PARISH NOTES.

OFFERTORY.—Oct. 4th, 70.33; 11th, \$49.35; 18th, \$43.86; 25th, \$43.15. Total, 206.69. Corresponding period last year, 212.23.

DAILY PRAYER during the month just past has been said in the Bible Class Room, and will continue to be said *there* until the decoration of the Chancel has been completed.

The Rector is still away, but ere this is read will, we hope, be with us again. He sailed by the "Gallia," on the 24th, which is due in New York the 1st November. Some of the ladies of the Parish are arranging a gathering of Pewholders to welcome him on his return. This is to be held on Thursday evening, 5th November, at the Schoolhouse.

We have now District Visitors for S. Patrick's Square, Sullivan, Soho, Bulwer, Richmond, Queen, Beverley, Phoebe, and William Streets. The following districts are as yet without Visitors: Peter, McCaul, D'Arcy, Baldwin, Larch Streets, and Grange Avenue. The Clergy will gladly hear of volunteers for this work.

The Phoebe Street Mission Sunday School is working very satisfactorily. There are on the roll 150 children, with an average attendance of a little over 100. Very few of the children, from the report of the Superintendent, Mr. Robarts, have come from the afternoon Sunday School.

The Services in the Mission Hall on Phoebe Street during the month just past have been very well attended, each Service witnessing an increase in numbers. While in the School Room we never exceeded 70. now we have, at the very lowest, 125. What is gratifying in connection with these Services is, that the people come voluntarily, *i. e.*, come without being asked to come. We are deeply indebted to the Rev. Mr. Whitcombe, and Messrs. Symons, and Dixon, for their very earnest and practical addresses.

In response to the appeal made in the September number of the *Parish Journal*, for books for a Library for the Mission Hall, the Curate begs to acknowledge contributions from Prof. Goldwin Smith, per Miss Moffatt; the Rev. Prof. Boys, Miss Gamble, and "a friend of the Mission Hall." We have also to acknowledge the present of a handsome eight day clock from Mrs. McGregor, and Scriptural Texts from Mrs. Chin.

The decorations of the Chancel have been getting on slowly, but are now nearing completion, as the ceiling is finished.

CHORAL WEDDING.

It is not very often that we have to chronicle a choral wedding at St. George's, and it may be that the first one which has taken place was that of Miss Ethel VanKoughnet to Mr. William McCulloch, of the Molsons Bank. The bride was met at the door by the Choir, and the Rev. Prof. Clark, by whom the ceremony was performed. Instead of the usual exhortation, a short homily by Bishop Jeremy Taylor was read. Despite the wet weather a very large number were present.

PAROCHIAL NEEDS.—Besides the means of meeting ordinary expenditure—

1. Debt, \$3,500, should be paid off, or at least reduced, but the ordinary revenue is insufficient to provide funds for this purpose. One dollar monthly from every pewholder would soon extinguish it.
2. The improvement of the Church, to render it more worthy and suitable for the sacred purpose to which it is consecrated. \$3,000 is wanted for this, and would be provided if every family in the Congregation gave a moderate sum towards it.
3. \$1,000 for the erection of the Phœbe Street Mission Hall, and subscriptions to maintain the Mission.
4. Donations and bequests towards an endowment, of which there is at present a sum of \$295 only.

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
