Greatest of Harvests in History of Province Golden Stream of Wealth Starts to Pour into the Granaries Of Tillers of Soil in Big Wheat Belt

HARVESTING operations will be general throughout Southern Alberta this week according to the weekly crop reports received on Saturday night by the C.P.R. from its agents in Alberta. In the north country the harvest will be from a week to ten days later in some districts. In the Lethbridge district wheat cutting is general and threshing has been started. The yield is good and the sample excellent. Fall wheat is yielding from 25 to 35 bushels per acre. Along the C. and E. south, between Calgary and Macleod, a little wheat cutting has been done and harvesting will be in full swing this week. LONDON, Aug. 11.—The Dutch steamer Iris reported here last night, reporting that the North German Lloyd steamer Frankfurt, bound for Canada from Bremen, with 1,200 immigrants aboard, collided with an unknown steamer near the Hawk lightship. Soon after the collision the Frankfurt began shipping water in large quantities. Despite the apparent seriousness of the accident, it is not believed that the passengers were in danger. Two steamers came to the rescue of the Frankfurt and are now towing her into port, probably Bremen.

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—The Evening Journal says: It is learned on good authority that the C. P. R. will make a new issue of \$60,000,000 at a premium of 75 percent at the meeting on Monday next. This will mean that present shareholders will receive one new share for every four shares now held and on the basis of 375 market price the shareholders will thus receive "rights" to the value of slightly over \$20 a share.

Winston Churchill COMPARES LAW TO TILLET

In Passionate Newspaper Attack Flays Leader of Opposition for Ulster's Stand Declares Doctrines Preached Disqualify Conservative Leader for Responsibility Says Teachings Inspire Action in Every Street Bully Armed With Brickbat

One Thousand Persons Are Killed Throughout Turkey By Earthquakes Which Lay Into Ruins Many Villages And Shake Warships Off Dardanelles

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 12.—Reports here today indicate that the great earthquake shock which was felt through a great part of Turkey, was accompanied by much heavier loss of life than at first stated. The newspapers today estimate the victims at 1,000 killed, while the injured are said to number from five to six thousand. The details of the earthquake, which are coming in slowly, owing to the interruption of the wires, indicate that the seismic disturbance was widespread. Several hundred persons have been killed, thousands are homeless and outbreaks of fire have occurred in many of the towns and villages. Great destruction has been caused by the uprisings in the district between Constantinople and Adrianople. The shock severely. Fugitives from Myriophito report 300 killed and 600 injured. The town was still burning when they left. Ganos-Hora has been wiped out, eighty persons being killed and thirty wounded. The wrecked buildings took fire and most of them were burned to the ground. Shar-Koi was completely destroyed and two nearby villages were engulfed. Adrianople suffered little damage but Tchorlu was partially destroyed by the earthquake and fire.

MORE ARRESTS PROMISED FOR DETROIT ALDERMEN

Detroit, Aug. 11.—Rumors that the sixteen aldermen arrested in connection with the alleged councilmanic graft exposure will waive police court examination, and that the case will be disposed of in record time, were in circulation tonight. It was said that a tentative agreement had been reached between Prosecuting Attorney Shepherd and the attorneys for the accused to allow for this procedure. The only other development in the situation today was that the statement that three of the officials have already confessed, and that Detective Burns had been called back to the city to look into new evidence uncovered by the prosecutor. The latter official refused to discuss the prospective visit of the detective. When he left, his office the statement today said: "There will be nothing doing today and probably not on Monday, but more arrests will come after Monday."

MAN MADE UNCONSCIOUS FROM BEE STINGS

Vancouver, Aug. 11.—Stung by bees in eight spots on his face, Frederick Gunter, aged 40, nearly died on Saturday. He was unconscious in the hospital for many hours but is now on the road to recovery.

BAGGAGE MASTER IS RUN DOWN AND KILLED

St. John, N.B., Aug. 11.—Frederick McInnis, the C. P. R. baggage master at Norton, was killed on the railway track a short distance above the station early Saturday morning. A train ran over him, cutting off both legs. Just how he came to be struck by the train is not clear as his body was not discovered until some hours after the last express had passed.

COMPANY FORMED TO TAKE OVER INDUSTRIAL SITES

Saskatoon, Sask., Aug. 11.—A company has been formed in the city by interested holding properties on the west side in which prospective industrial locations are pooled and the concern capitalized at a million dollars. This company will take over the character of the Saskatoon transfer railway company, and will co-operate with the industrial league recently launched with a million dollars capital by public subscription, eighty acres being granted to the latter for sites. The purchase of A. Dick, Calgary, Alvin Fletcher, and the Saskatoon-Saskatchewan Land Co., are involved. L. L. Anthes, of the Anthes Foundries at Toronto and Winnipeg, has been in the city in connection with the project.

