MIMICO WANTS A NEW G. T. R. STATION

Railway Commissioners Listened to Reasons From a Deputation.

BELL AT EGLINTON AVE.

G. T. R. and C. P. R. Must Install One at Dangerous Crossing.

Thirteen cases were heard by the Board of Railway Commissioners in the city hall yesterday morning.

Representatives of the Mimico Board of Trade complained of the inconvenience and danger in regard to the G.T.R. station, and asked that a new \$75,000 station be erected in the centre of four tracks and subway approaches.

W. C. Chisholm, who represented the Grand Trunk, said the railway were trying to keep down their capital expenditure, and that they may give Mimico what it asked for when times get better.

It was stated that most of the passengers in and out of Mimico traveled by street car or jitney. Trade receipts from this place did not warrant an expenditure of \$75,000 for a new station.

Decision was reserved regarding complaints made that butter for shipment was placed in an old shed in the station along with oil, owing to the want of proper facilities for merchandising.

Township Gets Order. The Grand Trunk and C.P.R., on application of the Township of York, are to erect an electric bell at Eglington avenue, where the railways cross on the west side of Yonge street.

George Webb, 253 MacPherson avenue, has applied for a license to construct a spur line to serve his lumber yard on Summerhill avenue. The C.P.R. has objected, as it would have to be constructed from their main line.

On hearing that there were law suits pending and the decision of the board might prejudice the cases the board decided to withhold its decision.

HARRY THAW WINS FREEDOM AT LAST

Crowds Cheered Him as He Traveled by Motor to Pittsburg.

STATE HAS APPEALED

Thaw Released on Bail Following Justice Hendrick's Decision.

NEW YORK, July 16.—Harry K. Thaw shook off the grip of the law today, motored down Broadway to the applause of admirers, crossed the ferry to Jersey City, bade the sheriff good-bye and whirled away towards Philadelphia with his car throwing dust on the procession of automobiles filled with newspaper men under orders to stay with him.

He reached Newark, 10 miles away, at 2 o'clock, and stopped for luncheon. His presence becoming known, immediately a cheering crowd, which taxed the capabilities of the police, assembled in the street outside the restaurant. After luncheon Thaw resumed his trip. His announced intention was to motor to Philadelphia, about 100 miles by roadway, and there take a train for Pittsburg.

For the first time since he fired the shot that killed Stanford White at the Madison Square roof garden, more than nine years ago, Thaw was free today to go and come as he pleased. Supreme Court Justice Hendrick, who presided at the jury proceedings which ended Wednesday with the verdict that Thaw was sane, announced from the bench shortly before noon that he had adopted the jury's verdict. The writ committing Thaw to Matteawan seven years ago thereupon automatically became inoperative.

When Thaw's attorneys appealed from Justice Hendrick's decision and Thaw was released in \$35,000 bail pending the result of the appeal.

### THE FASTEST MILE EVER RUN BY MAN

#### Norman S. Taber Beats Old Mark by Nearly Two Seconds in Trial Against Time.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., July 16.—The fastest recorded mile ever run by man was the athletic feat of Norman S. Taber, the Englishman, formerly of Brown University, in the Harvard Stadium today. His time was 4 minutes 12.5 seconds. Taber was paced by three fast middle-distance runners. The first quarter was made in 58 seconds, the second 57 seconds, the third in 58 seconds and the fourth in 58.5 seconds.

W. H. Meanix, formerly of Colby College, set a new world's time of 51.5 seconds in the 440-yard hurdles. Meanix had two pace-makers, Ross Taber and Meanix ran under the colors of the Boston Athletic Association.

The former amateur mile record was 4 minutes 14.5 seconds, made in 1912, by the same track by John Paul Jones of Cornell in 1912. Taber running second. The professional mile record is 4 minutes 12.5 seconds has stood since 1886, having been made by W. B. George, Little Bidge, England, in a series of races.

The former 440-yard hurdle record of 54.5 seconds was made in 1910 by Anderson of England.
