The Need is For Men

Now that Valcartier is being cleared of all the men in training there, it will perhaps be realized how tremendous the pressure is upon the other side of the Atlantic.

It is estimated that a million British troops will be engaged on the continent by next June. That means that we must do four times better than we have done yet.

Were the British navy, by any chance, to go down before the attacks of the concealed enemy who have just sunk three cruisers in the North Sea, the ravages of war would be transferred to Canada just as surely as they have devastated Belgium.

We rely on the British navy to prevent such an event. Yet we have done nothing to strengthen the navy.