HOSPITAL PATIENTS SAID TO BE BURGLARS

Port Arthur, Ont., Aug. 10.—Hugo Reid, Toney Aleites and Robt. Langan were placed under arrest here today on a charge of burglary at Sault Ste. Marie. They were taken into custody at the hospital where they have been patients for a week with knife wounds received in a stabbing affray on Sunday night last in an outlying park. At that time they refused to give their names or any particulars regarding the mix-up which sent the three and two others to the hospital. Their identification as men wanted by the S. M. police clears up a mystery that greatly puzzled the police. William O'Hara, another victim of the same mix-up, is under arrest on a charge of assaulting a girl of less than 12 years.

The Swift Locomotion "Bug" Promises Upward Attendants at Great Speedways Races

Constables Lying In Wait Book Heavy Day's Business as Cars Fly By

Points of Merit Will be Settled by Police Magistrate Today

LARGE QUANTITY OF STOLEN BANKNOTES

(Continued from Page 1)

No less than \$2,020 in notes stolen from a branch of the Bank of Montreal in New Westminster on the night of September 15, 1911, when \$350,000 disappeared, were found in a grip belonging to Davis, and of the other amount of \$7,305.50 which the man had in his possession, the officers allege much was obtained by changing groups of the stolen notes. Davis is maintaining silence as to the manner in which he got the notes. The arrest of Davis is primarily due to a plan conceived by Detective Tipton. About a month ago information reached the detective department that some of the stolen bills were in circulation in Toronto.

Secured Numbers of Notes

Tipton then thought it would be advisable to get a list of the numbers and series of all the noted notes. He secured this from the bank and had numerous copies of the list made out. These he left with the proprietors of hotels, cigar stores and many other places at which money changes hands. To make the net as "hole-proof" as possible he had the list left at many unlikely places until the whole town was a patchwork of notes. Shortly after this the effect of this system was felt. The day after a copy of the list had been left at the Hotel, a man bought a drink and gave one of the stolen bills in payment. Immediately after receiving the change he left the hotel and disappeared.

Woman Passed Notes

The police were of the opinion that he knew the truth concerning the bill, for it was believed he left the city almost at once.

On August 7, a woman made a small purchase at the cigar store of William Goldstein & Co., 32 Yonca street, and tendered one of the missing bills. The detectives were phoned to, but the woman had left before Detective Tipton got to the store. The boy at the store, however, saw the bill and an excellent description of her. The woman did not return, but it was the list at Goldstein's which caused the arrest. On Friday afternoon a man bought a walking stick at the cigar store and gave one of the stolen bills in payment. He also asked that another of the bills be made in change for him.

As the man left the store, one of the employees followed him while the constables hurried to the scene, but the amateur had lost sight of the man before he arrived.

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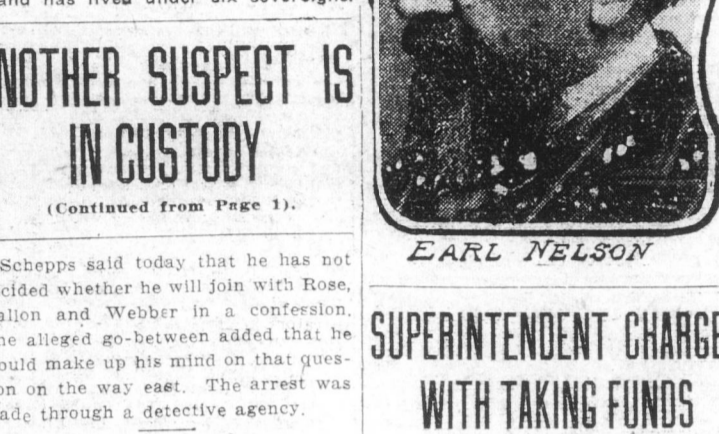

Another Suspect is in Custody (Continued from Page 1)

Scheps said today that he has not decided whether he will join with Rose, Vallon and Webber in a confession. The alleged go-between added that he would make up his mind on that question through the way east. The arrest was made through a detective agency.

