden, whose inclandatory death was recorded on Saturday, says:—The depeased was one of those inches whose energy and intelligence are certain to bring them into prominence, and his career in Toronto and in Canada deserves a passing notice. Mr. Shedden was non, in the perish of Kilbingie, in Ayrsine, Scotland, in 1-28. He was educated in Irvine academy, thus securing at least a fair share of scholastic acquirements. He was carly associated and connected with railway men and projects, his fatherbeing a contractor to some extent on several of the railways progressing at the time of Mr. Sheddon's youth. A valuable gold watch he wore at the moment of his death was a gift from the workmen on a contractor to see the moment of his death was a gift from the workmen on a contract on the G. & S. W. Railroad in Scotland. The crystal of the watch was broken, and it stopped at twenty minutes past aims. In 1855 or 56 Mr. Shedden cauge to Canada from Virginia, U. S., where he had successful completed a difficult railway contract. Here, in conjunction with Mr. Wm. Hendrie, he in ugugated the cartage system which has some that time become so perfected, in Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton, London, and Detroit. One of the best things of the kind from the pen of an English cricketer is the appended comments on the American game of base ball, written by Captain Fitzgerald of the English cricket party, who came to America in 1872. Referring to base ball, he says:—This game is well adapted to the genius of the people. It is of comparatively short duration; it has few pauses; it is constantly changing its aspect. There is no sticking, no monotonous change of overs—all is on the strike—everbody is on the bound. It will hold its own in America, and cricket can never expect to attain its popularity. From an English point of view, it presents little interest; there are no hard knocks on the knuckles or shins, none of the excitement that is engendered by a fast bowler, or a quick wicket. It sdemands quickness of foot and eye, and above all, requires smartness and precision of throwing. It develops fielding, and it ought to teach men to open their shoulders, for hard hitting is a sine quann with a good base ball player. To sum up it is an improvement on our oll schoolboy's game of rounders, without, however—the most attractive part to an English schoolboy—the "corking." We can see still, we are not sure we cannot still feel, the quiver of the fat boy's nether parts, as the ball, well directed, buried itself in his fielsh. "Rounders' had attractions for you; we doubt if the improved game would amuse the grown up Ericish public. Immense sums are staked upon it in America, and a handsome income is realized by the celebrated Red Stocking (Boston) Club. Crucket has to contend against the business habits of Americans. They will not give the time necessary for the game. They will snatch a few moments from the counter for base ball, and they would do the same for cricket; but the same two men may be in at the same time. We believe this to be the interestical position of cricket in the States. Time is money there, and they are not charmed with monotony, even if it be high art.
