FIFTEENTH YEAR  
WESTWOOD'S ANTE-MORTEM

LED THE DETECTIVE TO THINK HE WAS NOT FOR REVENGE.

He mentions the Name of a Man Whom His Would-be Assassin Remembered, But the latter is Able to Give a Satisfactory Account of His Movements on Saturday Night and is Not Detained.

Frank B. Westwood, the victim of the mysterious shooting at his father's residence at Parkdale on Saturday night last, was still alive at 3 o'clock this morning, but his death is only a question of a few hours.

The identity of the man who did the shooting is as much a mystery as ever. Young Westwood made an ante-mortem statement to County Crown Attorney Curry yesterday, but according to the detective it threw little light on the affair. He repeated the statement already published that after he went upstairs with his mother at 10:30 Saturday night he heard the door ring and went downstairs to answer it. He went to the door and at that instant the caller discharged his revolver. He was quite positive that the man was a man and that he made no remark.

Not the Housewife Thief.  
As soon as he realized that he had been shot young Westwood clung to the door and was therefore unable to get a good view of the man who had summoned him to his death. He secured the detective, however, that it was not the man with whom he had been in dispute a couple of months ago when he caught him attempting to break into the back house of the Westwoods, although the man resembled very much the party who was with him.

Not the Housewife Thief.  
The dying man solemnly assured the County Crown Attorney that the shooting could not possibly have been the outcome of any wrong inflicted upon young Westwood—that this hypothesis might be at once dismissed, as there were no grounds whatever for it. He said that whether he could possibly say that the assassin was one of the men who were at Clement's boat house, Westwood replied that he could not, but that he was certain that out of the two men who were not the party, but his visitor resembled the other, whose name he mentioned.

At the same time he expressed doubts that he was the man, as the dispute was not of such a nature as would lead a man to take his life to obtain revenge.

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HONOR TO THE NOBLE DEAD

CANADIAN TRIBUTE TO THE LATE SIR JOHN A. MACDONALD.

A List of the Monuments Which Have Been Erected to the Memory of the Great Leader—Interesting History of the Macdonald Memorial Committee's Work.

The people of Canada showed in the most remarkable degree their sorrow at the time of the death of the Right Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, and to multitudes throughout the Dominion June 6, 1891, remains one of the saddest days in Canadian annals. In the many months which are now completed or waiting completion Canadians have since shown that this admiration and respect for the life and work of a great statesman is a practical, living force in the country.

London, England, the heart of the empire which Sir John loved so well and did so much to unify and strengthen, was the first to erect a memorial. All the leading statesmen of the day combined in a committee, of which Mr. Charles Dufferin and Lord Rosebery were the chief members. In the many months which are now completed or waiting completion Canadians have since shown that this admiration and respect for the life and work of a great statesman is a practical, living force in the country.

London, Ontario, was the next place to honor the chief statesman, and on Nov. 2 of last year a handsome statue was unveiled by Sir John Thompson, one of the great Canadian politicians. The committee which did the necessary work in the Dominion City was headed by Mr. J. H. McMillan, and consisted of Messrs. A. G. Ramsay and William Hendrie as vice-presidents, John Kinnear, and E. Smith, secretary. Mr. George Wade, the English sculptor of the memorial in St. Paul's, was given the commission, and the result has been a handsome, life-like presentation of Sir John's features and characteristics.

Kingston started out to have a national monument, and appointed a committee, of which Hon. G. A. Kirkpatrick was chairman, John McKeay and J. S. Mucklestone, vice-chairmen, John King, secretary. The sculptor is to be Mr. Herbert of Montreal, and it is understood that the monument will be unveiled in the spring. In Montreal the matter was taken up as its general citizens are accustomed to do with patriotic enterprises. A committee was appointed, with Col. T. C. Henshaw as chairman, Mr. Joseph H. Johnston as secretary, and Mr. R. A. Grant as treasurer. And by Oct. 1, 1891, nearly 200,000 had been pledged.

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BOND QUESTION STILL A SECRET

English Offer Not the Best After All—Canadian Banks May Still Have a Chance.

Yesterday afternoon City Treasurer Coady received a cablegram from England in reply to the message sent on Monday to the people who made the offer for the bonds, but the contents of the cablegram were not disclosed.

The late Mr. McLean was a gentleman of the highest character, and of great capacity for his onerous position, and the Board of Trade has special occasion to express its appreciation of the valuable information at his disposal, and he was in most active sympathy with the work of the Board of Trade.

On enquiry in several quarters it was learned that the English firm with whom Mr. Shaw and Treasurer Coady were negotiating, did not, after all, make an offer for three and a half per cent. bonds, which the sub-committee on Monday declined to entertain, as they did not think that class of security would be of interest to the city.

If this is so, then the only offer for 3 1/2 per cent. bonds comes from the Canadian banks and if the sale has not been made the city will be bound to accept the offer of the three per cent. bonds from Mr. Wilson Smith, a Montreal broker representing either a bank or a syndicate of banks.

Whatever may be the situation, it is the something which was made public. The whole matter has been kept so secret that unfavorable rumors have been floating in the city, and the Mayor Kennedy and the other members composing the sub-committee.

Chinese Names.  
What we call names in China the clan or family name, the one or two names following being the personal names. The family name is, of course, inherited. The Chinese are very proud of their ancestral names and laugh with contempt at those tribes who have no surnames. In consequence of this change of names, it is effected by the imperial order. The surname is far more important to a Chinaman than it is to a European.

Chinese Names.  
The personal names are not given at baptism, but in the course of his life. The Chinese, however, address religiously to his family name, has many changes of name, which may prove harmful to him by his mother. Then he has his school name, which is solemnly bestowed upon him by his father. Afterward, when he comes to man's estate, his father gives him a new name, or he can give one himself. He may also have a name which he gives himself another new name, and if he becomes an author he gives himself a new name, which is usually a Chinese name. A British "nom de guerre," which is a name which he takes upon himself, especially in Western countries, where the literary name may not be known. A French name is given to themselves, they are always of felicitous import. A not uncommon one is "Chin" or "China," which is a name which he gives himself another new name, and if he becomes an author he gives himself a new name, which is usually a Chinese name.