New York, Aug. 11.—The arrest of Sam Scheps in Hot Springs has given a new impetus to the Rosenbaum case. It is considered the most important development since the confessions of Jack Rose and "Bridge" Webber led to the indictment of Police Inspector Charles Karpoff, chief of the district attorney to complicit in the alleged investigation of the murder.

Arrested By Private Detectives

One of the most interesting features in connection with the arrest of Scheps is that the police authorities here appear to have had no hand in the capture. Late tonight, nearly 24 hours after the arrest of Scheps, Deputy Police Commissioner Dougherty was in ignorance of the capture, except for enlightenment given him by newspaper dispatches.

Mr. Dougherty admitted, however, that if Scheps was really in custody, it was a most important contribution to the case.

The Conspiracy Charged

Scheps is charged, with in the conspiracy to murder Rosenbaum, and to hide the automobile in which the slayers were carried to and from the scene of the shooting and also paid off the gangsters after they had completed their work. While Scheps was missing from his home since July 15, the detective say he was in the city upto and including July 18.

He had a brother-in-law, Joseph Scheps, who was arrested in the house in Harry Pollock's house in Havelock street. When Rose surrendered, Scheps dropped out of sight and no trace was found of him until he was rounded up in Hot Springs yesterday.

Says He Is "Keynote"

Scheps' arrest at Hot Springs has led to the "keynote to the situation" here, did not appear to Mr. Dougherty to be an exaggeration. There is little doubt in the commissioner's mind that Scheps can furnish about all the information that is now needed to round out the case. No confession from the missing fugitives "Skip," "Blood" and "Lassy" Louis is needed. With the arrest of Scheps it is believed that the task of the district attorney is much simplified.

Jack Sullivan, "King of the News," has already broken down and has agreed to go before Mr. William Whitman tomorrow and tell all he knows about the alleged connection between the two brothers, with the murder, Sullivan made this agreement with Assistant District Attorney James E. Smith, who visited him today in the West Side prison where he is confined in company with Rose, Webber and Vallon, who have confessed their part in the crime.

More Money Found

Efforts of representatives of District Attorney Whitman to uncover the bank deposits resulted today in locating five more banks in which accounts were credited to the name of Becker and his wife, representing the fact that those bills were in the West Side Savings Bank, deposits of over \$25,000. All the deposits were made within the last eight months. In one bank, Becker was credited with \$12,000. It was also learned that two police inspectors had made recent deposits totaling \$15,000.

"Jack" Rose, it was learned today, has received absolute immunity. It became known that when Rose confessed before the grand jury a stipulation granting him his freedom as soon as he has completed his testimony at the trial of the case, was signed by the district attorney and Judge Mulquhann, with the approval of the grand jury.

THRILLING RESCUE OF WHITE PRISONER IN THE WILDS OF CENTRAL AFRICA

(George Sanford, who tells this story, is a rubber trader, explorer and big game hunter. His headquarters are in London now, but he is at home in all parts of the World. He was recently in New York, and spent a season hunting in the Rocky mountains.)

If there is one thing of which the Bechwana are more fond than twigs, it is fighting. They are an industrious, agricultural people, expert in the breeding and raising of cattle, but they do love a fight, and that for the fight's sake and nothing else.

For that reason, when Guy Stanton, Fred Churchwarden and myself left Mokoppe, in 1889, to trade with the natives for skins and grain, we armed twenty of our Kaffir boys with rapid-fire rifles. We didn't expect trouble with the natives, for they were friendly to white men, especially traders, but we knew their wholesome love of a fight, and we were going prepared for one.

We worked northward to Motopolopole, where we engaged a few more natives as porters, stocked the commissary and struck into Sebele's country. At the village of Mankole, we came to a native village and were received with a barbed-knife of honor with a barbed-knife of honor.

You'd laugh at me if I said anything about the beauty and charm of the dance. The girls who executed it were black, and their hair curled and not very long, and their bodies were not shapely, judged according to European standards, but they were different in the forest. You can't understand the beauty of these things until you've shaken off the head of civilization; until you are just a creature of the jungle, hunting and hunted in turn, depending on a sliver of eye between the scimitar and the spear.

When you have known these things, then you can understand the savage dance and the songs of the Bechwana; you know that a payable of their dialect.

A Spirit of Unrest

We did a bit of trading with Mankole's people, but the old man and all his big hounds were restless, and we knew there must be something afoot which was even more interesting to the Bechwana than sweeping akins and grain for salt and cattle.

Sure enough, there was. Mankole informed us that he and his people were to be sent away to the north and westward.

