U. S. Health Officials Say Perilous Period Following Pueblo Flood Has Passed

Pueblo. Colo., June 8-Danger of pestilence, following last Friday's disastrous flood has passed, according to officials of the United Public Health Service: there is plenty of food: shelter has been provided in gestion in churches, schools and private homes, and an army of men has been at work clearing the streets of debris, removing dead animals and clearing out the business places.

Part of the city is again electrically lighted. The gas companies have preparations nearly completed for supplying gas for heat and light. The city water plant is functioning and today a water purifier will prepare for human consumption 5,000,000 gallons of water daily. The city has a plentiful supply of meat.

With the centralization of immediate and permanent relief work. measures of rehabilitation got under way yesterday with the beginning of a census, or survey of every storm victim to obtain accurate information in each individual case on what aid would be necessary.

Forty two bodies of flood victims were in the morgues of the city last night. Five additional bodies were recovered, one of the unidentified bodies was identified and some of the discrepancies in the lists previously announced were traced. J. W. Pressy, in charge of identification of flood victims, stated that a number of dead reported were not flood victims, but died of natural causes.