The expedition was merely in the nature of returning a compliment. The Bechwana had asked for Mijiji, from that district had lately descended upon Mankole, destroyed two of his best herds of cattle, driven off another herd and incidentally given Mankole a piece of the soundest trouncing of his lives.

Until this wrong was avenged the heads of his people were in no condition to think of trading; the chief told us. They were smarting under the indignity and the affront which had been offered them.

A White Man Captive

And, last of all, Mankole said, partly in his native tongue, partly with his native hands, and with a few words and a flourish of his rifle, that he would carry away a white man who was as good as dead. He came all the way from Mankole to the Cape (which Mankole meant Cape Town) and he had been with me almost a month. I loved him, for he was a beautiful white man and traded generously.

The old savage recited this bit of news with the air of a man deeply moved. We hoped that Mijiji would burst into tears. I guessed his grief to be of the proverbial crocodile variety, but I knew for a fact that the story was true before Leo Waring, who helped Scotty Smith found Stellaland, had left the Cape more than eighteen months previously for the Bechwana country and had not been heard from since.

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There were cracking of heads and sitting of throats a-plenty even to satisfy the warlike Bechwana, but we numbered the enemy, and we soon had them seeking cover and scurrying for their villages. We thrashed on after them through the heavy growth, but they knew a blasted red head. Only it was evidently a hunting party we had encountered, and following the trail they led through the forest.

A Glimpse of a Fiery Red Head

There were no European tactics this time. We let the natives fight their own way. With a howl that split the air they dashed to the walls of the stockade, but the remnants of the hunting party had prepared the tribe, and they were ready for us. Just as we reached the first line of our men reached the timber stockade which surrounded the village I caught a glimpse of a blazing red head. Only a glimpse it was, and then the head disappeared as though some one had pulled the man away from the stockade. At the instant I did, and he broke simultaneously into a shout of triumph.

A Jackknife Reassures Us

One evening, just before we came to a halt for the night I saw Churchwarden stoop with a little rifle, pick some glistering object from the ground. Stanton and I ran to him, thinking he had discovered some valuable trinket, but he only held a jackknife. It was a small jackknife of Sheffield make, with a little blade, but it was so valuable to have been used in trading with the natives, and, moreover, the savages had no use for such trinkets.

Mankole's men were at the top of the enclosure, but the men at the top pushed them back, thrusting at them with spears and clubbing them. This manner of assault was plainly futile, and after a few of them were taken prisoner, we were able to persuade them to retreat. We had taken the rifles away from the Kaffirs, but the three of us lay under a tree, waiting for the next move. The Kaffir that showed himself. This was not accomplishing anything in the way of a rescue, and we tried, but with little success, to draw Mijiji and his men out of the kraal.

Waring Fights For Freedom

Suddenly there came a great outcry from within the stockade. It was a yell of triumph and pain mingled. Above it all we heard the shouting of a white man. We could not figure out what was going on. There was a great crash against the wooden gate of the stockade, and it burst almost open, then crashed shut again. We went out as the gate opened, but above all the uproar I heard Waring curse. We knew then what was going on. Waring had made a break for liberty, and was alone giving the brave of Mijiji the fight of his lives.

We did not wait for our African allies, Stanton, Churchwarden, and myself, but we went on alone. The Kaffirs were close behind us, but before we reached our objective the gate opened. Waring and a group of his men were sprawled on the ground. Before they had time to pin him down Churchwarden crashed his rifle butt on the head of the man nearest him. He rolled limp on the ground, and in an instant we had all three fallen upon the men who were attacking Waring. Waring was weak, and from many wounds, but we left him in the shade of a palm and returned to the conflict, which was going in favor of Mijiji. Our rifles were useless except as clubs, but our pistols stood us in good stead until they were emptied.

The Closest Call I Ever Had

Before I knelt with a pair of strong, heavy arms over my head, and I found it hard to breathe. I managed to get my forearm under the chin of the man who was crushing me, and pressed his head back until I thought his neck must break, but he wrigged and squirmed, trying to throw me to the ground.

With a wrench he lifted me from my feet, and we fell together. He freed me from the grasp of one arm, and felt with the other hand for my throat, but he was parrying and his breath came hard from the pressure on his neck. I was trying to liberate my other arm.



Twice as we rolled about I came on top, but I couldn't break the savage's hold. At last I drew my knees up and began to jab them into his face and stomach, but he held me too close for this to be effective.

I saw him lift his hand, and waited. It seemed minutes for the sound of the butt thudding against my adversary's skull; but it did not come.
